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50 Per Cent Of West Germany's Theaters Closed

FRANKFURT, Germany.—(AP)—An estimated 50 per cent of western Germany's private theaters closed after last year's currency reform. There are even some state-subsidized houses which fear their curtains will never rise again.

Some people here believe the Germans have lost their interest in cultural things. Baiding, bespectacled Erich Otto, president of western Germany's Players' Association, says no.

"Germans are as hungry for stage plays as they were fifty years ago," he added, "but they don't want to be disillusioned."

Eighty per cent of Germany's playhouses were either destroyed or badly damaged when the war ended. New theaters were soon started in barns, cinemas and private houses.

"But you can't perform an opera of Verdi or a French comedy in a former gymnasium. It's too disillusioning. This especially is meant for those depressing ultra-modern plays. If they see a play like this performed on a pastry house, people leave bored."

He says Carl Zuckmayer, German-born American playwright and author, keeps open German theaters with his "The Devil's General." This play features the end of General Ludwigs Gen. Ernst Udel, whose conscience conflicted with his sense of military obligation to the Nazis. He ended his struggle by taking his own

life. The play had all-time high attendance throughout western Germany.

"If there were no Zuckmayer," Otto said, "we would have been in desperate straits."

"Segregation and specific treatment" were given the major share of credit for success of the project, however, the California veterinarians said that culling and strict hygienic measures also were important, especially in preventing the spread of infection to healthy cows.

Dr. McMurray warned that some type of injury is the beginning of every case of mastitis. He said that while four types of germs can cause the disease, the germs can go to work only when the animal is damaged by one of three types of injuries.

He listed one as mechanical injuries such as cuts, abrasions and bruises, sometimes caused by rough milking and sometimes by accidents. A second was described as temperature injuries, caused by severe chilling of the udder when the cow lies on a cold damp floor or is otherwise exposed to sudden cold.

The third, he said, is chemical injuries, caused by the chemical contents of filth in the barn remain too long in the udder.



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Glenn McCarthy Gives Grid Credit For His Success

AP Newfeatures—DALLAS—Glenn H. McCarthy, who made millions from oil and has become a fabulous personality, credits the encouraging words of an admiring football coach with putting him on the road to success.

The Beaumont Texas A. and M. Club was giving a testimonial dinner to the owner of the swank Shamrock Hotel in Houston where the movie stars helped make it a national occasion when the hostelry was opened. McCarthy was born in Beaumont and the home folks were paying him tribute.

Among the 800 guests was Paul Tyson. In the twenties he coached Waco High School to four State football championships and one of them claimed the national title. Tyson is a college professor today but his interest still lies with athletics.

Tyson had been invited by McCarthy to come to Houston and then fly with him to Beaumont in his private plane for the dinner. Everyone paid tribute to McCarthy but when the multi-millionaire responded he recalled what happened in 1925 when

Waco High School played San Jacinto High School of Houston in the quarter-finals of the Texas schoolboy football race. It was Dec. 8. When San Jacinto came to Waco it was not given a shadow of a chance of stopping the Tyson juggernaut.

But early in the game San Jacinto's right tackle raised out of the line and said: "You won't gain an inch over this place today." The Waco team was amused but he was right. Waco won 36-0 but it never could gain over the fighting McCarthy.

As soon as the game ended Tyson sought out the husky tackle. "You men," he said "you put on a great fight out there today. We beat San Jacinto but we didn't beat Glenn McCarthy. If you battle against the odds in the future the way you did on that football field today, you'll really go places."

And so to the folks who paid him tribute in Beaumont, McCarthy had this to say: "Those were the first encouraging words anybody ever said to me. They went a long way toward putting me on the road to success."

Senate Agrees To Vote On Atlantic Pact On Thursday

President Puts Signature On Housing Bill And Requests It Start Quickly

WASHINGTON, July 15—(AP)—The Senate today agreed to vote on the North Atlantic Security Treaty, the Democratic leader, obtained the agreement. Senator Donnell (R-Mo.), representing opponents, objected when Lucas sought an earlier vote.

