Lost Fisherman Safe; Missing Day, 2 Nights

A Seminole County man reported missing when his empty boat was found Monday on Lake Harney in Volusia County turned up this morning after spending a day and two nights in the woods.

Chief Deputy Duane Harrell said Jack Sullivan, in his 70s, walked into Lindsey's Fish Camp on SR 46 near Geneva, this morning after being missing since Sunday.

Harrell said the man apparently ditched his boat in rough water and tried to find his way through swamps and thickets but seemed to get further away from civilization.

He spent Sunday and Monday nights in the woods and, according to Harrell, must have walked almost to New Smyrna Beach before becoming more confused and walking back.

Except for exhaustion, Sullivan appeared to be in fair condition.

In another county report, a mother has reported her daughter was located Monday by a man near the Orange County line.

The woman, who lives on Mobaw Trail, said her 15-year-old daughter was invited to get in the car by a middle-aged male driver as the girl walked to school.

COCKTAIL LOUNGE DEMOLISHED BY EXPLOSION; ONE MAN DEAD

1 Dead, Bar Razed In Blast

An explosion, believed to have been caused by a homemade bomb, cost the life of at least one man, and destroyed a South Seminole nightclub at approximately 3:30 o'clock this morning.

A shock wave shook the entire South Seminole County region during the blast, according to residents in the area. Flaming fragments from the building were blown across 17.92, some up to 300 feet. The front door of the blasted building was found across the four-lane thoroughfare.

Killed in the blast was Jack R. Berryhill, 38, of 7810 Sunvista Way, Orlando, according to Sheriff John Polk. The burned body was found near a service entrance to the bar.

Police and fire units from Casselberry, Longwood and the Seminole County sheriff's department were on the scene moments after the explosion, according to Chief Deputy Duane Harrell, the department

has received information that Berryhill was dropped off at the night club 15 minutes prior to the blast, but, according to Harrell, "it's still a puzzle."

Rustan told The Herald that two of his employees along with a friend secured the club at 2:30 a.m. this morning and went to breakfast at a Winter Park restaurant. On returning they found the gutted structure. Rustan said that he had come back to pick up some \$2,000 in cash receipts from Monday's business that he had left in the establishment.

A state fire deputy fire marshal from Winter Park and sheriff's deputies along with other investigators were still waiting at press time to sift through the smoldering club for evidence and the possibility that someone else was inside the building at the time of the explosion.

The body was removed to the Seminole Memorial Hospital, where Justice of the Peace Thomas Lovett ordered an autopsy on the badly seared body.

Carswell Opponents Drag Out Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Opponents of G. Harold Carswell's Supreme Court nomination are talking about stringing out Senate debate past Easter in hopes of "awakening the country" against confirmation.

Democratic Sen. Phillip A. Hart of Michigan and Birch Bayh of Indiana in saying Monday a vote probably would not come until after the March 20

Easter weekend, denied any intention to filibuster.

The two anti-Carswell leaders added they didn't expect lengthened debate to uncover any new evidence to further support charges that the Tallahassee, Fla., federal judge has a racist background and a mediocre judicial record.

He said the first day of debate yielded one such development—a statement by Sen. Roman L. Hruska, the nomination's floor manager, that mediocre people probably were entitled to be represented on the bench.

Although the Nebraska Republican said he did not consider Carswell mediocre, he added in a radio-television interview: "The President appoints these people and even if he were me, there are a lot of mediocre judges and people and lawyers. Aren't they entitled to a little representation and a little chance? We can't have all Brandeises and Cardozo and Frankfurters and stuff like that. I doubt we can. I doubt we want to."

Terrorists Hit Saigon

SAIGON (UPI) — Terrorist bombs destroyed two Allied military jeeps in Saigon Monday night and early today. Two days of fighting near Black Virgin Mountain left 20 North Vietnamese dead.

The South Vietnamese army said a two-pound bomb destroyed a jeep in Cholon, Saigon's Chinatown Monday night, and wounded a South Vietnamese sailor.

Another explosion early today wrecked a parked U.S. Army jeep in downtown Saigon. There were no injuries.

