

Four In Cabinet May Run Again

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Florida's top brass got together here Monday for a Kiwanis club forum and pushed a variety of state-backed programs.

Gov. Farris Bryant and all but two of his Cabinet members took part in the open forum before a meeting of state Kiwanis club members.

Four of the state's six Cabinet members—School Chief Thomas Bailey, Secretary of State Tom Adams, Treasurer J. Edwin Larson and Atty. Gen. Richard Ervin — gave firm indications they will seek re-election in 1969.

Only Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner and Comptroller Ray E. Green were not present.

The forum covered a wide variety of subjects.

Come Take Look Mme. Nhu Urges

ROME (UPI) — Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu, preparing for her trip to the United States, again has invited top American officials to see for themselves what is going on in South Viet Nam.

"The more senior officials come to Viet Nam to see the situation, the better it is," she told a news conference Monday night. "They are more responsible than the people who are sabotaging our officials."

She was referring to the on-the-spot assessment to be made by U. S. Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, chairman of the U. S. Chiefs of Staff. President Kennedy has ordered both men into South Viet Nam to find out if the government's religious-political dispute with the country's Buddhists is affecting its battle against the Communists.

Nixon Warns Of Red Push

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (UPI) — Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon, in what was viewed as a major policy speech, warned Monday night against the "overselling" of the recently negotiated limited nuclear test ban treaty.

The one-time presidential hopeful, who denied any aspirations for the 1964 nomination, also urged Republicans to ally their liberal and conservative factions because he said the party "can't afford a terrible bloodletting."

Nixon predicted the test ban treaty would be "overwhelmingly approved" by the approval will be marked by a stepped-up Soviet offensive to extend Communism without war in the free world.

Marion County Police Accused

OCALA (UPI) — A Negro integration leader told the State Civil Rights Advisory Committee here Monday that the sheriff's department "perhaps works hand-in-hand with the Ku Klux Klan."

The Rev. Frank Pinkston, advisor of the NAACP youth council in this racially-troubled city, also charged that the department knew who fired a shotgun blast into the home of a Negro leader but would not make arrests "because big names are involved."

Japanese Eat 'National Asset'

ODAWARA, Japan (UPI) — Two young laborers were on trial today for "destruction of a national asset," and faced a possible one-year jail term for eating a prize swan from a lake in Hakone National Park.

Nobuyoshi Otsuka, 21, and Tomokazu Watanabe, 20, said they barbecued the swan after strangling it because they were hungry.