Senate leaders are confident the treaty will be approved. Their problem has been to get the debate shut off and take a ballot. Democratic leaders looked with flat disapproval on a Republican plan to extend the Monroe Doctrine to Western Europe as a substitute for the pact.

Meanwhile President Truman signed the long-range housing bill and said it must be put into operation quickly.

The President called in more than a score of sponsors of the legislation for the signing ceremony.

Passage of the bill by Congress last week gave Mr. Truman his first major victory in his "fair deal" legislative program.

In a statement, Mr. Truman said the measure "equips the federal government, for the first time, with effective means for aiding cities in the vital task of clearing slums and rebuilding blighted areas."

He said he is submitting to Congress "immediately" a request for additional appropriations necessary to finance the program this year.

And senators agreed tentatively to slash \$1,250,000,000 from proposed military spending this fiscal year.

A member of the Senate appropriations committee, who would not permit one of his names, said that of about \$450,000,000 were cut out of a closed-door vote.

Jaycees Vote To Vacate Tourist Center Building

Use of Yacht Club On Lake Front Is Discussed By Club

The Seminole County Junior Chamber of Commerce voted yesterday at their meeting at the Tourist Center to be willing to move their meeting place from the present location to whatever facilities may be available in the city, and to share a pre-lease assessment to repair or refurbish the new location, but if none is available and suitable for the weekly meetings, the organization further agreed to move to some private establishment in order that the Tourist Center might be used to the fullest extent by the tourists of Sanford and Seminole County.

State Rep. J. Braley Odham stated that the Jaycees started the tourist program in Sanford, and that he felt the organization should again lead the way in moving from the only suitable building in the city for tourist use.

"If we are conflicting with the tourists, and their programs by meeting here, then let's get out. I realize that we are cozy and comfortable here, but I feel it is foolish to construct another building," Mr. Odham declared.

"We initiated the tourist program here, and I feel that we should do everything possible to keep from hindering a project we started," he added.

Malcolm MacNeill reported that the Yacht Club building was furnished and repaired to accommodate the civic club.

"The kitchen at the Yacht Club needs a stove and a refrigerator, but the club will be able to purchase these," Mr. MacNeill announced.

Secretary A. W. Epps, Jr., reported that progress is being made in securing a building for Florida Fashions in which to place 300 to 400 machines to be run by negro operators. A report on the matter will be made next week, Secretary Epps declared.

Bradley Odham was named chairman of the awards committee for the coming year.

Woodrow Riser and Fred Murray were welcomed as guests and introduced as a new member by President John Benkerik.

Britain Plans Two-Way Trade Deal With U. S.

Barter System Studied As Means To Solve Dollar Problems

LONDON, July 15—(AP)—Britain and her dominions may ask the United States to join them in a two-way multi-million dollar trade pact to help solve the world dollar crisis.

Highly qualified informants said today this is the approach most favored by Britain for the long-term solution of her shortage of dollars. The whole idea, they stressed, is far from complete.

Finance ministers of eight Commonwealth countries who were in session here today are studying this approach. It has been considered at least informally by American and British treasury chiefs John W. Snyder and Sir Stafford Cripps at their recent talks.

Beran Accused Of Treason By Czech's Reds

Treacherous Anti-State Riots Were Plotted By Archbishop, Cepicka Says

PRAGUE, July 15—(AP)—The Czech minister of justice declared tonight that anyone attempting to enforce the Vatican's order of excommunication against Communists would be charged with treason. Minister Josef Cepicka issued this warning in a long speech in the nation's state church hall.

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, July 15—(AP)—Justice Minister Alexej Cepicka today accused Roman Catholic Archbishop Josef Beran and members of the prelate's hierarchy of treason against the state. The archbishop now is a virtual prisoner in his palace.

The minister made the charges in a long review of the church state fight in Communist-governed Czechoslovakia. He spoke before the Central Action Committee of the National Front here.

Cepicka claimed that Beran maintained "treacherous connections with foreign enemies" and that, with Vatican emissaries, the archbishop plotted "treacherous and anti-state acts."

The minister termed this a "treacherous act."

