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Tentative Plans Are Accepted at Monday Night Conference Of Hotel Builders

Plan To Complete Building Jan. 1st.

Hulick Pleased With City And Believes It Has Big Future

Following a conference Monday night between officials of the Sanford Hotel-Realty Company and Howard Hulick, representing the firm of Hulick & Hulick, hotel builders, it was announced this morning that work on the new \$500,000 tourist hotel to be erected on the Inkefront, will be started by April 15.

Acceptance of the tentative draft of plans for the hotel and arrangements to have the final plans ready for the contractors within the next few weeks. In the meantime, it was stated, bids will be advertised for so that no time may be lost in beginning the construction of the building.

A contract, whose provisions guarantee the erection of the hotel was signed by Mr. Hulick this morning, the announcement said, thus insuring Sanford of the interest that is being shown by the hotel builders, whose connection with the project has been assured for the past six weeks.

In making the statement concerning the hotel, Mr. Hulick said that the work is to be rushed so that the hotel may be ready for occupancy by Jan. 1, 1926. Every phase of the work, he declared, will be pushed as fast as possible so that the promise of the Sanford Hotel-Realty Company of a tourist hotel at the beginning of the next winter season, will be fulfilled.

Sanford's new hotel will be four stories including a ground floor where will be located a barber shop, beauty parlors, billiard rooms in the front, with several quarters, boiler room etc., located in the rear. The building will be designed along Spanish and Moorish types of architecture.

The first floor above the ground floor will include the lobby, reception room, ladies' rest room, dining room, grill, ball room and other features. The third and fourth floors will be devoted to guest rooms. No expense will be spared in making the new hotel one of the finest in the state, Mr. Hulick declared. Such a hotel has long been the need of Sanford, he stated, and it will be the purpose of Hulick & Hulick to furnish that need.

Enthusiastic About Sanford Mr. Hulick is enthusiastic about Sanford. He believes that it has a future like of no other city in the state similarly situated. Asked what had prompted him most to interest himself and his firm in the building of a hotel here, Mr. Hulick declared that it was the enthusiasm and co-operation of Sanford citizens. This asset, he maintained, together with the natural advantages which this city has to offer, insures for it a bright future.

Sanford reminds me of St. Petersburg 12 or 14 years ago," Mr. Hulick said. At that time the "Sunshine City" was at a point where it was ready to break, it was at a point where it changed from a struggling town to a progressive city. Sanford is now ready to step from the town class and take its place as one of Florida's leading cities.

In addition to possessing all of the inducements that other Florida cities have to offer, Sanford, geographically speaking, is ideal Mr. Hulick reiterated.

Mr. Hulick arrived in Sanford Monday morning for his first visit since last night and spent Tuesday going over details in connection with the hotel. He plans to return within two weeks to take an active interest in beginning work on the hotel project.

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SCIENTIST OFF TO INVESTIGATE SARGASSO SEA

"Graveyard Of Atlantic" Will Be Subjected to Scrutiny at Battery of Photographers

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—The steamer Arcturus, former pleasure yacht now a zoological privateer, is at anchor yesterday off the Brooklyn water front, while Dr. William Beebe, youthful scientist and explorer, inspected the endless train of cameras, traps and cages being hoisted aboard.

Dr. Beebe supervised the final installation of equipment for the expedition departing for the mysterious oceanic region known as the Sargasso Sea tomorrow afternoon. Dr. Beebe was host to a score of friends aboard the vessel and also talked with Dr. Henry Fairfield Osborn, curator of the American Museum of Natural History. They discussed among other things the possibility of securing a live specimen of the giant sea-squid, a fighter of whales, known to exist in the Sargasso regions.

May Stop en Route
"We'll have to work hard to get everything aboard tomorrow," Dr. Beebe said, as he left the ship at dark. "We don't want to be late in starting out. We have to go over the charts, too. We may stop en route to the Sargasso, or we may stop en route."

The Sargasso Sea, which contains a vast growth of weeds that shift with oceanic currents, lies between Cuba and the Verde Islands, and has been called the "graveyard of the Atlantic" because so many sailing ships were caught in the weeds and lost there. Beneath the surface drift of seaweed the Sargasso Sea offers a treasure of marine plant and animal life which has been investigated with varying success by continental scientists.