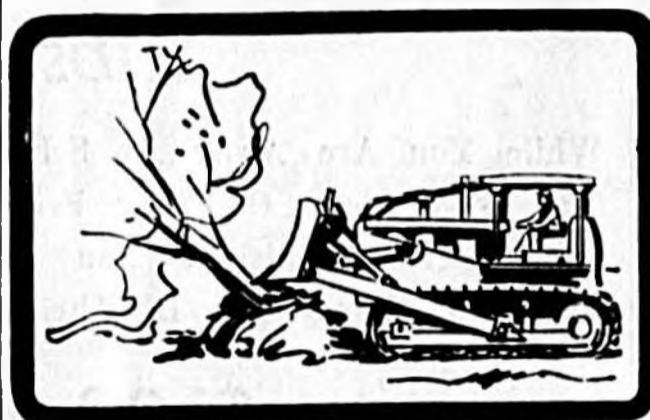

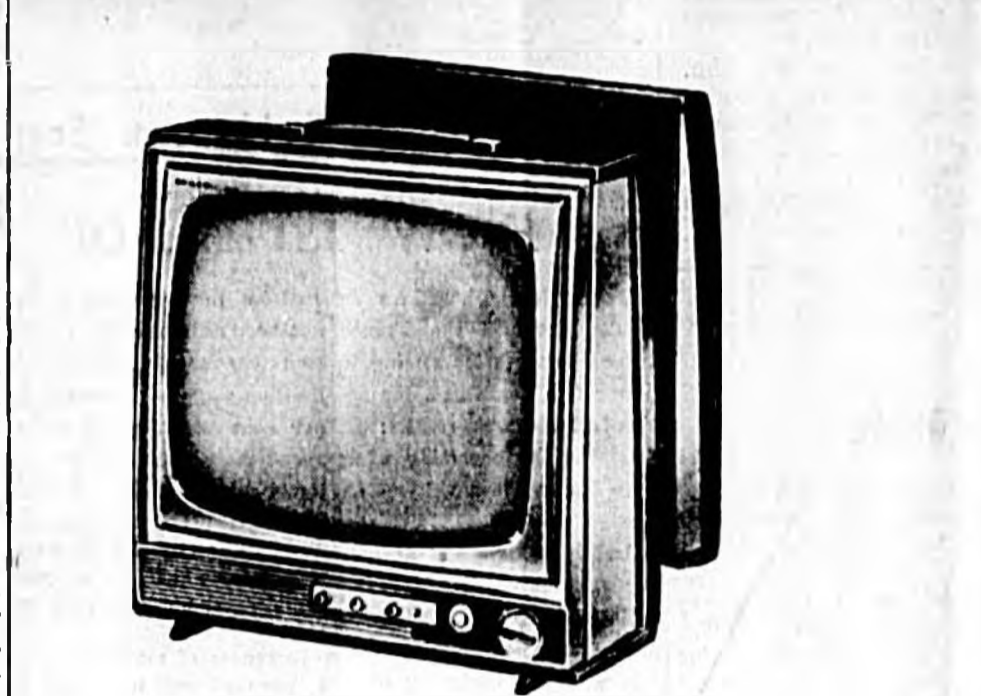
But the House is acting on taxes today, while one of its judiciary subcommittees still is struggling to give first-step approval to the civil rights measure.

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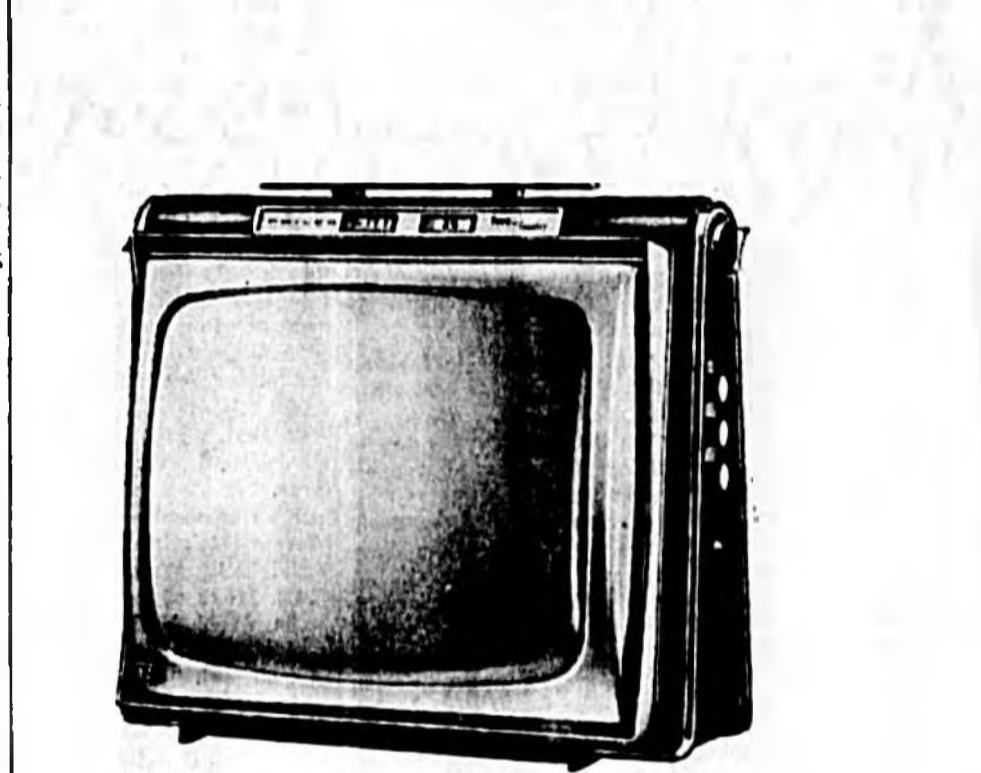
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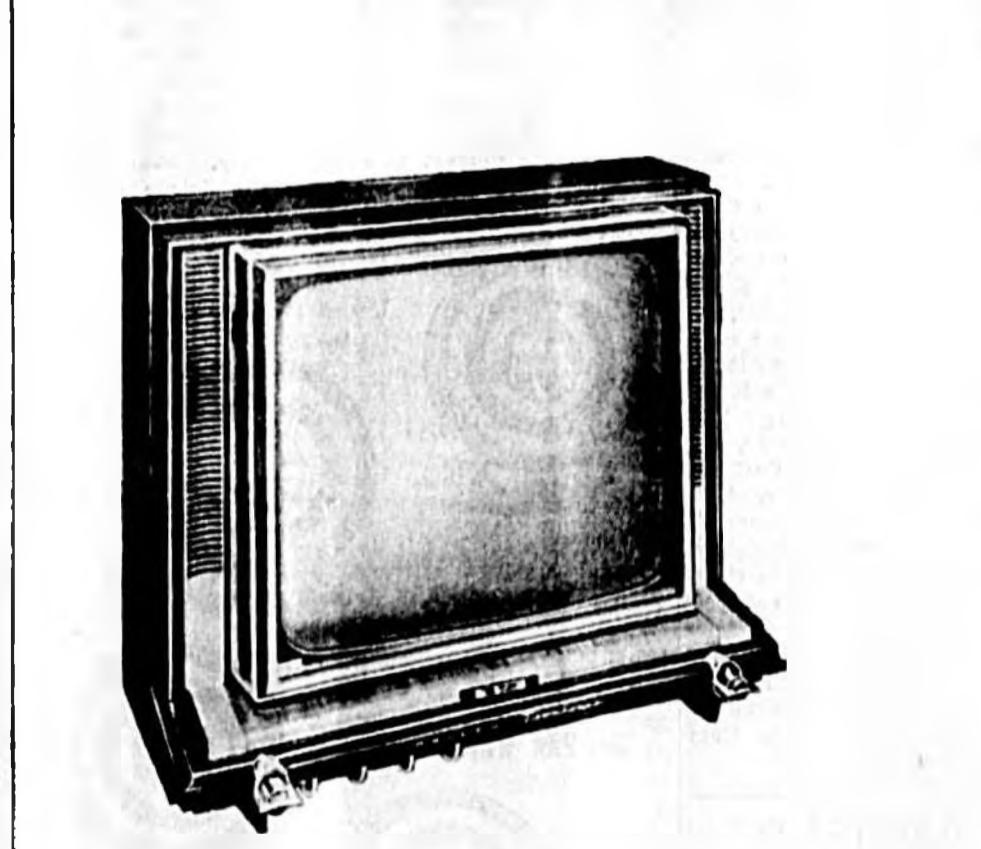
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Home Nursing Group Names K. McIntosh

