### Some Keloid Scars Difficult To Treat

DEAR DR. LAMB—Some years ago doctors removed a small cyst by surgery from the skin in the center of my chest. It healed slowly and apparently had some infection. But after feeling a very nasty keloid formed about the area. This tissue is ugly, itchy and always slightly sore and inflamed. A dermatologist treated it with cortisone injections. After two years of monthly injections, the keloid is still the same. It seems strange to me that in this age of advanced medicine that such a seemingly simple malady cannot be relieved. Can you give me any information on this keloid condition? I am a blond Caucasian. Therefore, I should not have a condition related to people of dark skin if this is truly a trait found among them.

DEAR DR. LAMB—What does iron do for a woman while she's menstruating? It is necessary?

DEAR READER—The iron isn't just to be taken during menstruation. We often say that a woman has increased iron requirements during her childbearing years because of her menstrual periods. The point is that she loses blood each time her menstrual period occurs and with the blood loss, she loses some iron. This, in turn, will increase her iron requirements since the lost iron must be replaced to avoid iron deficiency anemia.

West leads his king of clubs and continues with the ace after East drops the five. East completes the echo with the deuce, but West decides not to give his partner a ruff since South will overruff.

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## Track Owner Vows Fight

## Florida House Passes Conversion Bill

"If they (the Legislature) think they've got a sleeping dog, they had better not pick him," Jerry Collins said today as he challenged the legality of the bill passed by the Florida House today to allow the Seminole Harness Raceway to become a dog racing facility.

A clause in that bill designed to discourage legal action, would eliminate pari-mutuel wagering at the event of a successful court challenge.

"I will take the act to court even if it means wiping out the pari-mutuel industry in Florida," Collins said. "I built dog tracks in the way of the Capone gang to what it is today. Anytime the Legislature can handle a bill like this... anytime they can go back to the old ways of doing things, it is not fair to the public," he said.

Collins is upset about the combining of the Seminole County bill with a Dade County act to convert a dog track to a jai alai front.

"What's good for Dade County is not good for Seminole County," Collins said. "I'm going to determine for the benefit of the public if this is constitutionally right."

Collins also said he had been given the word of dog track owners statewide that they would band together to keep Dade County and Seminole County acts separate.

"If the courts say this is constitutionally right, I will sell my race track interests. I do not want to be associated with a bunch of guys like this," said Collins, who has owned and operated the dog track in Longwood for the past 25 years.

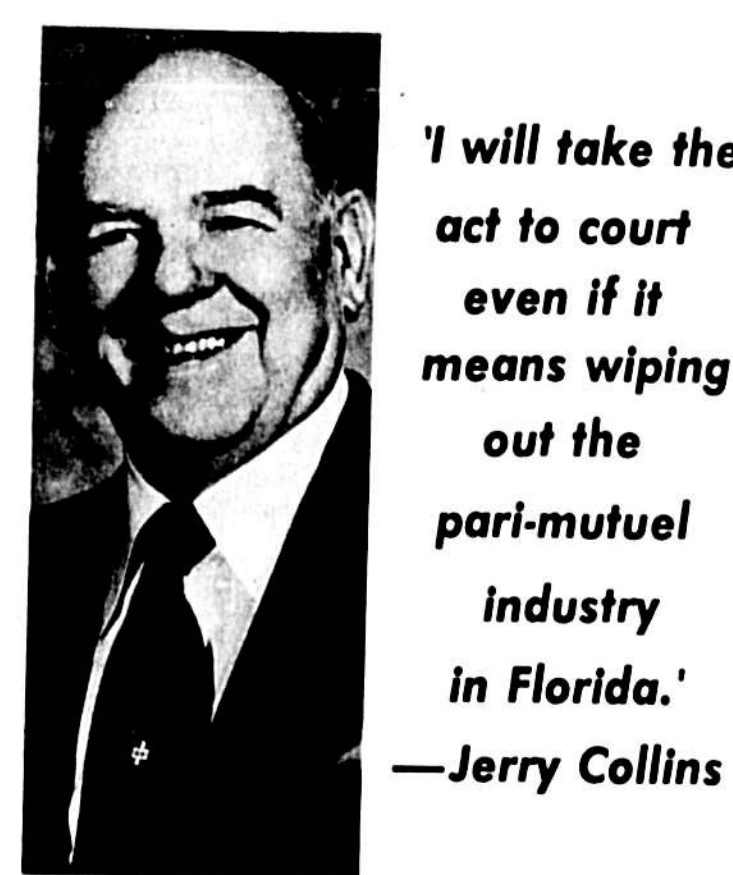
Collins said he attended the pari-mutuel subcommittee meeting in the Florida House that approved the combined bill Thursday afternoon. The Seminole County and Dade County combined bill was prepared Thursday morning and presented to the committee Thursday afternoon.

Collins said he attempted to speak against the bill in the committee, but was not permitted. During the bill committee on Regulated Industries, a gag rule was imposed, again denying him the opportunity to speak, Collins said.

Collins said he feared the two bills would be tied together. Collins said he authored the bill which would allow the 1946 forbidding dog racing facilities from being closer than 100 miles to one another. And, he added, this new proposed law violates that principle.

State Rep. Robert Hattaway, D-Altamonte Springs, who is co-sponsoring with Rep. Carl Ogden of Dade County, the combined legislation called Collins' position "selfish."

Hattaway said he and Ogden included the provision that could "wipe out pari-mutuel wagering in Florida" in the event of a successful court challenge because they "were tired of See DOG TRACK, Page 2A

## Revenge

### Ted, Bush Score Wins

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Sen. Edward Kennedy pulled out a narrow, campaigning victory over President Carter, and George Bush got a strong but only half-lost win over Ronald Reagan in Pennsylvania to keep them both alive today in the 1980 race for the White House.

Bush beat Reagan convincingly in the Republican beauty contest Tuesday, but actually lost ground to the former California governor in delegate counts. Carter pulled close as voters approached the polls, but couldn't overtake the Massachusetts senator.

Kennedy's win, built on voters' criticism of the Carter economic policy, kept alive the question of the president's ability to keep winning in the face of bad news from both home and abroad.

White House press secretary Jody Powell congratulated Kennedy, but noted the president had won more delegates in Tuesday's contest.

Powell said Carter must take care of foreign and domestic policy while dealing with political opponents "who, for the most part, have approached our problems on a sort of 'we can deal with them in a noncombustive, friendly, free lunch sort of manner' without making controversial or difficult decisions."

Bush said his popular vote victory in Pennsylvania showed that his differences with Reagan "based on my knowledge and experience in foreign and domestic affairs" are beginning to show delegates.

But Reagan pointed to his mounting delegate gap over Bush and virtually predicted for the first time that he will win the nomination.

"I hate to tempt fate but I can't think of a circumstance under which he could beat me for the nomination."

### Abcam Figures Triumph

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Although overshadowed by Democratic party leaders in Philadelphia because of little on my Abcam scandal, Rep. Michael "Ocie" Williams and Democrat City Committee Chairman David Glancy, were unopposed in western Pennsylvania's 12th District.

Williams had been called "unelectable" by Philadelphia Mayor William J. Green and Democratic City Committee Chairman David Glancy.

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### County To Accept Fire Station Bid?

The Seminole County Commission Tuesday accepted the \$20,000 bid of Southern States Contracting Corporation of Orlando to build four new fire stations even though the projects cost may delay other station, fire stations, reduce equipment purchases and preclude an increase in salary personnel.

The total cost of the project is expected to be \$1,044,170.

The commission has seen the cost of each fire station increase from \$40,000 when the projects were conceived five years ago, to \$100,000 each. If further delayed, county senior financial analyst Eleanor Anderson said costs will rise at the rate of \$20,000 per station every six months.

In a 4-to-1 vote late Tuesday, the commission directed County Administrator Roger Newsender to prepare additional budgetary information based on accepting the bid.

But Newsender said he had to prepare additional budgetary information based on the motion because he said the bids were handled improperly.

Kirchoff said he objected to the four stations having been bid as a package deal. He said he would like to have been able to accept the lowest bid for each station, not the overall bid.

"We would have saved the county about \$30,000 that way," he said.

But County Administrator Roger Newsender said the bids were accepted as a package deal under the assumption the contractors would charge less if they could build on the "fast track" method.

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### Herndon Gets \$10 Trip Hike

A unanimous but reluctant Seminole County Commission late Tuesday gave Herndon Ambulance everything it requested in rate and subsidy increases.

Public Safety Director Gary Kaiser recommended the increases because he said the county has no viable option at this time.

Approved is Herndon's original rate increase request, which will add an additional \$10 per trip to the company's base rate. The county granted a \$10 increase in February, but that was only half of what Herndon requested. The firm's base rate for emergency calls is now \$60, the same as is charged in Orange County, Kaiser said. Other charges were also increased.

In addition, the county approved granting a \$1,000 per month extra subsidy for the company for the period May 5 through Sept. 30, 1980. The company currently gets a subsidy of \$6,200 per month.

On top of the increased subsidy, the commissioners agreed to grant an additional \$33,000 subsidy for the next fiscal year, bringing the company's Seminole County subsidy to \$107,574 per year.

The increases were made, according to Herndon President Idus Willis, to offset the increased cost of gasoline and salary increases. He said the company had been losing money in Seminole.

This was confirmed by Assistant County Administrator Jeff Eitcheber, who was finally satisfied that an adequate audit of the company's books had been performed.

Ironically, Willis said as rates go up, the collection rate goes down.

The company's expected loss from uncollectible bills in the next fiscal year is \$117,600.

Kirchoff suggested earlier that the county should prepare for Herndon's eventual pullout by training county firefighters as paramedics and adding emergency medical equipment to fire department vehicles.

"We get there first anyway," Kaiser said. With the county having emergency medical equipment, he said, the ambulance company would be just a taxi service.

These funds allow the county to master all of the \$1,044,170 needed for the projects, although it will not all be spent in the current fiscal year.

