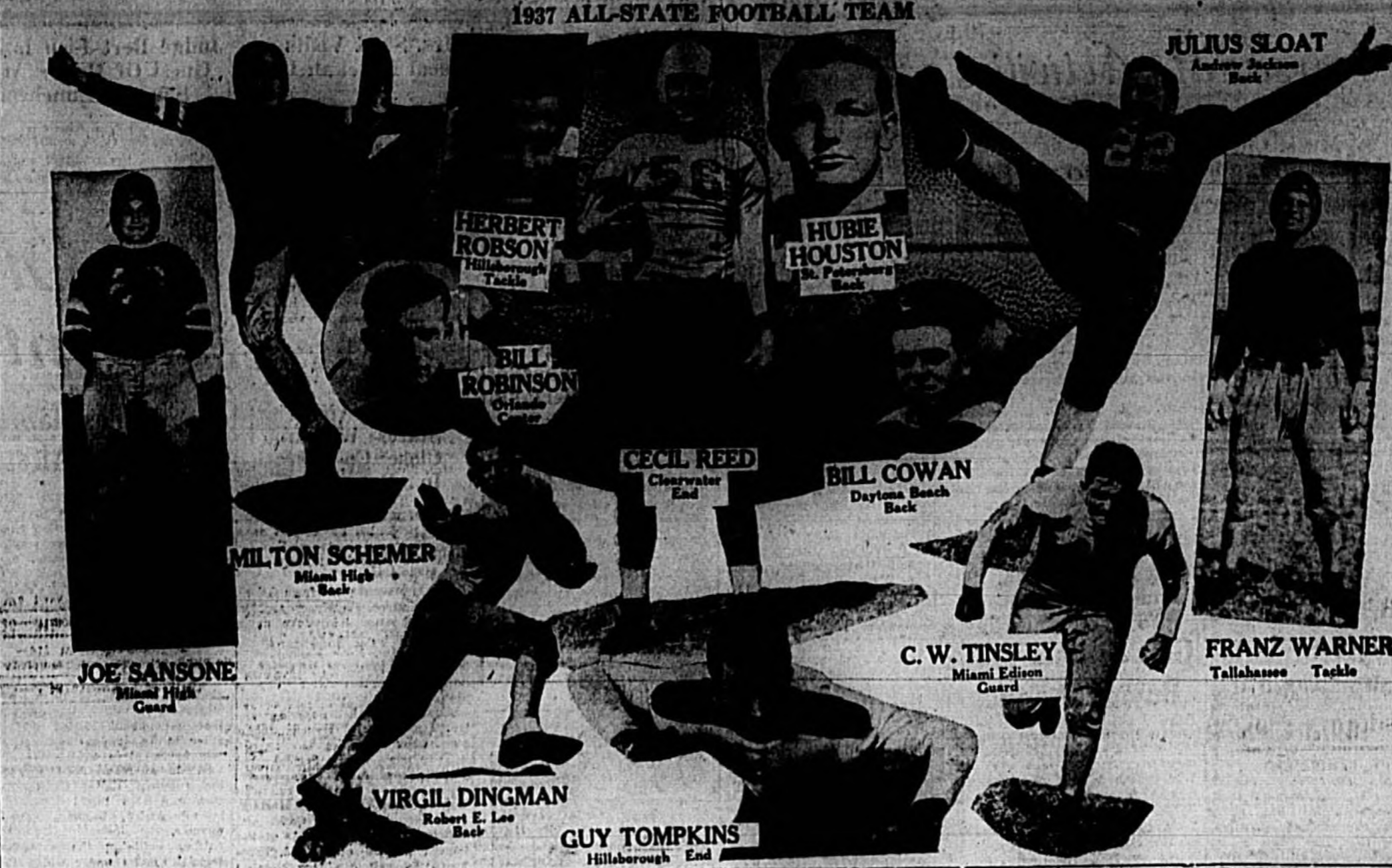

## Witnesses Say Jarrell Ran 'Cuba' Lottery

### Nearly Score Of Witnesses Called By State In Effort To Convict Jarrell

## Lees' Sales Were \$100 Per Week

## Lees Also Testified Jarrell Employed Forty-Six Salesmen

Nearly a score of witnesses were called by the state this morning to testify in the lottery trial of Joseph Jarrell, recently indicted by the Seminole County Grand Jury for conducting a lottery known as "Cuba" in Seminole County.

Among the most important witnesses were Bud Sauls, a former employee of The Arrow, First Street beer parlor owned and operated by Mr. Jarrell, and Andrew Lees, both of whom testified they had sold "Cuba" tickets, the proceeds of which were turned over to Mr. Jarrell who in turn paid off the winners.

Mr. Lees also testified that Mr. Jarrell had 46 salesmen, of whom Mr. Lees was one, working in Seminole County and that his own sales averaged \$100 a week.

