'Strippers' Nude, Kids Goggle-Eyed, Parents Get Irate

TOKYO (UPI) — Irate parents complained today that a Tokyo grammar school auditorium was used last week to stage an election campaign strip tease show while 100 of their youngsters looked on goggle-eyed.

The strippers cavorted at the Tanaka Primary school last Wednesday night in a show that featured Dr. Ryutarō Aruma, Liberal-Democratic candidate for governor of Tokyo, as its main speaker.

The embarrassed Asuma said he left immediately after he gave his speech and had no idea strippers were a part of the show that followed. He said someone else planned the program and that he was simply invited to give a little speech.

The children were attracted by posters splashed on telephone poles promising "an erotic nude show" and "snake and dancing strippers."

The children apparently went to see the snakes but stayed to stare at the dancers. Admission was free.

Teachers said they knew nothing about the strip show until one boy stood up in his classroom and described what he had seen on the stage.

"I was a little embarrassed," he told his teacher, "but it was great fun."

U. S. Army Ends 'Rides For Cough'

FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI) — The U. S. Army has stopped flying German children to high altitudes in attempts to cure whooping cough.

An Army medical spokesman said Monday "there is no scientific basis for the belief that flying children up to altitudes of 15,000 to 20,000 feet will permanently cure them of whooping cough." Such flights may prolong the illness, the spokesman said.

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alarm gave the wrong address, costing further precious time. Quinn supported previous testimony that the fire was burning as much as 20 minutes before the first alarm was turned in. "There was definitely a time element involved," he said. "Definitely and positively there was a discrepancy in times—definitely a delayed alarm."

He said speed and accuracy in reporting a fire is vital because "you either win or lose a fire in the first few minutes." Quinn said the caller gave the address of Our Lady of the Angels rectory. The trucks drew up to the rectory, then had to go around the corner to the school building where children were suffocating in classrooms and jumping from second floor windows.

Quinn said there were "three persons inside the school building who knew of the fire, and did not give an alarm immediately."

Earlier testimony showed at least two school teachers smelled smoke but did not immediately ring the school fire bell to empty the building or turn in an alarm to the fire department.

Income Up, But So Is Cost Of Living

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Average family income rose 4 per cent in 1937, but so did the cost of living.

A Census Bureau study disclosed Monday that the income rise was less than in previous years, partly because of the heavy job layoffs during the recession in the latter part of the year.

About half the 44 million families covered in the bureau's survey had an income of \$5000 or more, the report said, compared to a 1936 median income of \$4,800.

Oswego Isn't 'Dreaming Of White...'

United Press International OSWEGO, N.Y. (UPI)—No one here here is dreaming of a white Christmas.

With nearly a season's worth of snow already on the ground all the melodic sentimentality in the world would have a hard time getting anyone to wish for any more. The 85-inches of snow began falling on Dec. 7.

For a while it brought normal life to a standstill in this northern New York community. And al-

though normalcy is slowly returning it will be a long time before any one will forget this particular December 7 and its aftermath.

The snow, piled into huge drifts by winds and packed into solid walls 15 feet high by plows, brought hardship and some danger to the 23,000 residents of this community at the southeastern head of Lake Ontario. But no real crisis developed.

Little Car Travel — Despite the tons of snow which fell between Sunday and Thursday, all but the sick or elderly managed to get in and out of their homes with little trouble. Food and supplies were available. It was just a little more difficult than usual to get them.

Until the end of the week, for example, there was virtually no passenger car travel. But anyone who wanted food could get it by trudging waist-deep through the snow to the city's main business area.

Tavern-Business Good — A tavernowner reported that at the height of the snow-surge, "business was twice as good as any warm summer day." He attributed his good fortune to the fact that his was one of the few establishments in the area which kept a path open from the street, where pedestrians found it easier going than on the walks to his door.

Although many industries were shuttered, along with all schools in the city, the snow provided work for many. Police and firemen were kept busy directing emergency service for 18 to 20 hours a day. And the regional unemployment office channeled jobless workers to snow shoveling chores at \$2 an hour.

It's hard to estimate the cost of the storm to the city. Mayor Vincent Correll Sunday night asked the Common Council for an extra \$20,000 to help handle the snow expenses.

East Gets Break, Citrus Endangered

United Press International A warming trend surging out of the plains today promised at least a temporary break in a record December cold wave gripping the East.

The warmer weather, boosting readings an average of 10 to 15 degrees in its path, was expected to reach into the East today, although it may arrive too late to prevent damage to northern Florida's citrus and vegetable crops. Overnight readings again plunged to near or below zero in the Great Lakes region and the Northeast, with below freezing weather ranging a southward through the Ohio Valley into the Gulf Coast states.

Student Ambushed By Angry Husband

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—An angry husband shot and killed a student in a physics laboratory at the University of California early today because he was "messing around with my wife."