The budget details are complicated, Newsender said, because the construction will straddle two fiscal years. The \$200,000 will have to be paid back as a first priority of the next fiscal year public safety department budget. The pay-back and planned salary increases look feasible, but Public Safety Director Gary Kaiser has been warned that the construction projects will have the following anticipated impact:

— Construction of two additional fire stations planned for Chulavita and Fern Park at a cost of \$430,000 may have to be delayed. (Kaiser has said the Fern Park station has highest priority).

— Equipment purchases may have to be reduced to a minimum.

— An increase in personnel may not be possible.

It may also mean the projected Sabal Point fire station will be delayed.

"I told Gary (Kaiser) the number one priority for next year will be to replace the capital repairs," said Newsender.

"There won't be any money left over for any great new ideas."

## 200 Cuban Refugees Arrive In Shrimplot At Key West

KEY WEST, Fla. (UPI) — The 67-foot shrimplot "Big Baby" arrived from Cuba with around 200 refugees today in the latest exodus from the Caribbean island. More than two dozen other boats were poised to leave today to pick up more Cuban refugees. The refugees cheered as the boat docked at the Truman Annex in the former Key West naval station shortly before 4 a.m.

## Tito Lapses Into Coma

BEIGRADE, Yugoslavia (UPI) — Doctors said today for the first time that critically ill President Josip Broz Tito had lapsed into a coma in his struggle against a variety of illnesses. "President Tito's health condition remains critical," the daily medical bulletin said. "Besides the existing comatose state, President Tito has since yesterday entering state in shock. Necessary medical measures are being taken."

people grabbing us by the ear and telling us what they were going to do to us."

He said the purpose of the pari-mutuel wagering in Florida is to generate revenue for the state and for the pleasure of the people. It's not to generate a great deal of money for special interests," Hattaway said.

Hattaway had no fears about the pari-mutuel industry being eliminated in spite of the special language included in the combined bill.

"We do and undo things all the time," Hattaway said. "If the legislation is successfully challenged, the governor could call us back into session at any time. There are more ways to solve the problem than one," he said, adding he is not "that hung up on the thing."

"It was one way to get the attention of the special interest people," Hattaway said. He said Collins is still "hollering about the referendum that was held in the 1930s" authorizing operation of his dog track. Hattaway said Collins believes that referendum gave him ownership of Seminole County.

"I'm not a gambler," Hattaway said. "I look at the bottom line. Pari-mutuel wagering brings in \$100 million a year to the state government. If there is no pari-mutuel wagering, that money would have to be made up elsewhere."

"We are trying to stop some threats by special interests that we feel are not in the best interest of the state of Florida," Hattaway said.

State Rep. Bobby Brantley, R-Longwood, meanwhile, noting the legislation passed the House this morning on a 90-14 vote, said he attempted to gain support to knock out the provision that could suspend all pari-mutuel wagering licenses in the state, but was unsuccessful.

Brantley voted against the bill, as did most of the Orange County delegation, Brantley said. He said he was in the Florida Senate, Sen. John Vogt, D-Cocoa Beach, said the provision included by Hattaway and Ogden, although unusual probably could be deemed an "insurance provision."

The proposed law, which has not as yet been considered by the Florida Senate, will be sponsored there by Vogt.

"I wouldn't mind having the provision in there," Vogt said. The senator, whose district includes Seminole County, said it is likely the chairman of the Senate Commerce Committee will combine a raft of pari-mutuel wagering legislation into one consolidated bill.

"Then it will be a take-it-or-leave-it situation. A lot of pari-mutuel issues picked to death would be kind of put together to make everyone love the package," Vogt said. "You can sometimes avoid all the little problems in this way," he said.

Of the special provision in the House bill, Vogt said he doesn't know if it is constitutional. Vogt said he has never seen a provision of this sort in legislative history.

Don North, aide to Attorney General Jim Smith, said today, "Everything the Legislature does is presumed to be valid and constitutional. This means when the Legislature passes a law and the effective date of the law arrives, the law is in full force until it is judicially determined to be otherwise," North said.

In a related matter, the Florida House today on a tie vote killed a proposed law that would have allowed minors 12 years old and older to attend horse races in the state.

Hattaway voted for the proposal, saying safeguards were built into the law to provide the children could only attend races if accompanied by parent or guardian.

Brantley voted against, saying the definition of guardian was not clear enough to give adequate safeguards to the children.

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# Philippines Boat Sinks: 14 Dead, 100 Missing

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) — Rescue boats searched today for more than 100 people missing in shark-infested waters where an oil tanker rammed and sank a luxury ship with more than 900 on board. At least 14 people were confirmed dead and about 825 passengers of the sunken luxury ship were plucked from the waters of Mindoro island, about 120 miles south of Manila. There had been confusion throughout the night about casualty figures and it was not known if the latest also would be changed.

There had been initial reports that the tanker had left the scene. Manuel Pineda, 51, a radio technician who was aboard the Don Juan, said the weather was clear and he was playing mahjong in the engineers' cabin when "suddenly we were hit."



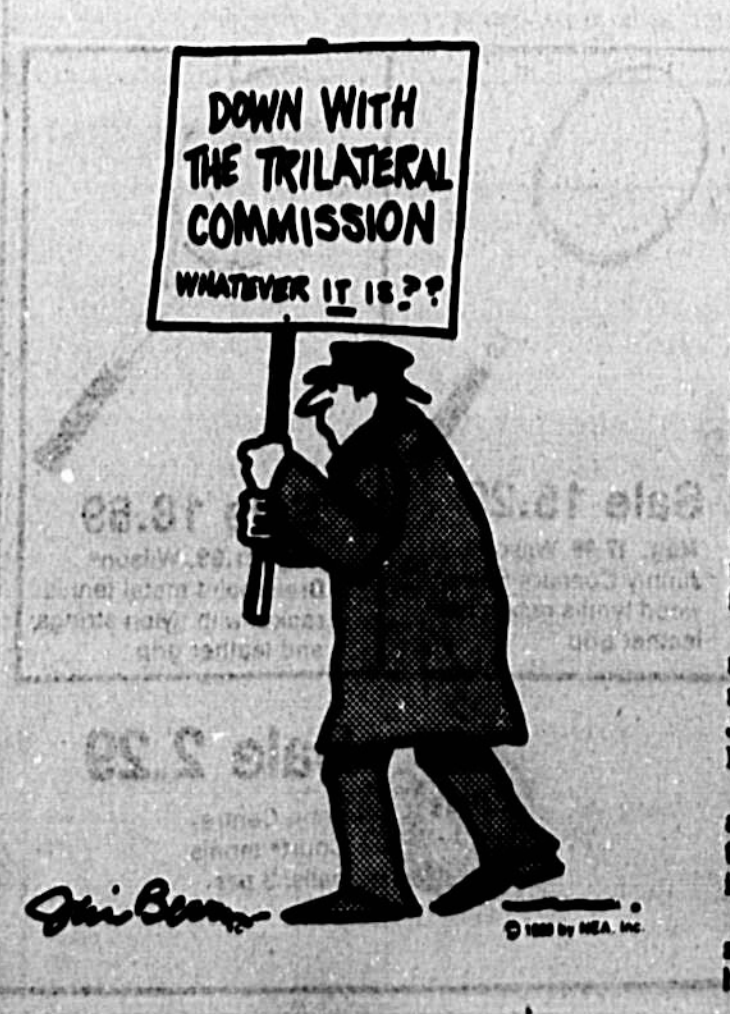

On The Fickle Allies

Face it, the situation is not one to inspire confidence in the future of the collective security of the democracies. The chaotic Mideast is seemingly hellbent on being the cockpit of a third world war.

And in this situation of escalating crisis, calls for allied solidarity are producing anything but. Instead of rallying to the cause we find ourselves wrangling with each other.

That, for memories in need of refreshing, was one of the great crises of the early postwar era. And as blunder followed blunder, it led to one of the great spectacles in the brief history of the United Nations...

Meanwhile, negotiations with the United States on financing of the projected Aswan High Dam, the great hope of Egypt's economic future, were foundering as Nasser became increasingly receptive to Soviet offers of assistance.

It all came to a violent head that October with a sudden Israeli pre-emptive strike against Egyptian forces in the Sinai, quickly followed by British-French landings at the Mediterranean mouth of the Suez Canal.

The United States responded initially, not with support of its allies but with intense pressure to compel their withdrawal. Suez, Washington maintained, was a flagrant use of force in violation of the U.N. Charter and a threat to world peace.

That it certainly was, and it happened to coincide with an equally serious threat to peace in Europe — the Hungarian Revolution.

Washington's response to Suez raised some questions at the time: Could it be because Britain and France, still recovering from the exhaustion of World War II, were more susceptible to U.S. pressure than was the Soviet superpower?

Questions never answered and now history, as is the Suez crisis, Britain and France did withdraw, peace did return to the Mideast for a time and the Atlantic alliance went on, but severely shaken.

Like a sillon or so other Americans, Jim Cherry of Atlanta watches the television smash "Dallas," and he despises the scoundrel J.R. Ewing just as much as the next person.

School Board member Robert G. Feather expressed concern this week that he was unable to help a transfer to allow the students to participate in sports at school, despite the fact that as a board member he spends taxpayers' money to provide athletic facilities and equipment.

Feather couldn't do anything because a regulation of the Florida High School Activities Association (FHSA) forbids sports participation by transfer students for one year. The independent FHSA is the governing body for high school athletics in the state and the school board can't override its edicts.

FHSA rules provide that a transfer student can attain sports eligibility if a waiver is initiated by the receiving principal and signed by the former principal, superintendent of schools or school board chairman. This policy is to avoid recruitment of student athletes.

The issue came to light several months ago when three students in Seminole County obtained transfers and then requested permission to participate in sports.

The principals involved, school superintendent and school board chairman all refused to sign waivers so the youths would be eligible to play.

Vesco Jury Cover-Up?

WASHINGTON — Senate investigators are probing the possibility that the Carter administration tried to cover up White House involvement in the Robert Vesco influence-buying scandal.

