Cone Voices Opposition To Book Buying

Board Of Education
Discusses Set Of
Proposed Statutes
For Year's Action

Governor Says
'Pay For Basics'

English Seeks Con-
trol Of Orders
On School Texts

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 31.—(AP)—Governor Cone opposed State purchases of supplementary textbooks for public schools today as the State Board of Education discussed at length, without final action, a set of legislative recommendations proposed by Colin English, superintendent of public instruction.

"I'm not going to adopt any more of them [supplemental books]," said Governor Cone. "As far as I'm concerned, from now on we will pay for basic books and no more. If they want supplementary readers, they can get them, but we shouldn't have them at State expense. It's going to bankrupt the State if it doesn't stop somewhere."

English proposed to have the law revised for the State superintendent to have closer control over orders.

An existing law provides that County superintendents send in book requisitions and the State make purchases based on these.

County Dispatches
3,619 Carloads Of
Celery This Season

Seminole County has shipped 3,619 carloads of celery to date in the 1937 season, according to a periodic report issued yesterday by the local branch of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

At this time in 1936, the County had shipped 3,080 carloads, comparable figures of the bulletin showed.

Breaking down the figures further the Bureau pointed out that the Sanford district produced 3,224 carloads of the total, while the Orlando section is responsible for 285 carloads. Both areas are ahead of last year's shipping.

Florida as a whole has shipped 4,911 carloads of celery this season, the Bureau said. At this time last year the figure rested at 3,979.

In Receiving \$1,960

Collections in State and County taxes Tuesday totaled \$1,960.00 as citizens staged a mild rush to settle their bills with the Government before the debts became delinquent, Tax Assessor Jno. D. Jenkins said today.

March is the last complete month in which taxes may be paid before delinquencies begin. They fall in arrears in April.

Mr. Jenkins reported that 600 poll taxes for 1936 had been paid as Sanfordites sought receipts that would enable them to vote in the special election of Apr. 13 to name a City Commissioner to succeed Perry N. Whitehurst, resigned.

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Sanford Asked To Assist Blind In Flower Sale Appeal For Funds For Worthy Cause

An appeal to Sanford citizens to be made Saturday by the American Brotherhood for the Blind through the sale of flowers.

Contributions received from these sales will be used to further the Brotherhood's various Braille publications that are given free to blind readers.

The committee sponsoring the affair includes Mayor Edward Higgins, Mrs. Stella P. Arrington, the Rev. W. P. Brooks, Jr., Mrs. J. C. Mitchell and Mrs. Walter Cooper. The event is sponsored by the Sanford Lions Club.

During the flower day sale, headquarters will be maintained at the Valdez Hotel with Miss Luella Hollis in charge of young people's work and finances.

The American Brotherhood for the Blind is supported entirely by voluntary contributions, and through the flower sales it has published more than 10,000 volumes in Braille during the last 14 years and has placed them free in libraries and elsewhere for circulation among the blind.

The Brotherhood also publishes the "All Braille Magazine," the only fiction magazine made in the United States for the blind. It circulates without cost to sightless readers in every State and 17 foreign countries.

At the request of the Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C., it is being sent to blind veterans throughout the country.

The national advisory council of the Brotherhood includes Hon. David Shultz, former governor of Florida; Dr. Edward Conard, president of Florida State College for Women; John D. Wing, of the Episcopal Church; the Rev. C. M. Brittain of the Baptist Church; Robert Campbell Lawson, Evan Gholson Booth, of the Salvation Army; Kathleen Norris, novelist and others.

"Florida clay is of the sedimentary type and are grouped in five classifications: Kaolin, pottery clays, Fuller's Earth, Bentonite clays and impure or stained clays.

"Florida has stood first in the production of phosphate for nearly a half a century. Its phosphate resources were discovered in 1884.

"Gypsum was widely used by the first Florida explorers in construction of their fort because of its capacity to absorb a cannonball and shatter upon impact.

"Florida's lakes were formed by the collapse of the limestone base, which supports most of the State. Underground waters dissolve the limestone, the roof of the cavern collapses and the lake is born.

"Florida has 21 outstanding springs, from Silver Springs, near Ocala, with a flow of 350,000 gallons of crystal-pure water per minute to Waldo with a flow of 12,000 gallons per minute.

"Florida has undergone geological convulsions during the ages of her creation as many parts of the land-areas of the world have, but was formed by gentle rise and fall of the land from the sea-bottom; sedimentary deposits made while under the waves and the washing action of the tides while above the ocean."



Maniac Wounds 2, Murders Father, Bruises Mother

Former Patient Of Insane Asylum On New York Rampage

TROY, N. Y., Mar. 31.—(UPI)—An investigation into the slaying of an aged man was climaxized today by a gun battle in which two State troopers were wounded and John Ireland, 40, was arrested and charged with first degree murder.

Six State troopers were called to the home of the victim, Edward H. Ireland, 75, after the Rev. Michael J. Dwyer, Catholic priest, heard shots as he was saying mass in a nearby church.

Inspector Edward O. Hageman of the State police who preferred the charge of first degree murder, said John Ireland, former patient at Hudson River State Hospital, had shot his father, thrown his mother down stairs and wounded two troopers at the Ireland home at Latham, a suburb.

The wounded troopers, P. J. Fitzpatrick and C. J. Konior, who went to investigate, were taken to a Troy Hospital, where they reported. Fitzpatrick received 75 shots in the shoulder and one of Konior's eyeballs had been penetrated.

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Police said John Ireland had been twice committed to the insane hospital and was last released in December, 1934.

Washington Senators Play Here Tomorrow.

Play Lookouts At Three O'clock At Local Park

Clark Griffith's Protégés Seek Eighth Win In Eleven Starts In Grapefruit League Exhibition Games

Clark Griffith's Washington Senators of the American League come to Sanford tomorrow for an exhibition game with the Chattanooga Lookouts as the Nats make their return to the Grapefruit League, playing the Lookouts in a contest which is scheduled to get under way at the local ball park promptly at three o'clock.

The Senators will be decided favorites to win, having copied seven victories, lost two and tied one during their spring training season. The Lookouts, on the other hand, after losing 4 to 3 to the Rochester Red Wings of the International League, defeated the Sanford club, 10-0 and won 6 to 5 over the Yankees team of the St. Louis Cardinals here Sunday following which they trounced the House of David outfit, 15 to 6, on Monday.

In all probability the visitors' batting order will be lined up with Chapman in centerfield, Lawlor at third base, Kubel at first base, Sington in right field, Stone in left field, Travis at shortstop, Meyer at second base, and Hogan or Cronin catching.

Clyde Milan, pilot of the Chattanooga team, intends to use the same batting order that swamped the House of David team so decisively. In all likelihood, McFarland will be in centerfield, Benmiller at shortstop, Miles in right field, Waddell at first base, Estrella in left field, Bloodworth at second base, Honeycutt in third base and Early catching.

Neither manager has as yet selected his starting hurlers although Hayes is expected to bear the brunt of the mound work for the Lookouts.

Both teams, together with the officials of the two clubs and visiting sports writers, will be the guests of the Chamber of Commerce at a dinner following the contest.
