





# Nixon Takes Oath As President

 Nixon, who was sworn in at 12:05 p.m., was the first president to be sworn in on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. He was accompanied by his wife, Pat, and their four children. The ceremony was broadcast live on television and radio. Nixon read a message to the people, in which he said that he was proud to be the first American president to be sworn in on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. He said that he would continue the policies of the Eisenhower administration and that he would work to bring about peace in Vietnam. He also said that he would work to improve the economy and to strengthen the defense. The ceremony was attended by thousands of people, and it was a historic moment in American history.

# Nixon Peace Team Off To Paris

PARIS (AP) — The Nixon administration's first team to the Vietnam peace talks began arriving in Paris today, and the four delegations were expected to get down to business before the end of the week.  
 Lawrence Walsh, who will replace Cyrus R. Vance as the U.S. delegation No. 2 man, arrived this morning. Henry Cabot Lodge, the delegation chief, was due tonight from Washington.  
 Walsh said on his arrival there are elements of optimism in the coming negotiations to end the war. "The timing of it may be difficult," he added. "It would be wrong to minimize the difficulties ahead."  
 Walsh told newsmen at Orly Airport. "Everyone realizes we have made a good start, but everyone also realizes that there is a great deal more to be accomplished. It seems to me the elements are here for optimism, but the timing of it may be difficult."  
 The Viet Cong's National Liberation Front proposed Saturday that the first session of substantive talks be held Tuesday. But Lodge said the U.S. response would have to await his arrival in Paris, and other officials in Washington doubted the talks could get under way so soon.  
 President Johnson's chief negotiator at the talks, W. Averell Harriman, flew to Washington Sunday and saw both Lodge and Johnson soon after his arrival.  
 Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky, supervisor of the South Vietnamese delegation, was expected back in Paris early this week. He had returned to Saigon before Christmas while the talks were conducted over the shape of a conference table.  
 A sense of urgency and activity pervaded all the delegations to the French capital.  
 In Washington, Harriman, told his successor the way has been set for "new and serious talks for a peaceful settlement" of the war in Vietnam.  
 "You'll be hard to follow," he said.

**LBJ Resumes Private Citizen Role**  
 WASHINGTON (AP) — While Richard M. Nixon stands in the spotlight today as the nation's 37th President, Lyndon Baines Johnson quietly leaves the national capital, a private citizen for the first time in 32 years.  
 The plans called for Johnson, after escorting Nixon to the Capitol for the oath-taking ceremonies, to have a quiet lunch with outgoing Defense Secretary Clark Clifford and then fly on an Air Force plane to his ranch in Texas.  
 While Johnson has said he has looked forward to exchanging the 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. address of the White House for Ranch Road No. 1, Johnson City, Tex., his last days in office as 36th President have been filled with sentiment and expressions of good will.  
 "I'm leaving this town with nothing but gratitude and love in my heart," he said.  
 The Johnson family, leaving the White House for the last time as residents about 11:10 a.m. EST, first join the motorcade that will carry Nixon to the Capitol for the oath taking ceremony.  
 Leaving with him were his wife Lady Bird, their two married daughters, Lynda Robb and Luci Nugent, and grandchildren, 18-month-old Lynn Nugent and 3-month-old Lucinda Robb.  
 True to form, Johnson spent a day, his final full day as President, working for hours in his office cleaning up some final details.  
 He went to church in the morning. The Martin Luther King prayer written by Johnson and the national anthem were sung by the choir.  
 Johnson urged the Lord to help the nation rid itself of bigotry, hate and violence, especially in Washington, D.C.  
 "Watch over his city and keep it from strife and sorrow," he wrote.

 During the church service, the minister read a prayer written by Johnson in which he asked God to "deliver us from the follies of power and pride."  
 "Show us the uses of our strength that will make life better on this earth for all Thy children. In season and out, help us to hold to the purpose 'Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself,' healing the sick, caring for the needy, trusting our young, training them up in the way that they should go."