The victim, Wolfgang Ludwig Marx, died of three wounds from a .22 automatic fired by John W. Hampton, 31, of Berkeley, according to a university spokesman. Hampton is a UC graduate.

The slaying took place early today in Leconte Hall, where the physics laboratory is located. Hampton told campus police that Marx, a German-born junior student, had been "running around" with his wife. Determined to seek vengeance, Hampton armed himself with the gun and started looking for Marx.

Marx hit twice in the heart and once in the head. He was dead before a doctor from the campus hospital arrived.

Hampton ran from the building. Janitors who heard the shots caught a glimpse of a man with a brown sports jacket, but were otherwise unable to identify him.

About three quarters of an hour later, campus police found Hampton in the building, searching for the pistol he had dropped.

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Youngsters Found Hurt And Helpless

AZUSA, Calif. (UPI)—Police said today two small boys, seriously injured in a traffic accident, lay helpless for 10 hours in a deep canyon beside the bodies of their mother and a male companion before they were rescued.

Police said a thick fog Saturday night prevented the wreckage from being spotted.

William Eugene Parks, 5, and his brother, Michael, 2, were found Sunday in the bottom of a rocky stream, 425-foot San Gabriel Canyon.

In the wreckage of the car were the bodies of Mrs. Sally Parks, 30, of nearby Pasadena, Calif., and her companion, Junius R. Fenlon, 35, of nearby Altadena, Calif.

William, who suffered a possible broken neck, was found huddled in the lifeless arms of Fenlon. Michael was thrown from the car and found on the canyon floor. He suffered a fractured skull.

Both boys were clad only in T-shirts and denim and suffered exposure.

Police said it appeared the accident occurred late Saturday night when the car failed to make a curve and plunged end-over-end down the canyon wall.

Snark Fired, Set For 'Round Trip'

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—An Air Force crew launched an intercontinental Snark missile early today to start a flight of about 3,000 miles down the Atlantic tracking range and back.

The Snark, the nation's only combat-ready ocean-hopping missile, was to return and land on its skills here harring any down-range mishaps. No announcement was expected on the return.

Although more than 60 Snarks have been fired, the air-breathing weapon is undergoing continued research and development tests.

Today's launching, however, was a training mission for some of the troops who would fire the Snark in anger if necessary.

Blasting off at about 5 a. m. into an overcast sky, the Snark dropped its two solid-fuel boosters with a familiar flash of flame. Then its powerful turbojet engine powered it on its way. The roundtrip, airplane-like flight was expected to take about nine hours.

The Snark is actually a pilotless bomber capable of carrying a hydrogen warhead in its nose cone. It is guided throughout its subsonic flight, while the Atlas ICBM is controlled only while its engines are burning.

TOKYO (UPI)—Mao Tse Tung has decided to give up the presidency of Red China to concentrate on his job as boss of the Communist Party, Peiping radio announced today.

Mao is faced with the mammoth job of marshaling China's millions into "people's communes," and Peiping said the party had decided to put on a drive in this direction between now and April.

Iraq Control Uncertain; Commies May Get Reins

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Government officials, anxiously scanning reports from the Middle East, said today that it is touch-and-go whether Iraq's beleaguered government will fall captive to the Communist forces which support it.

Officials were convinced that Communist elements in Baghdad planned the demonstrations against William M. Rountree, assistant secretary of state, on Monday. They were awaiting Rountree's first-hand report on the situation in the Middle East.

Coffee Club Plans To Consume Juice

Farewells will be said to Cdr. Joe Tully, just returned from the Mediterranean. Cdr. Tully leaves Sanford this month for duty in Washington. He is former commanding officer of VAIL-5, the "Orfee" Club members will meet at 10 a. m.

40 Persons Killed; Termed 'Mistake'

ARSAL, Lebanon (UPI)—Forty persons were killed last weekend in a major government-rebel clash caused by a simple misunderstanding.

Army infantry, armed cars and jet planes pounded the rebel stronghold in the Bekka Valley with mortars, rockets and shells in perhaps the bloodiest battle Lebanon has witnessed in the last eight months.

Village elders reported to persons were killed and more than 100 wounded in an eight-hour battle with army units which encircled the town on high ridges overlooking it.

Jet fighters made five runs on the village firing machineguns and rockets in addition to the human casualties, the road into the city was studied with dead sheep, cows and donkeys killed in the wild firing.

The tragedy occurred because of a misunderstanding which developed when rival villagers across the valley fired in the air at a funeral. Arab residents, thinking the fire was directed at them, opened up.

All Doors Locked; Shoppers Trapped

BOGOTA, Colombia (UPI)—A fire which started in a Christmas nativity scene roared through the Vida Department Store during the evening rush hour Tuesday, killing 98 Christmas shoppers—mostly women and children—and injuring 200 others.