Officers and members of the advisory council of the new Home Nursing Association were elected and appointed Wednesday with City Judge Kenneth W. McIntosh named to serve as first president of the fledgling organization, which will begin operation Oct. 1.

Official name of the group is the Seminole County Public Health Nursing Association, Inc., and incorporation papers were read approved and signed by 10 charter subscribers. They included Mrs. J. T. Russell, Mrs. C. C. Tomlin, Judge Vernon Mize, Dr. Eli White, Mrs. Ethel Peurifoy, Harold Rowland, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Kerce, Mrs. E. P. Richards, of Longwood, and Joseph Laird, of Casselberry.

Purpose of the newly formed organization is to provide standards of service in the home for convalescent, chronically ill and patients who need home care.

This specialized county-wide service was given impetus in Florida by Miss Ruth Mettlinger, director of the division of Public Health Nursing, who organized Florida's first visiting nurse association. Miss Mettlinger is the aunt of Dr. John Morgan, of Sanford, and member of a well-known pioneer family here.

Under the plan, public health nurses will go into the home to teach prevention and cure of diseases, teach care of patients, give hypodermic injections and special maternity and newborn care, help with rehabilitation of patients, serving in all cases when home care is possible in lieu of hospitalization.

The nurses will be on call daily from 8:15 a. m. to 4 p. m. Monday through Friday and on weekends in emergencies.

A fee of \$3.50 per visit will be charged and a fee of \$2 for an injection.

Nursing supervisor will be Mrs. Grace Fisher, RN.

Other officers and committee members of the advisory council include, Mrs. J. T. Russell as treasurer and Mrs. Lillian Richards, of Longwood, as vice president.

Dr. Eli White was named to the medical advisory committee with McIntosh, Judge Mize and Rowland selected for the by-laws committee.

Clyde Kerce of Casselberry, and E. P. Richards, Longwood were named to the ways and means committee and Mrs. Tomlin to the sunshine committee, which will arrange for social visits to shut-ins.

Mrs. Dorothy Austin was named to head a loan closet committee and any items which can be used in sick rooms for ill or bedridden patients are now being solicited.