In private, two-hour sessions, the investigators heard detailed charges of an official cover-up from Ralph E. Ulmer, former federal grand juror who looked into the Vesco case.

The Justice Department announced earlier this month that the grand jury had decided against returning any indictments in the case. But Ulmer told the Senate investigators that vital evidence had been withheld from the jury.

In fact, he charged that the grand jury was repeatedly sidetracked whenever it sought to chase down leads that might have proved embarrassing to Jimmy Carter and his Georgia pals.

The Senate investigators have chronicled Ulmer's charges in a stinging, secret report to Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah. Here are some of the details of the juror's charges:

"The grand juror said he had to 'fight, fight, fight' for 17 days to get critical transcripts of the proceedings released for the grand jury's review.

"There was a concerted effort by the Department of Justice to prevent the grand jury from obtaining a quorum at many occasions, he said, 'jurers were given conflicting times as to when the jury was meeting.'

"One of the early prosecutors, Thomas H. Henderson Jr., chief of the public integrity section, 'tried to lead the jury by the nose,' Ulmer told the Senate probers.

Anderson: The Chic Candidate

John Anderson should run as an independent. He owes it to the constituency he has now created. For him to quit now would be like denying the constituency its quick, its dry white wine, its latest Italian movie.

Anderson's campaign for the presidency has become essentially an item of decoration for which a considerable market obviously exists.

People support political candidates for a variety of reasons. Sometimes a candidate appeals to a particular concrete interest: he supports legislation beloved of the labor unions or desired by business, he will pour big bucks into education or urban renewal, he supports the military, he has a persuasive view of the world, and so forth.

But the Anderson candidacy has an entirely different character. Anderson appeals to people who wish to be marked off as different, as possessing superior taste. At bottom, their main desire is to differentiate themselves from the masses — from those who vote for the ordinary, or as it is now frequently put, the "dreary" candidates.

Supporting a candidate like Anderson is more a stylistic than a political decision. It's the drinking an expensive dry white wine or wearing jeans and expensive leather boots. That Anderson button makes a statement. It says 'I'm a person who possesses uncommonly refined taste.'

You may have noticed that practically all of the Gene McCarthy bumper-stickers in 1968 were attached to foreign cars. McCarthy voters would not do anything so vulgar as drive a Ford or a Chevrolet. I doubt that one pick-up truck in the entire country had a McCarthy bumper-sticker.

John Anderson's current status as the chic decorative candidate has been fatally signaled by the fact that he is being notably supported by Stewart Mott, the General Motors heir who dabbles in a few causes and candidates. Mott has spent a fortune in politics, and has never backed a winner.

Anderson did not I think start out to be a political bono boy for Mott's sake.

For the three students who caused so much controversy was his acknowledgment that he had allowed the students to be granted waivers under similar circumstances.

But his efforts were frustrated when the school board attorney gave the opinion that the board could not direct the principals, superintendent or board chairman to sign waivers.

The school board was helpless in the matter. "If a parent appeals to you, and you turn him down," Feather told Layer, "he ought to have the right to appeal to the school board."

"He does," Layer said. "No he doesn't. Not and get any satisfaction," Feather said.

It was pointed out that Layer is an elected superintendent, not appointed by the school board.

"It makes no difference," Layer said. "Well you don't have to answer to five (board members), replied board member Pat Telson. "That's right, thank goodness," Layer answered back.

Charles Veverka Jr., was the lead-off witness at the state Tuesday in the trial of five white former Dade County policemen charged in the beating death of 33-year-old Arthur McChaffie.

The state was expected to complete direct testimony from Veverka, who was granted immunity, today with cross examination by the five defense attorneys to follow.

MIAMI (UPI) — With pretrial motions, jury selection and opening arguments finally over, the "gold-plumbing caper" trial of suspended Dade County School Superintendent Johnny Jones is under way.

Testimony was scheduled to begin today as the government tries to show that Jones tried to use \$9,000 in school funds to pay for deluxe plumbing fixtures — some of them gold plated — for a vacation home near Naples, Fla.

GAINSVILLE, Fla. (UPI) — Inmate lawyers and unidentified guards from two of the state's maximum-security prisons have denounced a pattern of brutality at Florida prisons, according to testimony before the House Corrections Committee.

Excerpts of the testimony, given last week in Tallahassee, were published Tuesday by Florida Times-Union, Florida newspaper.

John Middleton, chief brutality litigator for the Florida Institutional Legal Services' Prison Project, quoted one guard as saying, "Inmate beatings occur there at the Florida State Prison at least on a weekly basis."

By United Press International Idaho health officials today entered the emptied Indian reservation town of Fort Hall to test for contamination from a chemical plant fire, possibly started by an arsonist, that drove out some 700 residents.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — Employees at the nuclear weapons research facility in Livermore, Calif., have a skin-cancer rate five times higher than other area residents, a study shows.

Prober Solves Ship Crash By Looking Beneath Waves

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — A Coast Guard investigator really got to the bottom of the Jan. 28 collision of two ships in Tampa Bay by digging around the floor of the channel where the incident occurred.

Rear Adm. Norman C. Venzie, commander of the 2nd Coast Guard District, Tuesday said his investigation of the collision between the Coast Guard buoy tender Blackthorn and the oil tanker Capricorn buoy tender Blackthorn and the oil tanker Capricorn was "very complex."

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Graham Urges Mass Transit For Central Florida

ORLANDO, Fla. (UPI) — Gov. Bob Graham wants community leaders to provide an alternative to automobile travel in central Florida within three years.

He also urged community leaders in a closed-door meeting on Monday to gear up for a futuristic mass transit plan, like monorails. He says such transportation is needed to deal with the tremendous growth projected for the area.

Graham met informally with representatives of the expressway authority, banks, major employers and tourist attractions.

He suggested that the community leaders learn a lesson from Dade County's 20-year-old mass-transit system, like monorails.

"What I'm concerned with is having some alternative to the automobile within the next 36 months in conjunction with the opening of the airport and completion of other projects," Graham said after the meeting.

"Central Florida will be one of the major growth areas of the United States in the next 20 years, as it has been during the previous decade," he said. "This growth is going to put pressure on all public services, especially on transportation, and particularly on public transportation."

The governor said his call for better transportation within 36 months meant expanded bus service on a regional scale. He wants long-range planning as well.

"It is equally important we begin to plan for a monorail or a higher form of technology for the future," Graham said.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Retired people are in a "Catch-22" situation: They will receive an increase in their Social Security payments, but only because inflation is climbing at such a rate it's eating away the money they get now.

The average retired person's Social Security pension will rise \$41 a month beginning with July checks.

The increase — from the present average of \$288 a month to \$329 — results automatically from the rise in consumer prices for January, February and March, announced Tuesday by the Labor Department.

In 1972, Congress ordered Social Security benefits each year be tied to the change in the cost of living during the first quarter.

As a result, 14.3 percent increases will be made July checks. The 35 million recipients of Social Security, pensions plus 4 million aged, blind and disabled Americans who receive Supplemental Security Income.

The Labor Department said consumer prices jumped 1.4 percent in March, the same as January and February. That works out to an 18.1 percent annual inflation rate.

Based on the March inflation figures, goods and materials that cost \$100 in 1967 now cost \$239.80.

WICHITA, Kan. (UPI) — Police early today patrolled predominantly black areas where they had clashed with young rioters who allegedly smashed windshields, set cars ablaze and threw bricks at passers-by. At least 27 people were injured and five people arrested.

Police said the rioters were "a bunch of hotheads." A clergyman who witnessed the melee said police "acted like barbarians."

**Japan Eager, But U.S. Cautious About New Canal**

TOKYO (UPI) — Panama's ambitious plan to build a new sea-level canal will probably stall at least until after the U.S. presidential election this fall.

Panamanian President Aristides Royo flew home from Japan with a token pledge of support for the mammoth project, one of the biggest engineering undertakings in history.

A joint communiqué at the end of Royo's visit said Japan will wait for results of consultations between Panama and other interested parties, notably the United States, "in view of the gigantic scale of the project."

Prime Minister Masayoshi Ohira told Royo that Japan was ready to cooperate as one of the principal users of the existing canal. But Ohira stopped short of a full-fledged commitment to the project, according to government sources.

Plans for a new, bigger canal have been promoted by Sen. Mike Gravel, an Alaska Democrat, and Shigeo Nagano, influential business leader and president of the Japan Chamber of Commerce and Industry.

But Nagano says he has found other American

lawmakers cool to the idea because of the up-coming presidential election in November.

A Japanese survey proposed construction of a canal 656 feet wide and more than 98 feet deep to link the Pacific and Atlantic oceans through Lake Gatun, a man-made lake created near the old canal when it was built.

The old lock-gate canal, opened to shipping in 1914, accommodates vessels only up to 40,000-deadweight tons. Tunneling its 56-mile length takes an average of eight hours. A new 61-mile waterway could take vessels in the 500,000-deadweight ton class from one ocean to the other in five to six hours.

The construction is estimated to cost well over \$10 billion, including \$8.3 billion for dredging alone, according to business sources.

Japanese industrialists and businessmen say they are eager to see the new canal built because it promises a stable supply of oil from Mexico and Venezuela, iron ore from Brazil, and other important imports such as coal and grain from the U.S. East Coast and Midwest.

Nagano admitted ecological problems would result from mixing marine life from both sides.

**Confederacy Lives At Home For Women**

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI) — The defeated Confederacy lives on in the flesh in Richmond, where a rambling structure houses 41 daughters of Southern soldiers who are spending their waning days as wards of the state and charity.

"The Home for Confederate Women, billed as a "permanent memorial to the women of the South," houses memories of a time gone by.

Mae Slaughter, one of the residents, recalls that her aged grandfather was shot by Yankee troops near the charred ruins of his Virginia home. It is a tale passed down like some oral heirloom that the 85-year-old woman retells with neither anger nor pride.

"Just before the war was over, the Yankees came through," she said. "They came to my grandmother early one morning and demanded something to eat. She said there was nothing but some corn mush.