Many of the injured were reported near death today. The pre-Christmas tragedy was compounded by a lack of rear doors at the department store, a lack of safety equipment and the manager's decision to lock the front doors at a precaution against looters—a move which trapped hundreds in the flaming building.

County Receives Plats On Property

Bob Brown, county zoning board director, submitted a pile of plats for approval yesterday before Seminole County Commissioners.

The board approved Brown's recommendation that property belonging to Charles Bloom near Wekiwa be zoned commercial to allow Bloom to build a hotel and restaurant adjacent to his golf course.

Submitted for consideration was an area in Lake Monroe, already occupied by the new post office. The former commercial area has been swallowed by the Interstate Highway.

A shopping center may be built near the Southwest road, Country Club Road area, subject to approval. Three commercial buildings have already been built in the section.

Further action included rezoning of Lake Mary for commercial use. Public hearings have been set for Jan. 20.

Six plats were approved for new subdivisions. O. P. Herndon, clerk of circuit court, suggested that commissioners require an abstract with each plat before consideration. Mack Cleveland Jr., board attorney was asked to investigate the costs of the abstracts before a decision is made.

Spike Spike Heels, Authorities Plead

WEST PALM BEACH (UPI)—Some city officials here want to spike those spike heels on women's shoes.

The reason: Too many women are falling on city sidewalks and filing big damage claims. City Attorney Egbert Beal said Tuesday that women file 98 per cent of the damage suits against the city for sidewalk falls.

"Mostly it's older women who wear these spike heels like 18-year-olds and go tripping down the sidewalk," he said.

He recommended that each city employ become a "sidewalk watchdog" to report any crack or defect in the sidewalk.

But Ben York, Recreation Director, suggested even more drastic action.

He urged the Florida League of Municipalities adopt a resolution against spike heels on the theory "if you buy 'em, you'll break your neck."

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Young Democrats National convention will be held at Miami Beach next April.

Neilson Lacione, president of the Young Democrats Clubs of America, said principal items on the agenda for the April 17-19 conference include organizing a college political program, reviewing the work of the group's new women's division, and planning for the 1960 presidential convention.

Lacione said Florida was chosen for the meeting because of the "vigorous party organization work now being done there under the guidance of Gov. LeRoy Collins."

Congress To Snub Arkansas Winner

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Authorities source said today the special House Elections Committee would recommend that segregationist Dale Alford not be seated pending a thorough investigation of his writ in victory over Rep. Brooks Hays (D-Ark.).

They made the prediction at the committee in a surprise move met with Hays behind closed doors and then called a public session to hear his statement on the controversy.

One member said the committee probably would wind up action late today on the complaint of election irregularities filed against Alford by a Little Rock publisher.

Hays, in a brief appearance before the committee, commended its inquiry but reiterated his decision not to contest the election.

But Hays did not appear to have closed the door against the possibility he might take the seat in event the House should rule that he was entitled to it.

Hays said he was already here at least tentatively excluded Alford from his ranks by falling to invite him to a party caucus Jan. 6. This paved the way for an almost certain showdown vote on whether to admit him at all to the majority party.

Hays said he was not prepared to testify on the irregularities alleged by Little Rock Publisher John Wells to have occurred in the Nov. 4 election.

Students To Swell Traffic On Roads

When university and college students from the 25 institutions of higher learning in Florida leave their classrooms Friday, Highway Patrolmen and Sheriff's Deputies will be doubly taxed.

An estimated 45,000 students will swell Christmas travel on Florida Highways, adding to the already increasing traffic problems of the approaching holiday season.

Arrests for traffic violations have swelled in Seminole County during the past two weeks, according to officials in police, sheriff and highway patrol departments. Excessive speed is charged against most of the drivers apprehended.

Florida is only a few weeks away from closing the books on another year of highway death and destruction. In the first 11 months of this year 98 died in traffic. At the present rate of death toll, the 1958 total will surpass last year's figure considerably.

Behrens Harvests First Celery Here

Herbert Behrens, one of the last few independent farmers in Seminole County, was first again with his celery harvest.

Farm workers on Behrens' 75 acres started cutting the celery last week, but were called in because of rain after only 80 crates had been harvested. Cutting is again under way in the fields of green celery.

The celery was planted the last three days in August. Behrens has harvested at least ten days ahead of other farms for many years, according to M. L. Cullum of Chase and Co.

Harvesting of the crop, which may run to 50 or 60,000 crates, will continue through January. The quality was described by Cullum as "beautiful." Behrens called it "nice looking so far."

The food will be given to the Salvation Army for distribution to needy families. Christmas dance hours are 7:30 to 10:30 p. m., under the direction of the Recreation Department.

Man Starved To Death, Had \$10,000 In Pocket

CUSHING, Okla. (UPI)—Neighbors filled in the details today of the 80-year-old recluse who wanted to be alone so badly he starved himself to death although he had more than \$10,000 in his pocket.

The body of George W. Williams was found Tuesday by a minister after the neighbors said they had not seen him for several days.

