# WORLD IN BRIEF

## Soviets Release Crew Of Korean Airliner

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Tass news agency said today two crewmen of a South Korean airliner forced down in the Soviet Union "fully admitted" they ignored attempts by Soviet fighters to order them to land after they entered Soviet airspace.

## Two Koreas In Gunbattle

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) — South Korea says the first naval gunbattle in a year between the two Koreas could mark the beginning of an intensified sabotage campaign by the communists.

## Plane Crash Kills 10

PAGO PAGO, American Samoa (UPI) — Two search helicopters failed Friday to sight any survivors amid the wreckage of a South Pacific Island Airways plane that crashed on a hillside with 10 persons aboard.

## Bank Robber Captured

LINZ, Austria (UPI) — A masked gunman who took 10 hostages and tried to rob a bank while shouting "this is a Red Brigades raid!" was shot and captured by police Friday.

# New Moro Letter Warns Of Bloodbath

ROME (UPI) — A new letter from Abu Moro (named up today and warned of "a resulting bloodbath") officials persist in their refusal to negotiate with the guerrillas who kidnapped the five-time Italian premier.

The letter, found by a Rome journalist in his car, once again begged the Christian Democratic Party to stop "playing with the life of a man" and agree to the demands of the Red Brigades kidnappers.

The Red Brigades have maintained a nerve-wracking silence on Moro's fate since they made the five-day days ago and threatened to execute the five-time premier if the government did not relent immediately.

Moro's family told reporters the silence "gives us all hope." Andreotti also criticized the press in the United States, Russia and China for all trying to link one of the superpowers to the Red Brigades without advancing any proof.

The premier was asked about a U.S. press report quoting a Secret Service agent as saying there were "strong indications" Cacciaravia was supporting the Red Brigades.

"The American press has accused Eastern countries, the Russian and Czechoslovak press have accused the Chinese and the Chinese have accused the Russians," Andreotti said.

"Up to this moment I must say that beyond accusations of a journalistic character, no proof has been given us of support — not ideological but practical support — of this criminal movement we have in Italy by any foreign state."

Police and troops Friday raided the part city of Genoa and conducted house-to-house and ship-to-ship searches in an effort to find the Red Brigades kidnapers.

# Singlaub: 'No Regrets'

ATLANTA (UPI) — Maj. Gen. John K. Singlaub, his career ended for twice criticizing President Carter's defense policies, says he has "no regrets" for speaking out.

Singlaub, retiring from a Pentagon, driving-down Friday, strode from a military jet to a waiting car, passing reporters without comment on his agreement to retire, which had been announced in Washington.

Later, he issued a brief statement saying "Regrettably, there has been considerable recent public discussion of my personal opposition to some of the policies of the current administration."

"As a result, I have concluded that the only honorable thing for me to do at this time is to retire from active Army service," said Singlaub.

"I have requested that I be relieved from active duty on 21 May, 1975, and placed on the retired list 1 June, 1976, or as soon as practicable after that date."

He added, "As I have stated several times before, I have no regrets for having spoken the truth as I perceived it. I do sincerely regret, however, any embarrassment that I may have caused the United States Army."

# Literacy Tests Spur Move To Get Tough On Teachers

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — There's no consensus on how it should be done, but it's a move that the 1976 Legislature will make changes in teacher certification laws with an eye on improving the quality of education in Florida's classrooms.

The Senate version of the bill (SB 987), passed last week 56-1, orders a one-year internship for new teachers and lightens up the recertification process for classroom veterans by making sure they are competent in basic teaching skills like keeping discipline and planning lessons.

The House Education Committee also moved last week on a bill getting tough with teachers. It requires newcomers to pass a written test before receiving provisional certification for one year, and also makes local school districts set up evaluation teams to gauge teacher performance.

Like many legislators, Sen. Curtis Peterson partially blames educators for the poor showing by students on the literacy test administered to high school juniors last fall.

"If a child has a bad teacher now and then, he's going to be hurt later on," said Peterson, chairman of the Senate Education Committee.

He expects a joint conference committee will be able to iron out differences in the two bills so legislators can go ahead and enact the new certification laws. And he's confident the result will be improved teachers.

"We're saying we're not going to accept recertification without something to tell us teachers are competent in the areas they're teaching," he said.

Peterson said the legislation is borne of frustration by parents and politicians with the schools.

But, teacher's union lobbyist James Geiger is skeptical of the legislation.

"Our state forcing that much of this is political rhetoric to say they've done something with incompetent teachers," Geiger said, adding there's plenty of blame to go around for the problems in the education system.

He said there are flaws in both bills, particularly the House version which sets up district evaluation teams. He said it will be costly and unwieldy because each of the 67 counties will have different criteria for judging teacher competence.

What the legislation really should address, Geiger said, is revamping college courses at state schools of education to insure what is being taught to new teachers is up to date.

He said teachers have long supported the internship or provisional certification concept for new teachers and are not opposed to re-evaluating since the validity of the recertification criteria is established.

