Three Main Issues 'Hung Up' By Solons

TALLAHASSEE Fla. (AP) — The Florida Legislature cleared a huge load of bills Wednesday, but the three main issues of the session — appropriations, reorganization and judicial reform — were still hung up in conference committees.

Present law makes it a misdemeanor if a person has "one package or more" without a tax stamp. A Senate bill which would give counties all powers of self-government except those prohibited by law was amended by the House to give counties ordinance-making authority only.

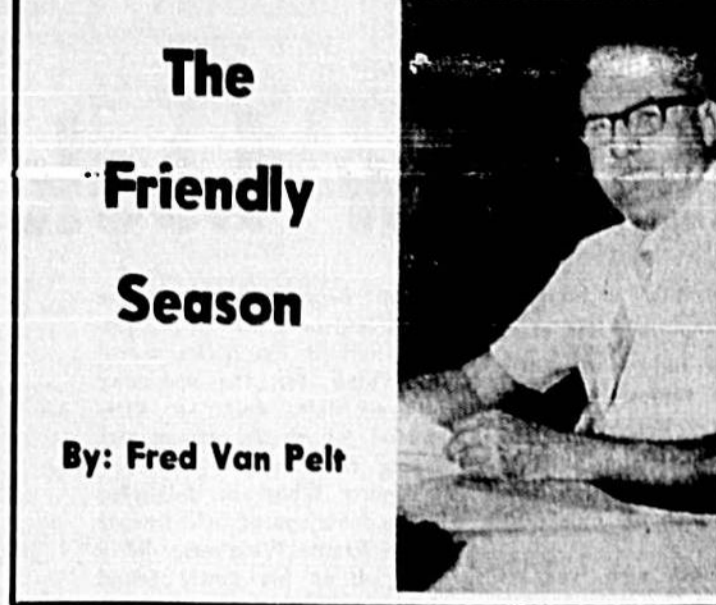

Appropriations For State Operations \$1 Billion Bill Studied By Solons

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A compromise \$1.02 billion appropriations bill — first of the bills to break out of conference committee — was sent to the full Legislature today.

The committee approved the take-it-or-leave-it money bill 10-0 late Thursday night. The huge appropriation covers operations of state government and capital outlay for kindergartens and schools.

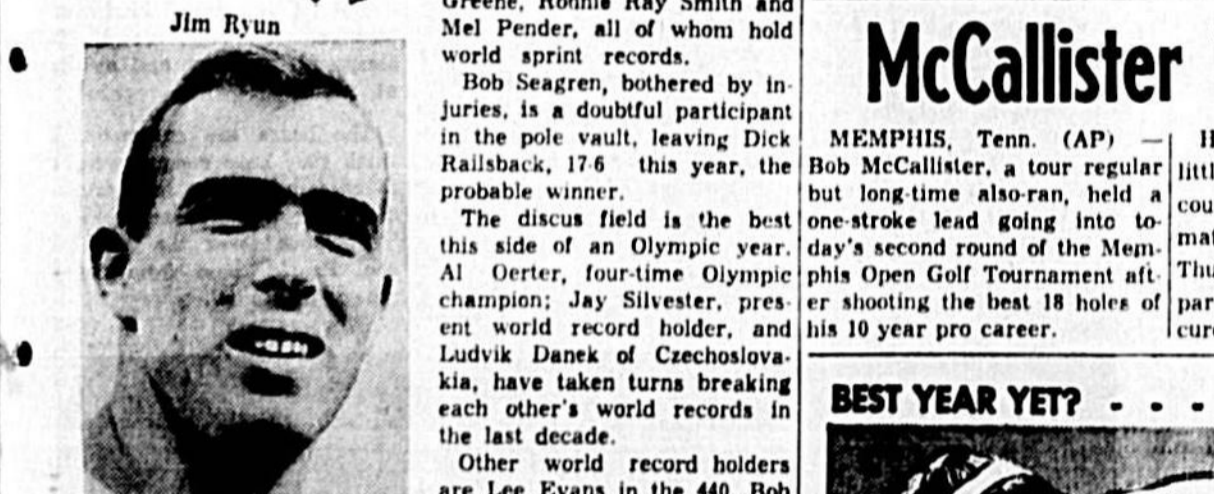

\$3.8 Million School Bonds Bid Opening Set June 12

Teague said today he had already had five inquiries about bonds and had forwarded them to Gundy for a prospectus.

