## Small Religious Denominations Are Fastest Growers

**NEW YORK, Apr. 2.—(AP)—**A tendency for small denominations to grow faster than large ones is shown in official reports from six religious groups for fiscal years ending in 1932.

The Church of the Nazarene and the Cumberland Presbyterian Church made membership gains last year of 9.8 percent and 2.8 percent respectively, while four major bodies reported increases ranging from 5 to 1.18 percent.

All the denominations reporting total contributions showed losses. The Church of the Nazarene, which registered the largest membership gain, had also the greatest loss in gifts.

The Northern Baptist convention, showing the smallest membership increase, also registered the smallest financial gain.

The membership gain of the United Lutheran Church, 1.8 percent, was the largest of the four numerically strong denominations. Its membership in this country and Canada is now 1,450,754, a one-year increase of 26,268. Its world total is 1,616,754.

The Disciples of Christ show a membership in this country and Canada of 1,572,732, a gain of

28,908 or 1.8 percent. Total membership in all six groups is 1,688,000.

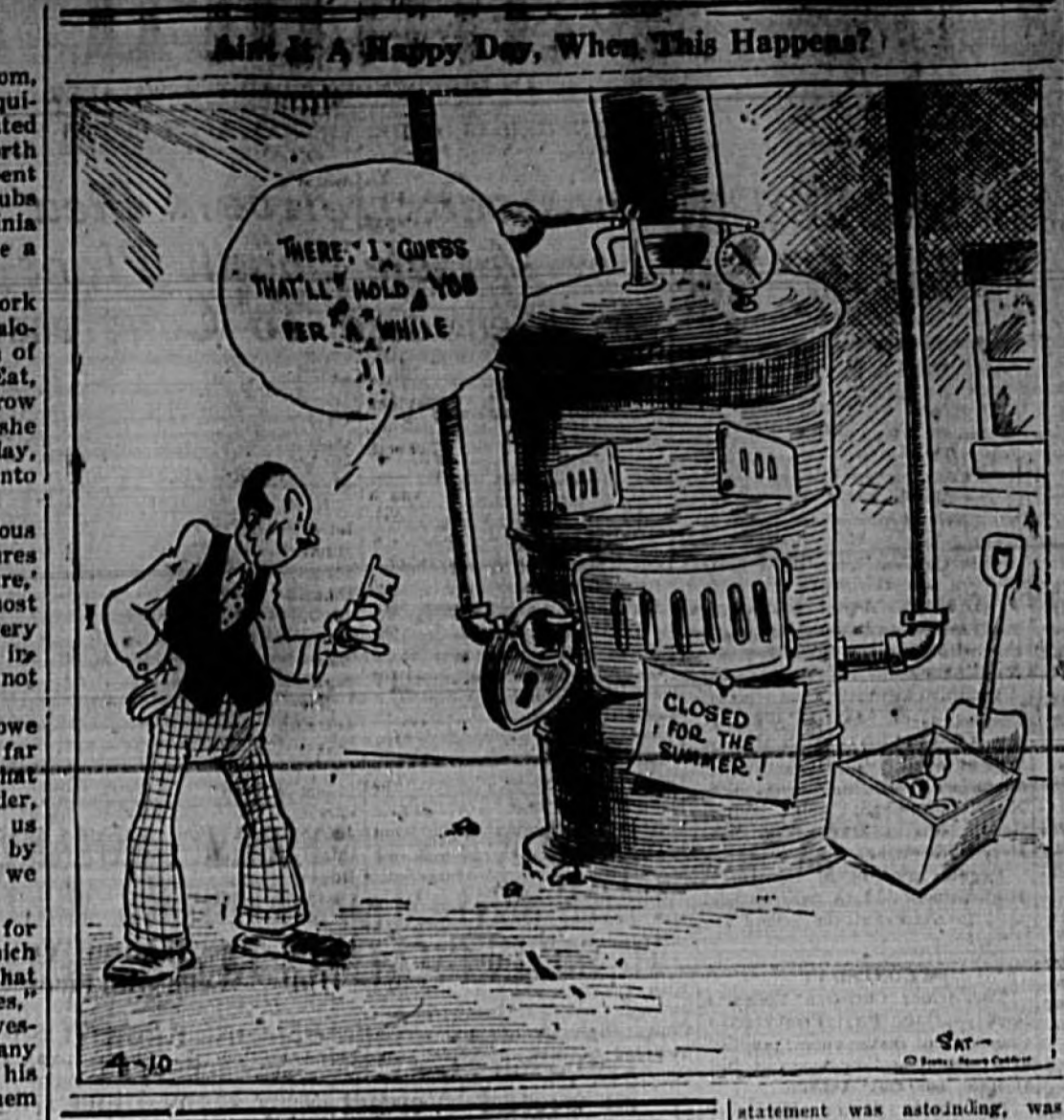