The explosions brought to five the number of terrorist incidents in the capital since Saturday, when explosive charges went off in three locations. The Saturday incidents killed one civilian and wounded seven others.

A high-ranking police source predicted an outbreak of terrorist activity and said guerrilla sapper squads were operating in Saigon.

Military spokesmen said fighting was light and scattered across South Vietnam Monday with most of the action at the base of Black Virgin Mountain, 50 miles northwest of Saigon.

Units of the U.S. 25th Infantry Division lost two killed and 11 wounded Monday with guerrilla losses undetermined. In the same area Sunday, the 25th Infantry troops lost one dead and 13 wounded while killing 20 guerrillas in six hours of fighting.

The Boulder-strewn mountain overlooks the strategic province capital of Tay Ninh City and several intense battles have been fought in the area.

Artillery fire from the 1st Air Cavalry Division killed six guerrillas 27 miles north of Tay Ninh City and three miles from the Cambodian border Monday afternoon, military spokesmen said.

For lunch Monday, he sampled some rattlesnake meat, smoked armadillo and venison supplied by the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission.

"Flying around in that bucket of bolts (a propeller driven Beechcraft) is probably one of the reasons I have what I have," he said.

"The legislators' theory is if they can keep me up in the air long enough I'll never touch the ground and won't be able to re-govern, but I just get up earlier and stay up later," Kirk said.

Brown Trial Delay Okayed By Judge

BEL AIR, Md. (AP) — H. Rap Brown has been ordered to appear in court next Tuesday but his attorney says he doesn't know whether the black militant will be there.

"We have not heard from him," William M. Kunstler said Monday after the trial on arson and inciting to riot charges was postponed again. "And we do not know where he is."

Circuit Court Judge Harry E. Dyer Jr., who granted the postponement, warned there would be no more delays unless Brown himself could convince the bench of the necessity.

Brown lives in New York but there has been no official contact where he is now.

Kunstler had called for an indefinite postponement asserting that Brown could not get a fair trial in "an atmosphere bathed in blood."

Kunstler said two bombings within 24 hours last week were charged with arson and impartial jurors impossible.

Brown is charged with arson and inciting to riot in connection with 1967 racial disorders in Cambridge, Md.

Two of Brown's friends, Ralph E. Fosterhouse and William Payne, were killed March 5 when a car they were in blew up near Bel Air.

Seminole County Commissioners this morning decided to advertise in two periodicals for a county planner. Commissioner Greg Drummond stated that he had conferred with the Tri-County Planning Commission, which advised the dual advertisement instead of concentrating on an advertisement in the American Society of Planning Officials planners periodical as had been previously discussed.

Cost of advertisement in ASPO is \$135 for a quarter page ad for two months. The other advertisement will be placed in Nation's Cities, which will cost \$65 a month.

Casselberry Debates Further Annexation

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Hanoi Strategists Seek To 'Whipsaw' President Nixon On Fronts

WASHINGTON (UPI) — With the increased Communist military and diplomatic offensive in Laos, Hanoi strategists are trying to "whipsaw" President Nixon on two fronts.

Their aim is to make it impossible for the United States to withdraw from Southeast Asia, except under conditions which would probably mean surrender of the entire area to the Communists.

The Communist Pabset Lao "peace proposal," advanced after new military gains by them and the North Vietnamese, underlines what U.S. officials have always recognized — Hanoi conflicts all Laos and Vietnam conflicts all Laos and Vietnam himself has said nothing can be settled in isolation of the other.

The Laotian situation appears to constitute Hanoi's "ace in the hole" for use if it were ever confronted with a situation in South Vietnam that is not willing to accept.

It has been obvious to U.S. officials the Pabset Lao and their North Vietnamese comrades-in-arms have had the ability for some years to take much more territory than they have from the comparatively weak "neutralist" government headed by Premier Souvanna Phouma and supported by limited military assistance from the United States.

The fact the Communists have not moved in has indicated to analysts in the past they were delaying a takeover of the Central Laotian Government, Prince Souphanouvong, the Pabset Lao leader. If this assumption proves correct, and

Nixon's program to "Vietnamize" the war in South Vietnam appears to be succeeding, then the predictable Communist tactic would be to turn on full-scale military pressure in Laos in an effort to topple Souvanna Phouma and outflank the Saigon government.