The Arcturus, fitted out with glass observation panels in its sides and equipped with an elaborate array of devices for observations for photographing and capturing fish, birds and insects, and for gathering specimens of plant life, is claimed to be the largest and best equipped vessel for Sargasso exploration ever planned.

The expedition is financed by members of the New York Zoological Society, a group, the members of which include Henry D. Whitton, Harrison Williams, Marshall Field and Vincent Astor.

Artists to Record Scenes

In addition to Dr. Beebe, who has made important contributions in virtually all zoological fields the expedition will include Miss Isobel Cooper, scientific artist; William K. Gregory, vertebrate specialist; John Tee-Van, photographer; William Morris, and Dwight Franklin, fish preparator, and Jay Pearson, Hugh Raup and Serge Chayrkin.

The Arcturus is a 280 foot vessel. Its journey will be 13,000 miles.

"Senior Tree" Is Planted At State College For Women

TALLAHASSEE, Feb. 16.—One of the most beautiful customs of Florida State College, celebrated during the second semester each year is the planting of the Senior tree by members of the senior class assisted by their sophomore sisters.

The services this year were unusually impressive. A spot of the campus overlooking "Fraternity Row" was chosen for the planting of an oak tree and her each senior, dressed in her cap and gown, and escorted by her sophomore sister, dressed in contrasting white, assembled in the beauty of the moonlight to perform the rites of the tree planting.

Dr. Paul Finner, senior class president, spoke briefly on the significance of the occasion. Miss Julia Bilzer of New Smyrna then read an appropriate poem after which Miss Lucile Summer of Tampa, president of the senior class, spoke to members of her class, and to the sophomores, entrusting the latter with the care of the tree during the remainder of their stay on the campus. The response was given by Miss Cornelia Deifer of Ocala, president of the sophomore class.