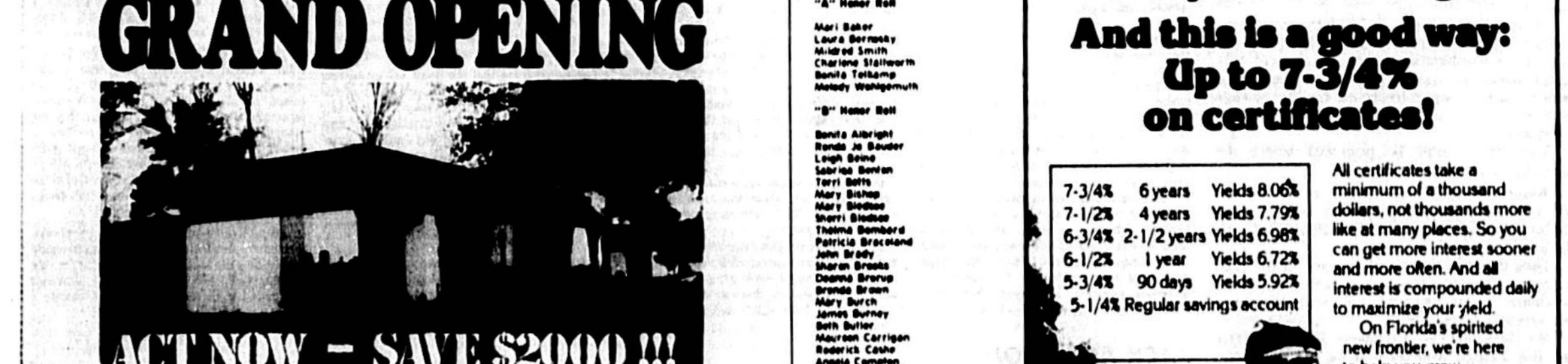

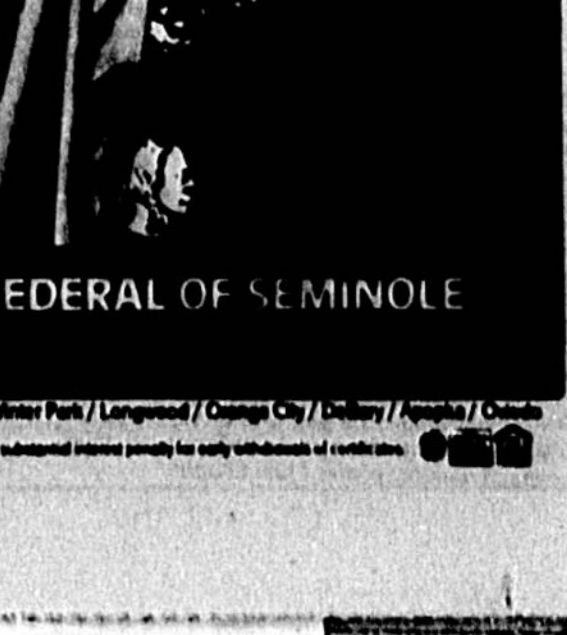

The immigration and Naturalization Service forced aliens to turn in their radios during WWII because they could listen to the enemy and help many governments jump radio broadcasts from other countries to prevent their citizens from hearing news reports unfavorable to their country.

The Voice of America has recently been under fire by Congress because of the large cost and lack of continuous American programming. But the administrators of the Voice of America feel that a truthful broadcast does more for the image of the United States than all the phony propaganda ever would.

The Voice of America also serves another purpose — that of keeping our citizens who are employed abroad informed of the internal affairs of their country so that they will know what's happening at home. These shortwave broadcasts are not all news; there are other enjoyable radio broadcasts such as symphony concerts, the latest pop releases, along with cooking shows, lobby discussions, etc. . . . The British Broadcasting Company puts out a monthly magazine "BBC London Calling," which is available to listeners all over the world by just writing and asking for it.

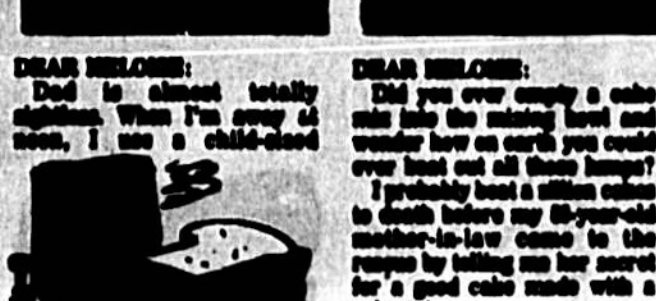
**DEAR HELOISE:**

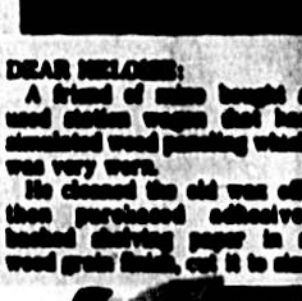
**DEAR HELOISE:**
