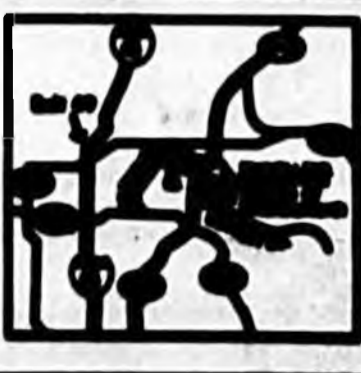

Officials: Grieshaber's exit under discussion

SANFORD — City officials confirmed that negotiations are underway regarding the resignation of Sanford City Manager Al Grieshaber.

District 3 Commissioner Randy Jones said Tuesday that the city attorney's office had contacted him regarding Grieshaber.

"They're just starting negotia-

tions," Jones said in a phone interview.

City Commissioner for District 4 Kevin Hipes said Monday that he did not feel comfortable commenting on what, if any, negotiations were being made, but did say that the city of Sanford needs a unified commission.

"I like Al," Hipes said, "but obviously there are some members of the Commission who may feel differently."

In January, the city Commission voted 3-2 not to renew Grieshaber's contract, which expires Aug. 4, 2005.

Commissioners Hipes and Art Woodruff voted against not renewing the contract, while former Mayor Brady Lessard, and Commissioners Jones and Velma Williams were the three votes swaying the decision to not renew.

The terms of Grieshaber's contract required the Commission to give him

six months notice prior to Aug. 4, 2005, if it planned not to renew his contract.

Newly elected Mayor Linda Kuhn said Tuesday that she was disappointed this issue had become a part of the election campaign. In an earlier interview with *The Herald*, Kuhn said she would not be inclined to retain Grieshaber, citing the city

Historic street officially reopens

SANFORD — As music blared from every corner of downtown Sanford and nationally known artists showed off award-winning paintings, thousands joined the celebration Saturday of the First Street Streetscape project, dubbed "We're Jazzed in Sanford."

The grand reopening dedication of historic First Street attracted more than 8,000 people strolling in and out of downtown shops and restaurants.

They viewed art featuring six of the original Highwaymen in the day-long street party. Many drifted a couple blocks east to the Hopper Jubilee Festival at Fort Mellon Park, while others stayed and enjoyed the Legends of Rock 'n Roll concert at Helen Stairs Theatre

Woodruff: New ideas merit full debate

SANFORD — Art Woodruff, newly re-elected District 1 City Commissioner is catching his breath after what he said was an exhausting race.

"We expected it to go to a run-off. I just didn't realize how long three weeks actually was," Woodruff said in an interview Monday.

Woodruff won the city of Sanford run-off election to retain his commission seat by 69 votes against Bernard Mitchell.

"Obviously, I'm glad we won," Woodruff said. "We worked really hard. Bernard did, too."

Now that the election is over, Woodruff said the City Commission should focus on seeking opinions and views from the community before making decisions.

"I hope the Commission will be better about talking things out and discussing things earlier," Woodruff said.

Woodruff, who said he likes to bounce ideas around before any decisions are made, believes that if someone has an idea, the Commission can build on that idea whether good or bad by discussing it before it pops up on an agenda.

"The city overall would do well if [we] discussed proposals ahead of time regardless of whose [proposal] it is," Woodruff said.

In regards to bouncing ideas around the City Commission, Woodruff would also like to do the same with community input. The Commissioner said he noticed, both on his first four years and on the campaign trail, an unclear mandate to go forward with any single item.

"People want to feel like they've been a part of

HUD fulfills promises, renovates housing

SANFORD — The assistant secretary for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development called changes at the Sanford Housing Authority "truly a remarkable turnaround."

"When we came in in 2003, 93 of the 480 units controlled by the Sanford Housing Authority were uninhabitable," said Michael Liu of HUD. Those conditions triggered the federal government to take over the housing authority. In the end, there were 160 units renovated, roofs replaced, paint applied and reinforced doors installed on apartments.

"Well, the work is done," Liu said. "The work is done."

He said a new chapter is about to begin for Sanford Housing Authority residents.