He was found lying under the bed in his home. There was no food in the house.

But a small bundle in his hip pocket, wrapped neatly in a worn cloth, contained four \$1,000 bills, 21 \$100 bills, 21 \$50 bills, 62 \$20's and a \$10 bill. More than \$100,000 was found in Williams' billfold in another pocket.

A coroner's inquest listed starvation as the official cause of death. Assistant Payne County Attorney Dennis Cabbage said Williams was probably under the bed "because he was scared of being robbed."

Two Wives, Dozen Kids; Engaged To 19; Real Lothario

BERLIN (UPI)—A lothario of heroic proportions has been sent to jail—leaving behind two wives, a dozen or more kiddies and the 19 young ladies he became engaged to in the last four years.

The case of 41-year-old Heinz Sommer was reported in the East German newspaper Die Union of Dresden.

Sommer was sentenced in three years and two months in jail for fraud, theft and embezzlement. In addition, the court ordered him to pay damages.

The paper said Sommer promised to marry 19 women between 1934 and 1939—and ten of them bore him children. One of them had twins.

During this period Sommer was actually married, for a second time, in 1934. At that time, the report said, he already had four illegitimate children of whose existence he failed to inform his wife.

Council Seeking Red-Negro Links

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI)—The Arkansas Legislative Council is attempting to prove that Communist activity is at the bottom of the integration crisis at Central High School which started in September 1957.

Atty. Gen. Bruce Bennett said hearings could prove that racial agitation in the South is a Communist conspiracy.

Royalty Waltzes With Commoners

LONDON (UPI)—Queen Elizabeth danced with a policeman and Princess Margaret waltzed with a footman at Buckingham Palace's annual Christmas party for the household staff Tuesday night.

More than 300 footmen, maids, housekeepers, butlers and others who worked in the palace had their chance to rub elbows and even dance with the royal family until midnight.

Prince Philip also chachacha'd with the household help, including the palace housekeeper.

The Queen, wearing a green satin evening gown embroidered with emeralds, and Princess Margaret in a strapless pink ball dress were nearly outdone in splendor by the Christmas cake, topped by a sugar model of Sandringham church.

Captain To Visit

Capt. James Reedy, former Hattiesburg commander, will arrive in Sanford early next week for a visit with his wife and five children at Silver Lake. Capt. Reedy is now commanding officer of the aircraft carrier USS Lexington, which will dock in San Diego Friday, after a tour in the Pacific.

Mother-in-Law Wins, Body Is Sought

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (UPI)—Authorities today made intensive search for the body of Mrs. Olga Duncan, 30, whose mother-in-law has admitted impersonating her in order to divorce the young woman's marriage.

Duncan is representing his mother in the criminal proceeding.

Ventura Dist. Atty. Roy Stafford (late Tuesday night) said Mrs. Duncan admitted paying a stranger \$600 to pose as her son while she posed as Olga. They obtained an annulment of the marriage on Jan. 5.

Navy Bombing Derbies Of Future To Be Supersonic

Future Navy "Bombing Derby" events will become supersonic with the arrival of the North American Aviation AJJ "Vigilante." Designed and manufactured at the Columbus (Ohio) Division, the Navy's first attack weapon system was christened last May by Admiral Arleigh A. Burke, Chief of Naval Operations. The twin-jet AJJ was flown for

the first time on Aug. 31. Since that time, after an initial test period in the Columbus area, the Vigilante was flown to Palmdale, Calif., for continuation of the program. The second AJJ recently made its first flight and is being test-flown in the Columbus area. The AJJ combines wide versatility with its superior performance. It can deliver not only spe-

cial (nuclear) weapons at high altitudes and speeds but it also can operate "on the deck" with both nuclear and non-nuclear weapons.

The AJJ is equipped to strike effectively in limited war by delivering bombs or low yield nuclear weapons over long distances. It can also be called upon for reconnaissance and intelligence missions.

A unique feature of the AJJ is its method of bomb delivery. Bombs are ejected out the tail from a "linear" bomb bay. This is, in effect, a tunnel running lengthwise in the aft section of the fuselage.

The AJJ is well suited for launching air-to-surface missiles—both short range tactical and long

range types. With its integrated bombing navigational system, the Vigilante is capable of pinpoint navigational accuracy.

In addition to its ability to carry a variety of ordnance (nuclear, non-nuclear bombs, missiles) the AJJ can be equipped with a "buddy tanker" refueling package. This will enable the Vigilante to function as a tanker to refuel other strike aircraft.

Because of its high speed, maneuverability, and range, the Vigilante may be flown on single airplane attack missions without fighter escort.

Designed to be based on aircraft carriers, the AJJ also has a short-field takeoff capability. Low-speed flight characteristics are enhanced by boundary layer control. This is a system of blowing high-pressure air over lifting surfaces.

Carrier deck handling is facilitated through the use of power steering on the nose wheel of the AJJ.

