## ALABAMA TO FACE STANFORD IN ROSE BOWL

### Great Southern Team Goes West Untied, Undefeated In Big New Year's Classic

PASADENA, Calif., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Alabama was selected today to meet Stanford in the Rose Bowl football game here New Year's Day. The announcement, made manager of Stanford, came by Alfred Masters, graduate-as no surprise.

It will be the Crimson Tide's fourth trip here. In its three previous appearances the Southern team won twice and was tied once by Stanford, seven to seven, in 1927. Coach Frank Thomas' boys come here undefeated and untied.

Stanford, Pacific Coast conference champions, was unanimously selected by the conference last Monday. The Indians are unbeaten but were tied by Santa Clara early in the season.

The big Red Tide of Alabama yesterday swept over the Vanderbilt Commodores, 34 to 0, winning a second consecutive Southeastern conference title and bolstering its chances for an invitation to the Rose Bowl.

## Bootleggers Face Rich Winter Trade With Agents Fired

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Fear that bootleggers will intensify their bid for the year-end liquor trade was expressed in government circles today as the treasury prepared to disband two thirds of its whiskey detective force at midnight.

By a mandate of Congress the enforcement agents were made to take a civil service examination. Of them, 900 failed the celebrated "horse sense" test given by the Civil Service commission and they must drop off the payroll tonight. About 400 will be left to combat all the illicit distilling in the United States.

Secretary Morgenthau has said that "chaos" will be the result. How much it will cost the government in revenue and how much bootleg liquor will reach the market only time will tell.

## Private Capital Asked To Aid FHA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Private capital was invited by the Federal Housing Administration yesterday to step into the low-cost urban housing picture, with the inducement of federal insurance of mortgages up to the full cost of the buildings.

The invitation took the form of a new set of regulations for insurance of such projects, issued by James A. Moffett, the housing administrator. The move generally was interpreted as further clarifying the housing situation since which Moffett and Secretary Ickes clashed last week.

## "Amazing" Is Word Best To Describe Huey Long, Former Pig Farm Boy Turned "King"

From pig farm boy to dictator of Louisiana—that is the amazing story of Senator Huey Long. The man, his methods and his victories are chronicled in a series of three daily articles, of which this is the first, written by Ralph Wheeler, chief of The Associated Press bureau in New Orleans, who has been reporting Long's extraordinary career since the blizzard first attracted wide attention.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Miles of copy have been written about Huey Long, Louisiana's senator and dictator. He has been called a buffoon, a coward, an ignoramus, a fool and even a lunatic.

But Long is none of these things. He cannot be described in a word or a phrase. To describe him it is necessary to dig deeply into the bag of descriptive language, for rarely in the history of this country has there appeared on the political stage a man like him.

The word "amazing" may fit Long as well as any simple word. He always is amazing. He is full of surprises and a finger never can be put on him.

He has a nimble mind and keen insight into the moods of the masses. He excels as an organizer, at breaking down opposition, at browbeating his enemies.

In a flash he can be either a terrifying tyrant or a beaming jovial, good companion. He will "dish out" the act that he thinks (Continued on page Eight)

## JOB INSURANCE SEEN NO REMEDY FOR DEPRESSION

NEW YORK, Nov. 30.—The national industrial conference last night announced results of an investigation of British experience with unemployment insurance from 1911, date of the first unemployment insurance act in Great Britain, to June 28, 1934, when the unemployment act of 1934 received royal assent.

The chief "lessons" from British experience were summarized as follows: 1. Unemployment insurance is not a remedy for depression.

2. Seasonal and casual unemployment tends to become permanent as a result of statutory unemployment relief.

3. Chronic unemployment due to permanent loss of trade, must be dealt with by other measures than unemployment insurance.

4. Without an efficient and honest administrative force, unemployment insurance has no chance of success.

5. Any scheme of unemployment insurance must be accompanied by a plan of unemployment relief for the workers who lose their right to insurance benefits or who cannot qualify for the receipt of benefit and for workers in uninsured occupations.

6. If unemployment insurance is not supplemented by a scheme of relief, the temptation to extend statutory benefits to persons who are not qualified under the law is (Continued On Page Five)

## Fort Myers Accepts Free Lighting Offer

FORT MYERS, Nov. 30.—The Fort Myers city council has accepted the offer of the Florida Power and Light Company of 50 percent more light at no extra cost and has authorized the company to restore the whitewash lights, and increase the candlepower of overhead lights effective Dec. 1.