"Then Grandpa Lazarus came up with his two black men and he wanted to kill them but the Yankees shot all three of them. Then they shot all the livestock and took it with them."

The youngest of 12 children, she remembers her father telling her how he ran away to the war when he was 18. He was put to work scavenging food for the starving rebel troops.

"He was too young to fight but he did break his arm driving some horses," she said.

The city of Richmond also remembers.

On tree-lined Monument Avenue, which runs through the heart of the downtown Victorian neighborhoods, imposing bronze statues of some of the Confederacy's favorite sons on horseback ride on and on, lest anyone forget.

They are all there poised on pedestals against the sky: Generals Stonewall Jackson, Robert E. Lee and J.E.B. Stuart. The statues of Jackson and Stuart point forward north because those two died in action, while the solemn figure of Lee, who returned home to the shattered Old Dominion, looks south.

As the capital of the short-lived nation, Richmond is also the international headquarters of the United Daughters of the Confederacy and the site of the Museum of the Confederacy.

A spokeswoman for the UDC said the organization, far from fading into some dusty archives, is flourishing. The Virginia chapter alone grew by 400 women last year and the international membership — garnered from 34 states, Paris and Mexico City — is thriving at 38,000.

"We're getting the young people interested," she said. "I guess it's because the War Between the States is the most interesting war we've ever had. And with states' rights so important today, it makes it even more appealing."

The UDC regards itself as a service organization, doing patriotic, historic and charitable work.

Some of the charitable work involves visiting the hushed Confederate daughters' home, a two-story structure with its wings separated by porticoed sun rooms.

Inside, one woman watches a soap opera with a nurse while another sits by herself in a wheelchair, cradling a baby doll as she stares out a long bay window at nothing.

"We have a game room, but most of them are too feeble to use it now," said Elsie Lacombe, superintendent of the home.

She said all of the residents, who range in age from 80 to 180, must be either the daughters of Virginia soldiers "or their fathers must have at least fought in Virginia soil."

The home is stocked with hundreds of antiques, Persian rugs, and, of course, portraits. Every dim wall of the structure is graced with stern portraits of benefactors and Confederate heroes.

In the foyer, an oil painting of an unsmiling Lee hangs above a small lamp. "We keep that light burning 24 hours a day," said Mrs. Lacombe. "We call it the eternal light."

But there is fear among the old women that the light may be extinguished before their time is up. State funding for the home, set at \$125,000 per year, is due to run out in 1982.

In addition, there are problems with a shrinking endowment. "We can't keep going on the interest, anymore," said one official of the home. "We've had to dip into the capital. If you saw someone willing to give us \$5 million, we'd be glad to give going."

A spokeswoman for the Virginia Welfare Department predicted that the state funding will continue, however.

During its 1968 session, the Virginia General Assembly voted overwhelmingly to continue the small pensions it has paid to the widows and maiden daughters of Confederate veterans for nearly a century. The monthly stipends come to \$80 each for one state's two living widows and \$24 apiece for the 353 daughters.

The UDC spokeswoman said there are about 2,000 Confederate daughters still alive in the United States. Estimates vary, but there is believed to be less than 80 widows remaining.

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# World's Journalists Fail In Group's First Press Run

DAKAR, Senegal (UPI) — Journalists from different parts of the world were unable to agree on UNESCO's (the United Nations Education Scientific and Cultural Organization) new order of information that the bureaucrats and special interests who have so far monopolized that debate.

The nearest thing to a consensus in a symposium that brought together newsmen from the East, West and Third World and other interested people was the view there probably isn't any alternative to government control or influence in many parts of the world for the foreseeable future.

In three days of discussion, the journalists had no better luck defining, objectively or new order than several UNESCO-sponsored groups and decided they had better not try. They weren't

even able to agree if there is a difference between news and information and, if so, where the line might be.

News organizations in the West have feared the UNESCO movement might lead to restricted access to news events elsewhere in the world. The Dakar discussions were sponsored by the University Laval of Quebec and Cesti, a Canadian-supported regional journalism college in Senegal with students from nine African countries.

Regional cooperation and solidarity among the Third World, which some forces see as a way to overcome Western domination of world news and information, suffered some blows.

The Nigerian head of the still-not-off-the-ground Pan African News Agency, who had been advertised as a key figure in the symposium,

backed out at the last moment. He apparently was worried that squabbles among participating nations would be aired if he took part.

And a Czech from the Soviet Bloc's International Union of Journalists brought along textbooks his group has written for Third World journalists, but finally admitted he didn't know if they would suit the needs of their intended users.

Harry Meyers, an executive of the Caribbean News Agency Association that links nine independent states and British territories, had hard words for the Non-Aligned news pool envisioned by some Third World nations as a replacement for developing nations and providing little coverage aimed at them in return. An African news agency head said he uses only about 10 percent of the stories he gets daily from two Western agencies.

A representative of Tanjug, communist

Yugoslavia's agency, got laughs for gamely trying to insist his organization is not state-controlled.

Italian Robert Savio heads an organization called Interpress that transmits some Non-Aligned pool copy and is seeking a role as a Third World news agency. He criticized news that is reported and written to be lively and interesting, and thus likely to be published by more papers. He maintained instead that news should be disseminated in a national context. But he offered no view on whether that kind of context would make it easier to suppress news than if marketability was the main criterion.

## South Bronx Residents Upset By Paul's Movie

THERE GOES THE NEIGHBORHOOD: Residents of New York's South Bronx — an urban scar that resembles London after the blitz — don't like Paul Newman. He's making a movie there — one called "Fort Apache, the Bronx" — and they say it defames the neighborhood. So they've gone to court in a bid to shut off the cameras. They told Judge Thomas Sincich the movie is racist, depicting blacks and Hispanics as savage and degenerate. But Sincich — himself a black — branded the charges "speculative connotation and ideological innuendo." He refused an injunction — said halting the movie would violate the First Amendment right to freedom of expression and cost the producer, Time-Life Films, \$2.5 million.

**BIG BREAK:** Nineteen years ago, an aspiring singer named Luciano Pavarotti entered a talent contest in Modena, Italy, and won. It was fortuitous because it gave the world one of the Metropolitan Opera's great tenors — but Pavarotti hasn't forgotten his big break. He's holding a contest of his own now — one that will bring 40 candidates, chosen by such stars as Joan Sutherland, to the Opera company of Philadelphia where the best of them will win a shot at the big time. Pavarotti, "the contest will be super severe, because this is a worldwide talent show." Meanwhile, Pavarotti has a "super severe" test of his own. He's trying to lose 100 pounds for a possible movie role.

**SLOWING DOWN:** Billy Graham says he's not about to stop preaching, but doctors' orders may force retirement as head of the evangelical organization that bears his name. The 61-year-old evangelist has been told he has

several potentially serious medical problems, so he's slowing down, but he told reporters Monday at his Montreal, N.C., offices, "No, I'll never retire from preaching." Graham says in the interest of health, he runs two miles a day — that, "My dogs go with me. They run but now they sit in the middle since they found out I was not going anywhere." He's not going anywhere this year either. He's canceled an evangelical conference in Thailand and a crusade in Canada.

**MINE SHAFT MYSTERY:** It isn't often a sheriff's deputy finds himself in the middle of a "Nancy Drew" story, but Raymond Trotta did on Monday morning. He says he was flagged down by a group of "visibly shaken" teenagers who reported "an eerie light" at an abandoned iron mine near Brewster, N.Y. Trotta went to investigate and found the mile-long mine shaft lined with "a long row of candles as far as the eye could see." With visions of Satanic rites dancing in his head, Trotta followed them deep into the mine. He found nothing, but says, "It was the spookiest and most bizarre thing I ever saw." The sheriff's office still is investigating — says it's taking the mystery "very seriously."

## Singer Froman Dead At 62

COLUMBIA, Mo. (UPI) — Jane Froman, a big band singer of the '30s whose life story was told in the movie "With a Song in My Heart," died Tuesday at her home. She was 62.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete, a spokesman for Parker's Funeral Chapel in Columbia said.

Miss Froman was placed under contract by Paul Whiteman in the 1930s and sang on radio with the Lenzie Haydon band, which included Benny Goodman and the Dorsey brothers.

She later played on Broadway in "Artists and Models" and the "Ziegfeld Follies" of 1933.

The soprano was seriously injured in an airplane crash in 1943 while en route to Europe with a USO troupe. A series of operations followed.

Ruth LaHouse and her husband, Edmund, retired 12 years ago, "stayed idle for a couple of years," then moved to Chuluota.

The house is wired for lights, bathroom fixtures were made from ceramics Mrs. LaHouse did herself, and pictures on the wall contain photos of her family. "I keep adding to it," she said.

They have refused many offers to buy the three-story frame house. "I want to landscape it and put it on a bigger base for a lawn," she added.

Mrs. LaHouse likes to cook all kinds of dishes, but she naturally prefers dishes that are quick and easy to prepare after coming in from work. Her husband often cooks the meat, she said, and "we always have company." A daughter and grandchild are presently visiting from Connecticut.

Knead the dough and form into rolls. Dip each into melted butter and then into sugar mixture. Place on greased cookie sheet. Let rise again then bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes or until done.

**BAKED CARAMEL CORN**

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup corn syrup
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 3 quarts popped corn

In a 1 1/2 quart sauce pan, melt butter or margarine and stir in brown sugar, syrup and salt. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Boil over medium heat without stirring for 5 minutes.

Remove from heat, stir in vanilla and soda. In a large bowl gradually pour hot syrup over popped corn, mixing well. Turn coated corn into a buttered 13x9x2 inch baking pan. Bake uncovered in 300 degree oven for 30 minutes, stirring the corn after 15 minutes. Remove from oven and let cool completely in pan. Loosen popcorn with spatula and break into pieces. Store in tightly covered container to keep it fresh and crisp.

## Convenience Foods: Luxury Or Economy?

Convenience foods account for nearly 50 percent of all foods sold nationally in chain retail grocery stores, according to a study released by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) in 1979. The USDA study defined a convenience food as any partially or completely prepared food that could be prepared in the home. The percentage would have been much greater if every food that provides some convenience would have been considered.