The Pabset Lao "peace proposal" is remarkably similar to the one put forward by the Viet Cong in South Vietnam after its military operations had achieved some success and the American public was demanding an end to the conflict.

The current assumption here is Souvanna Phouma will find it impossible to reach any peace agreement with his half brother, Prince Souphanouvong, the Pabset Lao leader. If this assumption proves correct, and

What Is It To Be Irish?

EDITOR'S NOTE—Why do the Irish act the way they do on St. Patrick's Day? An explanatory column by Hal Boyle, written in 1963, later became a school favorite and a popular greeting card. It is here presented again to a new generation of Irish admirers — or detractors.

On this day it is music. Not just the cornet in the parade high school band, but the deep music of living, the low sad rhythms of eternity. WASHINGTON (NEA) — Come along on a five-day merry-go-round discussion of the war in Laos, and try not to get dizzy.

The ride begins on a Friday afternoon in Key Biscayne, Fla., where an important White House official is giving White House reporters a background briefing on President Nixon's official statement regarding the degree of our involvement in the war in Laos.

When the briefing ended, some reporters were confused about a total casualty figure that the official had used. For some five minutes, he returned to the microphone and sought to clarify it.

Technically, the clarified figure is still for "background only" but they have been kicked around so much in this capital that they are now common currency.

What the official said was that "something less" than 200 Americans had been killed in Laos from 1962 through 1969, and that less than 200 (actual) by 1969 have been reported to the International Control Commission which is supposed to oversee Laotian "neutrality" are listed as missing.