A bid opening has been set for June 12 at which time the board may accept or reject the bids depending on the interest rate.

Teague said Gundy felt that market for short term bonds (under 20 years) had improved enough in the last few days to advertise for securities for sale.

County school construction bonds are 19 year certificates, and the sale of the remaining \$3.8 million completes the total issue.

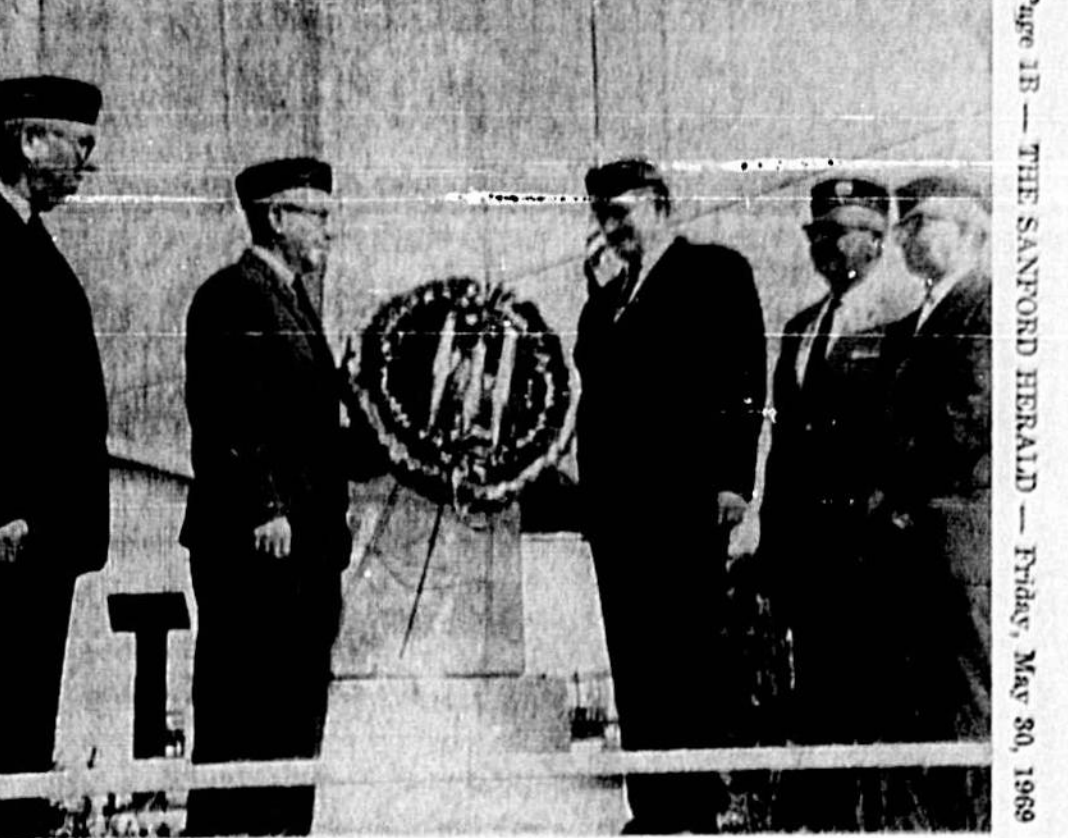

British Trainees Honored

ARCADIA, Fla. (AP) — People bowed their heads over granite tombstones today where fluttering Union Jacks mark the resting places of 23 young Royal Air Force flying cadets who died in crashes while training at Florida bases for combat against the might of Nazi Europe.

The cadets arrived in 1941 and soon became popular figures with the people of Arcadia. Their easy laughter and adventurous attitude made it all seem like a marvelous game until Cadet C. F. "Beano" Russell, an Irish boy, was killed in a crash July 22, 1941.

The people then realized that these boys in RAF blue were training in deadly earnest, and that they had come to Florida because here they would not find the skies filled with enemy planes against whom the unskilled flier would have no chance.

Beano Russell was the first to be buried in the 23 by 80-foot plot that today is "Forever England" to the townspeople.

Before the war ended, 22 of his comrades lay near him, all killed in training accidents before they could meet the enemy.

A local civic club makes sure that British flags waved along the side American banners each Memorial Day and cares for the plots.

Each May 30th, the people of Arcadia honor their own dead, then quietly offer prayers for the young foreigners who gave so much yet were unable to rest in the soil of their homelands.

On each headstone is the RAF emblem and an epitaph suggesting the fate of the parents of the cadet.
