Grand Jury Probe Of Jenkins' Slaying Will Begin Monday

Stephenson Is Confident He Will Gain Freedom Through Self-Defense Plea

Swift but certain justice apparently awaits Chris Stephenson, Seminole County deputy sheriff and contester of Ithamer Jenkins, escaped highwayman and former operator of the Hitt-Chip, notorious road house on the old Orlando highway.

A grand jury investigation of the murder of Jenkins will get under way Monday morning at Tallahassee, according to an announcement by State's Attorney J. W. Hunter. It is an indictment is returned against the deputy and it is practically certain that one will be, Stephenson will face trial the following Monday.

Thus, two weeks from the day the crime was committed, the accused man will begin his battle with the law in an effort to escape the penalty which the state hands to one who breaks its provisions. Thus do the wheels of justice turn so rapidly in the Lake county.

Meanwhile Stephenson is certain of the outcome of the case, confident that his story of self-defense will gain him a jury, and liberty once more. He realizes that an indictment will be returned against him. The stories of Mrs. Homer Jenkins, the slain man's wife with whom the accused man is said to be in love, and Miss Bessie Holland, her friend, will be enough evidence on which to bring an indictment. But Stephenson puts all his faith and hope in the law.

In the shadows of a trial for first degree murder, the accused man apparently indolent and untroubled by his alleged paramour near Alford, in his cell on the top floor of the Lake county court house, Stephenson sits smiling and with a deprecating smile.

DECOITTES' SUIT AGAINST HERALD SET FOR JULY 29

Defense Seeks Speedy Trial Despite Handicap Of Single Plea

The \$300,000 libel action instituted by George A. DeCottis against The Sanford Herald and its publishers, will come to trial July 29, it was announced today after counsel for the defendant had signified their intention of not filing new pleadings in the case. Earlier in the week Judge Wright for the fifth time sustained demurrers filed by Mr. DeCottis, the ruling knocking out all of the defense pleas except one, a plea of not guilty which is allowed by law and not subject to demurrer.

The court allowed 12 days for the defense to prepare new pleadings and an affidavit for the jury. Coupled with this time granted the attorneys for filing pleas, there would be the delay for hearing arguments in the case to the date of the trial, thereby bringing about the probability that the case could not come to trial by Aug. 1, when Judge Wright expects to begin his vacation.

Attorneys to have the case tried during this term of court and to file a plea of not guilty, which is the only plea which the defendant's lawyer notified their attorneys, James M. Carson at Miami and George G. Herring at Sanford, to go to trial or the no guilty plea despite the fact that it practically means a directed verdict for the plaintiff.

HUGE BANK IS POSSIBILITY IN DEBT SCHEME

Gigantic Financial Institution Would Be Aid To World Trade And Move For Peace

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(INS)—A hundred billion dollar world bank, helping as a financial rock of Gibraltar against all existing financial institutions, may go into the Treasury set up by the allied reparations commission for exchanging German reparations payments, it was intimated here today.

Already hinted at by Thomas P. Lamont, international financier and reparations expert, Senator William H. King (D) of Utah, today recommended the project as a means to promote world trade and international peace. He said the benefits of such a gigantic world financial institution would be fabulous and that the United States would reap the greatest benefits because of her tremendous international commerce.

The present international bank, now established by the reparations commission, will receive funds from Germany in foreign exchange and in currency and other distributions to the allied nations. Lamont already has hinted that this institution has developed into a real world bank.

"If in years to come," said Lamont, "it takes on broader functions, it will be because these are a practical and specific use for a branch of economic life which are not now being developed. King retained the world bank idea as evidence to promote trade and thereby to promote peaceful relations between nations. He pointed out that where the people of two nations have peaceful and intimate business relations, war seldom intrudes.

The possibility of such a world bank, almost always the imagination, for one thing, such an institution would not be a clearing house for all the world's commerce. In 1928, world trade probably reached the unprecedented total of \$74,000,000,000 in 1928, if the present annual growth of five per cent is continued, the total trade will reach \$100,000,000,000.

The interest of American industry and American bankers in such an institution can be appreciated by the fact that the United States did a \$2,000,000,000 business last year with other nations, monetary experts expect it to pass the ten-billion dollar mark by the time the world's commerce reaches the \$100,000,000,000 mark. American trade probably will be \$15,000,000,000 a year. The establishment of a world bank to facilitate the exchange of so much commerce, therefore, would be of tremendous benefit to America.







Merchandise Mart, World's Biggest Business Building, Pioneer in Solving Problems of Construction Over Railroad Tracks in Mid-Western Metropolis.



The above sketch shows what an air lot looks like; the air is now being subdivided in Chicago just the same as land and in the plans for construction of the Merchandise Mart land and air was subdivided for the first time.

CHICAGO'S air is being subdivided now just as the estate men of the city have laid out big subdivisions of millions of dollars are represented in the development of air rights for the construction of great buildings over the right of way of railroad tracks in the downtown district and in some of the territory adjacent to it.

The above sketch shows what an air lot looks like; the air is now being subdivided in Chicago just the same as land and in the plans for construction of the Merchandise Mart land and air was subdivided for the first time.

The Merchandise Mart, world's biggest business building now under construction, is the largest single air right development in the middle west and was the pioneer in this new method of constructing buildings over railroad tracks.

It was in a vast stretch of tracks belonging to the Illinois Central running for more than a mile along the lake front in the heart of the most valuable real estate section. Just north of the Chicago river, less than a mile from the center of Chicago's shopping district, is a long stretch of railroad tracks belonging to the Chicago & Northwestern railroad.