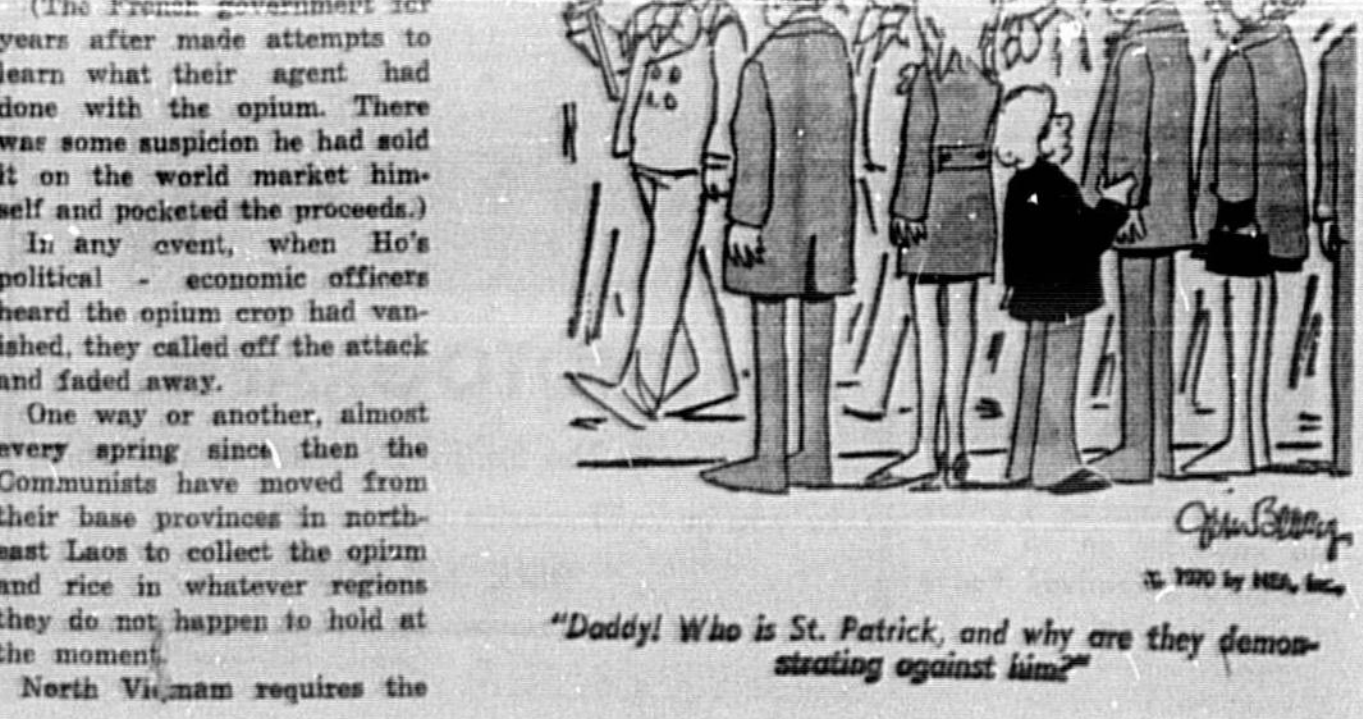

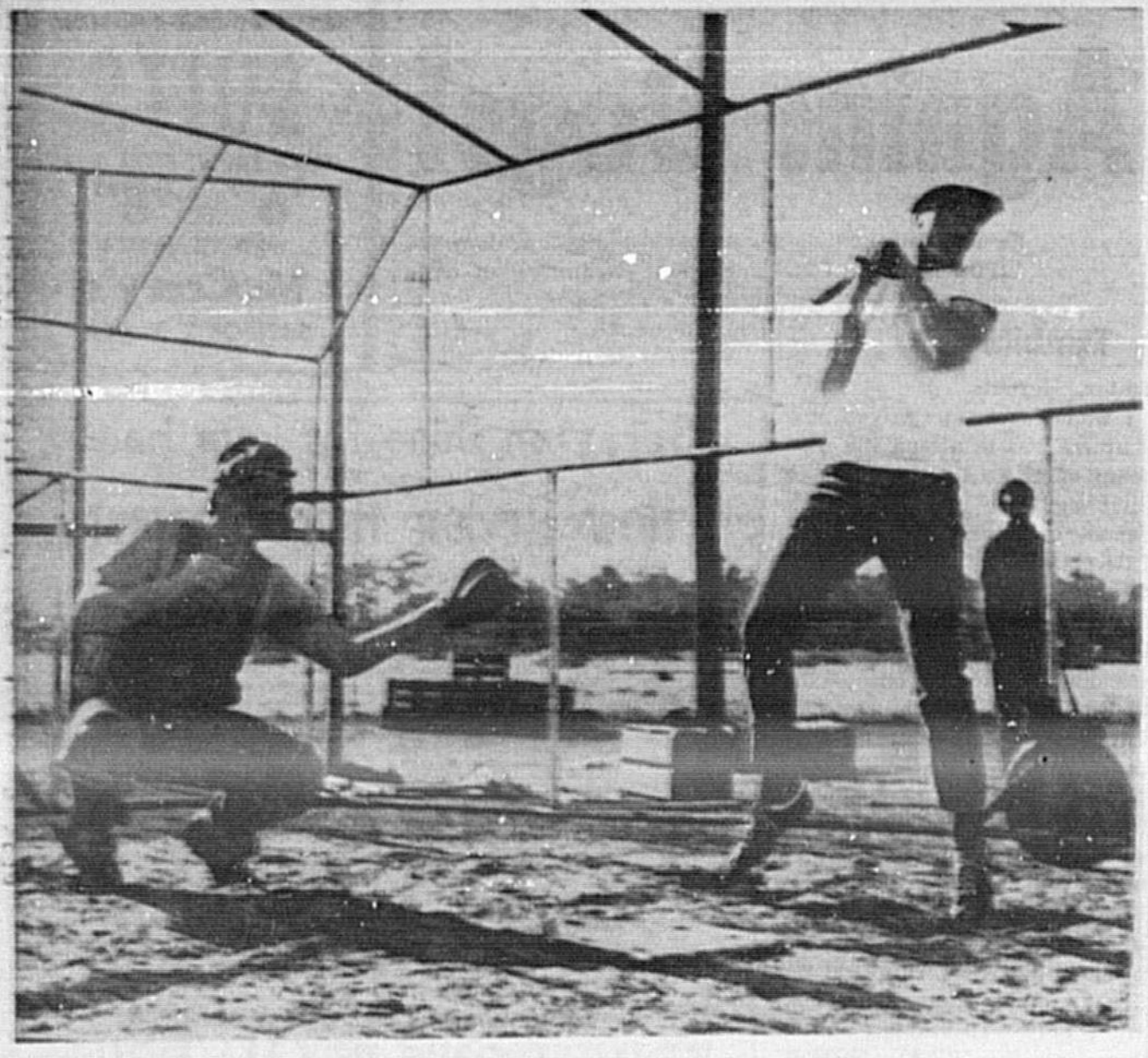

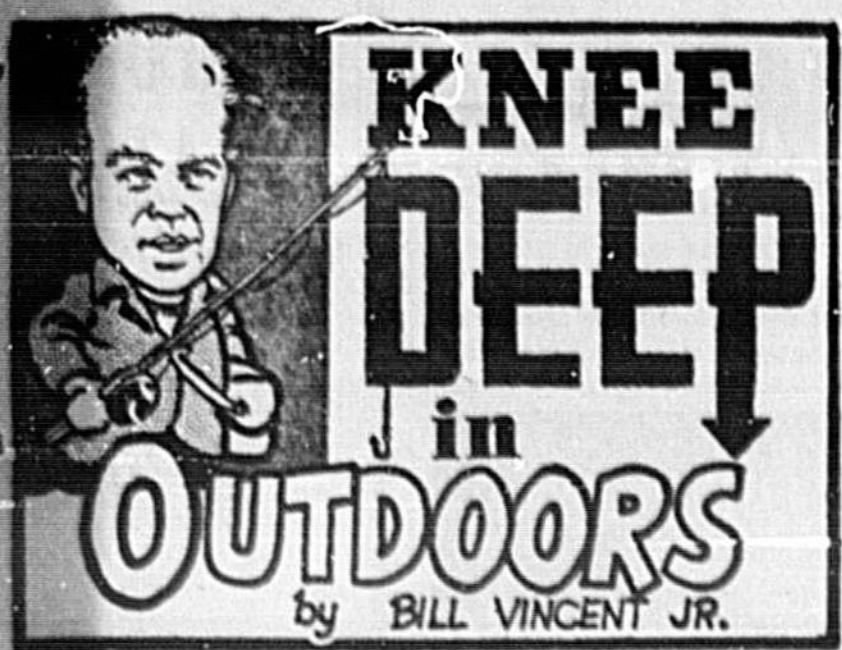

The first ball will be pitched at 4 p.m. for the exciting intracounty duel of Seminole County's two powerhouses.



