





TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 1. -(A.P.)-The Florida Supreme Court in an evenly divided opinion held that homesteads still are subject to taxation for the payment of refunding bonds issued when a political sub-division is unable to meet its original bonds at maturity.

The Court affirmed a decree of the Duval Circuit Court validating \$445,000 worth of City of Jacksonville refunding bonds.

The validating order was entered by the Circuit Court the day after the state electorate ratified a constitutional amendment exempting homesteads up to \$5,000 assessed valuation from ad valorem taxation.
