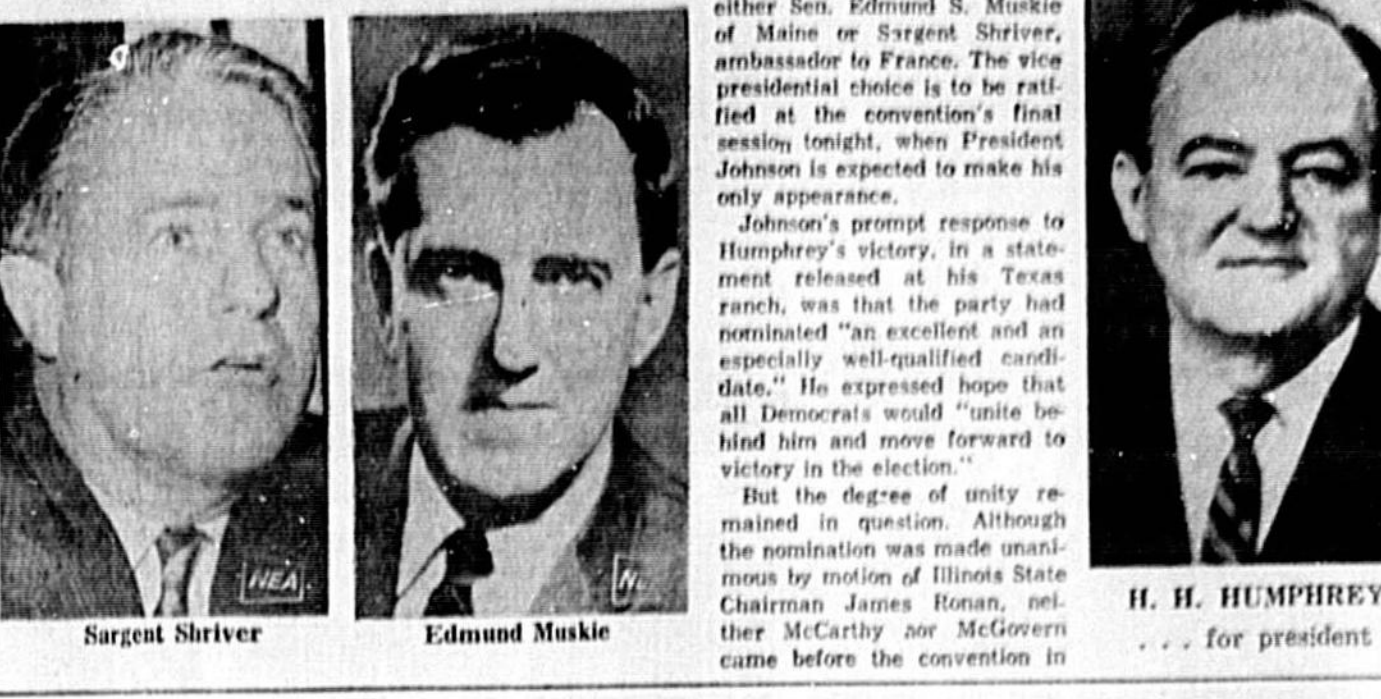
HHH Weep Choice: Muskie, Shriver?

CHICAGO (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey won the Democratic presidential nomination Wednesday night in a violence-thrilled party convention deeply divided on Vietnam war policy and uncertain as to ticket's fate in November.

In command all the way, Humphrey trampled the challenges of peace candidates Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy and George S. McGovern to become the election opponent of Republican Richard M. Nixon.

The vice president's methodically obtained victory was greeted with muted enthusiasm and apprehension by security-harassed delegates to this most guarded and restricted of all national conventions.

The selection of Humphrey promised to lay before the nation's voters a choice between



either Sen. Edmund S. Muskie of Maine or Sargent Shriver, ambassador to France. The vice presidential choice is to be ratified at the convention's final session tonight, when President Johnson is expected to make his only appearance.

Johnson's prompt response to Humphrey's victory, in a statement released at his Texas ranch, was that the party had nominated "an excellent and an especially well-qualified candidate." He expressed hope that all Democrats would "unite behind him and move forward to victory in the election."

But the degree of unity remained in question. Although the nomination was made unanimous by motion of Illinois State Chairman James Ragan, neither McCarthy nor McGovern came before the convention in

Officials Shift The Blame

McCarthy Visits Wounded

CHICAGO (AP) — Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, visibly shaken, visited several hotel rooms Wednesday night that had been set aside for victims injured in antiwar demonstrations outside his headquarters hotel.

McCarthy and his Secret Service agent followed by reporters immediately took the elevator down. He stepped into one room, where a young man with a bandage on his knee said he would be okay and asked the Minnesota what it all meant.

McCarthy has often said that if the Democratic party nominated Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey for the presidency it will bring widespread dissatisfaction among young people interested in politics.

Windows of the Conrad Hilton Hotel, the Democratic National Convention headquarters, were broken by protesters Wednesday night as Hubert H. Humphrey was receiving the party's presidential nomination across town.

Police used clubs in subduing the demonstrators, most of them white youths, some of whom were hospitalized.

Police arrested 267 youths. At least 300 demonstrators were injured, most of them from the police's clubs as the youths surged into police lines and attempted to storm the hotel.

