Swanky Liner Splits Tanker In Dense Fog

NEW YORK (UPI) — Fifteen crewmen were swept overboard today when the Israeli luxury liner *Shalom* collided with a Norwegian tanker in dense fog.

The U. S. Coast Guard reported that the Israeli liner split the tanker *Dagali* in two and that 10 of the vessel's crewmen who were swept overboard were clinging to the bow section.

The *Dagali* is sinking, the Coast Guard said.

It was not immediately known if there were any injuries to crew or passengers aboard the *Shalom*.

The Coast Guard said the accident happened about 17 miles northeast of Barnegat Light, N. J., while the *Shalom* was outbound on a Thanksgiving cruise. Early reports said the *Shalom* collided with the *Dagali* near the stern section.

The Norwegian vessel immediately radioed an SOS and reported it was taking in water and in danger of sinking.

The *Shalom* radioed it was in no immediate danger, but was reported to have suffered damage to the bow section and was taking in water in the forward hold and adjoining compartments.

The \$20 million luxury liner later radioed it was returning to port under its own power.

The Coast Guard said it was having difficulty in determining the extent of damage to the vessels because the heavy fog had reduced visibility to near zero.

2 Men Queried In B & E Probe By City Police

Two men are being held on suspicion of breaking and entering after they reportedly tried to "cash" a bagful of pennies at a place which lost some pennies earlier in the day in a burglary.

Being questioned by city police are men identified as Johnnie Lee Golden and Jefferson Jones, both of 607 Sanford Avenue.

Police say they tried to exchange the pennies for folding money at Henderson's Bar, 720 E. Seventh St., last night. The bar had been entered during the previous night by breaking a window and cutting a screen. A pay telephone was also ripped off the wall and taken, police said.

Thieves removed three jalousy windows from the Goldboro Elementary School sometime Tuesday night or early Wednesday and took between \$2 and \$3 from a secretary's office.

Boost Expected In Postal Rates

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. — (UPI) — Postmaster General John A. Gronouski said Wednesday there may be increases in postal rates for second and third class mail in an effort to cut the post office deficit.

Gronouski, after conferring with President Johnson on the LBJ Ranch, said he and the President had discussed the possibility of rate increases.

He said Johnson told him to make a study of those categories of mail that represent a "net loss" to the government. Second and third-class mail—including books, magazines and circulars—falls into this category, he said. Gronouski said Johnson also directed studies to see if costs could be reduced by eliminating several hundred of the nation's smallest post offices.

Unlike the mournful Thanksgiving of one year ago, Americans celebrated the holiday today in joy and gratitude.

From a turkey and corn-bread dressing-laden table on a famed Texas ranch to quiet, snow-drenched Montana hillsides, the day was one of thankful reverence, family reunions and contented rollicking.

The accidental death toll crept up slowly in opening hours.

The United Press International count at 2:30 a. m. showed 21 persons had died in traffic and other accidents.

A year ago, the nation sat down to holiday tales with appetites numbed and hearts stunned over the assassination of President John F. Kennedy six days earlier.

The First Family this year is gathering on the LBJ Ranch near Johnson City, Tex., for a late afternoon meal of Iowa turkey and Mrs. Johnson's own special corn-bread dressing.

Cold wave warnings were out for much of the northern plains and northern Rockies. Temperatures dropped below zero in Montana where up to a foot of snow fell Wednesday.

The rush of students and workers to the roads for the holiday caused traffic jams and hazardous driving.

Many persons preferred their feast with religious services. In New York, Methodist and Presbyterian congregations joined for a union observance at the Central Synagogue in Manhattan for the 29th time.

Macy's annual Thanksgiving Day parade in New York marked the official Christmas season kickoff.

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30 White Hostages Released From Congo

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI) — Belgian paratroops today rescued 30 white hostages "in imminent danger" from rebel-held Paulis.

The dawn mission into the heart of Congolese jungles followed by 48 hours a similar airborne rescue flight to Stanleyville.

Today's mission was launched from Stanleyville.

Paulis, 225 miles northwest of Stanleyville, was believed to have been the last major pocket of rebel resistance.

Today's Boys, Tomorrow's Scientists

Tomorrow's great scientist may very well be that youngster who today is continually asking "why" and "wherefore". Or, he may be the inquisitive teen-ager who wants to know about everything from outer-space to under-water exploration.

