LEWIS ORDERED TO STAND TRIAL

British Urge Verification Of Troop Figures

U. S. Group Decides To Oppose Moves To Inject Inspection Provisions

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., Nov. 25—(AP)—The British delegation to the United Nations today urged that all troop figures in a proposed U. N. inventory be subject to verification by a United Nations inspection unit.

The British position was disclosed shortly after it was learned that the United States delegation had decided to oppose any move to inject an inspection provision into the inquiry.

Russia also is known to be opposed to such a plan.

The Australian delegation is believed to be ready with a resolution calling on the assembly to condemn Russia for her stand against limiting the use of the Big Five veto.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov arranged to call on State Secretary Byrnes today to what may be their first serious private discussion of Soviet-American problems in many months. The appointment is said to have been made at Mr. Molotov's request.

Celery Rapidly Recovering From Blight, Side Burn

Rapid recovery from blight and side burn on celery which has been brought on by the continued, hot, dry weather in the Sanford-Ocala section, was reported this morning by M. C. Cullum, sales manager of Chase and Company, who last week after a tour and survey of celery sections throughout the state, reported that all celery crops looked rather poor.

Sanford seems to be the first section in the state to show recovery in celery, and there are signs of new growth, he said. At present, the Everglades celery districts seem to be the worst hit, due to a heavy rain there on Nov. 1. Cabbage was also damaged there.

A change of weather to cooler, with moderate rain, will overcome present difficulties in growing celery of good quality, declared Cullum.

"However," he asserted, "celery men are quick to point out similar conditions in the state when celery growth was retarded, then followed by large sizes of exceptional quality. If, on the other hand, present hot, dry conditions continue, there is likely to be further deterioration instead of improvement in the crop.

"If there is no set-back, perhaps 100 cars of the crop may move by Dec. 7. It is estimated, however, that plantings have been set back by two or three weeks and that movement will be comparatively light until Jan. 1.

In contrast to the relatively poor condition of the Florida crop is the report of fine quality celery in California, according to H. C. Hatzel, district manager of American Fruit Growers, Inc. who returned by air this Thursday. After inspection of packing plants at Inland and Los Angeles, he reported California packing equipment to be very good. The trade there is very uncertain as to prices on the celery deal, he said.

Washington Irving Hughey, a resident of Sanford for the past 25 years, died suddenly at an Orlando Hospital at 8:40 A. M. today.

Until his retirement several months ago, Mr. Hughey had been associated with the Hill Hardware Company for 25 years. He was a member of the First Methodist Church, the Odd Fellows and a leading member of the local Townsend Club.

Wilson Says Tomato Crop Reached Peak

JACKSONVILLE, Nov. 25—(Special)—"The tomato movement handled through our Fort Pierce State 'Produce' Market reached its seasonal peak during the last week, with an estimated total of 60,000 crates or better for the six-day period," said William L. Wilson, director of Florida State Farmers' Markets. In a letter, he said he was much impressed by the good outlook for Fall and winter production of major vegetable crops, and by the critical need for extension of facilities at several points. Right now the Fort Pierce Market is facing a real emergency, due to its rapid growth of patronage, and to the general expansion of production in that area.

"An idea of the situation at Fort Pierce may be gained by the official report from Market Manager M. E. Williams. For the second full calendar week of this month, Fort Pierce handled 33,450 packages of produce, including 30,787 bushels and 12,354 lots of tomatoes. For the corresponding week of 1945 the market handled 3,379 bushels and 7 lots of tomatoes. We may admit that a part of this tremendous increase in market patronage can be accounted for by the production season late last Fall, but even granting this, the growth in the market's business is tremendous, and the overloading of its facilities increasingly serious. Plans are now being drawn for some essential improvements, on which work will be started at the earliest possible moment, and I am very hopeful that construction may be completed in time for the Spring shipping season.

"Tomatoes sold on the Fort Pierce market this last week for prices ranging from \$2.50 to \$3.90, mostly from \$4 to \$5.50. A few cucumbers were handled at \$5.50 to \$7.

Committee Says More Than 50,000 Ducat Applications Have Been Turned Down

DALLAS, Nov. 25—(AP)—Arkansas has been officially selected as the host team for the Cotton Bowl. Athletic Director John Barnhill of Arkansas said earlier today that the Razorbacks would accept, if invited.

MIAMI, Nov. 25, (AP)—The Orange Bowl Committee today announced that Rice Institute of Houston, Tex., will play the Tennessee Vols in the Orange Bowl game on New Year's Day in Miami. The group revealed last night that Tennessee had accepted an invitation to play in the 1947 classic.