The offer was first made in a ten-year contract firm but was accepted with all time limits eliminated, though it provides either the power company or the city can terminate the agreement on 30 days' notice.

The present city light bill is approximately \$14,400 and the new agreement provides for lights which would cost approximately \$7500 to be turned on without extra cost.

## GREEN SEES RELIEF NEEDS AS SERIOUS

### Labor Head Reports 550,000 More Out Of Work Than At This Time In 1933

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—(AP)—On the eve of a significant administration decision as to its future relief policy, the American Federation of Labor last night reported that a half million more men and women were unemployed than in October a year ago.

William Green, president of the federation, interpreted this to mean that the relief problem over the coming winter was "the most serious this nation has ever faced."

"We are entering the winter of 1934," he said, "with 550,000 more out of work than we had at this time a year ago. The American Federation Labor estimates show 10,671,000 without work in industry in October, 1934, as compared to 10,122,000 in October, 1933."

Loaded down with even later and more complete data, Harry Hopkins, relief director; Secretary Morgenthau and Under-Secretary Tugwell of the agriculture department meanwhile were headed toward Warm Springs, Georgia.

At a conference with President Roosevelt today or Saturday, a session regarded as one of the most important of pre-Congress gatherings, the entire relief problem will be dissected and policies formed.

Foremost among proposals to be studied is a plan for transforming Hopkins' emergency relief administration into an agency for the rehabilitation of destitute families on a permanent basis by leading them enough money "at one shot" as Hopkins puts it. (Continued on Page 5)

FERA officials at the Court House today expressed elation over the fine enrollment, and the qualifications of the instructors. Miss Smoot, a graduate of Apopka High School, studied for six years at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, a year at the University of Missouri, and traveled in Europe for some time as the winner of two scholarships.

She has exhibited in New York City and Philadelphia art centers, and her works have drawn the attention and mention of the art critic of the New York Times. Many of her canvases or sculptures are in private collections in the East, and she is considered as among the outstanding artists in Florida.

She holds membership in the Florida Federation of Arts, and is a member of the Fellowship of the Pennsylvania Academy. She has taught privately, and is prepared to instruct in general art, illustration, sculpture, painting, the history of art, and interior decoration. Students are involved in no expense except that for materials used in their work.

## CITRUS MEN ASKED TO SIGN PACT

### Senator Fletcher Of Opinion That New Agreement Will Be Of Benefit To State

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Senator Fletcher said yesterday the Florida citrus industry should accept the marketing agreement proposed by Secretary Wallace and come immediately under the orderly marketing machinery of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

The senator's statement followed the posting of a letter by Wallace to the Florida Citrus Growers Clearing House Association declaring "differences between groups of shippers must be adjusted within the state, and should be adjusted quickly."

"I think the growers and shippers should sign the agreement," said Fletcher. "The difference seems to be in the personnel of the control committee. I advise the industry to go ahead and cooperate with the secretary of agriculture. I can't decide whether proper representation has been provided on the committee, but the growers and shippers should have faith in the secretary of agriculture. I am sure he will do what is fair."

The veteran senator, who owns considerable acreage of citrus fruit trees, said he knew of one grower who was offered \$2.10 a box for grapefruit on the New York City market, while the actual cost of picking, boxing and shipping the fruit was \$2.30 a box.

## Economist Warns Business Men Of Two Catches In Late Address By Donald Richberg

By LEWIS HANEY (Professor of Economics, New York University) NEW YORK CITY, Nov. 30.—Mr. Richberg has spoken. In the last few days, this key man in the New Deal organization has made two speeches which deserve the closest study.

Strangely enough, the business leaders appear to think that these speeches are reassuring. They nibble at the bait without seeing the trap.

The bait consists of a number of sound ideas which are scattered throughout the speeches.

For example, Mr. Richberg (presumably with the President's approval) says that "of all quack remedies the worst is to get drunk again in another orgy of inflation."

He says individual laborers must have the right to decide what union to belong to, if any, and refers to the "responsibility" of labor organizations, in such a way as to encourage those opposed to the "closed shop." This will appeal to many employers.

He says business cartels surely lead to state control of industry, and that a democratic people will not tolerate price-fixing. This is true, although some business leaders (Continued On Page 5)

## TRADE, BUILDING ON INCREASE IN SOUTHEAST AREA

ATLANTA, Nov. 30.—Continued business increases in the Southeast were reported yesterday by the Atlanta Federal Reserve Bank.