The AJJ can strike effectively and survive from all weapon-launching altitudes as well as from all altitudes. From close support missions at "on the deck" altitudes, to very high altitudes, it is a weapon system that will significantly extend the striking power of the U. S. Navy.

Editorials

Harmony Is Overdue In Seminole County

An outgoing member of the Seminole Board of County Commissioners has been accused of over-riding his budget on roads and bridges.

John Krider, board chairman, said B. C. Dodd, District 4 commissioner, had spent more than allotted since this fiscal year began, Oct. 1.

Three other commissioners joined Krider in voting to restrict use of funds in Dodd's district until the commission gets an "accounting" of money spent in District 4. Dodd voted against the restriction, pointing out that projects must be completed, else "roads under construction will be ruined and cost the county twice as much."

This discussion, which came about at the commission's meeting yesterday, raises a couple of very important questions. The first is: are the roads and bridges in question among the county's top priority projects? The second: if not, why are funds being spent on them?

Regardless of the answers to the above questions, it seems somewhat like the old adage of locking the barn door after the horse has escaped. The money has been spent. There is no doubt that some of the money will be wasted if construction is halted before projects are completed.

All of this raises a much more important question, one of conducting Seminole County's business on a business-like basis. Whether the roads and bridges in question were top priority, or whether much of the money spent on these roads and bridges will "go down the drain," are relatively minor matters.

The major issue, in the minds of most, is whether the county is getting what it should be getting for its money. Genuine differences exist on any board; all government bodies are split on certain issues; it is mandatory that each elected official vote his convictions.

But, all elected officials should keep one thought uppermost in mind: when an elected body engages in squabbles and disharmony, the public is not getting what it pays for. The time long since has passed when Seminole County can afford five County Commissioners. A healing of rifts and cessation of bickering are long overdue.

Sanford To Be Aglow

The Junior Chamber of Commerce once again is sponsoring its Christmas lighting contest.

Carlton Blais, chairman of the event, said the Jaycees hope to make Sanford the "Christmas lighting capital of Central Florida."

Two broad classifications, commercial and residential, have been established. Residential entries have been broken down into four divisions—religious settings, traditional, artistic and the best over-all decorations.

Christmas lights and decorations add a great deal to the Christmas season. A concerted drive such as the one planned by the Jaycees can do much to beautify Sanford and surrounding area at Christmas.

Based on decorations already put up, Sanford should be aglow until Yule is over. Street lights and decorations were put up weeks ago by the city. A Christmas tree near the Civic Center adds a great deal to the town at night. Decorations will cheer residents and visitors alike.

Butcher Assures No Axe For Birds

NEW YORK (UPI) — A Greenwich Village butcher shop put up a special holiday window display that included two live turkeys and a tree stump with an ominous axe imbedded in it.

Neighborhood children loved the turkeys but were so disturbed by the axe that they sent a delegation of their mothers to visit the butcher, after which this reassuring sign also appeared in the window:

"These birds are pets. They are NOT going to be killed."

Red Paper Lashes 'Peacock' Presley

BERLIN (UPI)—East German Communists attacked Pfc. Elvis Presley as a "cold war" weapon Sunday and said Soviet youth would not be tripped by the "modern Pied Piper of Hamelin."

The official Communist Party newspaper, Neues Deutschland, printed a picture of the rock 'n' roll singer and a teen-age German girl he has been dating in Frankfurt. The headline over the picture said "Cold War Weapon."

The paper denied reports in the West Berlin press that Presley, now on maneuvers with the U.S. 3rd Armored Division in West Germany, was popular among youth people behind the Iron Curtain.

"The majority of the youth of the German Democratic Republic will not be tripped by the modern Pier Pier of Hamelin, and the rain falls in an endless twilight. Our headquarters are in angrily ugly stone buildings, with a prison severity that only the German could have managed. It was they who did manage it. Our command is housed in captured German barracks and the sullenly colored German flag hangs alongside our own over a gray and sodden parade ground."

Under the picture, a caption read: "Puffed up like a peacock Presley, looking like a shipwrecked buoy, is an advertisement for NATO in the West zone."

(EDITORS NOTE: This is the first of six dispatches on the football teams playing in the post-season bowl games.)
Baton Rouge, La. (UPI)—Louisiana State's top-ranked Tigers crashed through the regular season unbeaten and united for the first time in 50 years but there is still a hitch to be bucked in the Sugar Bowl New Year's Day. In four trips south to New Or-

leans for the rich post-season football game the Tigers failed to show the Bayou bonnet folks a single win. They are now hard at work determined to reverse that unhappy record in 1936. The Tigers play twice-beaten Clemson, the Atlantic Coast Conference champion, in the Jan. 1 contest and for the fourth time in their five Sugar Bowl appearances, they will be favored. Under the coaching of youth-