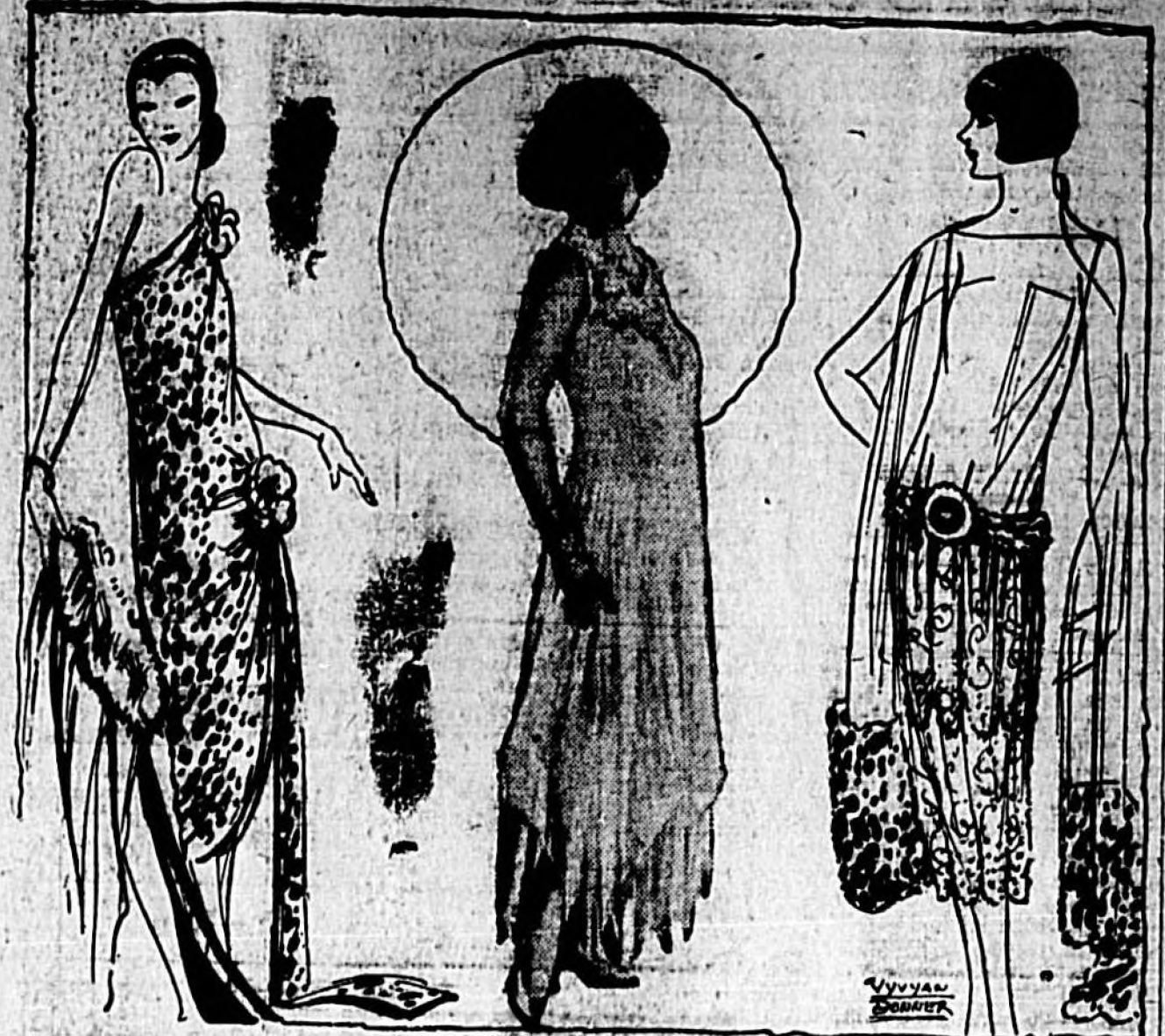

20,000 Visitors Go Through Jacksonville

JACKSONVILLE, Feb. 16.—Five thousand one hundred sixty-six automobiles bearing 20,541 persons crossed the St. Johns river bridge here, going south, during January, according to the monthly report of Frank Brown circuit court clerk. Among the number was the first car bearing an Alaska license tag ever officially recorded to have passed over the bridge. Georgia led the list with 566 cars in which were 2298 passengers. MAY BUILD IN PACIFIC ISLES PEACE CAPITAL

Pan-Pacific Union Will Get Palmyra Islands If U. S. Will Withdraw Sovereignty

HONOLULU, Feb. 16.—The Palmyra Islands, some 1,000 miles south of Hawaii will be decided by the Pan-Pacific union as a gift of the United States unless it withdraw sovereignty from them and recognize the isles as a neutral inviolate place of refuge for all persons who wish to confer on matters looking to the advancement of all interests common to the Pacific peoples, according to a pronouncement made by the owner, Fullard-Leo at a Pan-Pacific luncheon.

Alexander Hume Ford, director of the Pan-Pacific union, said that the offer will be taken under advisement by the union, and its decision as to acceptance will be reserved until the attitude of the state department at Washington is learned.

The islands were purchased outright several years ago from Judge Henry E. Cooper by Fullard-Leo, who was born in South Africa but now is an American citizen. It was his idea to provide some recognized spot in the Pacific, under the flag of no nation but under the protection of all where peace or war persons might meet in perfect freedom to discuss many matters of import to the Pacific peoples.

"This opens up a tremendous question that will have to be decided by the Pacific powers," said in announcement from the union. "Will they permit such an independent island in the Pacific?"

"For a quarter of a century there has been a movement on foot in Europe to create a world city, where a permanent parliament of the world would be held. Extensive plans of the world city have been sent to the union from Rome, with a statement that in the center of the Pacific alone would such a world capital be safe.

"The tentative offer of an independent principality to the Pan-Pacific union, to be under the control of no nation but its perpetual peace assured by the countries bordering on the Pacific, will doubtless cause world-wide comment, and possibly a line of international reasoning that may lead to the approval of the Fullard-Leo plan.

"It may be stated in passing that Palmyra is a part of Hawaii, a ward, in fact of the City of Honolulu. Any persons living in Palmyra may vote for officials of the city and county of Honolulu. The city might lose an outlying ward, but if the whole world be the gainer, she can afford to give her assistance."

ZODIAC IS BASE OF WRITING SAY ASTRONOMERS

Claims to Trace 20 Separate Languages To Common Origin In Heavenly Signs

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16.—A new ship was launched here recently for the seas of archaeology when Edward C. Getsinger, astronomer and searcher of antiquities, in a paper presented by him before the Argonaut Club, a philosophical body meeting in the University of Southern California, outlined the principles of "zodiacalphy" whereby, he asserted, he was able to trace the origin of 20 written languages to the signs of the zodiac.

