\$124,000, provides scholarships for the disadvantaged. The second HEW grant for \$34,267 is for continuation of an office of veteran affairs at Schrieber says "more and more" students each year apply for financial assistance. Under

the HEW grant, a student must first apply. His application is sent away for evaluation. If need is substantiated, money can be provided for housing, as well as cost of classes.

Anita Harrow, the school's director of academic affairs, said SCC also received \$35,000 to run the school's cooperative education program, Under that program, students receive college credit for working - when the work is related to a student's major field of study. Also, \$22.861 came in for continuation of the 21st Century Woman program. The non-credit course deals mainly with women's changing role

in today's society. Lastly, Mrs. Harrow said a small grant, about \$4,000, has been received for purchase of books for the school's library.

Just prior to announcement of the grants, trustees elected new officers and greeted two new board members. New members include Mrs. Beverly Freeman and Wendell Agee. Agee did not attend last night's meeting. Both were appointed by Gov. Reubin Askew to replace Vernon Mize and Mrs. Thelma Clontz, whose terms have expired.

SCC President Earl Weldon welcomed trustee' choice of Mrs. Carolyn Stenstrom as chairman and John Daniels as vice-chairman. Also, trustees decided to continue meeting the second Tuesday in each month.

Weldon also gave a brief rundown on th school's financial position. In essence, he said SCC in the fall will accept as many students as possible." SCC is slated to receive about the same amount of state money as last year - \$5.2 Schrieber urged new students to get ap-

Electric Bill Shocks Board

Seminole County Commissioners received an electric shock vesterday. They learned of their June electric bill: \$12,305.74 for providing electricity to the county courthouse.

And, while county officials say they expect power bills to increase during summer months with additional use of the air conditioning, the June bill still was a big jump over the May billing of \$9,681.20.

Ashby Jones, deputy clerk of the Circuit Court, yesterday reported the figures of the recent six months billings from Florida Power and Light Company to the Commission. He said he did it to draw commissioners attention to the bill.

And he succeeded. Commissioner Harry Kwiatkowski has dispatched a memo to department heads, elected officials and maintenance officials suggesting methods to conserve electricity in the building such as raising the theromostat on the air conditioner to 72 degrees and turning lights out when leaving the

He also requested county employes in the courthouse to individually conserve electricity.

According to Jones, the Commission can expect an overexpenditure of \$55,000 at the end of the year because of the cost of electricity. \$100,0000 was placed in the general fund budget for all courthouse utilities, including gas and water. But now, Jones reports only \$10,160 remains in the general fund for utility payments.



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
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49 Still Without Jobs

At tonight's 7:30 School Board meeting, five more Seminol County school teachers will be rehired, leaving 49 teachers still without jobs for the coming school year.

School Supt. Bud Layer today reiterated his position that "90" per cent of those teachers eligible for rehiring will have jobs before classes begin the day after Labor Day.

"With normal attrition and the number of resignations, think we'll be able to place them," Layer said.

Stewart Gatchel, the school system's director of personnel. agrees with Layer's 90 per cent estimate. Gatchel says teachers will be rehired a few at a time until schools open in the fall.



Southern Bell Seeks \$74-Million Rate Boost

TALLAHASSEE (AP) - Everyone in Florida who

calls outside his hometown would be affected by Southern Bell Telephone & Telegraph Co.'s requested hike in intrastate long-distance toll charges, says the firm's vice president.

J.M. Brown, vice president for the firm's Florida operations, told the Public Service Commission Tuesday that a \$74 million increase in intrastate long distance toll charges was needed to assure continued good service. Brown cited increased costs of construction and borrowing money, and the demand by customers for

prompt service. He spoke during the second of nine public hearings being held around the state on Southern Bell's total rate increase request of \$216.5 million. The PSC granted Southern Bell, the state's largest

phone company, an interim hike of \$85.9 million in February. That hike was the largest ever granted a telephone firm in the state.

Officials said the St. Petersburg youth apparently had slumped out of sight in the rear seat when six other children were removed from the nine passenger wagon. "This is a tremendous shock," said Bert Muller, executive vice president of the Pinellas Association For Retarded Children (PARC). "This is a family situation -

we've lived with him for six years. "When I think of the number of kids carried in here we've saved their lives - I have to accept that we've made a mistake," he added.



President Ford chose an audience deep in America's heartland to make an important address on foreign policy recently. His appeal for support in resisting a new isolationism in U.S. policy was voiced in the Midwest, an area which was once the stronghold of isolationist sentiment in American politics.

Mr. Ford dipped into personal as well as political history to recall how America shifted away from isolationism at the end of World War II with the advent of a bipartisan internationalist foreign policy. The shift was getting under way when he became a congressman 26 years ago, and one of its prime movers was a midwesterner from Mr. Ford's own state of Michigan, the late Sen. Arthur Vandenberg.