ful, Yankee-born Paul Dietzel, and the line-wearing runs of "Player of the Year" Billy Cannon, LSU is a two-touchdown favorite over the South Carolinians. But put in its historical perspective, that fat bulge in the odds may slim somewhat. The great LSU teams of the mid-30s coached by eager Bernie Moore sported such football legends as Ken Kavanaugh and Gus Tinsley and made three straight trips into New Orleans for New Year's Day. The 1933 team, which lost only one regular-season game, was dumped by Texas Christian in the 1934 Sugar Bowl. Then tiny Santa Clara came in from the West Coast two years in succession to dump the Bayou dandies. In 1930, the Bengals showed up in the underdog's role against Oklahoma and were laced 25-0 by the Sooners. There was no New Year's joy in Louisiana that evening.

But LSU football observers note the element of being "down" for a game has not troubled the Tigers this year and isn't likely to happen Jan. 1. "Those boys have pride," explains Dietzel. In addition to pride and the other intangibles that combine to produce a winner, the Tigers have Cannon, probably the South's best back in a decade. Given a fast field where the LSU line might offset a whopping weight disadvantage, the Tigers should move through the South Carolina line like Sherman marched through Georgia and one aspect of history may repeat itself. Sherman, before he became notorious in these parts as a union general, was first president of LSU.

Quiet Boy Relates Rape, Murder Of Expectant Mother

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI)—David S. Smith, 29, tall, quiet part-time college student, calmly told authorities today how he planned to rape the pretty young expectant mother who lived across the street.

Smith showed no remorse as he admitted raping and then killing Mrs. Janice Ora Porter, 24, in her bed Tuesday morning. He hid the 22 caliber revolver with which he shot her in the rafters of his home. "There is no question the boy telling the truth," Sheriff Stacy Hall said, "but the investigation is not complete."

Smith, who was held for investigation of murder, told authorities he had planned the crime for two or three days.

The body was found and gashed. Her clothing had been slit up the front. A single bullet wound was in the center of her forehead. At the foot of the bed was a baby crib, blankets folded neatly over its sides. Baby books and Christmas packages were nearby.

The couple had been married five years and eagerly looked forward to the birth of their first child, expected any day. The husband, who expects to graduate in June, was taking examinations when notified of the death.

The search for the killer turned to Smith within a few hours when deputies checked a set of footprints in the snow between the two houses.

Smith said he did not even know Mrs. Porter's name.

After the killing, Smith said, he returned home and "started to read and study."

Truck Kills One Injures Another

BRATT (UPI)—An Escambia County School Board truck spun out of control and struck a utility pole Tuesday, killing one youth and injuring another.

The victim was identified as Eugene Norris, 17, of Bratt. Raymond Peebles, 15, Bratt, was reported in fair condition at a hospital.

Police said the accident occurred Tuesday afternoon on State Road 99, near the Alabama-Florida line.

However, the chilly grip of winter maintained a stubborn grip on the Southeast during the night, and a new snowstorm, powered by arctic blasts, raced across the northern plains into the upper Great Lakes.

As the warm air advanced across the interior, temperatures shot up to 70 degrees in northern Texas, Lincoln, Neb., had a high of 58 and Pickstown, S. D., recorded 31.

In Chicago, overnight temperatures held in the mid-20s, about 20 degrees warmer than the night before. It also was the city's warmest weather since a brief warm spell which ended Dec. 4.

The northern tier of states faced another onslaught of winter today with gusty winds expected to push snow and blowing snow across the Great Lakes region, with snow extending into New England.

Three youngsters drowned at Sanford, N. C., Tuesday when they fell through thin ice on a mill pond.

The deaths added to the mounting cold weather toll which now stands well above 100 since the snow and cold swept out of the west early this month.

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Search Under Way For Bomber's Crew

TAMPA, Fla. (UPI)—The Coast Guard searched the waters of Tampa Bay today for the bodies of crewmembers aboard a low-flying B-47 jet bomber that crashed and exploded late Tuesday.

Four persons were aboard the six-jet medium bomber. One body was recovered about an hour after the plane went down with one wing ablaze.

Crewmembers were identified as Capt. George E. Whitney, 37, commander; Maj. Marcel F. D'Amico, 25, Plainfield, N. J., instructor navigator; Lt. Joseph D. Bernardi, 23, navigator; and William C. Rieker Jr., 24, navigator. The Air Force did not immediately say which officer's body was found.

The plane was from the 36th Bomb Wing at nearby MacDill Air Force Base.

The Air Force said the plane was approaching from the east over the bay to make a landing at MacDill when the crash occurred. It plunged into the water some 1,000 yards off Lewis Island located just off the coast.

No parachutes were seen leaving the plane.

The B-47 is considered the backbone of the Strategic Air Command's long range striking force and is capable of carrying nuclear weapons.

Diggers, Do Be Careful; Phone Line Buried There

Ditch-diggers and ambitious gardeners, beware!