His findings, Mr. Getsinger declared, proved that astronomy was a religious science familiar to the more intelligent classes of the ancient world upwards of 12,000 years ago; that the Bible, by means of zodiacalphy, now may be made to reveal many secrets, religious and historical, which hitherto have been locked books, that Israel has a history going back 6,500 years into a period when its high priests, as revealers of the mysteries of the heavens, were more advanced in some branches of astronomy than the star-gazers of today, and that there have been fundamental errors in the rendering by Egyptologists of some of the earliest inscriptions found in Egypt.

Zodiacal emblems, the speaker declared, became tribal or brotherhood symbols, and from that plane stepped into place as written characters, each representing an idea to become later, in altered form, the letters of the modern graphic systems.

The rescue shaft will be dynamited after Collins' body has been removed.

"It is a dangerous place and we do not want any one else trapped in there," said Mr. Carmichael, in charge of the excavation.

Collins was trapped by a falling boulder in Sand Cave at 10 o'clock Friday morning, Jan. 20. His plight was discovered 24 hours later and the men began a great fight against nature to rescue him.

Heart breaking disappointment the workers encountered repeatedly, as nature dumped one hazard after another into their paths.

Man's Perseverance Wins.
At last, however, man's perseverance won and the limestone roof of Sand Cave collapsed today under the weight of the miners and dropped them into the natural passage, between where Collins was trapped and a "squeeze" which trapped the natural passage some ten days ago. But their indomitable struggle to sink a shaft to save him was in vain.

Though his eyes sunken, Collins lay. The man the rescuers had worked so hard and so long to save had paid with his life for his search for the earth's underground treasures.

The continuously dripping water was not sufficient to keep Collins alive, the physicians said. His jaw was in a state of tension when found.

90 Per Cent Pure Gold
Carmichael, who had been in command of the heroic volunteers expressed his admiration of the unselfish and unceasing labor of the men "from the lowliest waterboy to the man who was about to receive his A. B. degree." He said this experience had strengthened his faith in human nature and that he had found the men were "99 per cent pure gold."

"After 20 odd years of construction work I have never seen a group of unorganized men do work so well and quickly," said Mr. Carmichael.

"These volunteer laborers, ranging from small boys to old men, have each given every ounce of his strength to his duty," he added.

"Out of the hundreds that volunteered and worked for me they were 99 per cent pure gold."

Investigation Ordered.

Jardine-Warren Action Later
The senate still has to act on two other cabinet nominations, those of William W. Jardine, of Kansas, to succeed Howard M. Gore, of West Virginia, as secretary of agriculture and Charles B. Warren, of Michigan to be attorney general. The nomination of Mr. Jardine was sent to the senate last Saturday along with that of Mr. Kellogg and has been referred to the agriculture committee. Administration leaders said there would be prompt action on it.

Mr. Warren's nomination still is before the judiciary committee, probably will give it further consideration later in the week. Administration leaders are still undecided whether it will be pressed at this session or held up for resubmission to the special session of the senate called for Mar. 4.

Standardization Takes Hold in Europe

BERLIN, Feb. 17.—Germany is struggling to establish a general standardization in industries, and the progress which has been made was reported upon recently at a meeting of industrialists.

Dr. F. Neuhaus, director general of the Hertz Works, who is chairman of the standardization committee, gave a survey of last year's efforts. Tools have been standardized to a considerable extent. One great forward step has been the standardization on pipes.

Industries in England, Holland, Austria and Switzerland are interested in extending the idea of standardization all over Europe, in the hope of reducing production costs.