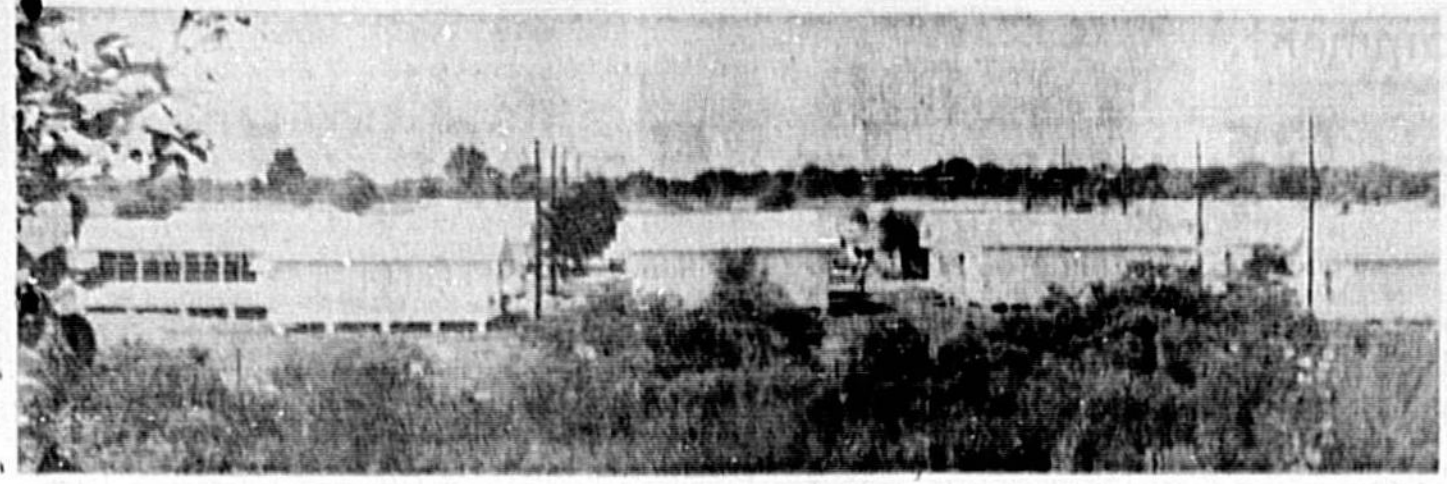

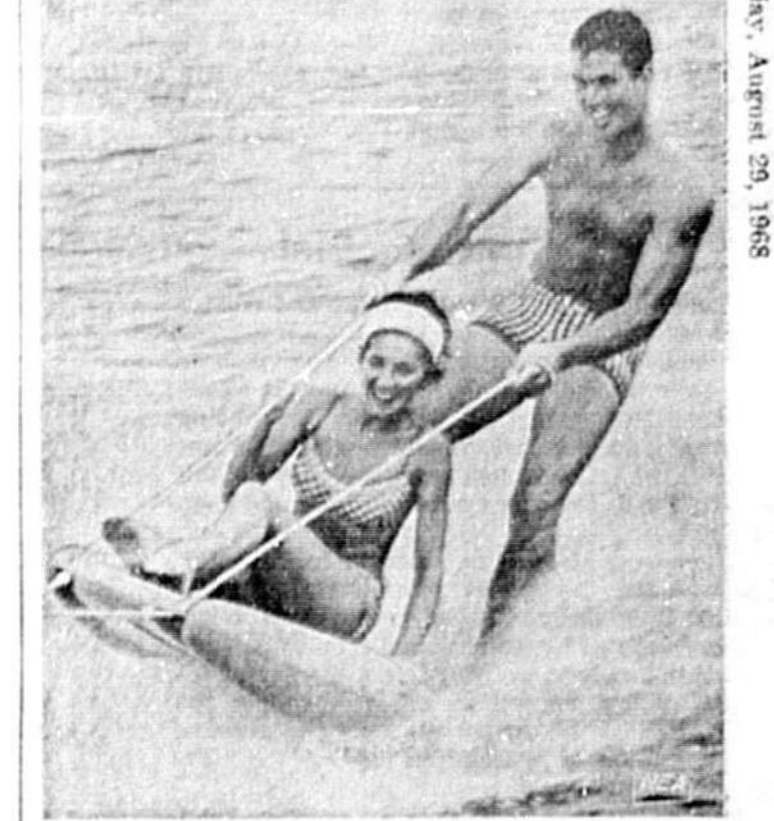

Doubts Expressed About Constitution

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Atty. Gen. Earl Fierloch has become the third Cabinet member to express doubts about the proposed new Florida Constitution.

He said in an interview Wednesday that he has not yet made up his mind and would try to remain as objective as possible, but he did feel the new document "leaves a lot to be desired."

Meanwhile, Secretary of State Tom Adams became the first Cabinet member to speak out in favor of the new charter. But he said he did not plan to be "testing the bushes for its passage."

State Controller Fred Dickson has previously criticized bonding provisions in the new Constitution and State Treasurer Bradford Williams has found fault with sections calling for consolidation of executive departments.

Fierloch said there were questions about whether Gov. Claude Kirk would be able to appoint a lieutenant governor to serve for the remainder of his term if the new Constitution is approved by the voters in November.

The Attorney General's membership of the constitutional revision commission which wrote the original new charter, said he would "lean to" the interpretation that Kirk could appoint the number two executive and add it.