Look before you push that shovel into the ground by your road. You could be responsible for cutting off several thousand telephones, water lines or electric power.

In an age when everyone takes to the sky, utility companies are planting as much as possible beneath the surface of the earth.

In the past few months the Southern Bell Telephone Co. has buried thousands of miles of cable. The cable doesn't just lie there; it has to be spliced to another cable. Each large cable contains 400 pairs of small cables. Each pair contains lines for one to eight party lines.

And the splicing job—that of joining each of the 400 pairs to its mate in the joining cable, must be done by hand. The ends are

joined together by winding a special kind of tape around them.

Of course, there are larger cables than those with 400 pairs, but that is the size used in Seminole County at the moment. The splices must be made every time the cable has to curve or turn a corner, so it's quite a job. This is in addition to the pits every half mile.

Out in the county, the telephone men sit in pairs in a pit and splice. If the line is a working cable, they will work continuously, 24 hours a day, with one crew relieving another. Downward they work in manholes, with a pump to pull out the dangerous gas that accumulates beneath the earth—particularly the gas from the killing mangrove plant.

Due to growth in south Seminole County, telephone men have been spending much of their time in the pits. They recently put down 10,000 feet of cable, 1,500 miles of wire at a cost of \$24,000 on the Orlando Highway for Pinecrest, Sunland Estates and routes south. Pits are still in evidence on County Club Road, where the men protect themselves with sawhorses and flame pots. (Against the Traffic)

Cable crossing signs are spaced down the road as a warning to other utility companies as well as property owners. Cement markers show where the cable begins and ends.

According to Bob Shelden, manager of the local telephone office, anyone should always check it would be pretty hideous for someone to splice all those fires together again, wouldn't it?

Sergeant Declares 'Didn't Kill Wife'

Denham, England (UPI)—M. Sgt. Marcus M. Marymont, of Hobbsville, N. C., denied today that he either purchased or used the arsenic with which he is accused of murdering his wife.

Marymont, testifying in his own defense, admitted he had sexual relations with another woman while his wife was still alive, and discussed marriage with her. He said he gave her expensive gifts, including a diamond ring and a fur coat, but denied that he was "deeply in love" with her.

The 37-year-old Air Force non-com's testimony took up most of today's session of the court-martial that is trying him on charges of murdering his 43-year-old wife while courting the attractive Cynthia Taylor, a dress shop manager from Maidenhead, England.

Under direct examination by his counsel, Maj. William Karr, Marymont flatly denied Tuesday's testimony by a druggist from Maidenhead that he had attempted to buy arsenic in his store.

"Have you at any time attempted to purchase arsenic while stationed in the United Kingdom?" Karr asked.

"No, sir, I have not," Marymont replied at any time and in any way administered or attempted to administer arsenic to your wife?"

"No, sir, I have not." The druggist, Bernard Sampson, said Marymont came into his store in May—two months before his wife's death—and asked whether he could buy arsenic. He dropped the subject, Sampson said when he was told he would have to have a permit.

Under cross-examination by Maj. C. J. Lewis, the prosecutor, Marymont admitted that he had been on sexually intimate terms with Mrs. Taylor during the period between Christmas 1956 and last May.

"Would it be fair to say you promised marriage to Mrs. Taylor?" Lewis asked.

"We merely discussed it," the defendant replied. "She had mentioned marriage, and I concurred that if she was free I would give it consideration."

Air Force Silent On Hustler Crash

WESTWAY, Tex. (UPI)—The Air Force refused today to reveal the cause of the first crash of a B-57 Hustler, the world's fastest bomber, in a desolate area near Westway and the New Mexico state line.

One of the 1140-mile-an-hour plus jets plowed a 40-foot hole in the ground when it hit Tuesday. Residents thought they heard a sonic boom.

Two of the three-man crew escaped, but the pilot was killed. A helicopter pilot who landed at the scene said the pieces of wreckage were so small he could not identify the aircraft.

An Air Force spokesman said the number of B-57s that have been built is classified. The jets have been in production by Convair Aircraft Corp. at Fort Worth for about two years.

No major injuries have been reported so far, although the Emergency Service said there were the usual number of minor burn cases and smoke inhalation suffered by firefighters.

The weather forecast for today was for "Santa Ana" winds—dry, fast-moving winds that whip across southern California from the desert are one of the major causes for the area's high fire danger at this time of year.

The area has been without rain for nearly two months.

Segregation Big '58 Story: Deep South Unchanged

ATLANTA (UPI)—The week before Thanksgiving, 1958, in Atlanta large printed signs began appearing on automobiles. They read: "We want public schools."

In rapid succession three manifestoes were issued by influential groups—the metropolitan Atlanta clergy, the Emory University faculty and Agnes Scott College professors—urging that a way be found to keep public schools open regardless of the outcome of pending integration cases.