From the testimony it was indicated that of all the other lotteries operating in Seminole County, Mr. Jarrell's was the largest.

**Gov. Cone Tells Flog Prosecutor To Do His Duty**

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 14.—(AP) Governor Cone wrote, State Attorney Rex Parker, at Tampa today, "Be alert and do his duty in the prosecution of the shoe-maker bootlegger trials at Bartow. The Governor wrote he would not relieve Parrior of the prosecution nor replace Judge Robert T. Devel of Bartow of the Polk County criminal court as presiding judge nor ask the supreme court to clarify its opinion on case."

Parrior had written the Governor and Attorney General Cary D. Lewis that he could not continue as prosecutor unless the local situation was clarified.

Governor Cone declined "to make public the text of his letter to Parrior but said it contained his endorsement to the case. "I wrote him that I have nothing to do with telling the courts what kind of decisions they should make," Cone told reporters. "It changed judges everywhere they gave a ruling I felt like I'd be changing them all the time."

## Salvation Army Receives Numerous Appeals For Food

The vast majority of the appeals which come to the Salvation Army are for food, according to Capt. Fred R. Perea, who explained this morning that more than 75 percent of the money contributed to the Emergency Stocking Fund will be devoted to the purchase of food for Christmas baskets.

Only a relatively insignificant part of the fund can be utilized for toys and similar gifts for children, the Salvation Army leader said, and in no case will more than 15 or 25 cents be spent or toys for any one child, because of the far greater demand this year for food.

There will be no duplication of donations by various charity organizations to the poor, he said, because the Seminole County Welfare Board acts as a clearing house for such operations.

## WPA Project Re-Paving Of Celery Avenue Okayed By City

### Improvement Costing \$8,500 Provides For Widening And Construction Of Fill

A WPA project which contemplates improvement to the lower section of French Avenue between Commercial Avenue and the Lake Shore Boulevard, was given the approval of the City Commissioners in the regular meeting in the City Hall last night, and City Engineer Fred T. Williams was instructed to submit the project to officials of the Works Progress Administration for their approval.

The City's contribution to the project which calls for an expenditure of over \$8,500 is slightly over \$2,000. According to Mr. Williams the project calls for the widening of the street to 24 feet and constructing a fill at the lower end so that the grade of the street will be more nearly that of the State highway.

## Japs Meet Major Demands Of U.S.; British Interested

### John Bull And United States Working In Close Co-Operation In Present Crisis

SHANGHAI, Dec. 14.—(AP) Fifty-two survivors of the bombed United States gunboat Panay today made their way from an inland refuge back toward the Yangtze River carrying their two dead and eight seriously wounded.

Awaiting their arrival from Hasaban some 30 miles inland the United States gunboat Oahu, the British gunboat Bee, three Japanese warships and a Japanese airplane stood by at Hsiehnan to the injured.

Two known dead in the Japanese bombardment Sunday of the Panay and three other American vessels were: Charles E. Keaminger of Ocean Beach, Calif., and Sandro Sandri, an Italian newspaperman, who sought refuge on board the vessel.

Available information of the attack which endangered 70 foreigners mostly Americans was that two were dead, eight seriously wounded, two slightly wounded, and 11 foreigners and 81 Chinese were missing and probably a total of 66 saved.

## Local Merchants Form Group To Protect Credit

### Effort Will Be Made To Post Each Other As To Bad Accounts

Efforts to overcome unfavorable credit conditions which have been prevailing locally for some time, got underway with the formation Saturday of what is known as the Merchant's Co-operative Credit Board, it was announced yesterday by D. K. McNabb, secretary of the new organization.

All in all, the merchants who are members of the Board of Commerce, which is made up of the Merchants' Co-operative Credit Board, and the local credit associations, will be able to post each other as to bad accounts.

The Board will send out notices to persons who are behind in their bills, notifying them of the amount of their bills and requesting payment. The second and final notices will contain a warning that if the bill is not paid promptly, the association will be notified.

Under this system a person who does not pay his bills with one merchant will be unable to secure credit with another, it was explained, since all merchants will be advised of the names of all persons who do not pay their bills, and no merchant will be willing to credit a person who has a large and long overdue account on the books of some other merchant.

## Papworth Shows Need For Revision Of Tax Structure

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 14.—(AP) Papworth, a prominent citizen of Sanford, gave a specific illustration of the need for revision of the state tax structure in a letter to the Florida Tax Revision League released here yesterday.

Mr. Papworth used the M. F. Robinson estate, which he manages as a concrete illustration. The text of Mr. Papworth's letter is quoted below:

"This estate owns an orange grove at Orange City, Volusia County. It was frozen down during December 1934 and we lost the entire crop. Since then we have been putting out money to try and bring the property back to a paying basis. Understand we have not received a cent in return since 1933. Now note the way we have been assessed:

"1934 we paid the assessed taxes amounting to \$142.12.

