"It's funny," he said.

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## NATION IN BRIEF

**Carter Relaxes While Preparing For Future Fights**

THURSDAY, Md. (UPI) — President Carter, relaxing today at Camp David, was expected to work on plans to make his White House more effective and efficient in time for the 1978 congressional elections and his own political future.

Carter appeared tired Friday as he and his wife Rosalynn left for the mountainous hideaway.

His last weekend at the retreat was full of work and tough talk. Aiding from his narrow victory in the Panama Canal treaty battle, Carter said he had to step up as he prepared for upcoming fights with Congress over tax reform, the Middle East arms package and other priority issues.

### Pilots Go On Strike

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI) — Northwest Airlines' more than 1,000 pilots went on strike today for the fourth time in nine years.

The strike started after contract talks broke down at the end of a 30-day cooling off period.

Roy Erickson, Northwest vice president for public relations, said last-minute talks broke down when the pilots' union would not consider postponing the strike and management would not continue bargaining unless the strike was postponed.

### Betty Ford On Purlough

RANCHO MIRAGE, Calif. (UPI) — Betty Ford was on a weekend furiously today from the Navy alcoholism and drug abuse center where she is under treatment, and may be permanently discharged within a week or two, says a spokesman.

The former first lady left the hospital in Long Beach Friday, and is due back there Monday from her home in the desert, about 100 miles to the east.

She had no plans for the weekend, said Bob Barrett, executive secretary to former President Gerald Ford.

### Gays Lose Legal Battle

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Justice Department said a high-level official to California to help investigate charges of bribery in the state legislature, part of the government's new public emphasis on prosecuting corruption that may involve hundreds of officials.

### We're Fraud Indictments

CHICAGO (UPI) — A woman graduate student has been indicted on 100 counts of theft and perjury for allegedly receiving more than \$115,000 in illegal welfare payments. It is the largest welfare fraud indictment in the history of Arizona. Ohio. 30, a graduate student in criminal justice at the University of Illinois Chicago Circle, was accused in a supposed indictment made public Friday of receiving \$115,000 between July 1973 and February 1978.

### Farm Prices Rising

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Agriculture Department officials who were striking farmers bitterly attack them earlier this year are leaving optimistic forecasts about the economic outlook on the farm.

The department Friday announced that raw farm product prices rose 4 percent in April, the seventh consecutive monthly increase. Prices were up 9 percent from a year ago and 50 percent since the last price revision last September, after a record 1977 harvest.

### Corruption Charges Probed

ST. PAUL, Minn. (UPI) — Gay rights supporters have lost a legal battle to delay the trial of a homosexual rights ordinance.

District Judge Edward Nichols Friday denied the request for a court injunction after an hour-long hearing.

Allegations for gays had asked the court to postpone until it was determined whether the case was timely. The city ordinance was passed in 1976.

now to act under a statute that allows the other relevant information to be disclosed by her home and handle the problem immediately.

"It is important that the facts are straight. They are employees' rights as well as citizens' rights," said Perinchief.

To Nelson's continued opposition to revising the written complaint, he responded that the person receiving the complaint should put it in writing.

"That's altristic and idealistic," replied Perinchief, adding that when he receives a vicious telephone call from a

complainant, he will not

answer it.

"He complained about me," Nelson said, "whether it is by telephone or however."

Nelson said: "When a citizen sees something he feels strongly enough about to pick up the telephone, we should thank him and look into it. And that doesn't violate state law, today," said Nelson to Perinchief.

"I am saying that when a complainant hears a complaint to the department head, such as a department head (such councilman is a department head), and the person receiving the complaint should put it in writing.

"You're fighting a bagage

## WORLD IN BRIEF

### Soviets Release Crew Of Korean Airliner

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Tass news agency said today two crewmen of a South Korean airliner forced down in the Soviet Union "fully admitted" they ignored attempts by Soviet fighters to order them to land after they entered Soviet airspace.

But it said the Soviet Presidium, acting on "humanitarian principles," had decided not to bring charges against them and would release them.