In Miami, Episcopal bishops of the United States adopted a pastoral letter—read in every Episcopal church in the South calling for universal obedience to federal laws and for a return to principles of Christian brother-

hood in the solving of racial tensions.

In Atlanta, J. H. Calhoun, not long ago one of the most militant of the NAACP leaders in the South, told an assembly at a Negro university that desegregation can only take place in a "favorable atmosphere." He said he hoped that leaders of Negro and white races could sit down together and work out their problems in the event a federal court orders integration for Atlanta schools.

Change of Heart?
 Did the critical racial troubles of 1958, including the closing of some schools in Arkansas and Virginia, produce a change of heart in a section of America that once vowed to stand firm against the encroachment of integration?

Much of the Deep South has not changed, but events most certainly have caused some deep reflection and hard planning.

Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus conducted a personal nationwide money-raising campaign to produce private funds for operation of high schools in the Arkansas capital. As the year ended there was some form of private education for youngsters displaced by the closing of white high schools.

Virginia also got its first taste of private schools. Federal court orders in Norfolk, Charlottesville and Warren County meant the schools had to integrate or be closed under Virginia's massive resistance laws. They were closed.

Basement Classes
 Private classes more or less hobbled into operation in Virginia, many of them conducted in basement rumpus rooms of private homes.

As the year ended there was no indication that public education would be resumed soon in any of the 33 schools closed by the race issue, four at Little Rock, one at Front Royal, Va., six at Norfolk and one at Charlottesville. More than 16,000 pupils had been affected.

And what portends for 1959? Look to Georgia, where two important court cases are pending. One, already on trial, attacks segregation practices at Georgia State College in Atlanta. The other encompasses the entire Atlanta public school system. Final settlement in both cases is expected well before the opening of the 1959 fall term.

Right now many groups in the Georgia capital are striving to find an answer to the problem. State laws now require the closing of any integrated public school.

Double pressure can be expected in the January session of the Georgia Legislature — one side seeking to strengthen numerous segregation laws on the books; the other side urging adoption of local option laws. It would take a constitutional amendment and a statewide vote to make any basic changes.

Frederick Othman Has Heart Attack

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Frederick C. Othman, Washington columnist for the United Features Syndicate, suffered a heart attack Tuesday.

Doctors reported his condition Tuesday night as "pretty good."

The 53-year-old veteran newspaperman was stricken shortly after he had covered the morning session of a House election subcommittee hearing on the defeat of Rep. Coya Knutson (D-Minn.) in the Nov. 4 election.

Doctors said he suffered what they described as a "coronary thrombosis with a myocardial infarct."

Othman became ill during lunch in the Capital restaurant. He walked from there to the Senate press gallery to rest and then went to his Washington home where he was attended by a physician and later removed to Doctors Hospital.

Everybody In Minority; Public Too Thin-Skinned

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Audiences have become too thin-skinned for comedian Danny Thomas who says dialect jokes are a forgotten art, thanks to over-sensitive groups and individuals.

"From now on I'm going to use as much dialect material as possible in my guest appearances," Danny vowed. "I can't use dialect stuff on my own show because it doesn't fit in."

"I'll do Yiddish, Greek, Arabic, Negro, Italian and Irish vernaculars, and to heck with the squawks."

"Dialect jokes are the best weapons available to fight prejudice. People who complain about dialect bits cause more bigotry

than they prevent. After all, everybody in this country belongs to some kind of minority group."

Thomas deplores deletion and changes of lyrics in "Old Man River" and Stephen Foster's classics.

"Those songs glorify a great and colorful era in American history. It's abominable that they have been altered," he said.

"When I was 11 years old I took a job as candy butcher in a Toledo, Ohio, theater. During the seven years I worked there I saw the greatest dialecticians in show business. Whenever the audience was in an absolute uproar, laughing itself to death, you could bet 99 per cent of the time the comedian was doing dialects."

"There was no hatred nor hurt feelings. The people loved it. And I'll tell you why: In those days you lived in neighborhoods where the butcher was usually German, the tailor Yiddish, the cop Irish and the fruit peddler Italian. Their native accents were a part of everyday life."

"Sure, they heeled and fought with one another, but they loved each other, too."

"Those people were proud of their backgrounds and old-country culture. Their laughter was genuine when they heard a visiting comic mimic their mannerisms and accents."

Danny's own beginnings in show business included dialects. But he gave them up in 1941 when he was advised that the road to stardom wasn't paved with imitations of other stars nor the accents of racial groups.

Occasionally he works in a character with a strong dialect on his CBS-TV "Danny Thomas Show." Usually it is a warm-hearted characterization which keeps his audience from becoming malicious.

"One of these days I'm going to give a black party in my neighborhood in Beverly Hills," Danny went on. "Everyone will wear costumes representing their family origins."

"It would help us all get to know one-another better."

"Nobody has anything to be ashamed of regarding his national origins — and by golly I'm trying to prove it."