Eventually, HUD intends to hand the project back to a locally appointed board that the federal government oversees. Liu said that would take place within a "reasonable" time period.

With a \$3.3 million loan from Wachovia Bank, HUD has made the improvements by using local resources and basic financial know-how, Liu told officials and advocates Tuesday morning.

Liu said the Sanford project compared well with the other 3,400 housing authorities he oversees. It is smaller than many of the others.

"We've shown that with good management and the ability to think creatively, we

can take available resources and turn them into real benefits for people," Liu said in an interview.

When HUD took receivership of the housing authority, the apartments were very run down, he said.

"All we got from previous management were excuses," he said, adding that HUD doesn't like to take control of housing authorities.

Liu gave symbolic keys to Andrea Lee and Cherrie Jackson, two new residents of the housing authority.

"I think they did a nice job with the apartments," said Jackson, 22.

Long-time residents have heard promises of improvements over the years, but are

Overnight relay to fight cancer kicks off Friday

LAKE MARY — An overnight Relay for Life will help fight cancer in an annual event at Colonial Town Park.

The event begins at 6 p.m. Friday, April 8 with a survivor's lap and a caregiver's lap. Teams will then walk laps until 10 a.m. Saturday.

The Relay for Life of Lake Mary/Sanford will benefit the American Cancer Society.

According to activity and entertainment chairwoman Jennifer Finch, the relay will have several bands, including the Rock Lake Middle School Jazz Band. There are 28 relays in central Florida, but this is the best venue, she said.

"This is a community fighting for a community," Finch said. Sixteen teams from businesses, schools and other organizations will all do fundraising during the event. In addition to pledges for laps, the teams sell food or hold competitions such as dance contests.

Bands and entertainers will perform until 12:30 a.m., then a DJ will take over. A scavenger hunt is planned as well as a midnight makeover for men.

A Mr. Relay for Life where male participants will dress as women takes place at 2:30 a.m. A poker lap, hoola hoop contest and putting contest are also scheduled.

Basically there will be activities every half hours during the event, Finch said.

During all the activities, teams compete for spirit dollars. Progress Energy won last year's competition for which it received a plaque.

"The goal is to raise awareness of cancer and to raise money," Finch said. She said her mother died of lung cancer and her cousin died of breast cancer at 32. Almost everyone knows someone who has battled cancer, she said.

The goal this year is to raise \$155,000, which would be about \$11,000 more than last year's total.

Patients need transportation to treatment

SANFORD — The local chapter of the American Cancer Society is looking for volunteer drivers to transport patients to radiation and chemotherapy sessions.

The program is called The Road to Recovery. The society transports people free of charge, and has an urgent need for drivers, according to Jennifer Finch, who coordinates the program.

"The worst thing in the world is having to tell a cancer patient that no one can drive them to treatment," she said.

These are people who have no other way to get to treatment.

"If they don't go, they may not survive," Finch said. Some people are low-income who don't have transportation, others simply don't have a way to get to the treatment center.

One man has the inability to be in the sun, so he can't walk and he is blind in one eye and can't drive. His wife works weekdays. So he is driven by volunteers.

Treatment for cancer may last six or eight weeks, but it is an everyday thing on weekdays. They may have to be there everyday at 10 a.m. and skipping a dose is not an option.

Volunteers should be over 18 years old and have a driver's license.

"Typically, our drivers are either self-employed, unemployed, or retired," Finch said. Normally patients have to go to treatment around 9 a.m. and return about 3 p.m. Once in a while the person may have to stay later. Those are people undergoing chemotherapy.