Such items include crutches, wheel chairs, special beds, toilet utensils and equipment and other home nursing care items. Mrs. Austin can be contacted at the office of the Seminole-Delaware Heart Association, 116 1/2 N. Park Avenue, or by telephone under the listing of Heart Association of Seminole-Delaware.

Briefs on the services of the Home Nursing Association have been sent to all physicians in the county, Dr. Levine said.

Wheat Belt OKs Sale Of Surplus Grain To Russia

The wheat belt gave guarded approval today to suggestions the United States sell surplus grain to Russia.

"It doesn't make a lot of difference whom we sell wheat to...," summed up one grain terminal official simply.

"We have plenty and apparently the Russians are short," rancher J. Tupp Hamilton, Wiley, S. D., said.

"Sometimes we have to put aside our hostilities and help those who are less well off."

Both Republicans and Democrats tried — but were largely faulted for their farm programs. And yards of huge government granaries continue to dot the countryside throughout the Middle West.

On the other hand, it has been reported the Russians have been having serious agricultural problems of the opposite kind. Production is low

and food prices are sky high. A fortnight ago Soviet negotiators signed a \$500 million Canadian wheat deal.

Against this background, it was learned four private grain traders are in Ottawa, Canada, trying to lay the groundwork for a large United States-Russia wheat deal.

At the same time, President Kennedy winged his way on a cross-country trip along the rim of the wheat country, and it was learned he had discussed the possibility of grain sales to Russia.

JFK Attacks Eisenhower Power Policy

GREAT FALLS, Mont. (UPI) — President Kennedy today attacked the electric power policies of the Eisenhower administration.

The budding Democratic Chief Executive seemed to show new zest in his contacts with western voters.

Until today, Kennedy's criticism of the Republicans had been somewhat muted. He devoted himself largely to praise for Democrats and what they had done to preserve and advance conservation and reclamation, and protect natural resources, particularly in the upper Plains States.

His speech prepared for delivery here today took a different and stronger tack, however, Kennedy was specific in his criticism of Eisenhower administration power policies and practices. At one point he referred to "blunders" of the years immediately preceding his election to the White House. And he spoke of exploitation by private interests permitted by another administration.

Military Funds Likely For Congo

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Department said it is optimistic over chances of working out a solution that will keep funds available for a peacekeeping military force in the Congo.

The present funds will run out Dec. 31, but a State Department spokesman said a financing proposal for the Congo is expected to come before a UN committee in the near future.

Kennedy Wins Major Victory As House Approves Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Propelled by a 211-155 House vote, the biggest tax cut in history reached the Senate today with President Kennedy pressing for final enactment before Christmas.

The Senators may balk at Kennedy's timetable. But most lawmakers figured it was a safe bet that some version of the \$11 billion tax-cutting bill would become law by early spring, if not sooner.

The bill passed the House Wednesday night over strong Republican opposition. Asserting that the nation can not have both tax relief and higher federal spending, most Republicans voted against final passage after the House defeated a GOP attempt to attach budgetary strings to the tax cut.

House approval was a major victory for the President and Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon. Kennedy said in Billings, Mont., that the

action was a step toward saving the nation from limping from recession to recession.

Dillon said in a statement here that the measure would help encourage the growth of the free enterprise system.

The House bill would parcel out tax relief to virtually every taxpayer—individual or corporation. The relief would start in January, with two-thirds effective on 1964 incomes. When fully effective in 1965, the tax cuts would average 16.8 per cent for the nation's 50 million individual taxpayers.

The next step in the legislative process is up to the Senate finance committee. Chairman Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) takes a dim view of cutting taxes at a time when the Treasury is running a deficit estimated at \$9 billion a year. Starting late next week,

Byrd's committee will hold closed sessions to get briefed by Treasury and congressional staff tax experts on the provisions of the 310-page House bill. Then the committee will start public hearings which are certain to extend well into November.

