### Victory Harvest Show

Uncle Sam is calling louder

and louder for Victory Gardens.

The slogan adopted by an agricultural group, "Food Will Win the War," has been carried by our Secretary of Agriculture Claude A. Wickard, who, in a vein of optimism and confidence, has changed it to "Food Is Winning the War." Economic call attention to the increased population, immense need in camps and hospitals, the lack of home-grown vegetables, the heavy shortage of canned goods, lead on restaurants, hence a nationwide patriotic movement has been planned to arouse this Victory Garden spirit and unite the sympathetic efforts of all organizations, groups and clubs in an all-out contribution for the welfare of men in our armed forces, for the relief of city dwellers, our Allied forces and oppressed civilians abroad.

Army Emergency and Navy Relief Societies, funding their own camp and base in the United States through the welfare officer in charge, whose duty it is to assist the man in uniform, or his family in case of financial stress, to care for disabled soldiers and sailors, to alleviate the burden of war-torn families and towns.

To raise a generous fund with out sparing attention, unduly from the gardeners' accustomed line of service, Victory Garden Harvest Shows were decided upon as a most fitted medium, and some \$10,000 contributed, so vegetable shows are expected to be staged throughout the United States within this year. 85 percent of the proceeds is to be divided between the Army Emergency and Navy Relief Societies which will have charge of the distribution of all work done.

The tin can endures the cold of Iceland and the heat of Libya. It withstands bombing assaults. After ship sinkings, tin cans can be dropped without harm to the fighting men cut off from their base. Did you know, too, that a drop of solder is an essential part of every light bulb? And don't we need light?

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**Medical Gremlins Are Playing Havoc At Camp Blanding**

CAMP BLANDING, Fla., Apr. 26.—Gremlins of the Medical Corps are the Army's latest worry. Dieticians at the Station Hospital report that their mess halls are overrun with the invisible imp.

Lila M. A. Wakefield, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Wakefield, 2418 3rd Avenue North, St. Petersburg, Florida, describing the situation says that one type of gremlin is causing the patients to get potatoes that look like they are cooked, when they are only partially done. Another gremlin starts at the coal fires in the kitchen stoves with similarly disastrous results.

A cousin, known as the "electrical gremlins"—he goes around dressed in a coil of wire and burned-out fuses—turns off the electric oven. Others blow light fuses, leaving the kitchen in total darkness when food is being cooked off on the rolling carts, which take it to the patients' wards.

Still another type, known as the horned gremlins, use their horns to absorb the salt out of mashed potatoes, regardless of the amount put therein. One gremlin, a lady gremlin, when Lieutenant Wakefield refused to name him, mixes salt and sugar on the patients' trays.

However, the worst gremlin of all is one who eats the last portion of meat, just as the Colonel enters the mess hall a couple of minutes late. They call him the "unk-buster."

The only countering force, according to Lt. Margaret Biggs, Chief dietitian at Blanding's Station Hospital, and daughter of Mrs. M. V. Biggs, Barberville, Florida, is a good-hearted gremlin, which sneaks in food from other mess halls to cover short-ages. But he is the laziest of all gremlins and seldom works at his task.