It's never too early to spark and stimulate the spirit of inquiry in children, and a microscope is one of the best ways to do so. Nothing quite compares to the thrill of discovery as a child learns about the many wonders of this world.

A microscope can serve as a passport to the invisible phenomena around us—in the air we breathe, in plant life, in the soil and in countless everyday objects.

This year you can give your own potential scientist a very special thrill with a professional-type microscope or science set of his own.

For the first time, a leading producer of optical products for science and industry has brought out a new line of microscopes and science sets designed for beginners—for as young as eight years old—as well as for teen-agers.

These microscopes are officially approved by educational consultants and are used in all levels of science education in many school systems.

Such a Christmas gift for the interested youngsters can be the start of a rewarding career, or help launch a life-time hobby. A gift of microscope can also provide the basis for many shared family projects.

The young boy will enjoy starting his "experiments" by examining familiar objects around him—a human hair, a piece of wool or an insect.

The older, more experienced student will find the stereo microscope ideal for three-dimensional viewing of biological specimens as well as of rocks, coins, etc.

More advanced students and hobbyists will appreciate the "zoomscope" with its zooming magnification up to 200 X.

The microscopes can be purchased separately or, in sets with complete equipment and instruction for setting up a home science laboratory. Thus, boys and girls can expand upon school laboratory work or proceed with experiments of their own.

Greeting Cards Are More Fun

Greeting cards for youngsters are more fun than ever, this year. Games and story-books that burst into three-dimensional scenes... cards that can be made into tree ornaments or Christmas mobiles and other novelties are included in a 1964 collection, according to Mrs. Jeannette Lee, design director.

New this year is a paper barn farm that comes folded flat in its envelope and opens into a 4-compartmented barnyard complete with 24 pound-out animals, a complete family as well as fencing, wells, and farm wagons designed to give a child many hours of amusement. Three-dimensional, this greeting card stands 1 inch high and is more than 13 inches across.

There is Christmas fun for a "sweet girl" in a card opening to a four-room cottage for paper dolls. Cut-outs include furniture and a family of four. For a boy who wants to be an astronaut, another four-area standup card contains all the orbiting devices of a 1970 space station.

Greetings that teach thrift, thoughtfulness or the significance of the first Christmas may also be found in the expanding collection of juvenile greetings.

There's a variety of "piggy bank" cards and coin-holding greetings. The coin cards, designed in the shape of Christmas ornaments of sleigh trimmings, hold ten shiny dimes. Youngsters are usually more delighted with silver than with paper currency.

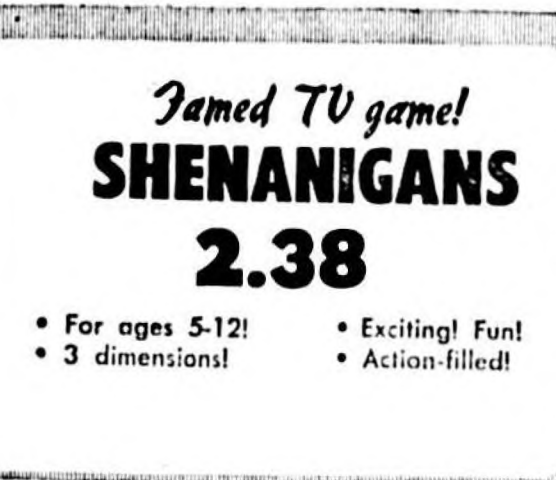

CAT Would Bring In 5-7 More TV Channels

Survey Slated On Police Role

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Florida Peace Officers Association got a favorable reaction from state officials to a request Florida underwrite the cost of a sweeping law enforcement study.

Gov. Farris Bryant and Atty. Gen. James Kynes both expressed their support of the proposal, and the governor said such a report was long overdue.

The four months study covering everything from the crime rate to police pay, would be made by associated consultants of education headed by former Florida State University President Doak S. Campbell.

It would cost \$27,500. The peace officers association said if Florida would put up \$15,000, it would pay for the rest of the cost.

Newly elected president of the Florida Public Relations Association is Robert E. Phillips, public relations executive of Jacksonville.

According to reliable sources, this is a system which involves the installation of a single, large television antenna tower. This tower picks up signals, amplifies them and delivers the signal through cables to the individual television set.