1/2 cup Crisco
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1/4 cup sifted enriched flour

1 cup chopped nuts
1 tsp. vanilla
1 1/2 squares (1 oz. each) unsweetened chocolate, melted

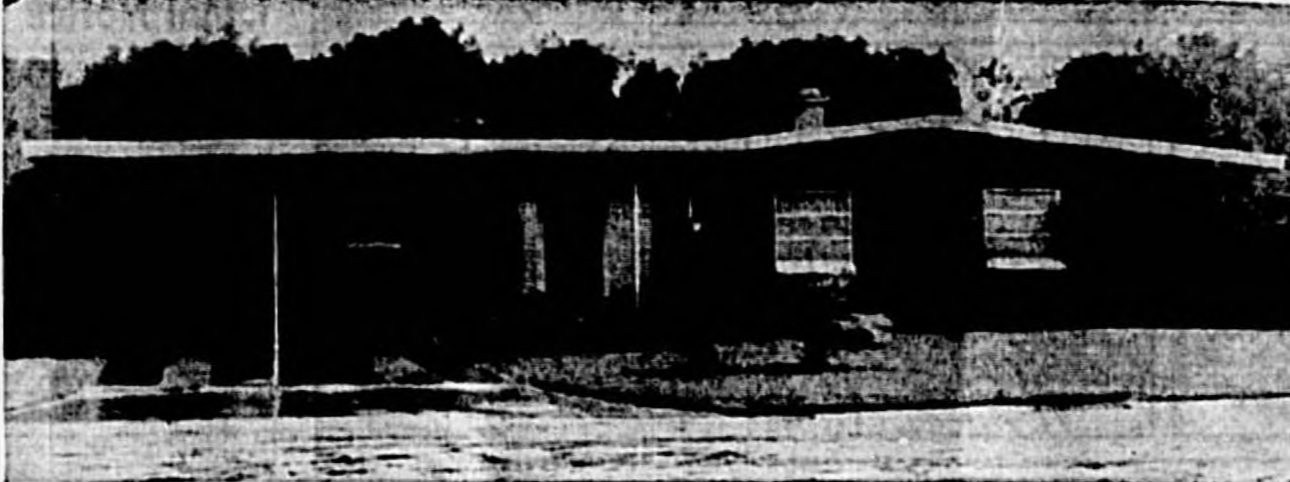

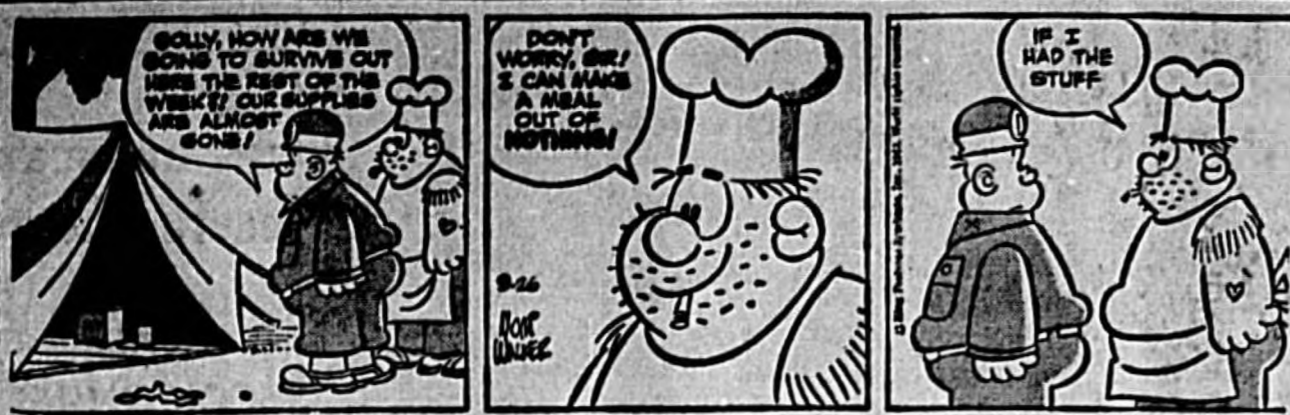

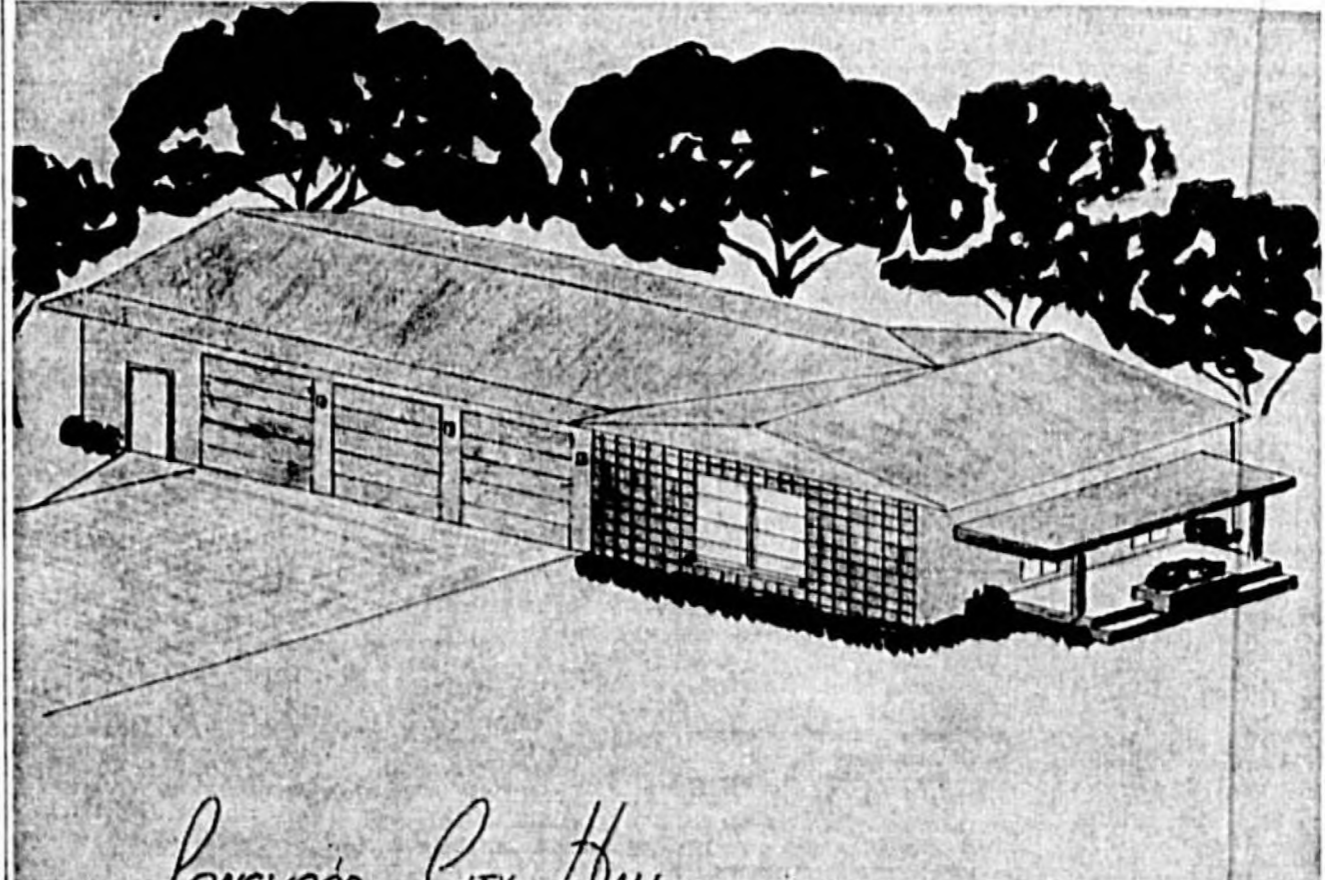

Edith Now No Threat To Us, Bureau Says

SAN JUAN, P. R. (UPI)—Hurricane Edith moved into the Atlantic north of Hispaniola today and weathermen said it would bypass Florida, Cuba and the Western Bahamas.

The tempest lost some of its power in crossing over the eastern tip of the Dominican Republic last night, with 100 mile an hour winds dropping to 75 mph. But forecasters said it would build up intensity again over the open ocean.

Hurricane hunter planes found Edith's center at 11 a. m. (EST) about 210 miles west-northwest of San Juan, near latitude 19.3 north, longitude 69.6 west. It was moving toward the west-northwest at about 10 mph, a direction and speed it was expected to maintain throughout the day.

With passage of the storm from the Caribbean after its sudden and unexpected turn late Thursday, the threat of high seas and flooding rains in southern Puerto Rico diminished. But heavy seas continued to roll against the Dominican Republic where gale warnings continued to fly this afternoon.

All hurricane warnings came down.

In a midday summary of conditions, the Miami Weather Bureau said "Cuba, Florida and the Western Bahamas appear out of range from Edith, but small craft in the Bahamas should not venture east of Mayaguayan."

Sen. Kelly Stresses Ability To Say 'No'

"The importance of being able to say 'no' and defending yourself when it comes to bigger and bigger government spending problems was emphasized by State Senator Scott Kelly, of Lakeland, gubernatorial hopeful, speaking to members of the Sanford Shrine Club and guests Thursday.