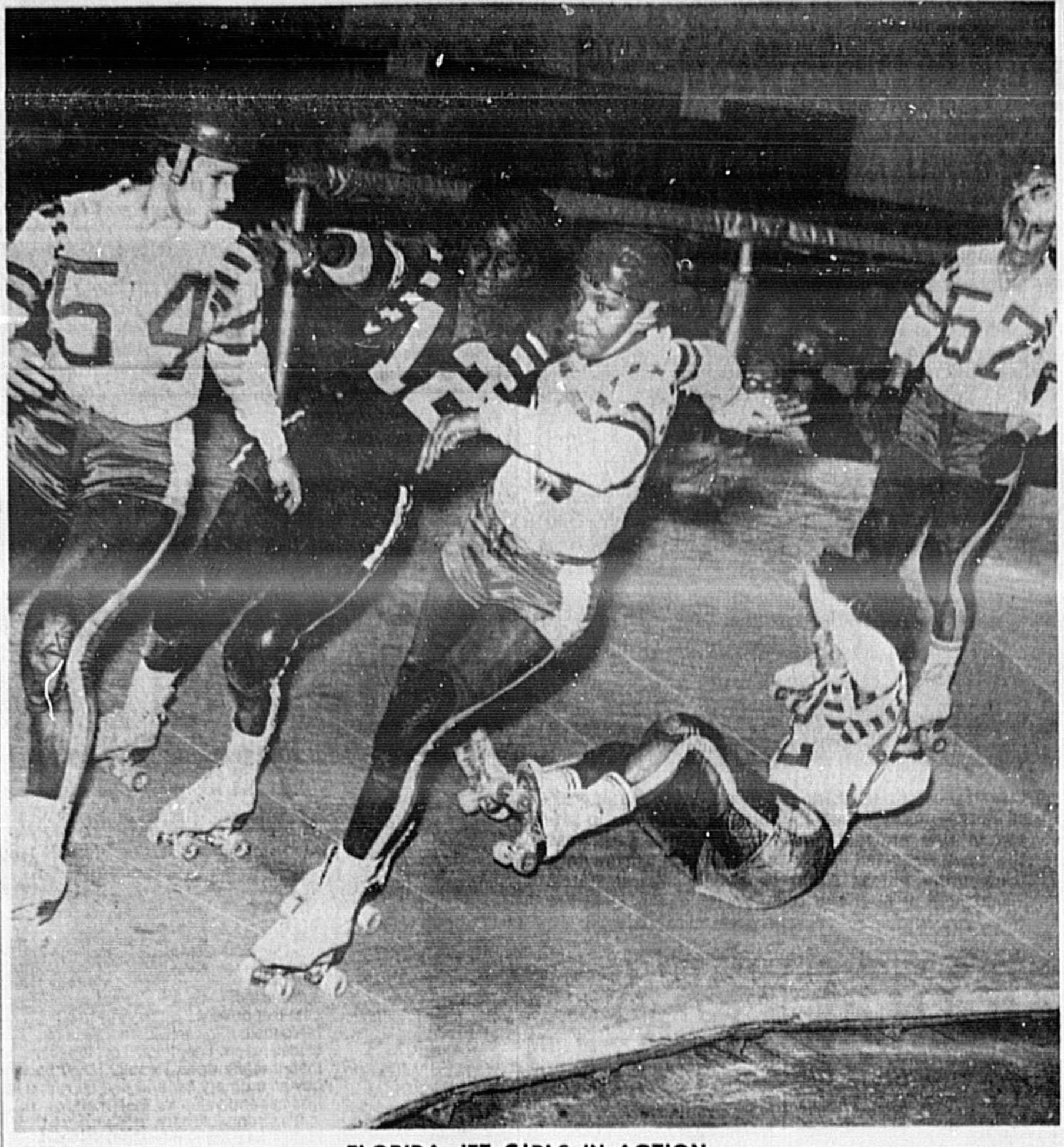

Athletics will bring the student body closer together than any academic program. Seminole County would have enough middle schools that no team would have to leave the county for football games.

This writer feels that the seventh and eighth grade could form one team in each school and that the sixth grade should play first football.

Intramural programs are fine but they take a lot of time and the leader is usually non-paid and will get tired of this different after a few weeks. Intramural programs will not unite the student body as well as a program between different schools.

What price is too high for the development of our young people who will be tomorrow's leaders.

A young athlete learns to believe in himself because he knows he can master the situation and he will always give his best. This alone is reason enough to play athletics. So administrators, teachers and students take a long look at yourselves and decide but please decide wisely as the decision will affect the entire county.

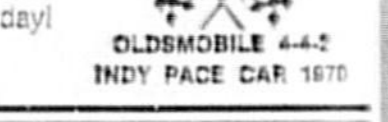

Murder Suspect Cries As His Trial Nears End

The tension of two days' participation in a trial for first degree murder, in which the death penalty could possibly be evoked, were apparently too much for Carl Lee Bowers. He "broke down" on the witness stand late Tuesday afternoon, sobbing that he had loved his common-law wife whom he is accused of murdering. The 12-man jury was hustled from the courtroom.

Bowers has been indicted for the shooting of Beryllien Bess Bowers, then pistol-whipping and stomping her face in the 1969 Halloween afternoon slaying. State Attorney Abbott Herring said this morning, in his closing argument, that evidence proved Bowers guilty of the pre-meditated murder of his wife. He noted the earlier testimony of a neighbor who claimed that he saw Bowers drag his wife down the steps of his mother's home into the mud and stomp her in the face.