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# Communists Step Up Warfare

SAIGON (AP) — Four U.S. bases and a dozen South Viet barracks installations were hit Sunday night by stepped-up attacks which Saigon officials considered a demonstration of enemy determination to fight as well as talk in Paris.  
 Military spokesmen said eight Americans were killed, 35 were wounded and nine helicopters were slightly damaged by mortar fragments in hand-run attacks on four U.S. outposts northwest, north and south of Saigon. The attackers left behind boxes of the U.S. Command said.  
 South Vietnamese headquarters said mortar and rocket attacks on 13 government camps and subordinate headquarters inflicted only light casualties. But on Saturday night there were 29 shelling, sabotage incidents and terror raids in which 19 South Vietnamese soldiers and eight civilians were killed and 18 government troops and 85 civilians wounded.  
 The stepped-up enemy attacks began a few hours after the first session of the four-party peace talks in Paris Saturday, and a government spokesman said the two obviously were connected. More than a million South Vietnamese troops across the country were placed on full alert Sunday because of the increased enemy activity, but a U.S. spokesman said there was no change in the status of American troops.  
 "We're maintaining the same degree of operational readiness we normally do," he said. "We show no enemy threat to Saigon at this point."  
 U.S. air cavalrymen sweeping near the Cambodian border and two of the American installations which were attacked set more than four tons of ammunition, including 132,000 small arms and machine gun bullets and 300 mortar rounds.  
 U.S. intelligence officers said a few captured documents indicated the enemy planned a massive winter-spring offensive to coincide with the presidential inauguration in Washington, but they discounted them because the documents gave conflicting starting dates going back to last Dec. 15.  
 U.S. military sources in Saigon also discounted intelligence estimates from Washington that infiltration of North Vietnamese troops into South Vietnam increased heavily in the last two months. The Saigon sources said such infiltration was "up slightly, but it isn't enough to change the current situation."  
 Some authorities in Washington said infiltration had increased from about 7,000 North Vietnamese troops a month to 10,000 a month.  
 A well-informed source in Saigon said "the 10,000 figure isn't bad at all, but it's nothing like 20,000 according to our preliminary estimates. We can't place any significance in it. They need about 10,000 troops a month to replace their losses."  
 He emphasized that these figures were only preliminary estimates and it would take about six months to get anything resembling an accurate figure.  
 On the political front, an anti-Communist rally in Saigon was a flop Sunday. Only 300 persons showed up, about a quarter of them newsmen, and many dis-

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Editorial Comment

Inauguration Day: Mark GOP Watershed?

As this is read on the afternoon of Jan. 20, 1969, the traditional presidential inauguration parade with all its pomp, pageantry and color winds its way down Pennsylvania Avenue in Washington from the Capitol to the White House.

This year the mass media has mustered all of its talents, all of its facilities to bring the spectacle to the homes of millions to delight the eyes and provide the ears with the sights and sounds of the memorable event which leads to the inauguration of the 37th President of the United States.

Underlying all of this and worthy of the closest scrutiny by all Americans are the words which will be spoken, the expert comment on what they mean, and the local observations and the written accounts offered by the Fourth Estate.

For such a day, such a spectacle, such a memorabilia event does not live by itself. It is, in the truest sense, one more milestone in the progress towards the basic American ideal which came to this continent more than three centuries ago.

Inauguration of Richard M. Nixon can be interpreted, however, as marking a political watershed which has been seen off-and-on ever since 1901 when President William McKinley was killed by an assassin's bullet and "Teddy" Roosevelt, spouse of the "strenuous life" moved in and moved with characteristic vigor to vitalize the Republican party of those days.

President Nixon is, of course, a hard-and-fast Republican. And the course of the Republican President from TR to ERM has been something which might well be noted on this inaugural day.

For instance there were six GOP leaders in the White House from 1901 to 1908. During that period only one Democrat made it — this was Woodrow Wilson, professor turned politician, whose and decline and fall allowed the Republicans to nominate and put in the presidential office Warren G. Harding, who would die in office and be succeeded by Calvin Coolidge, president in 1923.

This is the time when the tide of events produced the swell which would crest during the presidency of Herbert C. Hoover (R) and make possible the watershed which helped the Democrats to win the White House and allow Franklin D. Roosevelt to stay there from 1933 until his death in 1945.

For those who read the historic and memorable years of the New Deal, which Harry S. Truman's Fair Deal and — with the one interlude of the administration of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower '53-'61 — al-

lowed that political philosophy to continue into the Great Society program, when Lyndon B. Johnson now leaves the presidency.

Thus it could well be that the Nixon administration which starts today could produce a change in our controlling political philosophy which would, indeed, become another historic watershed.

For the problems and challenges which the 37th President-elect has tackled with such care during the President-elect honeymoon now knock at his door.