"We must have men and women prepared to say 'no' and then to be able to defend their answer in regards to deficit financing and increasing centralization of government," said the man who was elected to the Florida Senate at the age of 28.

"Proposed legislation" under the guise of civil rights will take everyone's rights away and is a fast in the door toward the fateful day when we all lose the right to own and control property," Senator Kelly charged.

"Let your legislators know how you feel before these bills are passed for it is doubly difficult to repeal a law after it is once approved," he warned.

"Government should be approached in a business-like manner, with the confidence of the people and operating within a reasonable budget like any good business must do," Senator Kelly remarked.

He said that the best government is city government because it is closest to the people, with county, state and federal government consecutively getting farther and farther away from the needs and wishes of the people and farther and farther out of their control.

"The greatest return on your tax dollar is from your city government, with the federal government giving the least return," Senator Kelly pointed out.

The gubernatorial candidate spoke at a meeting of area Shriners here. He also is a Shriner, member of the Lions Club, AMVETS, Woodmen of the World, Moose Club and Boy Scout Council.

The youthful senator was elected to the city commission of Lakeland at the age of 25, served as mayor at age 26 and was elected to the Florida Senate at 28 in 1954 and re-elected in 1959.

He was named one of Florida's "Five Outstanding Young Men" in 1957 and received the Florida Legislative Achievement Council Award in 1961 and the State Jaycee "Good Government Award."

In the Senate, Kelly serves on the Senate public roads and highways committee, chairman of the joint Senate and House interim committee, which investigated irregularities in the State Road Department and has been one of the leaders in the fight for constitutional revision and reapportionment.

He is chairman of the citrus committee and also serves on committees on agriculture, oil and natural resources, banking, cities and towns, education, insurance, public health, roads and highways.

Valachi Says He Got 'Kiss Of Death'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Gangland turncoat Joseph Valachi told Senate investigators today that underworld overlord Vito Genovese gave him the Mafia's "kiss of death" by kissing him on the hand while they were cellmates in the Atlanta federal prison.

The stocky, red haired ex-mobster described Genovese as the "under the table" super-boss of organized crime. He also testified that Genovese ordered the murder of sub-boss Tony Bender (Anthony Strollo) from his Atlanta prison cell.

Testifying publicly for the first time, Valachi told the details of hearing that Genovese described news reports of Bender's disappearance as "the best thing that could happen—he wouldn't be able to take it like you and I."

Valachi recounted the episode after testifying that he joined the disciplined "Cosa Nostra" crime cartel—"our thing, our family in English"—in 1932, born in New York to Italian immigrant parents, he said he took to crime after dropping out of school at age 15 and working for about a year on a sand scow.

2 Saved; Wife Of 1 Dies On Raft

TAMPA (UPI)—Two fishermen recuperated in a hospital here today—one with tragic memories of their ordeal at sea in which his wife died on their makeshift raft.

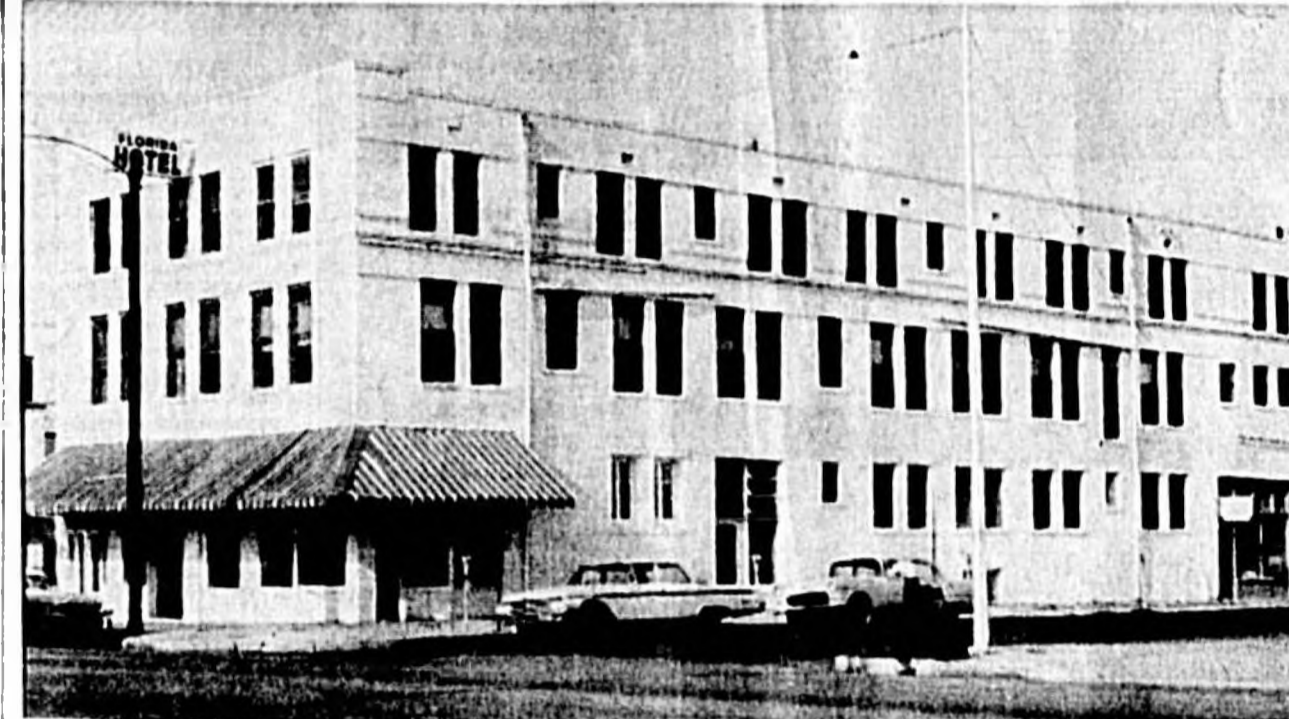
"Then she started down the aisles and people started running and screaming. We were crowded."