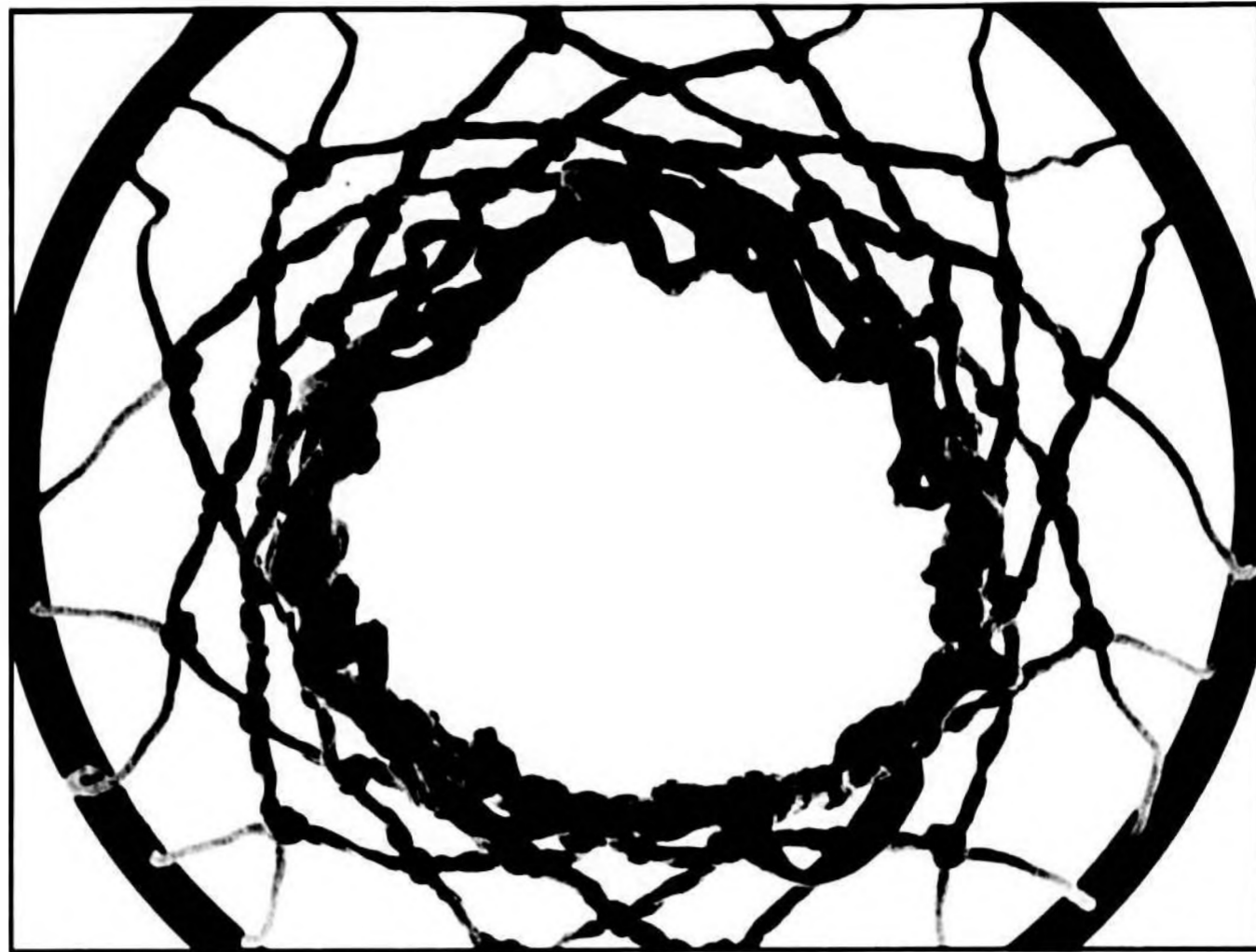
If the treatment is radiation, they usually go for a round trip because the treatment can be finished in as little as 15 minutes. With chemotherapy, one person drives in the morning and another person normally picks up.

"Chemo can be as short as an hour and as long as eight," Finch said. Some volunteers drive every day, others as little as twice per month.

"What I always tell volunteers is they can drive as little or as often as they want," Finch said. "We can accommodate their schedule." There is no volunteer driving on weekends, she added.

starting to believe the latest ones from HUD.

"They're getting off to a good start," said Oscar Redden Jr., of Brothers Keepers, who remembered playing in the housing authority neighborhood as a child. "If I'm at a standstill, it's easier to go forward than if I'm falling backward."

Liu said the approach of HUD and President Bush's administration is to not over promise and under perform.

"That is how we will gain support of the residents," he said. "I think that's what's happened here. Anything we promise, we have to make sure we can deliver."