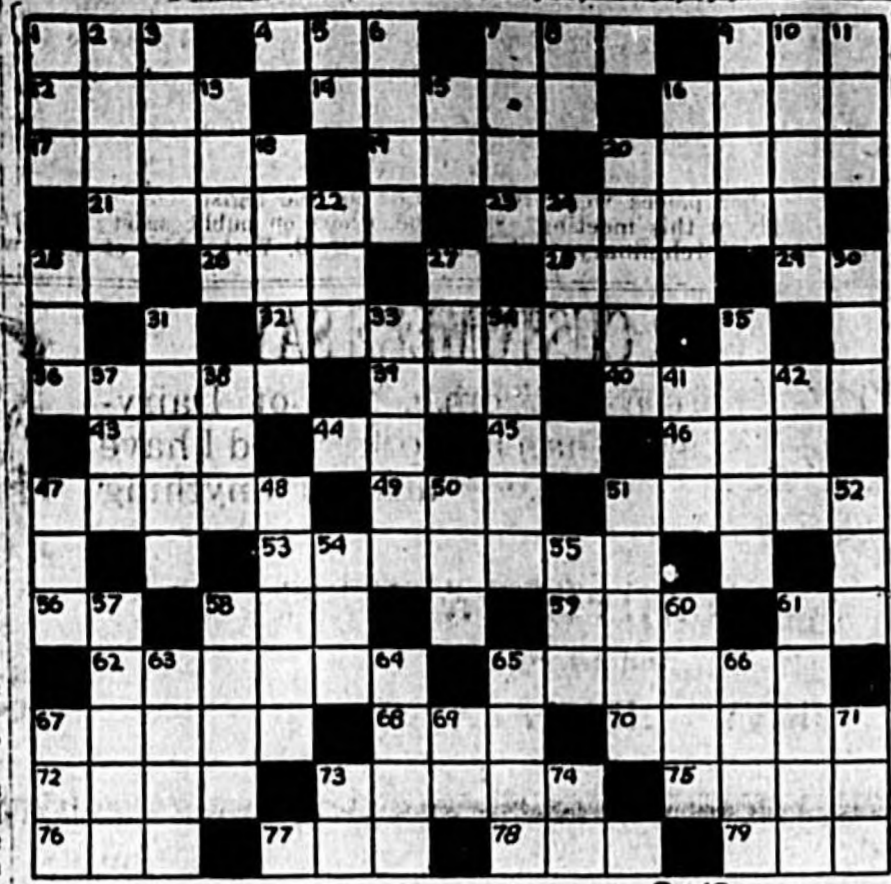

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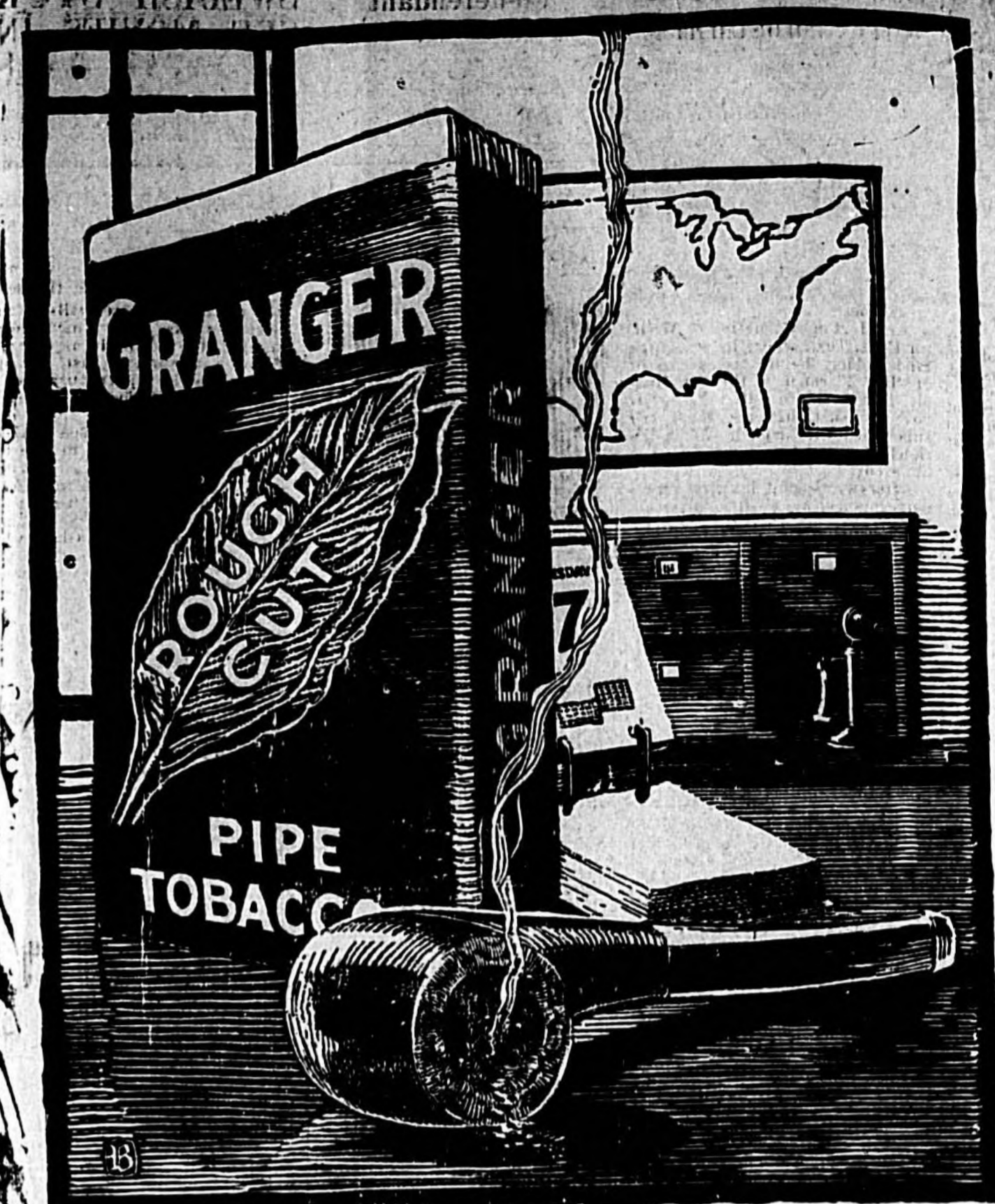