First Phase Scheduled

A near half-million-dollar land transfer and building construction program was announced today by President Howard H. Hodges of Sanford Atlantic National Bank.

Purchase of the Florida Hotel building as a site for Sanford Atlantic's expansion was announced by Hodges.

The three-story hotel building, fronting 40 feet on Park Avenue and 114 feet on Second Street, was purchased from R. C. Boyce, Greensboro, N. C., for \$55,000.

Hodges stated that in about three months the hotel building will be razed and the site will be converted into a parking lot for bank customers.

Ultimate use of the site, he added, will be for a new bank building, with the present bank facilities at First and Park to be completely remodeled and renovated and made an integral part of the new building.

Queriad as to the cost of the proposed bank structure, Hodges said he "could only hazard a guess at this time—\$100,000 for the new building and remodeling of our present building. The land deal for the hotel is a separate figure."

The bank president said that "now we only have general ideas for our new building. Our architects and engineers will study other new banking facilities, especially in Florida, for new thoughts."

"The general trend now in new bank structures is to provide drive-in teller windows and parking facilities on the ground floor, with regular banking facilities on the second floor and general operating departments on the third floor."

He explained that the two structures will be connected with overhead pathways, or bridges, over the present drive-in and parking lot. He emphasized both buildings will be integrated into one general banking facility to care for their expanded business.

Questioned of the trend to move to outlying shopping centers, Hodges stated: "We made a complete and thorough study of the situation and decided the future of Sanford and Seminole County is right in downtown Sanford."

He held that "contrary to some thought about downtown Sanford's future being on the downgrade, we are convinced in just the opposite direction. As bankers, we are aware of plans and negotiations now under way for the downtown and nearby parts of the city, along with knowledge of planned expansion in the county."

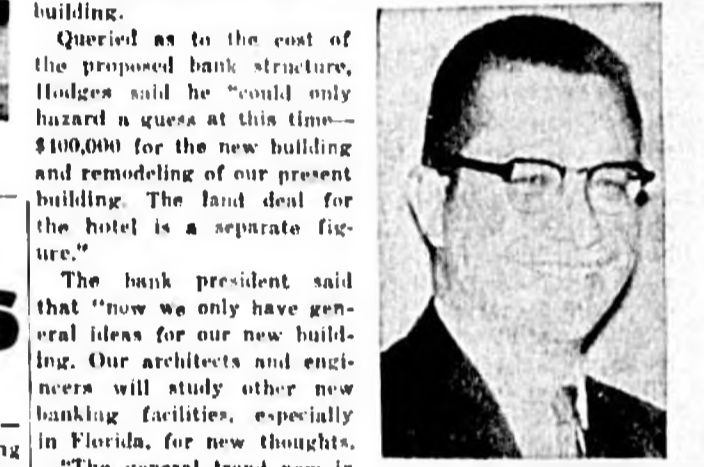