Promoters say it will allow local viewers to bring in five to seven television channels with a strong clear signal, plus FM channels, a local weather station and educational television stations.

The subscriber pays a charge for installation, plus a monthly service charge. This service takes the place of home antennas and greatly increases the clarity and number of stations. It is said to be particularly good for color television reception.

As might be surmised, it is vigorously opposed by sellers of television home antennas.

However, television set dealers are paid a commission for hook-ups they obtain and can actually serve as sales agents for CATV.

The lines are strung on telephone and power poles under agreements with the respective utility companies. They will pay a lease of a certain amount per year to the company for the lease of each pole.

It is not pay television. The cable company provides no repairs, sales or service for television sets, only to the cable itself.

The whole system operates much like having a telephone installed in your home. If you want one, you call the company, pay an installation fee, have it installed, book up your set and pay a monthly service charge. If you don't want it, you don't have to buy it.

In order for any community cable to be available to the individual subscriber, it is necessary for the city, or county government to grant the company a franchise, for which the company pays the government body a certain percentage of receipts.

Advantages of the CATV system is that Sanford viewers might be able to tune in on Jacksonville and Tampa stations, ETV stations in Orlando and Gainesville and FM music stations, as well as continuous weather information. Signals of area television stations would be clear and sharp, and viewers would have a wider choice of special programs. It may also reduce interference from planes, electric motors and other video disturbances.

Disadvantages noted include the fact that area television stations available in the Sanford area already include the three national networks, CBS, NBC and ABC, which carry all network shows.

Programs other than network shows carried by Jacksonville or Tampa stations would most likely be local interest features and news stories, which might or might not be of any interest to local viewers.

The extensive local coverage provided by the three area channels might be "diluted" or reduced when viewers dial out-of-area stations, thereby cutting down on the coverage for local advertisers.

Community Antenna Television cable service was first introduced some years ago in remote or mountainous areas where geography and topography prevented the reception of TV signals from far-off stations or across mountains.

In a past year, the service has mushroomed in smaller communities and counties with no television stations, and more and more companies have incorporated, many of them backed by the television stations themselves or

other communications media. The CATV explosion is heralded as the forerunner of "pay television" which has been struggling for years to get a foothold in major cities, but has met with fierce opposition from organized

interests of advertisers and home antenna manufacturing companies.

It is expected that the Federal Communications Commission will soon assume jurisdiction to control the rapidly growing CATV industry.

Central Florida communities who have already accepted CATV or are in the process of installation include Eau Gallie, Ormond Beach, Gainesville, Leesburg, Ocala, Daytona Beach and the South Brevard County area.

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Sarah Promoted Thanksgiving Day

Give the Pilgrims credit for celebrating the first Thanksgiving back in 1621. But these hardy people had absolutely nothing to do with establishing the day as a national custom.

That particular honor belongs exclusively to Sarah Josepha Hale.

Mrs. Hale was a woman's magazine editor — the nation's first — in the mid-Nineteenth century who involved herself in a number of burning issues, in addition to Thanksgiving Day, whose effects are still being felt, no matter if Mrs. Hale herself ranks near the top of the Forgotten Great Americans list.

This New England editor dictated fashions for nearly 30 years (including the hoop skirt, hour-glass figure and triple-padded petticoats), wrote that immortal poem, "Mary Had A Little Lamb" and brought about the completion of Boston's Bunker Hill monument.

But making Thanksgiving Day a national holiday was the most famous effort for which she is not known.

For 36 years she badgered presidents and governments and legislatures and congress until finally in 1863 President Lincoln — perhaps only to get Mrs. Hale out of his hair — gave in and proclaimed a national Thanksgiving Day.

Up to then, Thanksgiving Day was a pretty irregular affair. In 1644 the Dutch governor of New York issued a Thanksgiving proclamation. Congress recommended one every year during the Revolution, but after the peace in 1784, everybody forgot about it until 1789. In that year, President Washington ordered a Thanksgiving Day for the adoption of the Constitution.

In 1815 President Madison proclaimed one and that was it until Lincoln — and Mrs. Hale — got together in 1863.

Although Mrs. Hale spent much of her time editing "Godey's Lady's Book," she still found time to push for Thanksgiving. She felt that a national Thanksgiving Day would be a step toward a better understanding between the North and South. War came before she had her way.