Ingredient foods such as mayonnaise, margarine, and flour provide considerable convenience, but were not included in the study since they generally are not prepared in the home. These products are taken for granted as "staples" or "ingredients" today, but were considered convenience foods to shoppers years ago. If today's consumer prepared basic ingredients in the home, however, the true convenience of these products would be appreciated.

Convenience foods are not always more expensive than equivalent home-prepared foods, as many believe. The USDA study reported: "When the costs for food, fuel, and preparation time (at the minimum wage) were combined for 41 convenience products, nearly half were less expensive than their home version. About 60 percent of the convenience products were less expensive when the cost of preparation time was based on a cook's wage."

The choice between convenience or home-prepared convenience foods must be made by each individual depending on the time and money available. Clearly, the time factor is very important to the increasing number of women employed outside the home who do not have time for lengthy meal preparation on workdays.

When purchasing convenience foods, careful shoppers ask the following questions: Are the ingredients of the same high quality I would use myself? What is the nutrition content? Is this the kind of food we enjoy? How many ingredients would I have to purchase to prepare a similar food? Convenience foods are not popular only with working women. According to the USDA, young men living alone spent the highest proportion of their after-school budget on prepared products. A 1979 Seventeen magazine food survey estimates that 65 percent of teenage girls buy and prepare food for family meals, and 80 percent of these inexperienced cooks use convenience foods in meal preparation. Another industry survey estimates that 23 percent of the meals in multi-person households are eaten alone, and are often convenience foods.

Experienced shoppers occasionally enjoy the convenience of partially or fully prepared foods — create "convenience foods" of their own. They take advantage of weekly supermarket specials, prepared favorite recipes in quantity, then package and freeze small servings for later use. They also personalize purchased convenience foods by adding one or more additional ingredients such as chicken or tuna to macaroni and cheese dinner.

Consumers must individually evaluate the value judgment that must be made by each individual based on their nutrition needs, convenience, cost, time, and individual preferences. Few consumers want to return to a life without convenience foods; most simply want to make wise selections among the many types available on workdays.

# Spiced Up Potato Dishes Help Reduce Salt Intake

Certainly no single substance can be attributed to the development of high blood pressure (hypertension) and stroke. However, many scientists now feel that excess sodium in the diet can contribute to the onset or aggravation of these very common disorders. Many of us have become aware of the health implications of our daily diets and are trying to eat more wisely by cutting back on the use of table salt, as well as eliminating heavily salted foods.

Herbs and spices can so greatly enhance a good flavor that additional salt is unnecessary. It is important, of course, to begin with a nutritious, low-sodium product, such as the immensely flavorful Idaho potato, which is in such plentiful supply on the market now. The taste of mealy potatoes produces a nourishing, satisfying sensation.

one-third cup unsalted butter or margarine  
1 small clove garlic, minced  
1/4 teaspoon hot pepper sauce  
1/4 teaspoon dried dill  
1/4 teaspoon lemon rind  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
2 large Idaho potatoes

In small saucepan, melt butter over medium heat. Add garlic, hot pepper sauce, dill, lemon rind and lemon juice; mix well. Cut potatoes in half lengthwise; deeply score cut surfaces being careful not to pierce the skin. Place in shallow baking pan. Brush with butter mixture. Bake in a 425 degree F. oven 1 hour, brushing with butter mixture every 15 minutes. Place potatoes under broiler; brush with remaining butter mixture. Broil until golden brown. Yield: 6 servings.

**IDAHO SPUD 'N CELERY FRY**  
3 large Idaho potatoes  
2 tablespoons vegetable oil  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/4 teaspoon curry powder  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 1/2 cups diagonally sliced celery  
1/2 cup lemon juice

Pare potatoes; slice crosswise into 1/4-inch slices. (Should have 4 cups slices.) Heat oil in large skillet. Add potatoes, onion, curry and pepper; toss potatoes in oil to coat evenly. Cover; cook over medium heat 5 minutes. Uncover; add celery. Cook over medium-high heat 15 minutes turning with a spatula until potatoes are tender. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Yield: 6 servings.

**WESTERN MINISTRONE**  
1/2 pound round of beef  
1/2 package frozen country-style dinner fries  
3 tablespoons oil  
1 cup chopped onions  
1 teaspoon crushed garlic  
1 teaspoon basil, crumbled  
2 (10 1/2 ounce) cans condensed beef broth  
1 soup can water  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 cups celery  
1 (1 pound) can stewed tomatoes  
2 tablespoons chopped parsley  
Grated parmesan or romano cheese  
Cut beef in thin strips. Brown potatoes in oil in Dutch oven. Remove potatoes and set aside. Brown beef in oil remaining in pan. Add onions, garlic and basil. Add broth water and salt. 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# Canned Tuna Fine Fare For Prime Time

There's a new spirit, among over-40ers. Among over 50ers, too. And if the proliferation of ads, articles, and broadcast programs hasn't spelled it out loud and clear, a most interesting magazine, which bloomed recently, is being totally devoted to the fuller appreciation of life, liberty, and the pursuit of fitness during one's "Prime Time," the name they've given to mid-life years.

Many experts are agreed that any regimen designed to improve one's outlook and state of well-being — at any age and certainly in mid-life — has to start at the table.

Dr. Henry Seibell, Jr., Professor of Public Health Nutrition at Columbia University, says, "Diet is one of the most important factors in determining how long an individual lives. We like to say in public health that, while a good diet can't guarantee that you will be in good health, you can't be in the best of health unless you live on a good diet."

A good diet, such as the Prudent Diet, is high in proteins, vitamins and minerals, low in fats (especially saturated fats), and moderate in carbohydrates. One of the staples of the American diet, canned tuna packed either in vegetable oil or water, can go a long way toward providing the prime time set with interesting, delicious, satisfying and easy meals, in any home situation, from breakfast through late night snack.

Canned tuna, a truly contemporary food, is widely advocated for healthful, lower cholesterol, lower calorie eating. Along with its complete protein, it's a source of B-vitamins, as well as important minerals like iodine, phosphorus, fluorine and selenium. And because it has little connective tissue, it's easy to digest.

The following ideas have been expressed before — but they are better off with several light but nourishing meals — a day rather than three heaves.

1. Prime time-aged people (and older people, as well) are better off with several light but nourishing meals — a day rather than three heaves.

2. Flanging taste buds — it happens to everyone Beyond A Certain Age — need a repertoire of extra-tasty, nutritious protein and other foods, with a wide variety of vegetables and fruits.

3. Past mid-life, it's essential to cut down on quantity of food (not quality) and on calories — and, at the same time, increase intake of complete protein. (Apparently, when middle-aged and older people cut down on food, they cut down on foods high in protein. Current research indicates the greatest need in their diets is for complete protein.)

For the most part, it is recognized that many prime-timers might eat better if there were a lesser degree of involvement in the kitchen. The tuna recipes, below, were developed for ease in preparation, either with small appliances, such as the almost indispensable toaster-oven, or conventional range. They clearly demonstrate how simple it can be to put together appetizing, wholesome meals and snacks.

**TOASTY TUNA SANDWICH-BUN**  
1 can (6 1/2 or 7 ounces) tuna, in vegetable oil or water, drained and flaked  
1 1/2 cups chopped vegetables (zucchini, carrots, celery, parsley, leftover vegetables, etc.)  
2 tablespoons low calorie mayonnaise  
2 tablespoons low fat yogurt  
2 teaspoons lemon juice  
1/2 teaspoon dried dill  
1/2 teaspoon Tabasco pepper sauce  
3 Vienna-type rolls

In a medium size bowl, combine tuna, vegetables, mayonnaise, yogurt, lemon juice, dill, Tabasco sauce; mix well. Cut a thin slice off tops of rolls. Remove most of the soft centers and spoon tuna mixture into roll. Bake in a 350 degree F. oven 15 to 20 minutes or until mixture is heated through. Cover rolls with tops; serve hot. If desired, serve with additional Tabasco sauce. Yield: 3 servings.

**TUNA-VEGETABLE PILAF**  
1 can (6 1/2 or 7 ounces) tuna in vegetable oil or water  
2 tablespoons polyunsaturated margarine  
1 cup fresh green beans, cut in 2-inch lengths  
1/2 cup, each, coarsely chopped onion and carrots  
1/4 pound mushrooms, sliced  
1 cup diced fresh tomato (about 1 medium)  
1 cup minced fresh parsley  
1 cup uncooked brown rice  
2 tablespoons chopped walnuts

Drain tuna of excess liquid; heat polyunsaturated margarine in large skillet. Add green beans; saute 8 minutes. Add onion, carrots and mushrooms; cook, stirring, for 5 minutes. Add tomato, parsley and tuna; heat through. Cook rice according to package directions; toss with walnuts. Spoon rice onto a serving platter. Spoon tuna mixture over rice. Yield: 2 to 3 servings.

**SPAGHETTI AL D'INGREDIENTI**  
3 tablespoons olive or salad oil, divided  
1 clove garlic, crushed or minced  
1 cup sliced mushrooms  
1/2 cup diced red or green pepper  
1 1/2 cups fresh broccoli flowerets and chopped stems  
1 can (6 1/2 or 7 ounces) tuna, in vegetable oil or water, drained  
1 egg, beaten  
1/2 cup grated, Parmesan cheese, divided

In a medium skillet, heat 2 tablespoons olive oil, saute garlic, mushrooms and red pepper until tender. Add broccoli and tuna, heat through. Cook spaghetti according to package directions; drain. Immediately return spaghetti to saucepot. All at once, add egg mixture, tuna and 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese; toss well. Mix in remaining 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese. Serve immediately topped with remaining 1/4 cup Parmesan cheese. Yield: 2 servings.