These problems, as former President Johnson so deftly included in his death and final "wishes of the nation" message, are truly in extinction.

"Did You Hear?"

Well now, as everyone has been saying and events themselves are confirming, Sanford is growing. There is one aspect of growth which, it almost goes without saying, is growing pains.

"There's no great about a unicameral legislature when only one state in the Union has it — Nebraska," said a legislator from Florida.

"I do not believe because we are governed by the one-man, one-vote concept that it is necessary to do away with both houses of the legislature. Under the current method, we have checks and balances when one house passes a law, the other reviews it."

"Reasons advanced by proponents of the two-house system is cost."

"If they really want to reduce the cost, we can elect a one-man legislature. If the objective is to cut down cost of expenses in state government and if this is the only concern, why not make it unicameral and have one man pass the laws?"

"The smaller a legislative body is — the more easily it can be manipulated by the various special interest groups. I think the people have to realize we still have a representative form of democracy. It is an expensive form of government. If the least expensive form of government is desired that would be a dictatorship if this is what proponents of this bill are concerned with. I personally would rather pay the expense as a citizen and have more bodies in Tallahassee where I, as one little individual, may have an opportunity to talk to them."

"I think legislation should be carefully considered and should not be pushed through at the whim of one or two individuals. In fact too many attempts are made to pass too much legislation as it is."

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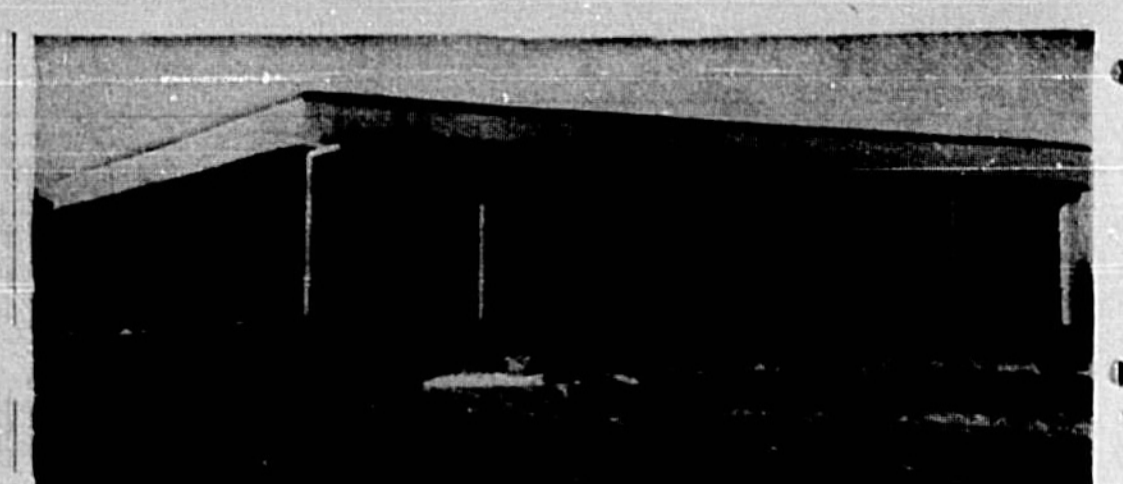

Optimism that the Florida Supreme Court will expedite the entire matter which is hindering Seminole County from building a new courthouse and relatively rapidly arrive at a decision as to the status of the City of Sanford was expressed today by William Hutchinson, special attorney for Seminole, in the courthouse suit.

Hutchinson said the paramount issue in the suit is whether Sanford is the county seat.

Hutchinson, representing the county, and Mack N. Cleveland Jr., representing Vernon Mize and Harlan Tuck, attorney for the three South Seminole residents who stopped construction of the county building through their decision in the appellate court, presented arguments before the Florida high court of the state yesterday in Tallahassee.

Considering whether the high court has jurisdiction the appeal of the Fourth District Court of Appeal decision, which stated Sanford is only the temporary county seat, said Chief Justice Richard Irvin and Justices Joe Boyd, James Adkins, Campbell Therman and E. Hariz Dray.

Also to be considered by the court is the validity of the \$2.9 million bond voted to construct the facility. Cleveland has appealed this decision in order to have the issue clarified and decided.

Hutchinson also has moved to have all suits concerning the courthouse consolidated if the court takes jurisdiction in the matter.