Graduate observers in the South had previously declared that the Tennessee opponent would either be either Rice or the University of Texas. Boston College, winner of Alabama by a 13 to 7 score last Saturday, faded out of the picture because the Vols had already defeated Boston by a 34 to 0 score.

Coach Bob Neyland of the Vols declined to be interviewed. He has applied for death to go. The Army general recalled Tennessee's 17 to 0 victory over Oklahoma in Miami in 1937 and said that the Vols made their debut in bowl games in Miami and are delighted to return.

Tennessee has won eight games and lost one this season. Rice has won two while losing seven. Rice teams have faced rugged opposition. The Vols downed Georgia Tech, Duke, Alabama and North Carolina. Rice defeated Tulane, Texas, Texas A. and M. and TCU.

Rice have no more opponent before their regular schedule ends but both opponents are weak.

Postmaster Field Makes Appeal To Citizens To Mail Parcels Early

Since the Sanford Merchants Association has announced that Santa Claus is planning a visit to Sanford everyone appears to be getting into the Christmas spirit. And there's no greater reason for Sanfordites to start mailing Christmas packages to distant points than the spirit of the season.

Joel Field, postmaster, today appealed to local citizens to mail their parcels on or before Dec. 15. "This request is made," declared Mr. Field, "in order that the patrons themselves will not have to stand in line to mail packages and it will also enable the employees at the address post-office an opportunity to deliver the packages on time in good condition."

"Now that airmail is reduced to five cents an ounce," Mr. Field continued, "it is suggested that Christmas cards going to distant points be sent by airmail for quick delivery and forwarding by airmail if necessary." If the card cannot be delivered, he added, it will be returned the same as first class mail.

Mr. Field stressed that "third class" mail with one and a half cent stamps are not forwardable, either can they be returned if not delivered.

Mr. Field warned the public not to mail any of the following classifications of unmailable matter. This applied not only to Christmas mailing but is prohibited at all times:

- 1 — Intoxicating beverages.
- 2 — Inflammable matter such as matches, lighter fluid, and other articles likely to cause fire through absorption of moisture.
- 3 — Spontaneous chemical change.
- 4 — Ammunition and all other explosives.
- 5 — Firearms, such as revolvers which are capable of being concealed on the person.
- 6 — Obscene matter.
- 7 — Narcotics.
- 8 — Explosive matter.
- 9 — Lottery and raffle tickets.

"The postal laws," said Mr. Field, "provide severe penalties for the mailing of any matter included in any of the above classifications."

Decision Is Handed Down In U. S. Court

One Of Greatest Legal Fights Between Labor And Industry Has Been Forecast

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25—(AP)—John L. Lewis is to stand trial Wednesday on charges of contempt of court in the soft coal strike. This was ordered today by Federal Justice T. Alan Goldsborough at a hearing in Washington.

Lewis arrived early at the jam-packed courtroom this morning. Through his lawyers, he challenged a federal court restraining order in the coal strike and demanded a trial. Lewis's attorneys argued that "Big John's" notice cancelling the miners' contract with the government was both valid and proper. They also asked that the court's order be set aside and the contract reinstated.

At 10:15 A. M. Wednesday the government will try to prove that the industry was in violation of the mining contract was valid and that Lewis is wrong.

One of the greatest legal battles involving labor in the history of the United States government has been joined.

Seminole Racks Up 21 To 0 Win Over Seabreeze Of Daytona Beach

WALTON FIELD, Daytona Beach, Nov. 25—(Special) Big Willie Anderson and Clyde Hutt led the Sanford Celery Field in handling the not too impressive Seabreeze High School team, 21 to 0, tomorrow night.

The plucky Sanford team, containing six of the State's top players, tied two touchdowns and added three extra points to run his total points scored for the year in this league to 174, having scored 27 touchdowns and 26 field goals.

Sanford gained 276 yards and rucked up 11 first downs while Daytona moved 105 yards and tallied 11 first downs.

Sanford opened the game by kicking to Daytona and on the first play, Clyde Hutt intercepted a Sanford punt. The Seabreeze team kicked the ball on the 30 yard line and the punt was blocked by Sanford. Anderson kicked a 20 yard field goal to move the Sanford team to the Seabreeze 16 yard line.