**KNAP SNACK CRUNCHIES**  
1/2 cup peanut butter  
1/2 cup honey or corn syrup  
1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
3 cups quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked  
1/2 cup sunflower nuts  
1/2 cup raisins

Heat oven to 350 degrees F. Combine peanut butter, honey, brown sugar and butter in 3-qt. saucepan. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until well blended; remove from heat. Add oats and sunflower nuts; mix well. Spread mixture evenly into ungreased large shallow baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 15 to 20 minutes, stirring occasionally, until lightly browned. Stir in raisins. Spread onto ungreased cookie sheet or aluminum foil; cool thoroughly. Break into bite-size pieces. Makes about 7 1/2 cups crunch.

Variation: Substitute 1/2 cup chopped peanuts for sunflower nuts.

## A Deft Hand Mark Of Good Chinese Cook

A deft hand with vegetables is the mark of a good Chinese cook. Since fuel was often scarce, the Chinese long ago learned not to overcook foods, especially vegetables. And Americans who enjoy Chinese cooking are getting the hang of keeping vegetables crisply crunchy.

You do not need special equipment for stir-frying foods although it does help.

Most important is to cut ingredients into small pieces of even sizes and to cook them for only a few minutes in very little hot oil, stirring constantly.

Add seasonings and a little broth at the very end. Serve immediately to avoid overcooking.

An easy Chinese dish is this chicken and celery with sliced scallions, bean sprouts and ground ginger.

**CHINESE CHICKEN AND CELERY**

3 whole chicken breasts, skinned and boned  
3 tablespoons cornstarch  
teaspoon ground black pepper  
7 teaspoons soy sauce  
5 tablespoons salad oil, divided  
6 cups thinly sliced Florida celery  
2 cups thinly sliced carrots  
1 cup thinly sliced scallions (green onions)  
1 chicken bouillon cube  
1/2 cup boiling water  
1 (1-pound) can bean sprouts, undrained  
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

Cut chicken breasts into 1/2-inch chunks. Place in medium bowl. Sprinkle with 1 teaspoon cornstarch, black pepper and 1 teaspoon soy sauce. Toss to coat chicken completely.

In very large skillet or wok, heat 3 tablespoons oil until hot. Add chicken, a few pieces at a time. Brown on all sides. Remove and set aside.

Add remaining 2 tablespoons oil. Heat until hot. Add celery, carrot and scallion. Sauté for 5 minutes.

Dissolve bouillon cube in boiling water. Add to skillet along with bean sprouts. Cook and stir, scraping dripping from bottom of skillet, for 1 minute.

Blend 2 tablespoons plus 2 teaspoons cornstarch with ginger and 2 tablespoons (5 teaspoons) soy sauce. Stir in a little of hot liquid from skillet. Then pour blend into skillet. Cook and stir until mixture boils and thickens.

Return chicken to skillet. Simmer, covered, for 5 minutes. Serve with cooked rice, if desired.

This kitchen-tested recipe makes 6 servings.

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## Windows On The World: Feast For Eyes, Tastebuds

Perched atop tall buildings, many a restaurant, today, beguiles diners with handsome, wrap-around vistas. But New York's own showplace, Windows on the World, offers what may very well be the most spectacular views of any dining mecca in the whole universe.

One hundred and seven stories above the World Trade Center's lobby, less than a minute by elevator, all of the Metropolitan area within a fifty-mile radius is literally and figuratively at your feet.

On a clear night, even the most jaded world travelers are visually moved when gazing on that incredible scene for the first time — the glowing tower of the Empire State Building far below... New York harbor's welcome lady, the Statue of Liberty with gleaming beacon, like a delicate figurine from these heights... small aircraft flitting by like toys... the East and the Hudson Rivers, beautiful beyond words with their diamond studded necklaces of famous bridges... New Jersey, Governor's Island, Staten Island and, yes, the Bronx and Brooklyn, too... It's a panorama that stuns the viewer "like some watcher of the skies — when a new planet swims into his ken..."

The 107th floor — all understated, muted elegance — is a series of restaurants rather than one. And the fare is international-contemporary — with much emphasis on American dishes.

In mid-afternoon, the exciting Hors d'Oeuvre (earlier it's

the lunchtime Grill Room) stars a rotation of chefs from different lands, preparing tantalizing tidbits from their country's repertoire in full view of guests. Afternoon tea is also served. In the evening, diners have a choice of feasting in the intimate Cellar in the Sky, where there is a set meal with five specially selected wines (the menu changes frequently) — or in the multi-level Main Dining Room.

Since Americans are always looking for different ways to serve this popular food, both of these recipes have been adapted from Windows on the World's own preparations for easy translation in your kitchen.

- TURKEY TONNATO**
- 1 can (6 1/2 or 7 ounces) tuna, drained and flaked
  - 1 can (2 ounces) anchovies, drained and chopped
  - one-third cup olive oil
  - 3 tablespoons capers, divided
  - 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
  - 2 tablespoons light cream
  - 1 clove garlic, crushed
  - 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice
  - 12 slices cooked turkey roll
  - 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
  - 1 lemon, thinly sliced
- In container of electric blender; combine tuna, anchovies, oil, 1 tablespoon capers, vinegar, cream, garlic and lemon

juice; process until smooth. Stir in remaining 2 tablespoons capers; cover; chill. To serve, arrange turkey slices on a platter, spoon Tonnato sauce over turkey. Sprinkle with parsley and garnish with lemon slices, as well as additional capers, if desired. Yield: 6 servings.

- TUSCAN WHITE BEANS AND TUNA**
- 2 cups dry, white Great Northern beans
  - 1/4 cup olive oil
  - 1/4 cup wine vinegar
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 2 cans (6 1/2 or 7 ounces) solid white meat tuna, drained of excess liquid, flaked
  - one-third cup sliced black olives
  - 1/4 cup finely sliced scallions
  - Chopped parsley to garnish
- Rinse and cook beans according to package directions or for 1 hour and 20 minutes in boiling salted water until just tender. Drain and cool. In small skillet hot oil; saute garlic until golden. Remove from heat; cool. Stir in vinegar, salt and pepper. In medium bowl combine beans, tuna, olives and scallions; add oil and vinegar mixture; toss lightly. Cover. Chill in refrigerator several hours. Garnish with chopped parsley before serving. Yield: 12 appetizer servings or 6 to 8 main dish servings.

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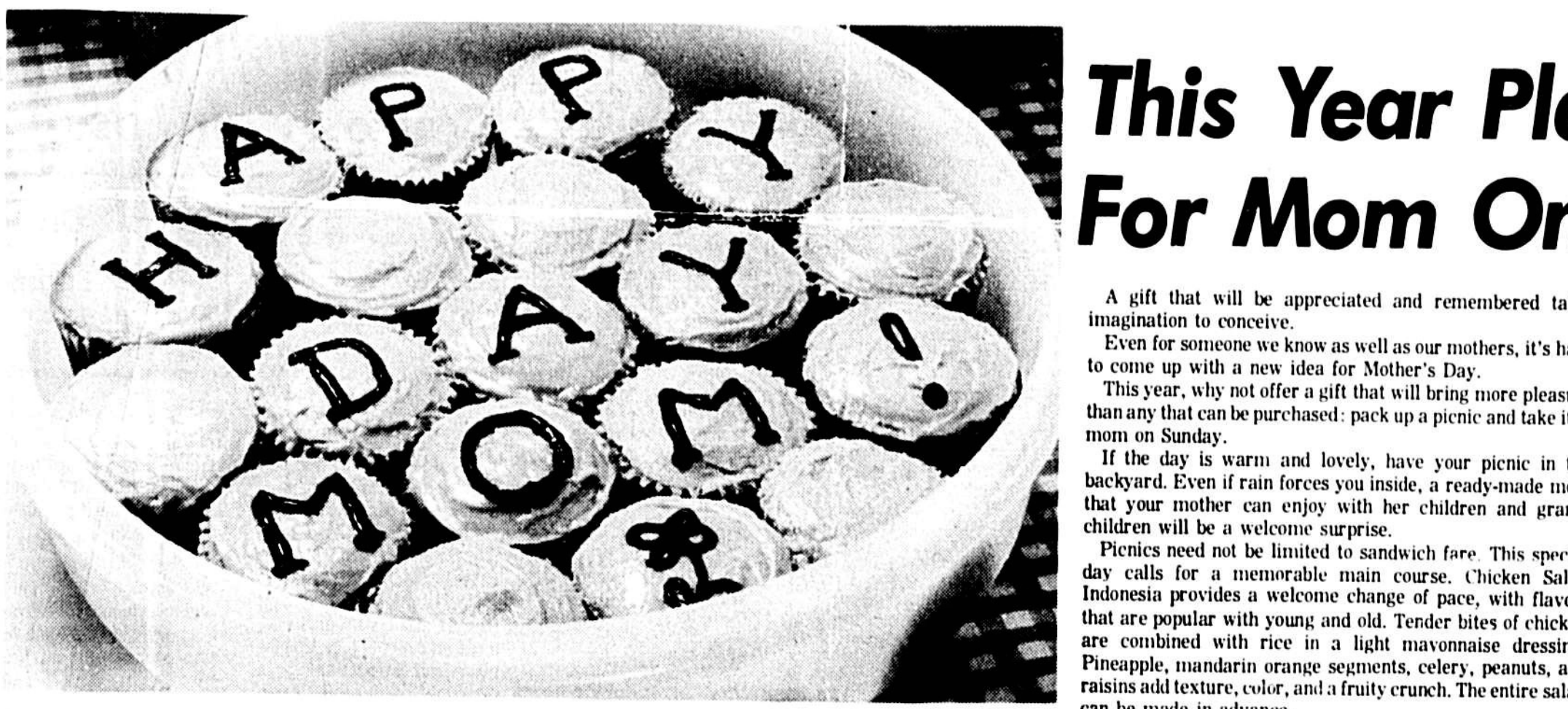

- CHICKEN SALAD INDONESIA**
- 2 to 3 tablespoons cider vinegar
  - 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
  - 1/4 cup mayonnaise
  - 2 1/2 cups cooked, chilled chicken
  - 2 cups cooked rice
  - 1 cup chunk pineapple, drained
  - 1 cup mandarin orange sections, drained
  - 1 cup sliced celery
  - 1/2 cup salted peanuts
  - 1/2 cup raisins
  - Lettuce leaves
- In large bowl combine vinegar, oil and mayonnaise. Add remaining ingredients except lettuce leaves. Toss until all ingredients are well coated. Cover. Refrigerate until well chilled, about 4 hours or overnight. Serve on bed of lettuce leaves.
- Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

- MOTHER'S DAY PUNCH**
- 2 1/2 cups cold water
  - 1 can (6 ounces) frozen concentrated orange juice, undiluted
  - 1 can (6 ounces) frozen concentrated grapefruit juice, undiluted
  - 1 can (6 ounces) pineapple juice, chilled
  - 1 can (19 1/2 ounces) apricot nectar
  - 1 bottle (24 ounces) ginger ale, chilled
  - Fresh whole strawberries
- Place water in pitcher. Just before serving, add concentrated orange juice and grapefruit juice, pineapple juice and apricot nectar; mix well. Stir in ginger ale. Garnish with whole strawberries. Yield: 2 quarts.

