SYRACUSE, N. Y. (UPI) - Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, in what was viewed as a major policy speech, warned Monday night against the "everselling" of the recently negotiated limited nuclear test ban treaty. The one-time presidential hopeful, who denied any aspirations for the 1964 nomination, also urged Republicans to unify their liberal and conservative factions because he said the party "can't afford a terrible bloodletting."

These colleges range from a rural town in New York to a sparsely populated county in Upper Michigan to the metropolitan centers of St. Louis and Cleveland.

A new school is opening its doors in the resort area of the Virgin Islands. Appropriately, one of its courses is in hotel management.

All told, some 20 new public-supported junior colleges are starting their first terms this fall. Each will enroll from 150 to 2,000 full-time stu-