Western diplomatic sources said they would be freed later today.

### Two Koreas In Gunbattle

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) — South Korea says the first naval gunbattle in a year between the two Koreas could mark the beginning of an intensified sabotage campaign by the communists.

The South Korean navy speedboats sank a North Korean supply boat in the early morning clash Friday, killing two infiltrators, the Defense Ministry said in a statement. One South Korean sailor was killed and two were wounded.

The 10-minute sea battle 215 miles south of Seoul near Komodo Island was the first since May 14 last year, when an armed North Korean boat fired on a South Korean fishing boat in the same waters and abducted one fisherman.

### Plane Crash Kills 10

PAGO PAGO, American Samoa (UPI) — Two search helicopters failed Friday to sight any survivors amid the wreckage of a South Pacific Islands Airways plane that crashed on a hillside with 10 persons aboard.

The wreckage was sighted by another South Pacific Island Airways flight, Samoa News (Pago Pago) Publisher King said.

"One of the pilots said there were bodies scattered all over the place," King reported.

### Bank Robber Captured

LINZ, Austria (UPI) — A masked gunman who took 18 hostages and tried to rob a bank while shouting "this is a Red Brigades raid!" was shot and captured by police Saturday.

Police said the 21-year-old suspect, Peter Walzer, 51, seized 16 bank clerks and three customers inside the Allgemeine Sparkasse bank but released all nine women hostages a few hours before he was overwhelmed by police 13 hours after he started the robbery.

The freed hostages said he repeatedly described himself as a member of the Red Brigades but police said he had no such ties.

### Congress: Warplane Proposals

WASHINGTON (UPI) — In an action that was more cosmetic than compromise, President Carter sent Congress four separate Middle East warplane sale proposals — with a reminder that he still considers the sales a single unit.

The flurry of activity around the State Department and the White House Friday amounted to subtle change in the original proposal, announced on Feb. 14, that the administration would sell 200 warplanes to Israel, Egypt and Israel in one \$4.8 billion package.

## New Moro Letter Warns Of Bloodbath

ROME (UPI) — A new letter from Aldo More, turned up today and wired to party secretary (parties) Zecconi, for the resulting bloodbath for the country.

The once influential politician wrote that he was "not under any immediate coercion and I am not being dragged."

Hours before the letter was received in Rome, the government went on national television to renew its demand that More's refusal to negotiate with the guerrillas be kidnapped by the Red Brigades.

Police experts told the 10-page letter was written with a pen and seemed to tremble constantly but they judged it authentic.

The letter appeared five days after the Red Brigades

months threatened to "execute" More immediately if the government did not release 13 prisoners, including several murderers.

The government firmly rejected the demands.

"How can you argue that the state will be ruined if once more an innocent man is exchanged for other persons in prison or exile?" More wrote again.

"Up to this moment I must say that beyond accusations of a journalistic character, no proof has been given us of support — not ideological but practical support — of this criminal movement we have in Italy by any foreign state."

Police and troops Friday surrounded the party offices and communications houses and ship-to-shore searches in an effort to find the Red Brigades kidnappers.

## Singlaub: 'No Regrets'

ATLANTA (UPI) — Maj. Gen. John K. Singlaub, his career ended for twice criticizing Carter's defense policies, says he has "no regrets" for speaking out.

Singlaub, returning from a Pentagon dressing-down Friday, made from a military jet to a waiting car, agreed to his agreement to retire, which had been announced in Washington.

Later, he issued a brief statement saying "Regrettably, there has been considerable recent public discussion of my personal opposition to some of the policies of the current administration."

"As a result, I have concluded that the only honorable thing for me to do at this time is to retire from active Army service," said Singlaub. "I have requested that I be relieved from active duty on May 1, 1976, and placed on the retired list June 1, 1976, or as soon as practicable after that date."

He added, "I have stated several times before, I have no regrets for having spoken the truth as I perceived it. I do sincerely regret, however, any embarrassment that I may have caused the United States Army."