- MOM'S DAY CUPCAKES**
- 1 1/2 cups unsifted all-purpose flour
  - 1 teaspoon baking powder
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
  - 1/4 cup butter or margarine
  - 1 and one-third cups firmly packed dark brown sugar
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 2 eggs, room temperature
  - 1/4 cup milk
  - Caramel Frosting (below)
  - Decorating gel
- Line twenty 2 1/2-inch muffin pan cups with fluted paper liners or grease and flour pans; set aside. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and baking soda. In large mixing bowl, beat butter until creamy. Gradually add sugar and vanilla, beat until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Add flour mixture alternately with milk, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Scrape bowl frequently. Fill prepared cups two-thirds full. Bake in a 350 degree F. oven 20 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool on wire racks. Frost with Caramel Frosting. Decorate with cake decorating gel, if desired. Yield: 20 to 22 cupcakes.

- CARAMEL FROSTING**
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
  - 1 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed
  - one-third cup light cream
  - 2 cups unsifted confectioners' sugar
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- In small saucepan, melt butter. Add brown sugar, stirring until smooth. Bring to boiling over low heat. Boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Stir in cream. Return just to boiling over low heat. Remove from heat. Add vanilla to bottom of saucepan feels lukewarm. With electric mixer at medium speed or with a wooden spoon, beat in confectioners' sugar until frosting is thick and of a spreadable consistency. Stir in vanilla and cinnamon.

- HAM AND CHEESE FRITTERS**  
(Makes 24 Fritters)
- 1 cup flour
  - 1 teaspoon baking powder
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 2 eggs
  - 1/2 cup milk
  - 1 teaspoon safflower oil
  - 1 1/4 cups 1/2-inch cubes, cooked ham
  - 3/4 cup 1/2-inch cubes, Swiss cheese
  - 1/4 cup sliced green onion
  - 2 to 3 cups safflower oil
- Measure flour, baking powder, salt, eggs, milk and 1 teaspoon oil into medium sized bowl. Beat with whip or rotary beater until smooth. Add ham, cheese and onion. Drop by rounded tablespoons into 1/2-inch deep hot (375 degrees F.) safflower oil. Cook until golden brown, turning once. Drain on paper towels.
- This is an excellent recipe for leftover ham.

- EGG SALAD SANDWICHES**  
(6 sandwiches)
- 10 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
  - 1/2 cup bottled creamy French dressing
  - 1/2 cup shredded carrots (about 2)
  - 1/2 cup chopped celery
  - 2 green onions and tops, thinly sliced
  - 1/4 teaspoon salt
  - 6 Kaiser rolls or hard rolls
  - Mayonnaise or softened butter
  - Lettuce leaves
  - 6 thin slices tomato
  - 12 thin slices cucumber
- Combine eggs, dressing, carrots, celery, onions and salt. Cut rolls in half. With a fork, hollow out center of both halves of rolls, leaving a 1/2-inch shell. Spread rolls with mayonnaise. Spoon about 1/4 cup egg salad mixture into each roll half. Top salad in 6 roll halves with lettuce, a tomato slice and 2 cucumber slices. Close sandwiches.
- To hard-cook, put eggs in single layer in saucepan. Add enough tap water to come at least 1 inch above eggs. Cover and quickly bring just to boiling. Turn off heat. If necessary, remove pan from burner to prevent further boiling. Let eggs stand in the hot water 15 to 17 minutes for large eggs. (Adjust time up or down by about 3 minutes for over eggs or put them in smaller.) Immediately run cold water over eggs or put them in ice water until completely cooled. To remove shell, crackle it by tapping gently all over. Roll egg between hands to loosen shell, then peel, starting at large end. Hold egg under running cold water or dip in bowl of water to help ease off shell.

**ORANGE CHEESE CHOCOLATE BAR**  
 1 pound Danish Natural Cream Cheese with Orange  
 2 ounces semi-sweet chocolate  
 Nuts (optional)  
 Bakery or packaged cookies  
 Form Danish Natural Cream Cheese with Orange into a bar shape, spread top and sides evenly with a spatula. Cream cheese is easier to handle if well chilled. Shave chocolate, using a potato peeler and cover exposed areas with the shaved pieces. Garnish with nuts, if desired. Have butter knives handy so that diners can spread cheese and chocolate onto sugar cookies or graham crackers.

**SPICY RIPE OLIVES**  
 1 can California pitted ripe olives  
 one-third cup sliced celery  
 1 tablespoon minced parsley  
 1 fresh garlic clove, split in half  
 2 teaspoons chili powder  
 1 bay leaf  
 1/4 teaspoon fresh ground pepper  
 1 tablespoon salad oil  
 Drain liquid from a can of pitted ripe olives; mix with the remaining ingredients. Pour over olives in can. Cover tightly and chill 2 to 3 days.

**BAKED STUFFED TOMATOES**  
 12 medium tomatoes  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1 teaspoon flavor enhancer  
 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs  
 1/2 cup chopped parsley  
 1 tablespoon dried leaf basil  
 2 cloves garlic, crushed  
 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted  
 Preheat oven to 375 degrees.  
 Cut tops from each tomato. Scoop out seeds. Sprinkle insides with salt and flavor enhancer.  
 In bowl, mix together bread crumbs, parsley, basil, garlic and butter.  
 Fill each tomato with crumb mixture.  
 Place in lightly greased baking dish. Bake 25 minutes. This kitchen-tested recipe makes 12 servings.

**ORANGE-NUT BRAN BREAD**  
 1 cup milk  
 1 1/2 cups 40 percent bran flakes  
 1 1/2 cups unbleached all-purpose flour  
 1 cup sugar  
 1 tablespoon double-acting baking powder  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1 tablespoon grated orange rind  
 1 egg, well beaten  
 1/4 cup shortening, melted  
 1/3rd cup orange juice  
 1/4 cup chopped pecans  
 1/4 cup raisins (optional)  
 Four milk over cereal in a bowl; set aside. Mix flour with sugar, baking powder and salt; add orange rind. Add egg, shortening and orange juice to softened cereal. Add flour mixture; stir just to moisten all flour. Fold in pecans and raisins. Pour into greased 9x5-inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 60 minutes or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan 10 minutes. Remove from pan and finish cooling on rack.  
 Note: For easier slicing and mellowing of flavors, store bread overnight wrapped in wax paper, plastic wrap or aluminum foil.

**WHOLE PINEAPPLE WITH RUM ICE CREAM**  
 1 large whole pineapple  
 2 tablespoons sugar  
 1 quart vanilla ice cream  
 1/4 cup Bacardi dark rum  
 Cut off pineapple top about 2 inches down from base of green fronds. Wrap top in foil and freeze.  
 Cut around rind with sharp knife, being careful not to pierce shell. Remove pieces of pineapple as you progress. Continue to cut out fruit until shell is hollow. Refrigerate shell.  
 Chop about 1 cup of fruit. Place in small bowl. Add sugar. Soften ice cream. When soft but not melted, add cup of chopped, sugared pineapple.  
 Stir in rum. Spoon into pineapple shell. Cover with plastic wrap and place in the freezer about 15 minutes before serving. Replace pineapple top. To serve, scoop out ice cream with large spoon.  
 The kitchen-tested recipe makes 4 servings.

**STRAWBERRY HONEY JAM**  
 2 cups prepared fruit (about 1 qt. fully ripe strawberries)  
 2 cups (1 1/2 lb.) sugar  
 1 cup honey  
 1 cup water  
 1 box fruit pectin  
 First, prepare the fruit. Stem and thoroughly crush, one layer at a time, about 1 quart strawberries. Measure 2 cups into large bowl or pan.  
 Then make the jam. Thoroughly mix sugar and honey into fruit; let stand 10 minutes. Mix water and fruit pectin in small saucepan. Bring to a full boil and boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Stir into fruit. Continue stirring 3 minutes. (A few sugar crystals will remain.) Ladle quickly into scalded containers. Cover at once with tight lids. Let stand at room temperature 24 hours; then store in freezer. Small amounts may be covered and stored in refrigerator up to 3 weeks. Makes about 4 1/2 cups or about 6 (8 fl. oz.) containers.

**CRUNCH-TOPPED YOGURT PUDDING**  
 2 cups quick or old-fashioned oats, uncooked  
 Two-thirds cup firmly packed brown sugar  
 1/2 cup butter or margarine, melted  
 One-third cup unprocessed bran  
 One-third cup wheat germ  
 1 teaspoon cinnamon  
**Padding**  
 1 6-ounce carton (1 cup) plain or vanilla yogurt  
 1/2 cup milk  
 1 1/2-ounce package vanilla-flavor instant pudding and pie filling  
 1 cup heavy cream, whipped  
 For crunch topping, combine all ingredients. Mix well. Spread into 15x10x1/2-inch jelly-roll pan.  
 Bake in 350-degree preheated oven about 25 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool.  
 For pudding, combine yogurt, milk and pudding mix in small mixing bowl. Beat at low speed on electric mixer about 3 minutes.  
 Fold in whipped cream. Spoon into 4 to 6 dessert dishes. Chill.  
 To serve, sprinkle each serving with about 3 tablespoon crunch topping.  
 This kitchen-tested recipe makes 4 to 6 servings.  
**NOTE:** Refrigerate remaining crunch topping in lightly covered container to serve over ice cream, yogurt, frozen yogurt or fruit, as desired.