In the first moments of the first period, Hutt broke away around his own left end, cut back to midfield then scampered 72 yards to the Seabreeze 16. Anderson went through center for a first down on the 24. Anderson exploded through the right guard for the touch-down. Anderson added the extra point to place Sanford in the lead.

Late in the first period Sanford recovered a fumble and the 15 yard line. The game broke away, this time for 28 yards and first down on the 21. Anderson made four yards then Hutt streaked around end for the final Sanford counter. Anderson kicked his third placement to make Sanford lead 21 to 0 at the half.

Seabreeze came back determinedly in the third quarter, but the Sanford line held in the trenches every time. The Sanford team tried the air route, completing one 20 yard pass to left half Monk Noel, but the Celerymen were alert for a passing offensive and were in there with the interceptions. All together they intercepted four Seabreeze passes.

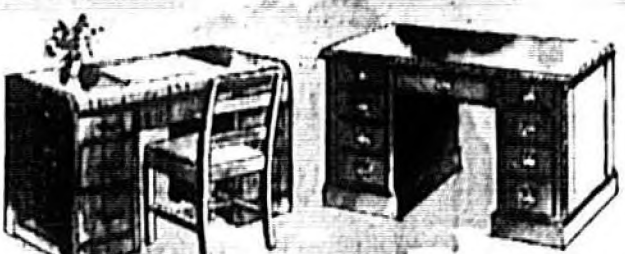

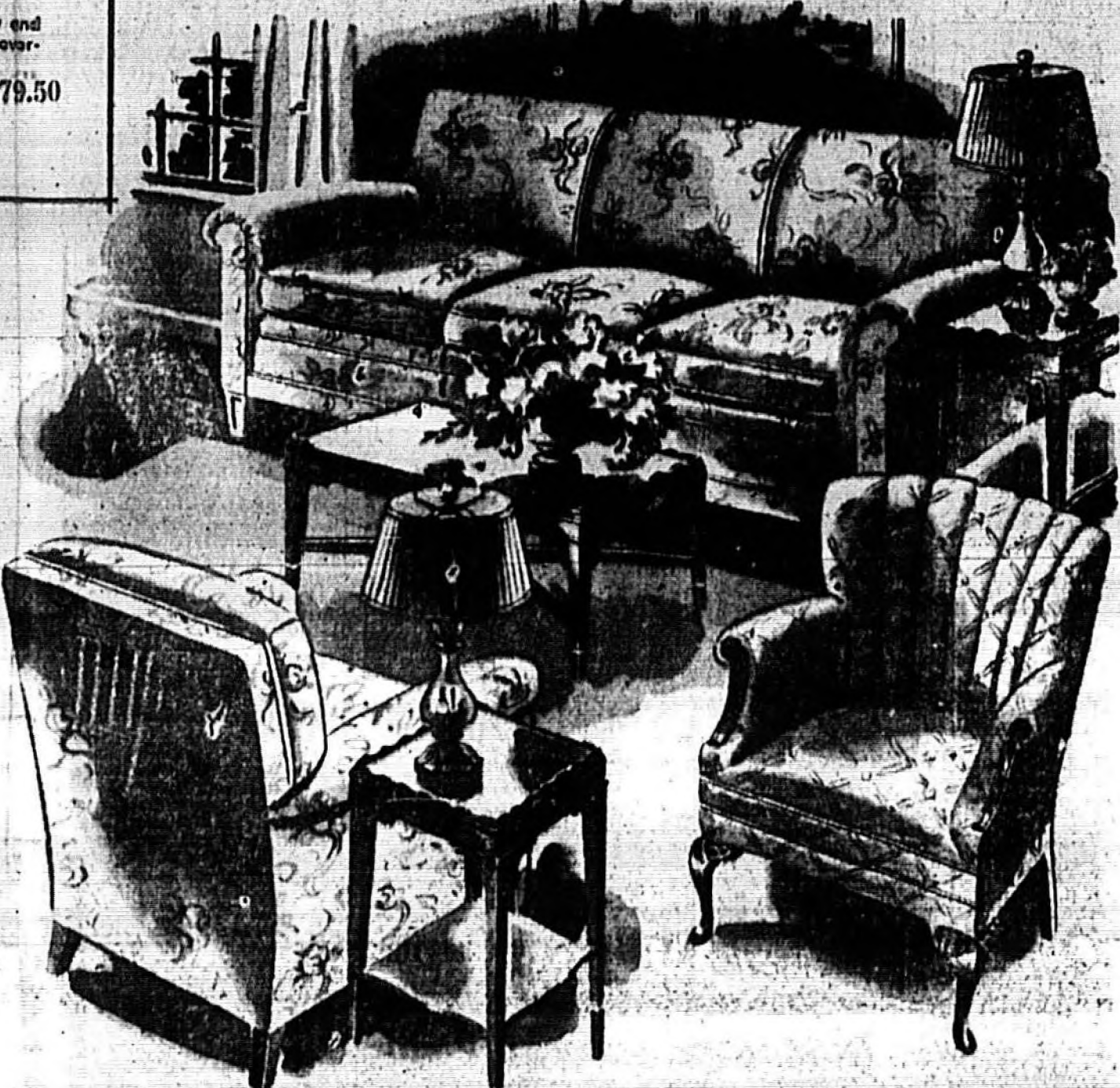

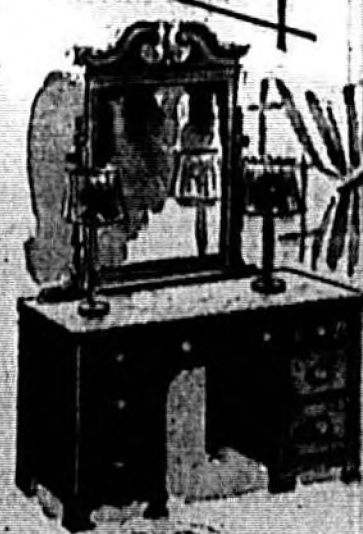

Jews Fight British At Haifa In Dash To Enter Palestine

3,400 Illegal Immigrants Arrive In Ship From Europe; Resist Deportation

HAIFA, Palestine, Nov. 25—(AP)—Illegal Jewish immigrants staged a pitched battle today when British troops tried to transfer them from the vessel they were on to British troopships.

There were close to 3,400 Jews aboard the biggest immigrant ship yet to try the dash to Palestine. They'd been in port only a half an hour when the troops came to put them aboard troopships to deport them to Cyprus. Rioting broke out aboard the immigrant ship—the Hamerli Haverl. Shooting refugees threw whatever they could get their hands on at the troops.

The British soldiers fired four Sten gun bursts into the air, but finally retreated. A little later, they came back to begin the operation again. This time they wore riot helmets and carried tear gas.

In describing the riot, one police officer said: "The blighters were tossing full tins of UNRRA food at us." And he added: "It was ankle-deep on the dock."

At the height of the fight, the passengers hung a huge banner over the side of the ship. It was signed "Commander-in-Chief, Jewish resistance movement," and it read:

"For every Jew murdered aboard this ship, you will pay in English blood. You have been warned."

About 50 of the immigrants leaped overboard and were picked up from the water. A number of others jumped to the deck of a nearby tug, but were rounded up.

The transfer was to be made pending a court decision as to what the fate of the refugees will be. On a writ granted to Jewish attorneys the Palestine government must show cause to tomorrow why the immigrants should be deported to detention.

Final Rites Held For B. C. Moore In Wilkes-Barre, Pa.

In addition to funeral services conducted for the late Basil C. Moore at the First Baptist Church in Sanford, there were services conducted, Nov. 25, at the Kniffen Funeral Home in Wilkes-Barre, Pa., former home of Mr. Moore. Interment was in Hanover Green Cemetery with Masonic rites at the grave.

Mr. Moore, a certified public accountant, died Nov. 12, following a heart attack. Mrs. Moore and an aunt, Mrs. Martha Kivlen, accompanied the remains to Wilkes-Barre.

12 Families Saved From Apartment Fire

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 25, (AP)—Twelve families were rescued here today from a burning apartment house. Seven of the tenants and two friends were injured.

It was a two-alarm blaze, with flames roaring through the five-story building when the firemen got there. Fifteen children were found wandering panic-stricken through the heavy smoke. They were led to safety by firemen, aided by police and passers-by. Several tenants were trapped on the top floors, and the most seriously injured was Mrs. Marie G. Langley. Police said she jumped from her third-story apartment. She was said to be in critical condition.

Firemen said the blaze was started by an explosion in an oil stove on the first floor.

PAPER SUBSIDIZED

HAICONG, Indo China, Nov. 25—(AP)—The French commissioner for Cochinchina has ordered the suspension of the Chinese daily newspaper Viet-Nam. The newspaper was ordered suppressed on the grounds that it had published articles attacking the Commissioner General KAL-SHEK. The commissioner said the action was taken on a complaint from the Chinese consul general.