The President went to South Bend, leaving behind a Congress that is moving dangerously back toward the isolationist course. Ironically, while it took the change of heart of a Republican Vandenberg a generation ago to help Democratic administrations put isolationism to rest, it is now Democratic majorities in Congress who are resisting a Republican President's effort to preserve the alliances and economic programs which were built on that bipartisan foundation.

The Democrats are allowing a sense of futility over the progress of the war in Southeast Asia to dictate a cut-off in military aid which could have a shattering effect on the confidence of our other allies around the world. The House recently cut 40 per cent off the administration's requests for both the economic and military segments of our foreign aid program - the sharpest cuts in its 27-year history. Our economic recession has bolstered the point of view that America should pull into its shell - that we cannot afford either to support our allies with weapons or continue or role as a provider of

assistance to developing countries. "There is no safety for any nation in a hungry, ill-educated and desperate world." said Mr. Ford at South Bend, echoing what might have served as the theme for our foreign policy since the late 1940s. This leads to another irony. The new solationists in Congress often plead their case on humanitarian grounds, arguing that our in-

ternational role is draining resources away from our own problems and not helping people abroad History refutes them. Most of the nations benefiting by our military aid have enjoyed a prolonged period of peace. Most of the Third World

nations receiving our economic aid and participating in trade and investment programs with the United States are making far more progress in advancing their living standards than they could ever have hoped to make without it, and they now are buying 30 per cent of the products which we

It is a dangerous notion, said Mr. Ford, that "our fate is unrelated to the fate of others." The opposite of isolationism is not so much inernationalism, but interdependence. Moreover, interdependence is not so much a policy as a truth, and the Congress needs to be awakened to it.

Good Investment

The American investment in Vietnam refugees, involving up to one-half billion dollars in federal funds and an infinite amount of human compassion, has been criticized as a drain on an already overtaxed economy. But a delegation of Nebraska legislators has dramatized the


potential for a profitable return. The group is negotiating at Camp Pendleton, Calif., with South Vietnamese physicians in the hope of relieving the plight of several Nebraska communities that have been unable to lure doctors to administer to the ills of their people. Sizzling midwestern summers and frigid winters combined with sparse population have long discouraged American-trained professionals from establishing practices in those rural areas. The initiative of the Cornhuskers, certainly, is not going to

resolve the refugee problem in itself. America historically has taken its strength from its ability to feed on the strengths of its immigrants. It must continue to do

so, not only for reasons of charity, but of self interest. The imagination exhibited by the Nebraskans is a start.



DON OAKLEY India Loses **By Actions** Of Gandhi

Because the "world's largest democracy" has consistently behaved as if it also deserved the title of the world's most righteous nation, others may feel a certain grim satisfaction in the fact that when it came to the ultimate test that; separates a true democracy from a sham - the choice between the rule of law and the rule of ; men (or in this case, of a woman) - India has shown itself capable of descending into a state of political repression that ranks with any extant

But that aside, the dictatorial powers assumed by Prime Minister Indira Gandhi in the name of defending India but actually to perpetuate herself in office can only be viewed with sorrow and dismay.

If India joins the lengthening list of emerg nations that have taken the road to totalitarianism, what hope is there for freedom anywhere in the so-called Third World for which India was in many ways the model?

The answer depends upon how deeply rooted democracy really is on the subcontinent and how grievously Mrs. Gandhi may have injured it. The answer presumably will become known at the end of summer when the reconvening Indian Supreme Court decides whether or not to uphold a regional court decision that found Mrs. Gandhi guilty of illegal election practices and ordered er stripped of her seat in Parliament and, in consequence, of the prime ministership.

In the meantime, she continues to rule by virtue of a stay of the court's order, by a proclamation of a national emergency and by a display of brute force which has seen the jailing of reportedly thousands of her political opponents.

Should the high court rule against Mrs. Gandhi, and should she abide by its decision, the crisis would be resolved with what can be hoped would be a strengthening of democratic in-stitutions in India. Or should the court vindicate her, as it is widely believed it will, the crisis would also be resolved, but with what lasting harm to India it would be difficult to predict. Many unhappy things could happen before

Opposition to the overwhelmingly predominent Congress Party has always been weak and fragmented. Peron Forced To Give Up

Limit On Wage Increases

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) - President Isabel Peron suffered a double blow at the hands of the Peronist movement when labor forced her to abandon the wage ceiling and the Senate named a successor to the presidency over her objections.

The General Labor Confederation (CGT), backbone of the ruling Peronist movement, called off its two-day general strike 10 hours early Tuesday after Mrs. Peron agreed to abandon the 50 per cent limit on wage hikes she ordered last week as part of an austerity program to counter inflation.