 2 green onions, sliced  
 1/4 cup curry dressing  
 2 medium tomatoes, peeled and chopped  
 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped  
 2 slices crisply cooked bacon, crumbled  
 1/2 avocado, diced  
 Prepare peaches. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Set aside.  
 Line large individual salad bowls with broken romaine leaves.  
 Mix chicken and onion with enough dressing to moisten.  
 Arrange peach halves in center of lettuce. Top with mound of chicken salad. Arrange remaining ingredients around peaches.  
 Serve cold. Pass extra curry dressing.  
 This kitchen-tested recipe makes 2 servings.

 1 to 2 tablespoons diced red onion  
**Footnote:** Or use 3/4 cup cold water; chill until slightly thickened.  
 Dissolve gelatin and salt in boiling water. Add vinegar and ice cubes. Stir until gelatin begins to thicken, about 3 to 5 minutes. Remove any unmelting ice. Fold in remaining ingredients. Pour into 4-cup mold or individual molds and chill until firm, about 3 hours. Unmold. (Or chill about 1 hour in a serving bowl.) Serve with crisp salad greens, if desired. Makes 3 1/2 cups or 6 or 7 servings.

## 'Harassed' Sanford Looks To Sen. Chiles

The city of Sanford has appealed to U.S. Sen. Lawton Chiles to find out why the U.S. Justice Department has resurrected a civil rights complaint settled by the city nearly three years ago.

City Commissioner John Morris said today Chiles has been contacted about the order from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) demanding completion of a detailed questionnaire concerning the settled complaint. LEAA is an agency of the justice department.

LEAA attorneys have warned the city that failure to complete the questionnaire could result in the city losing federal revenue sharing funds and future LEAA grants.

The questionnaire concerns a former police officer, John C. Moore, who has retired from the city force on a disability pension, and Tony Brooks, who is on the police department payroll but assigned to the Drug Enforcement Administration.

Morris said Chiles has responded to the city appeal by advising he has asked for an explanation from the justice department.

Morris said the city feels it is being harassed since the matter was settled in July 1977. At that time the city settled the issue with the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) by reinstating John Moore and Tony Brooks to police department posts.

## Anderson Makes It Official

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. John Anderson announced today he will run for president as an independent because Americans are disillusioned by the candidates running under Democratic and Republican banners.

Anderson, R-Ill., a one-time model conservative who became more liberal during his 20 years in Congress, said he is ending his campaign for the GOP nomination — but that he will remain in the Republican Party.

"America can no longer afford those who are more interested in perpetuating their political power than in perpetuating the ideal for which everyday Americans continue to strive," he told a news conference at the National Press Club.

"I have chosen, after careful deliberation, to pursue an independent course toward the presidency of the United States," said Anderson, and promised to return unused federal campaign subsidies from his GOP efforts to date.

## 3 Groups Want To Build Deltona Hospital

Three separate hospital groups are officially in a race to get permission to build a hospital in Deltona.

The requests may impinge on the future of the planned replacement facility for Seminole Memorial Hospital if a suit now being considered returns Volusia County to the jurisdiction of the Health Systems Agency of East Central Florida (HSA-ECF).

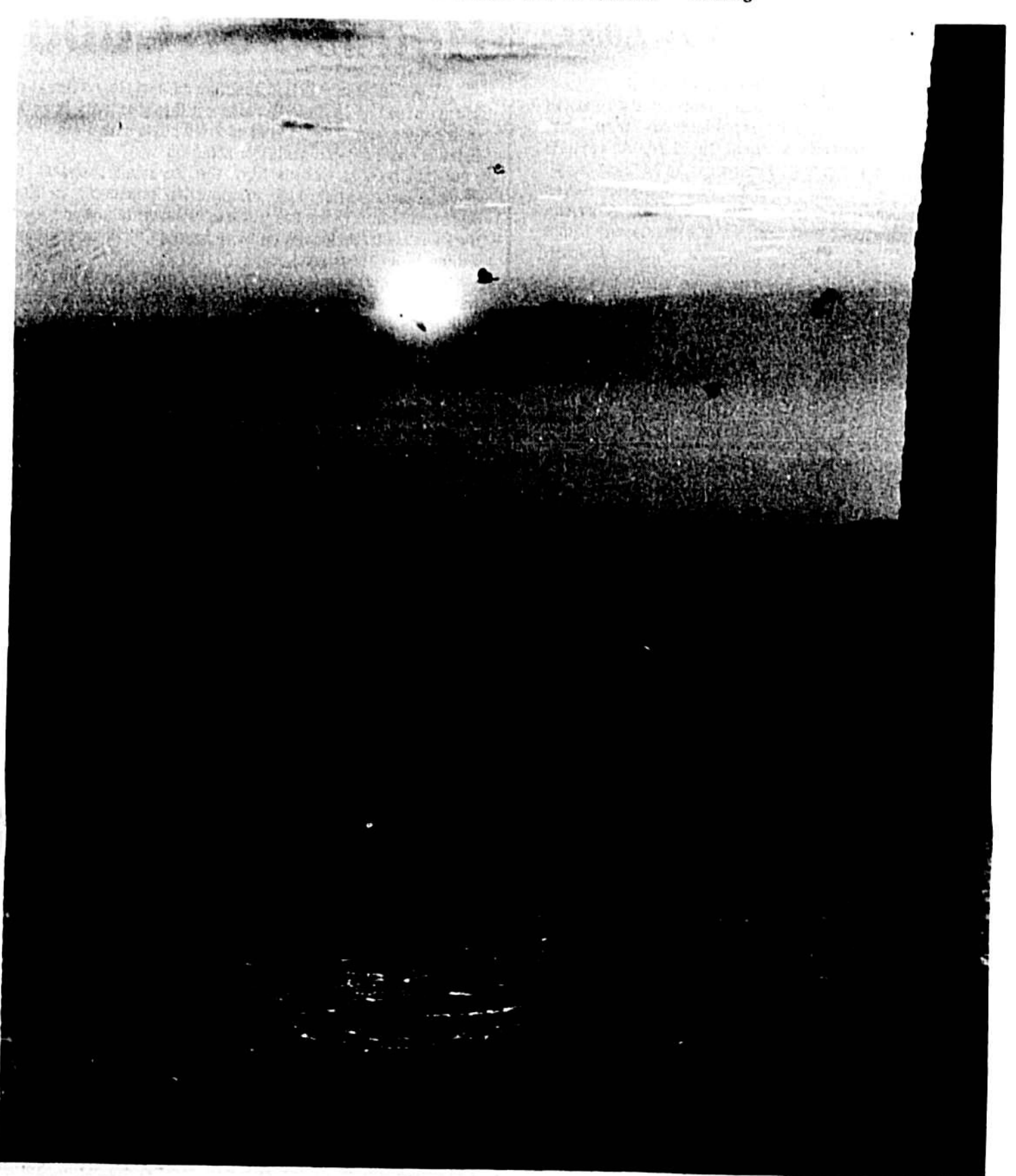
According to the Health Systems Agency of North East Florida (HSA-NEF), which currently has jurisdiction over hospital building requests in Volusia County, three groups have filed letters of intent with that agency. The letters of intent state that each of the groups will ask for the required Certificates of Need to build a hospital.

The groups are Gateway Medical Management Corp., Clearwater; Southern Health Services, Atlanta; and the West Volusia Hospital, Del-And, said Ron Floyd, director of the project review for HSA-NEF.

Volusia County currently has a surplus of a few hundred beds, Floyd said. "But perhaps they are not distributed right," he added.

He said the HSA probably would not begin considering the Certificate of Need request until July. The HSA-NEF board meets four times a year, he said, and has a meeting scheduled for tonight. The board cannot officially consider an application until that application is ruled complete by the state Office of Community Medical Facilities.

According to recent surveys, Keeling said, Seminole County needs about 51 more beds by 1984. But, she said, Florida Hospital-Alamonte is included in the Seminole County area and it may also have requests.

## Soviet Aid To Be Accepted

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Iran is considering an American family's proposal for an Iranian-American conference aimed at resolving the hostage crisis and intends to take up the Soviet bloc on its offer to help Iran counter U.S.-imposed economic sanctions.

Word on the proposed conference came today from Carl McAfee, attorney for Barbara and Kenneth Timms, mother and stepfather of 20-year-old American hostage Kevin Hermoning. McAfee said the Timms had proposed the conference in a letter given to Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh Wednesday night and now are awaiting the Iranian government's response.

The official Iranian radio made no mention of the letter or the Oak Creek, Wis., family and government departments were closed in mourning for a contemporary of Ayatollah Khomeini reported slain in neighboring Iraq. The attorney said the Timms were not engaged in any direct attempt to obtain the release of their son, the youngest of the hostages, or of all the 50 captives now in their 173rd day of captivity.

## Iran Considers Family's Plea For Conference

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, considered one of the Senate's leading "hawks," wants President Carter to wait a "long time" before imposing a blockade of the Persian Gulf or mining Iranian harbors.

Goldwater, R-Ariz., said Wednesday either move — considered the two most likely options if Carter resorts to military action in an attempt to free the hostages — would constitute an act of war.

He said he hopes Carter will "take a long, long time before committing an act of war at a time when we are not prepared for war. ... I don't want to see my country go to war until I'm sure we can win a war."

Goldwater was the Republican candidate for president in 1964. He did not elaborate on the significance of the conference amid international efforts directed at giving Iran a choice between the continued detention of the Americans or full-scale sanctions by U.S. allies.

Political analysts said an Iranian-American meeting, if attended by competent officials, had obvious advantages. Yet, they said, it was hard to guess at Iran's reaction. Only recently Iranians went on the march across the country to celebrate the diplomatic break with the United States.