"1935 we paid the assessed taxes amounting to \$132.32.

"1936 we paid the assessed taxes amounting to \$123.73.

"This year if you please we are assessed \$262.13."

The assessor knows there is no chance for any return from this property for the next two or three years, yet we have no redress or application."

In commenting the Tax Revision League said: "This, in our opinion, is a clear illustration of the inequality and thoroughly degrading effect of our antiquated and vicious tax system."

## Huge Fires Blaze In Nanking After Falling To Japs

SHANGHAI, Dec. 14.—(AP) Great fires blazed in fallen Nanking tonight as the Japanese army relentlessly pursued its punitive mission deep into China. The city, which had been the seat of Chinese government and industry for over a century, was reported to have been reduced to a vast wasteland.

The Japanese reported that they had captured the city after a long and bloody battle. The city had been under siege for several weeks.

## Tokio Note Expresses Regret, Promises Indemnification And Future Carefulness

Further exchanges today marked the progress of diplomatic representations growing out of the Panay incident. Japan met the major demands of President Roosevelt on the sinking of the United States gunboat before they were presented formally.

The Japanese note expressed regret, promised indemnification, and stated measures had already been taken to prevent the recurrence of the incident.

## Fourteen Persons Are Arraigned In City Police Court

Fourteen persons were arraigned before City Judge Frank L. Miller in a criminal case in the Municipal Court in the local Police Station yesterday afternoon.

Only charges for minor law violations were listed against those whose names appeared on the court docket with drunkenness charges heading the list of law violations.

Those charged with drunkenness were: Jay Kiddall, who was sentenced to 30 days; Mike Brennan who was sentenced to 30 days; H. A. J. Sheehan, who was sentenced to 30 days; Julia Sims, who was given a similar fine and Cornelius Robinson, who was given the alternative of paying a fine of \$5 or serving 10 days.

## Cold Continues Over Most Of Country

Cold weather prevailed in most sections of the country today except around the Gulf Coast and along the Pacific Coast.

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The Jap Plan

Again the Japanese have insulted the United States and again they have instantly apologized and expressed their most profound regrets.

The Japanese apology characterizes the bombing as a horrible mistake, a frightful blunder on the part of one of their aviators who mistook the Panay for a Chinese ship.

While there should be no disposition on the part of this country to rush into a war with Japan, or to start shouting "Remember the Panay!", we can see no reason at all why the Japanese apology should be accepted.

In our opinion the attack on the Panay was conceived and ordered into execution by the Japanese high command.

It is now perfectly clear that the Japanese invasion of China is not just a punitive campaign, but a great national conquest of the first rank.

These countries have certain concessions in China, including not only trade but actual territorial rights, guaranteed to them by formal treaties signed by Japan as well as China.

It is the Japanese hope that by making it so hot for the British and Americans, by sinking their ships and machines gunning their nationals, without precipitating an actual war, they will withdraw and leave the country wholly to Japanese exploitation.

The Value Of Insurance

Cash payments totaling more than \$12,000,000,000 (twelve billion dollars) were made to policyholders and beneficiaries by life insurance companies in the United States during the seven depression years beginning in 1930.

John R. Hardin, president of the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Company disclosed that living policyholders had received \$8,785,187,000, including policy loans, while cash paid for death claims to estates or beneficiaries aggregated \$3,988,177,000.

Stripping the fact that these payments exceeded the cash payments to estates and beneficiaries, Mr. Hardin said: "Depression experiences support the view that, through the payments in cash to living beneficiaries in times of individual pressure, life insurance is enabled to render a more helpful and beneficial aid to life insurance patrons than through the cash payments made on policies matured by the death of the insured."

Mr. Hardin revealed that policy loans have been repaid in substantial volume. Pointing out that the difference between total policy loan investments in 1929 and 1936 does not reflect the repayments to the companies, he said: "Throughout the darkest days of the depression cash payments continued to be made in large volume by policyholders on account of their loans, whether originally made for cash or to pay premiums."

In the midst of the depression conditions of the seven years, the 45 companies made investments costing \$19,848,769,000, Mr. Hardin said. Eliminating non-cash elements in this total, there was an outlay in cash—excluding cash policy loans—on the acquisition of investments eligible for insurance company funds of \$18,888,894,000.

Washington Daybook: WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Military students in these parts have come to the conclusion, after close analysis of the Chinese conflict, that the Japanese are very skillful fighters.

In North China the Yellow River extends inland to the west some 500 miles, then turns abruptly northward about the same distance.

Japan, operating southward from the puppet kingdom of Manchukuo, launched a drive in three columns, following southward along these three railroads.

As soon as the Japanese line had forced its way about half way to the Yellow River on the south, a strong force was sent inland from this coastal railroad.

In four months Japan has overrun about 200,000 square miles. If Germany had overrun all of Belgium and France in 1914, it would have covered only 223,000 square miles.