In this morning's testimony, Mrs. Bessie Bowers, mother of the defendant, said that she was in her house while Bowers and his wife were in a back bedroom with a neighbor who was visiting, and saw her daughter-in-law lying on the floor with blood on her face. Bowers was standing nearby holding a gun in his hand. The two women then ran, screaming, out of the house and down the street.

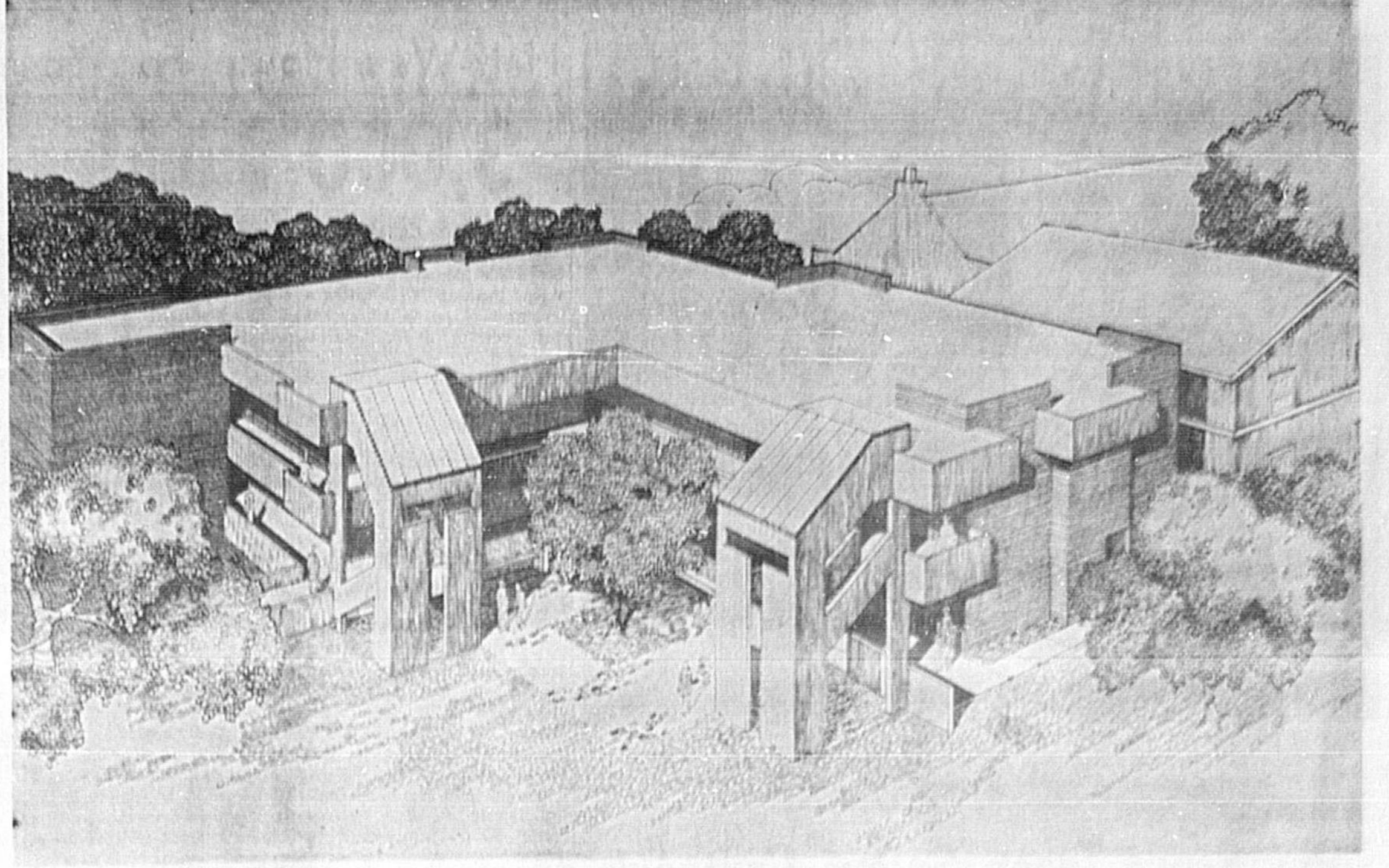

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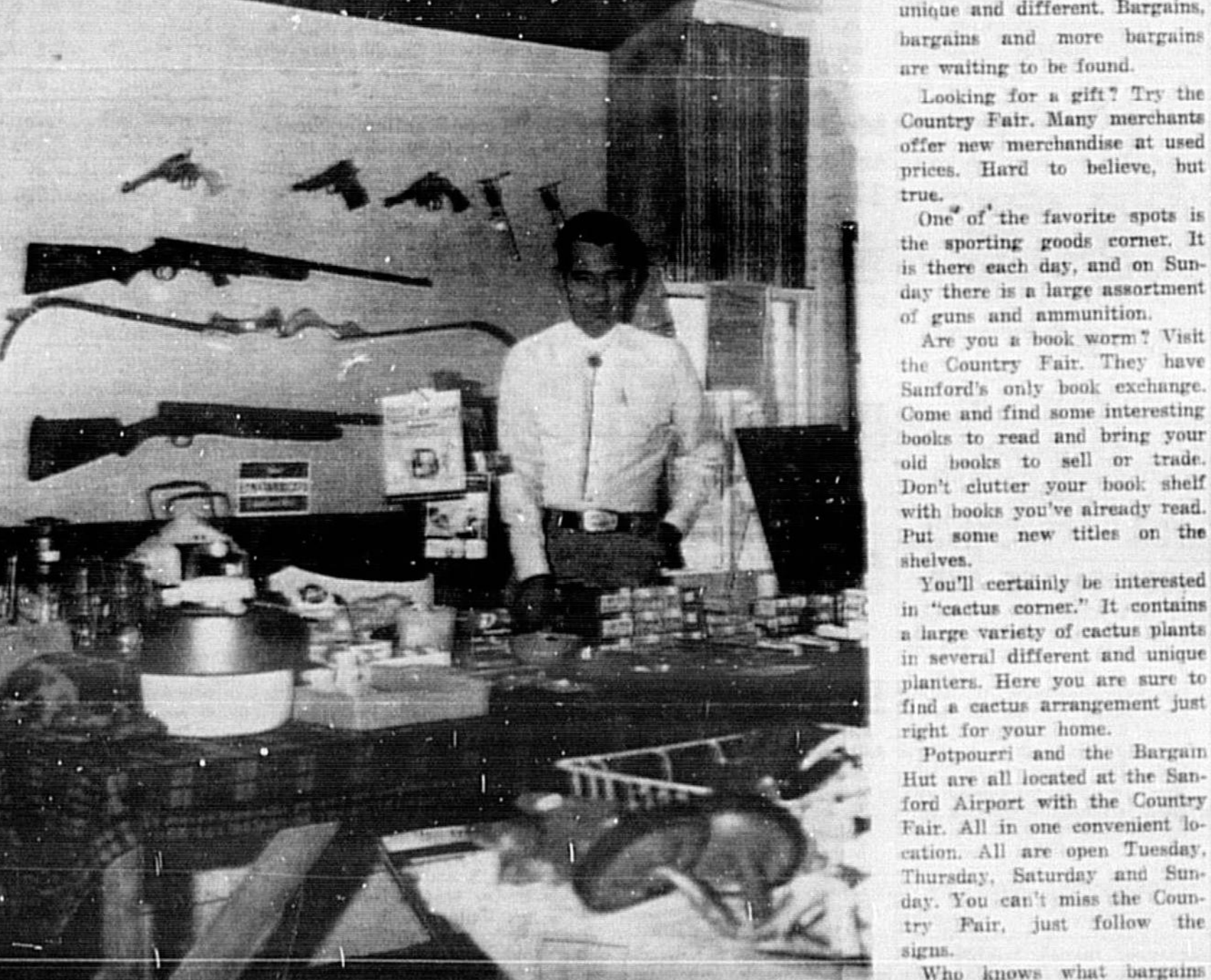
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