The bank said its survey of business conditions in the Sixth Federal Reserve District for October showed further increases in the volume of retail and wholesale trade, in bank debits to individual accounts which reflect the volume of business transactions settled by check, in building and construction, and in loans and deposits at member banks.

Department store sales gained 18.2 percent in October over September and were 16.5 percent greater than in October last year. However, because October had 27 business days and September only 24, daily average sales increased only five percent.

Wholesale trade increased 6.9 percent for the month and was 20.4 percent greater than in October, 1933. Bank debits to individual accounts were 19.1 percent greater than in September and 18.2 percent greater than in October a year ago.

Building permits issued at 20 reporting cities show a gain of 64.1 percent for the first ten months of the year over the same period of 1933. They increased 49.2 percent from September to October and were a little more than double those for October last year. ## Japan Will Denounce Washington Treaty

TOKYO, Nov. 30.—Foreign Minister Koki Hirota yesterday publicly confirmed the grim determination of the Japanese government to denounce the Washington Naval limitation agreements.

In a blunt speech before a special session of the Imperial Diet, the Telukuo Jikai—the foreign minister asserted that Japan proposes abolition of the ratio principle of naval strength between herself, Britain, and the United States and "establishment of a common upper limit for the powers concerned."

## PARAGUAY OUT TO PUT END TO CHACO WAR

### Disruption Of Government In Bolivia Serves To Inspire New Army Attack

By The Associated Press HEARTENED BY AN unexpected change in the Bolivian government, PARAGUAY forces pressed forward in the Chicago Boreal seeking a quick end to a war which has raged furiously for two and a half years following a half century of animosity.

Vice President Jose Luis Tejada Sorzano of Bolivia issued a decree several days ago in which he cleared himself in charge of the affairs of state for his nation.

His President, Daniel Salamanca, was absent from La Paz, the nation's capital, at the time, inspecting Bolivian troops in the jungle battle territory.

Dispatches from Buenos Aires and from Asuncion, capital of Paraguay, indicated that Salazar had been made prisoner by his own soldiers. There is no confirmation of this report from Asuncion, however.

On the contrary, the Bolivian government announced that the vice president's assumption of power was "A routine matter."

Dispatches from La Paz today, however, indicated that Tejada Sorzano's action was a coup d'etat for they told of his naming a new cabinet and said there was "Great jubilation" at the seating of the new president.

## Cyclonic Wind, Rain Spot Weather Map; Pacific Gets Quake

By The Associated Press CYCLONIC WINDS IN Louisiana and Mississippi causing more than 30 injuries and much property damage, streams rising toward a flood stage in North Carolina, rain general over the Ohio valley and eastern United States, and cold weather on the way.

Key, who got into the headlines about two years ago by speaking out at Paris, France, against prohibition, said yesterday chances were good for council giving him the "semblance of authority" he asked.

Since that Paris outbreak, Atlanta's mayor has been day Georgia's chief foe of prohibition.

The mayor has told his budget commission that unless a municipal whiskey store is established city employees face a 30 percent cut in pay.

Atlanta's council, with Key championing the cause of 32 beer, more than a year ago licensed.

Mayor Key yesterday said he would be willing to personally stand trial before a jury for violation of the state law should state or county officers seek to interfere with sales of the dispensary.

In event of conviction, he continued, he would go to jail rather than pay any fine. The mayor said, however, that he considers prospects of such conviction as negligible.

Two leading prosecutors of the county already have said, they would take action if the stores opened.

Possible conflict between the city and county authorities was indicated by the mayor yesterday when he said the city would have "a few policemen scattered around to protect the store."

The mayor knows he has the full support of his chief of police, T. O. Sturdivant. The chief wrote him a letter Wednesday commending his "courageous stand" on prohibition.

The chief wrote, in part: "Past events have demonstrated to the satisfaction of any reasonable mind that we will never have prohibition.

"The only hope for temperance, therefore, in the regulated sale of liquor and I know of no better way to regulate it than to prevent its sale by any but civil authorities.

"Public saloons should never be tolerated; city-operated dispensaries should furnish the only medium of distribution, no matter how relaxed our laws may be in the future."

Demonstrating his confidence of success of the liquor store movement, the mayor invited a New York wholesaler to send a representative to Atlanta for a conference.

The wholesaler offered to stock the store on credit.

City council next Monday is scheduled to be asked to set aside \$10,000 to buy wine and liquor for the establishment.