Sanford Vice Mayor Velma Williams is the city Commission's liaison to the housing authority board. She read a proclamation commending the changes at the authority called, "Rebuilding

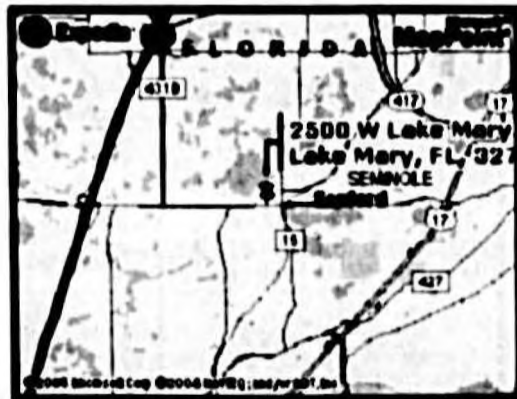

Florida Blood Centers need to replenish supply

In an effort to immediately replenish dwindling blood supplies following the Easter holiday weekend, Florida's Blood Centers have issued a "Community Alert" for all eligible volunteer blood donors of every blood type.

"An alert of this nature means that blood inventories have fallen well below our comfort zone," said Tim Toothman, spokesperson for Florida's Blood Centers. "Reserve inventories (normally a 3- to 5-day supply) have fallen to levels not seen since the Christmas holidays. Add to that the recent Easter holiday weekend and unprecedented usage at hospitals throughout the region, and it's easy to understand that an immediate response (in the

form of blood donors) is needed from the community to avert any potential shortages that could occur of blood supplies are not immediately replenished."

"Traditionally, law enforcement agencies, fire fighters and other first responders step forward and lead by example," he continued. "Florida's Blood Centers recognize this and once again are calling on these community heroes to set the pace and help prevent blood shortages. Simply put, without blood donors, hospitals can't operate. We must make every effort to immediately replenish our inventories. Those who are eligible are needed today."

To donate blood, a person must be in good health, weigh

a minimum of 110 pounds and be 17 years of age or older. There is no upper age limits for donors meeting other eligibility requirements. As a benefit to the donor, a mini health check, which includes evaluations of blood pressure, iron level and cholesterol, is performed to help the donor maintain his or her good health. The entire procedure, from completing a short medical history to drawing blood and resting afterward with refreshments, takes approximately 30 to 45 minutes.

State targets local telemarketer

SANFORD - Florida Agriculture and Consumer Services Commissioner Charles H. Bronson has announced he has taken legal action against a Seminole County telemarketer for violating Florida's "Do Not Call" law.

A lawsuit filed in Seminole County Circuit Court alleges that Florida Solar Distributors made at least 12 telephone calls to residents on the list during the past year.

"Consumers who join our

program are entitled to be spared the intrusion of commercial telemarketing calls, and this company apparently has failed to get the message," Bronson said.

The legal action seeks an injunction prohibiting Florida Solar distributors from any future calls to state residents on the "Do Not Call" list and fines of up to \$10,000 for each of the 12 calls the company made to prohibited phone numbers.

Bronson's department has collected or obtained judg-

ments for more than \$1 million against companies that have called Florida residents on the list, and several such legal actions are pending in courts throughout the state.

near Magnolia Square. The celebration capped eight months of construction and beautification at a cost of \$2.1 million, directed by the city of Sanford and the Sanford Community Redevelopment Agency.

The streetscape project allowed the city to return to a historic brick street and addressed needed storm water, waterline and electrical upgrades; including extra lighting which will give the city ability to hold special events in the area.

"Our new brick street, beautiful landscaping and wider sidewalks create a more pedestrian friendly environment for everyone to enjoy our historic downtown," said City Manager Al Grieshaber Jr.

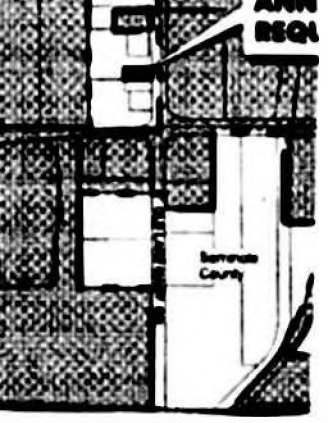