Singlaub, who had been scheduled to retire late next year, first got off the hook when he and Carter's planned withdrawal of troops from Vietnam could lead to war. Then came the decision to withdraw American forces from the Ogaden, a part of Ethiopia.

## Literacy Tests Spur Move To Get Tough On Teachers

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — There's no consensus on how it should be done, but it's a sure bet the 1976 Legislature will make changes in teacher certification laws with an eye on improving the quality of education in Florida's classrooms.

Spurred largely by public reaction to the high failure rate on the Functional Literacy Test, legislators have devoted many hours to figure out what they think will make those entering the profession work hard and focus on the job at hand.

A Senate version of the bill (ab 641), passed last week 35-3, offers a more lenient interpretation of requirements laid down on the recertification process for classroom veterans by making sure they are competent in basic teaching skills like keeping discipline and planning lessons.

The House Education Committee also moved last week on a bill getting tough with teachers. It requires newcomers to pass a

written test before receiving provisional certification for one year, and also makes local school districts set up evaluation teams to gauge teacher performance.

Like many legislators, Sen. Curtis Petersen partially blames educators for the poor showing by students on the literacy test administered to high school seniors last fall.

"If a child has a bad teacher now and then, he's going to be hurt later on," said Petersen, chairman of the Senate Education Committee.

He argues a joint conference committee will be able to iron out differences in the two bills so legislators can go ahead and enact the new certification law. And he's confident the result will be improved teachers.

"We're saying we're not going to accept recertification without something to tell us teachers are competent in the area they're

teaching," he said.

Petersen said the legislation is born of frustration by parents and politicians with the schools.

But, teacher's union lobbyist James Geiger is skeptical of the legislature's motives.

"Our basic feeling is that much of this is political rhetoric to say they're concerned with improving teachers," Geiger said.

He argues there's plenty of blame to go around for the problems in the schools today.

He said there are flaws in both bills, particularly the House version which sets up district evaluation teams. He said it will be costly and unwieldy because each of the 67 counties will have different criteria for judging teacher competence.

What the legislation really should address, he said, is revamping college courses at state schools of education to in-

sure what is being taught to new teachers is up to date.

He said teachers have long supported the internship or provisional certification concept for new teachers and are not opposed to reexamining once the validity of the recertification criteria is established.

## Let's Move On Heathrow

It's Lake Mary vs. Seminole County. Central Florida's version of David vs. Goliath.

And all because the Seminole County Commissioners have stubbornly refused to budge—or even compromise—on the Heathrow annexation controversy.

On July 3, 1977, the city of Lake Mary annexed the 1,000-acre tract in question on petition of Peacock Enterprises and others for a Heathrow Planned Unit Development and a proposed industrial park area on the west side of I-4.

Immediately after the annexation, the county filed a lawsuit against Lake Mary, insisting the annexation did not comply with state law because an "enclave" was created and the property was not contiguous to other city land.

Lake Mary contends differently, claiming that neither of those claims are accurate and that the property was plainly contiguous and that the word "enclave" is not defined in the law and has not been defined, legally, by the courts.

But Lake Mary, seeking to break the logjam, has, in good faith, offered to de-annex 40 acres of the tract, returning it to county jurisdiction and eliminating the enclave dispute affecting county residents in the Bassett Lake area.

The county commission will have nothing to do with it. And only the words voted against any compromise, opting instead for the question to go on the ballot.

The willingness of Lake Mary to compromise and get the planned development moving seems reasonable to us. And, frankly, the arguments presented by the commissioners against it in our estimate, just don't make good sense in the context of the area's long-term orderly growth.

Really point for the county commission opposition, though, is the vague and almost superfluous "enclave" issue, appears to be the question of services that would need to be provided in the developed area.

All of the negotiations is puzzling to us. What is the county's motive? Is it, as many suggest, merely a desire to keep the annexation and avoid a court challenge?

Please for Heathrow call for 4-325 housing units on 1,000 acres. The remainder of the 1,000 acres is earmarked for an industrial park and other development. This means growth for everyone. Is that what the commission is afraid of?