Mayor Key said 75 cents a pint for liquor of tested quality was his chief weapon to drive out the bootleggers.

He also suggested some regulations for the store:

Cash and carry.

"Not a drop" to be consumed on the premises.

Chemical tests to insure purity.

Confiscation by police of bootleg liquor and sale of confiscated supply, after it has been tested and federal taxes paid.

Said the mayor:

"We are going to break up this unholy alliance between the goody-goody element and the bootlegger."

"Council should be glad to approve of my plan. Folks who drink all the liquor they get their hands on should be delighted to eliminate the fraud and hypocrisy."

Most important of the commandments are: Stop at stop signs; keep to right of highway; forego the legal right of way when accidents can be avoided; exercise care in passing school or zones where children are at play be courteous at all times.

Good reports were made by Rodgers on the industry, the third year now codified.

The industry's contribution to the success of the President's recovery program has been the employment of 300,000 additional men since the code became effective last February," said Rodgers. "This was the figure hoped for by General Johnson.

He talks much of "private enterprise" and freedom.

But this bait lies on the spring of the trap.

Following the lead of the President, he says to business men: Now, gentlemen, you see all this unemployment, and it is up to you to "take up the slack." You go ahead and employ all these millions who are out of work. If you don't, the New Deal government will.

You see, the New Dealers having thus far failed to "cure" unemployment, now find more people on "make do" than a year ago. So now they seek (1) to pass the buck to business, and (2) to provide the excuse for the next move toward state socialism. This is luck passing, because they imply that business could, if it would, give work to the 11,000,000 unemployed. It is a threat, because they say, if you don't, we will create government employment, which means the government in business.

resistible, making it impossible to avoid political raids on the unemployment fund until the state of national finances become so critical as to threaten the solvency of the nation.

7. If unemployment insurance is uniformly applied to all types of unemployment, it impairs the elasticity of the economic system.

8. If unemployment insurance is not based on an accurate knowledge of the facts of unemployment, it will be abused both by workers and by employers.

The board's report points out that in the United States reliable information concerning the extent and nature of unemployment is almost totally lacking. It suggests that before any compulsory scheme of unemployment relief is adopted it would be desirable to establish, under government auspices, a fact-finding body, composed of representatives of labor, industry, state and local governments and the general public.

The British unemployment insurance fund began with an initial coverage of 2,250,000 but in 1931 this was increased to 3,750,000 and by the act of 1920 the number of insured persons was raised to almost 12,000,000.

In each of the first eight years of the fund's existence, its receipts exceeded expenses and on Nov. 7, 1920, the fund had a surplus of 21,800,000 pounds sterling. The extension of the insurance scheme occurred during a business depression. By the end of July 1921, the surplus of the fund was exhausted and a deficit began to accumulate. During the fiscal year ended June 30, 1922, the fund incurred a deficit of fifteen and one-half million pounds sterling, and by Mar. 31, 1931 the total debt of the fund was 115 million pounds sterling.

## Seminole Linemen Star In Defeat By Stopping Jackets

(Continued From Page One) of the field and Seminole was able to hold its powerful opponents to the lowest number of yards gained in a single game this season.

The first touchdown came in the middle of the first quarter. After the kickoff, Seminole was forced to punt on fourth down, Leesburg taking the ball at midfield. The Jackets made one yard in three tries, and Brady's punt went out of bounds on the Seminole nine. Seminole was held to a yard gain in three downs. Standing on his own five yard line, Harnage's punt was short, going out on the Seminole 24 yard line.

Kirkland failed at guard when Monger slapped him down. The drive was broken up when Pennington intercepted Harnage's fourth down pass on the Jacket five yard line and returned it to his own 34 yard line before being tackled. The half ended shortly thereafter.

Hard line play and intercepted passes featured the second third quarter in which Seminole held a slight advantage. Seminole took the ball on downs on its own 16 yard line and made six yards on two tries before the quarter ended.

With fourth down and two to go, Harnage dropped back, apparently to punt. However, he suddenly decided to run with the ball but he fell in the soft sand as Pennington yanked at his arm, and Seminole had lost nine yards and the ball on its own 15. Two line backs brought four yards gain, and the Jackets again fooled the Seminole backs with their pass play, this time from Henry to Pennington.

Offensively and defensively, the Seminole line, with Ralph Monger, the Williams brothers, and Elmyr Squires turning in the greatest games of their high school careers, tore the heavy Leesburg line to bits and turned back nearly every offensive thrust.

