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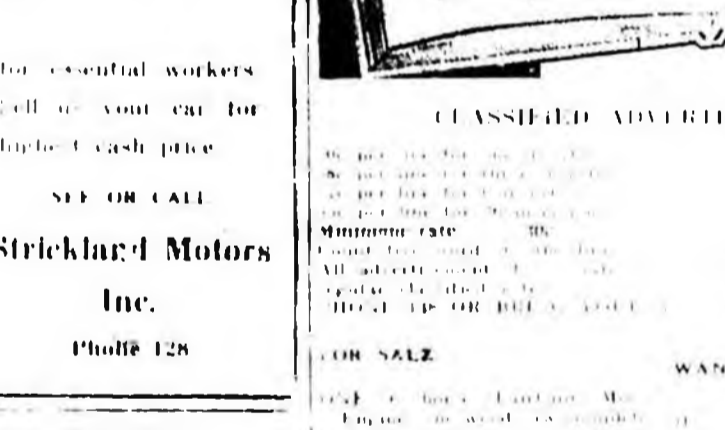


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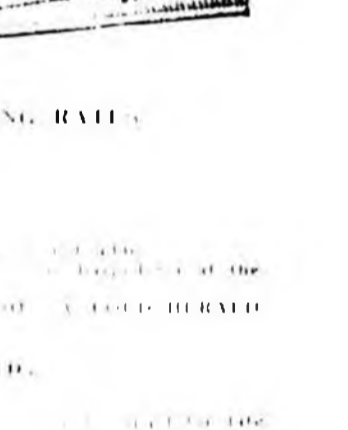


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Medical Gremlins Are Playing Havoc At Camp Blanding

CAMP BLANDING, Fla., Apr. 20. — Gremlins of the Medical Corps are the Army's latest worst enemies. Doctors at the Station Hospital report that their mess halls are overrun with the invisible imp.

L. Ella Wakefield, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Wakefield, 2418 3rd Avenue North, St. Petersburg, Florida, describing the situation says: "That one type of gremlin is causing the patients to get potatoes that look like they are cooked, when they are only partially done. Another gremlin puts out the coal fires in the kitchen stoves with similarly disastrous results.

A cousin, known as the "electric gremlin"—he goes around dressed in a coil of wire and burned-out fuses—turns off the electric oven. Others blow light fuses, leaving the kitchen in total darkness when food is being checked off on the rolling carts, which take it to the patients' wards.

Still another type, known as the horned gremlin, use their horns to absorb the salt out of mashed potatoes, regardless of the amount put therein. One gremlin, a lady gremlin when Lieutenant Wakefield refused to name, mixes salt and sugar on the patients' trays.

However, the worst gremlin of all is one who eats the last portion of meat, just as the Colonel enters the mess hall a couple of minutes late. They call him the "rank-buster."

The only counteracting force, according to Lt. Margaret Biggs, Chief dietitian at Blanding's Station Hospital, and daughter of Mrs. M. V. Biggs, Barberville, Florida, is a good-hearted gremlin, which sneaks in food from other mess halls to cover shortages. But he is the latest of all gremlins and seldom works at his tasks.