If, as was suggested this week by commissioners responding to Herald questions, the matter of services is the crux of their opposition, we suggest they check the original agreement with Paulucci.

In the 9½ pages negotiated with the county, the Paulucci interests agreed, among other things, to construct a combination police department station and/or fire stations to provide a uniformed security force, a water treatment facility, sewage disposal system, and all the other needs of a new community.

What more must be promised before the commission backs off?

When you stop to think about it, in the long run and in terms of long-range growth, does it really matter what is the precise definition of an "enclave"?

Does it really make a difference in the final analysis as to what is surrounded by what, or whom by whom—as long as proper and needed facilities and services are present?

We commend Commissioners John Alexander and Bob French who seem to be the only commissioners to recognize and grasp what really is involved and who seem to have the best interests of the entire area in mind.

We urge the entire commission to follow its realistic stance.

## Reason For Holocaust

WASHINGTON (UPI) — It is always more encouraging to see a disease prevented than cured to hear the affirmative used to measure the progress of medicine.

For this reason, despite sincere objections based on artistic merit or strict historical accuracy, NBC deserves credit for devoting nine and a half hours of television prime time to "Holocaust," the "documentary" that depicted the Nazi effort to murder all the Jews in Europe. What was shown last Sunday through "Nightline" was, to my way of thinking, the most moving of the U.S. population in 1975 was 20 years, which means more than 160 million Americans have no personal recollection of the period when the maniac Adolf Hitler set off the Nazi effort to murder all the Jews in Europe.

## Untruth-In-Banks Lending Is Uncovered

WASHINGTON — Because of lax enforcement of the Truth-in-Lending Act, the nation's banks have overcharged their borrowers perhaps as much as \$10 billion. Now the banks are trying to wriggle out of the trap.

The House has passed, and "only a tiny minority" of senators voted, a bill that would require banks to spell out in clear language the terms of their loans.

The reason is that in this country a tiny but loud minority of ardent development cases who might be taken by some to give credence to this point of view.

By depicting what happened in the late 1940s and 1950s in Europe, the television network have undertaken affirmatively to show just what it is that America Nazis went to great lengths to eliminate the threat of future abuses.

The government regulators, for their part, are considering an even better arrangement for individual consumers, the so-called "Truth-in-Lending Disclosure Act," which would banish banks from paying overcharges except for those made one year prior to the discovery of a violation.

A spokesman for the American Bankers Association argues that the two-state statute of limitations for a consumer to sue for damages in overcharge cases "is somewhat sufficient." He also told reporter Tony Caputo that the Senate bill "would not be violated if the consumer didn't wait a year to file suit."

"The regulations are complete," the spokesman said. "While the original bill was 12 pages long, the final regulation was 10 pages long, and that had been supplemented by 1,200 interpretive regulations."

A sister regulatory body, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, wants an amendment to the bill that would banish banks from charging fees for loans that would accurate information on their transactions.

The bottom line is the Annual Percentage Rate, which has become known as lending in circles simply as the APR. "The APR is the true cost of a loan," one regulator said.

"It's the only way to compare the true cost of a loan," another regulator said.

The spokesman added, "A combination of independent inspection, administrative supervision, regulation, and enforcement makes us concerned that banks have overcharged their loans."

After a long-overdue investigation, Committee of the Consumer Protection recently asked Federal Reserve Board Governor Philip Morrissey to, in effect, banish the APR from bank lending.

He responded by saying that the APR is not necessarily misleading.

"We found that consumers are often confused over what the APR is," Morrissey reported in the preliminary results of the ongoing investigation. "We concluded that the best monetary impact to consumers of

the APR is the fact that it is a simple way to compare different loans."

The spokesman added, "The APR is not necessarily misleading."

"It is misleading to consumers if the APR is not properly explained," he said.

The magazine contains complete program listings for the coming month with in-depth descriptions of the programs and many pictures of the participants.


You can hear the BBC on the following frequencies: 15.45,