Later another official of the government directly attacked Pope Pius XII, accusing the Pontiff of blessing and supporting Fascism.

Although the pontiff's press office has not yet informed the Czechoslovak people, 75 per cent of the Catholics of the Vatican desire ex-communication of Communism.

Minister of Information Valy Kopecky reflected the Communist anger at the church's action.

Speaking at a meeting of the society of friends of democratic Spain to commemorate the 13th anniversary of the outbreak of the Spanish civil war, Kopecky charged that the Vatican is still supporting the regime of Generalissimo Francisco Franco.

Pope Pius XII blessed the Italian Fascist army, blessed the German Wehrmacht, and attacked the Soviet Union and today he is trying to bring the hand over the bloody Franco dictatorship.

And the pope's papal legate, Cardinal Barbini, has the same policy. He tries to disrupt the progressive order.

They dare to present us with ex-communication. The Catholic hierarchy, the Catholic press and the Catholic people are siding with the pope."

He was reported to have been born in Douglas, Ga., and his FBI record listed a number of places where he had been arrested for vagrancy, including DeLand and Oakland, Calif.

The spokesman said his company had received notification from the CIO United Steelworkers union following the company's acceptance of President Truman's 60-day time plan. He said it had begun bringing its furnaces back to full operation.

Summer business is mighty good at Florida west coast beaches. Most of the customers are from inland Florida and other Southeastern states. They don't throw the cash around quite as freely as the winter visitors from the cold North, but they're certainly welcome.

There are still a good many unrented cottages and apartments, but they are mostly the very high priced ones. All in all, things have picked up and picked up since the days when summer accommodations were almost given away to tide owners over a dull period.

Clearwater Beach has 16 per cent more visitors than last summer, Chamber of Commerce Secretary Paul Light reported. The financial picture is definitely improving, though no official figures are available in midseason.

From St. Petersburg, Gulf beaches comes the word. "Beaches are enjoying a better summer business than they did last summer. More people are finding the beaches a good place to spend a vacation."

The report from Anna Maria Island, Bradenton's beach resort, was even more encouraging. "Anna Maria Island is having its best summer season in history although tourists aren't throwing away their money as in other years."

At Anna Maria, low and medium priced units are booked solid and prospective renters are being turned away. Those with more expensive lodgings (about \$50 a week) are being turned away, too.

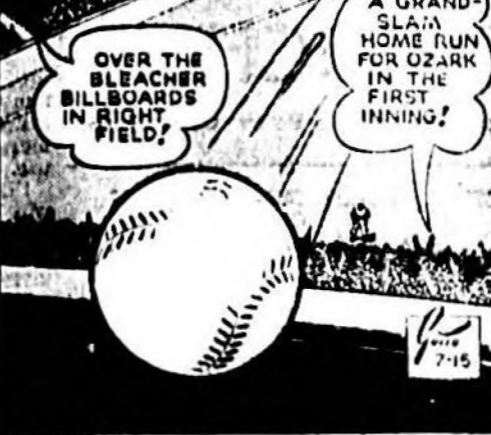

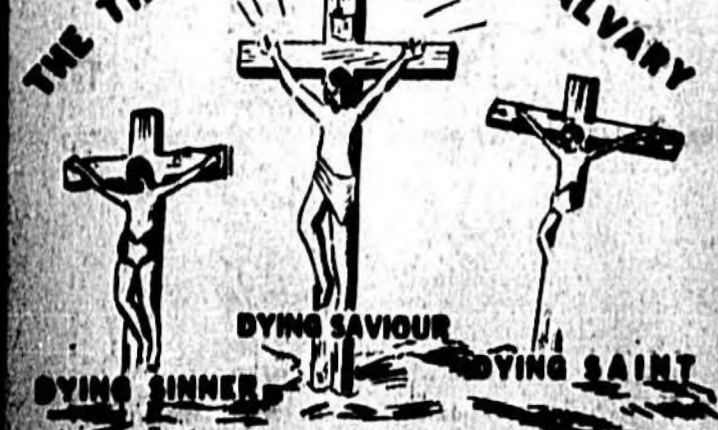