There was no indication, however, that Mrs. Peron had agreed to the labor leaders' demand that she get rid of Jose Lopez Rega, her conservative private secretary and social welfare minister who is the dominant figure in the government. Lopez Rega has alienated many sectors of the Peronist

movement and is also out of favor with the leaders of the armed forces.

Miners Shelve Pay Demand

LONDON (AP) - Britain's Labor government scored its first victory in its battle against Europe's highest rate of inflation when the coal miners agreed to shelve a demand for a 60 per cent wage increase. The decision Tuesday came after a long, angry meeting

at the annual convention of the 270,000-member National Union of Mineworkers. The meeting discussed a demand by militant union leaders in Yorkshire and Scotland for a \$70.40-a-week increase for workers at the coal face, raising their basic

wage to \$220 a week. Prime Minister Harold Wilson had told the convention on Monday that such inflationary pay raises would be "crazy, even suicidal" in the current state of the British economy.

After violent argument, the convention voted to replace the word "demand" with "seek." This put the miners on record that they want the \$220 weekly wage but are prepared to forego it for this year.

In this enlightened year, 1975, there lives in Beaufort, S. C. a man who professes to be a white witchdoctor. He is consulted far and wide for the removal of 'roots' or curses, the curing of illnesses that are supernaturally induced, and the solving of a wide variety of problems.

James Edwin McTeer Sr., was born in 1903 in Hardeville, S. C. At the age of 22 he was appointed High Sheriff of Beauford County and served in this capacity for 37 years, during which time he came to be loved and respected by his people and earned local, state and national honors. Even though he is officially retired, he still has an office in downtown Beauford and the walls of one entire room are covered with framed awards and photographs of him with Senators and Cabinet members. McTeer agreed to meet me at his office at 9 a.m. and I was there ahead of time. I knocked and entered his office to find the lights and air conditioning on, but the room empty. In a moment a tall thin man with piercing eyes and somewhat pointed ears came out of an adjoining room

and shook my hand firmly. As I listened to him talk about being a root doctor I perceived a man wise in the ways of his fellowman and aware of the fears and superstitions that plague us all at

one time or another. According to McTeer, a root doctor deals mainly with auto-suggestion in an individual's subconscious mind. Dirt from the grave of a preacher, frog's feet, various herbs, powders, and feathers make up the magical potions wielded by the root doctor.

Keep Your Financial House In Order

With inflation on the rise again, you can no longer afford to manage financial affairs "by the seat of your pants." Today, to make ends meet with the same amount of money as last year, you must put your financial house in order — and keep it there.

To help you do a better job of managing your money under present conditions, the American Bankers Association (ABA) offers the following tips.

With budgeting, the problem is how to get started. You can't do much planning unless you have a point of departure. So that's where you begin. Take your checkbook and analyze your spending for the past year. Identify fixed costs, such as rent, mortgage and taxes, versus variable expenses. The rest is simple. Just subtract fixed costs from after-tax income, and what's left is spendable. Once you know that figure, you can make a sensible budget. Without it, you're guessing.

Take food expenses. For years, most experts advised that a family of four with an income of \$15,000 should spend no more than 20 per cent of take-home pay. But today, inflation requires you to increase that food guideline to 25 per cent. That means you have to cut somewhere else to keep your head above water. There's nothing you can

only once a week instead of twice or preplanning to make fewer shopping trips or taking less expensive vacations. How much you should save is another key question. An old rule of thumb suggests setting aside an emergency fund equivalent to 30 or 40 per cent of gross annual income. But this will vary depending on your age, relative. job security and whether your employer covers you for

medical, dental and disability problems. Also if you have children going to college in a few years, you ought to know what inflation is doing to tuition and student living costs. They're going out of sight. So you can't start too early to establish a college education fund. And if you already have one, make sure its goals are still realistic. Chances are inflation will require you to up your commitment to the fund. When it comes to insurance, the main point to be

made is don't cut it when things get tight. It's too important, not only for you but also your loved ones. If anything, consider increasing your coverage, not only on your life but also on your automobile and home. The type of insurance best for your depends on many factors. But young people in particular should try to get



Only one incorporated community in Seminole County, Longwood, has no land zoned

An ordinance was adopted there three years ago, adding the PUD classification to its coning categories. But its single effort to rezone a large parcel to PUD was met with an outpouring of disapproval from nearby property owners.

In Lake Mary, although 70 acres were rezoned PUD, an attempt to develop the tract was also met with rejection by the community's residents.

In Winter Springs in recent weeks, a request by a land developer to extend the 12month time limit on his plan for development of 190 acres was