RED EQUALITY

MOSCOW, Nov. 25—(AP)—The Russian government newspaper Izvestia asserted today that the British government has ignored what it calls the "principles of equality" in dealing with Egypt. The Russian paper charges that British policy in the Nile valley has resulted in rising tension throughout the Middle East.

City Prohibits Slaughter House In City Limits

Johnson And Gatchel Denied Permit For Operating Abattoir

An ordinance prohibiting establishment of a slaughter house or abattoir within the city limits; also prohibiting the slaughter of cattle, sheep and hogs in the city limits, was passed last evening by the City Commission as "amending Section 110 of a former city ordinance along that line."

Passage of this ordinance resulted in refusal by the City to permit operation by Alex R. Johnson and Forrest Gatchel of an abattoir in connection with the Central Florida Quick Freeze and Locker Plant now under construction at Elm Avenue and Thirteenth Street, according to Gordon L. Bradley, acting deputy clerk in the absence of City Manager H. N. Sawyer. Mr. Sawyer and City Attorney Fred R. Wilson are attending the League of Municipalities convention in Miami.

Commissioners discussed the problem of cleaning up the downtown section before tourists arrive. It was pointed out that often the downtown sidewalks present a bad appearance on Sundays due to boxes and crates being left in front of stores. Growing practice of placing display racks of fruits and vegetables on sidewalks was also pointed out, said Mr. Bradley. It was decided to instruct the City Attorney to prepare an ordinance prohibiting use of display racks on sidewalks, also boxes and crates, and directing merchants to confine displays within the area of business property.

Mayor Gut appointed himself, Lea R. Lesh and Manager Sawyer as a committee to confer with Fire Chief Mack Cleveland in reviewing bids of companies on a new fire truck and aerial ladder. Purchase of 12 fire extinguishers from the Way Assets Corporation was approved.

It was ordered that the St. Johns River Warehouse and dock at the foot of Palmetto Avenue be condemned as unsafe and removed unless the owners show some evidence before the next city commission meeting on Dec. 9, that the structure and dock will be properly repaired.

Stine Explains Operation Of 2 New Inventions

Machine Wraps Celery Stalks In Seven Inch Cellophane

B. WILLARD CONNOLLY Two important inventions; one designed to wax fruit and to permit efficient use for the first time of chemicals to prevent stem rot in oranges and other citrus fruits; the other a machine that wraps and seals the lower seven inch portion of celery stalks in cellophane, were yesterday displayed at the Stine Machine shop to a throng of visitors. The inventors are E. M. Brogden of California and Louis Marks of New York State.

Proponent of all was George Stine, in whose "Rube Goldberg" department, as he calls it, the machines were recently completed. He hinted that new plants may be built here to manufacture the inventions.

E. M. Brogden, California, who has by one stroke of inspiration, made millions of dollars worth of machinery, he previously invented for waxing and polishing fruits obsolete, as he put it, explained to visitors the functions of his machine which by ingeniously looped heavy chains freshly washed fruit slowly over a base of soft foamed latex, removing wax that might dilute the chemical effect of the wax.

Government Rushes Trial Of Lewis; Strike Is Spreading Unemployment

Hope Is Pinned On Belief Strike Will End As Result Of Legal Proceedings

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25, (AP)—The government is aiming for a swift trial of John L. Lewis on contempt charges. Federal attorneys said they will press for speed when the trial opens tomorrow. Thursday is Thanksgiving Day and there will be no session of court on the holiday, but the government's lawyers say they will ask Judge Alan Goldsborough to hold a session Friday although that will mean breaking the traditional long weekend after Thanksgiving.

A high Administration aide who asked not to be quoted by name said the government has pinned all its hopes for an early end of the strike on the legal proceedings. No other action is contemplated at this time.

In themselves the legal moves will get no coal mined; nor will putting Lewis in jail—as could be done—if he is found guilty of contempt. But the official indicated that the hope in government quarters is that the legal tactics will soften up Lewis and push him toward making an agreement with the mine owners. That hope is that Lewis instead of pursuing a strike which the official said might prove disastrous to his 400,000 miners as well as to the national economy will seek a face-saving end to the controversy.

The official suggested that by bargaining with the private owners Lewis could slide gracefully out of the present situation without loss of prestige and without yielding on his demands. He has never stated specifically what those demands are.

At the same time the government could relinquish its unwanted control over the mines which it seized during last Spring's 59-day strike.

30,000 Are Laid Off In Steel Mill As Wage Losses Run Into Many Millions