Monger, playing his last high school game, was in the Leesburg backfield time after time, upsetting the highly touted Curry Brady and the speedy Julian Miller with a viciousness that was amazing. Also in the Leesburg backfield to stop Jacket backs dead in their tracks was "King Kong" Williams, the sophomore guard, his brother Bill, and young Squires. They went down only after seeing their fine work spoiled by the backfield's inability to diagnose two identical pass plays which were completed for touchdowns on each occasion.

In the Seminole backfield, it was almost all Lennie Harnage. This frail youngster ran, kicked, and passed until he was near exhaustion, personally accounting for 63 of the 67 yards Seminole gained from scrimmage, and ending his high school career with great credit. Never a great punter, the youth nevertheless has carried the burden all season. It was unfortunate that one of his few punts of the afternoon should have been short and thus paved the way for the first Jacket touchdown. However, there are no other punter on the squad and the youth refused to let this break stop him from trying to score every time he carried the ball.

Jack Hughes, Oliver Miller and George McClelland, all senior backfield men who started and finished the game with Harnage performed creditably at times, but it was Harnage's sturdy play that was outstanding. Other seniors in their final game were the Pearson brothers and Charles Heidin.

Statistics of the game reveal the surprising manner in which Seminole met its foe. The Jackets were able to muster but six first downs where they usually make 10 or 12, while Seminole made five first downs. Instead of rolling up about 200 yards from scrimmage, the Jackets had to be satisfied with only 104, and they saw Seminole turn in 67 yards net gain.

The Jackets were more successful with their passes, completing two of eight for 24 yards gain and two touchdowns, and having one intercepted. Seminole tried 12 passes, completing two for 28 yards gain, and having four intercepted.

Harnage turned in 63 yards net gain from scrimmage, almost twice as much as that scored by Miller and Brady combined, while his 17 yard off tackle run equalled that of Brady's 24 yard jaunt which came in the last 30 seconds of play.

Only one penalty was called during the entire contest and that for an excessive time employed by Leesburg in its huddle. Ed Saul, former University of Florida backfield ace, was credited as doing the best job of refereeing seen here this season.

to the dictatorship of Louisiana and a possible candidacy for the presidency, Huey Long, known as the "kingfish," has carried one main weapon—money.

It takes three things to make a war, he will tell you; Money! Money! Money! He not only gives money direct to his leaders to carry an election, but he spends it lavishly in public works. He probably can point to more material things he has created than any other state politician. It has reached the point where it is said almost every resident of Louisiana has benefited in some manner by Long's dictatorship.

In the last six years he has spent more than \$350,000,000 in the state. These funds went for a network of paved roads, a skyscraper capitol, a new governor's mansion, bridges, airports, various public works, free school books and other things. His opponents claim that several millions of these funds found their way into political channels, but Long denies it.

This expenditure has given Huey a wealth of material to shout about from the hustings until he has convinced a majority of voters in the state that he is their benefactor and a Moses leading them out of the wilderness. With skill and cunning, Long has pressed this advantage until today he has reached the stage in Louisiana, of Alexander the Great — there are no more worlds to conquer.

Instead of weeping, the "kingfish" is looking beyond the horizon of Louisiana into the other 47 states and has ordered an immediate drive for organization of "share-the-wealth societies" in other commonwealths. From this nucleus he hopes to build a political machine that some day will land him in the White House.

For several years Long has controlled the executive and legislative branches of the state government. Control to Long means

complete dominance, the rule of a monarch with a mailed fist.

Until recently his opponents managed to check his progress by going to the courts for writs and injunctions. But now his efforts form a majority in the state supreme court, and the recent session of the legislature made all courts impotent against him.

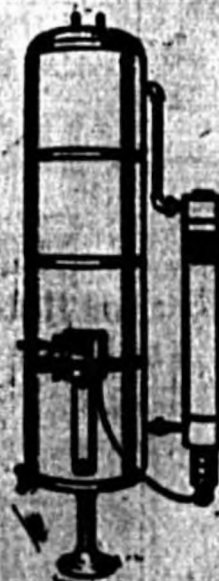

## GERMANY OFFERED SAAR BASIN

### France Willing To Abide By Decision Of League Even If Election Is Won

PARIS, Dec. 1.—(A.P.)—Foreign Minister Laval today publicly offered to Germany a second chance to regain the Saar territory if the Jan. 13 plebiscite favors remaining under the League of Nations' jurisdiction.