SWEDISH STICK SEE MOVIES IN HOSPITAL HALL

Pictures and Other Decorations Will Be Used in Effort to Relieve Bare Walls

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 16.—The hospital wards of Sweden will not longer be mere "sanitary deserts" and the eyes of patients will not be worried by staring at the desolate expanse of bare walls, after selected works of art have been placed in the hospitals as the result of a movement just getting under way, which is enthusiastically supported by doctors, patients and art experts.

The initiative has been taken by a number of patients in Moerby County Hospital who, having heard that there was a movement to place specimens of fine art in restaurants, wrote to a leading Stockholm paper and asked why the same could not be done for the hospital, where they were shut off from nature and forced to gaze continually at white walls. The suggestion led to inquiry among hospital experts who endorsed the idea of bringing art to hos-

pital patients. Some made certain interesting reservations. The pictures must be selected with great care both with reference to the colors used and the subjects depicted. This is particularly important, it was pointed out in the case of wards for fever patients, whose imaginations might be stimulated by certain types of painting. In general the total effect of subject, color and design should be cheerful, and at the same time soothing to the nerves. Certain hospitals in Sweden have already been decorated under this new plan, both with original works by Swedish artists and with printed reproductions of masterpieces.

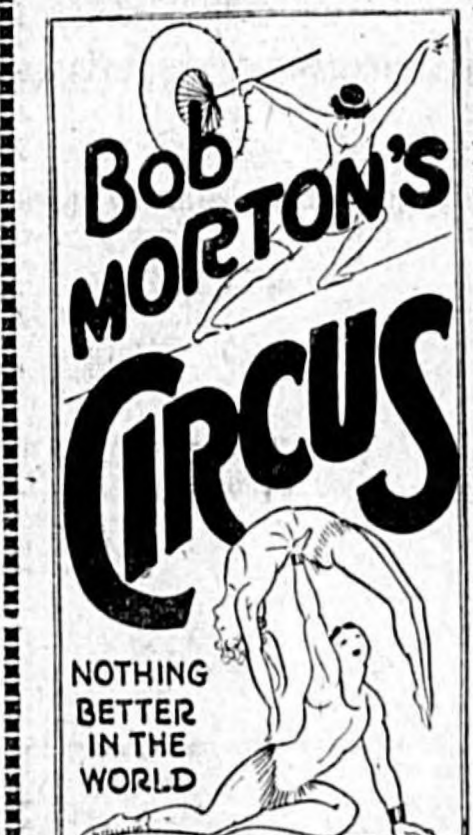