In "Godey's Lady's Magazine," as it was later named, Mrs. Hale had the perfect propaganda weapon. Regularly, the magazine's 150,000 readers would find among the crinolines and bustles inspirational tidbits about the need for a national day of Thanksgiving.

And collections of mouth-watering recipes — "Lafayette Ducks with Snowballs," "Oysters Etiquette," "Indian Pudding and Frumety Sauce" — especially designed for Thanksgiving dinners.

And essays on the role of women:

"God gave to man, authority; to women, influence; she inspires and persuades. He convinces and compels. It has always been in my aim to use my influence in this womanly way."

But the magazine wasn't enough. Mrs. Hale wrote thousands of letters to influ-

ential politicians throughout the country, asking them to endorse a national Thanksgiving Day. So when she started her campaign to persuade Lincoln, she knew how to cope with all negative responses. Besides, President Lincoln never could say "no" to a woman.

When Lincoln issued the first national Thanksgiving proclamation, Mrs. Hale knew his words had special meaning: "... It has seemed to me fit and proper that they (the gifts of God) should be solemnly, reverently and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American people."

Lincoln could have added, "and, besides, Sarah Josepha Hale would never give me a moment's peace if I didn't find it fit and proper."

Spacemobile Visits Schools Next Week

The National Aeronautics Space Administration will send one of its "spacemobile" units here next week for demonstrations at the junior and senior high schools. The visit will be on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Demonstrations are tentatively scheduled for 9 a. m. and 1:30 p. m.

The Spacemobile, itself, is actually a panel truck of conventional size. It does not, as the word implies, travel out in space.

What makes it different from other vehicles is its cargo. The Spacemobile is filled with scale models of rockets and satellites and mechanical and electrical equipment.

One can see models of Tiro, Syncom, A Lette, Ranger, and the OSO. A look into the future is afforded with the models of Nimbus, OAO, OGO, Surveyor, Gemini, and Apollo.

The Spacemobile is not used for exhibit purposes, but is presented as a lecture-demonstration. These demonstrations are given by experienced science educators who are authoritatively informed on activities of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

A typical lecture of about 30 minutes covers such subjects as the history of rocketry, propulsion, biological aspects of space flight, orbits, electrical requirements, and man's responsibility in the Space Age.

By utilizing models, the lecturer will discuss the NASA programs in the areas of communication and weather, scientific exploration, and manned and unmanned space flight.

The Spacemobile and related educational programs were conceived by NASA during the summer of 1960. This agency was receiving thousands of requests for knowledgeable speakers from all over the United States. The educational community was particularly interested in keeping its students and teachers informed of the latest developments in space-research and exploration.

In short, what was needed to meet the demand was authoritative speakers who possessed depth and versatility for audiences of different educational backgrounds. In addition, attractive audio-visual aids were deemed advisable to convey a better understanding of space projects. All of these had to be combined into a package which was mobile.

The first Spacemobile began meeting commitments in the spring of 1961. Later, additional Spacemobiles were placed into operation to meet the ever-increasing demand. At the present time, the NASA operates over 20 Spacemobiles in the United States. On the average, the Spacemobile lecturers will talk to about 400,000 people per month.

The majority of requests that are received for a Spacemobile appearance are from the elementary and secondary schools. In most cases a lecture-demonstration is presented to the entire student body which is assembled in one location. However, if scheduling permits, the space science lecturer visit individual classrooms for more informal and detailed lectures in the areas of physics, biology, and chemistry.

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — The United States plans to go ahead Friday with an attempt to rocket its second Mariner spacecraft to the planet Mars. A space agency spokesman said, however, that the launch depends on successful completion late today of a series of tests on a new metal shroud replacing the fiberglass model that failed on the Mariner-3 flight Nov. 5.

If all goes well, the Atlas-Agena rocket will send the 375-pound camera-carrying spacecraft on its 8½-month voyage during a three-hour and 13-minute period starting at 9:28 a.m. Friday.

Project Manager Jack N. James told newsmen the close of the 1964 Mars launch period has been extended five days to about Dec. 9 by removing 43 pounds of equipment from the Agena upper stage.

After that date, the planet moves out of range until late 1966.

Homecomers Cheer Bowl-Bound Tribe

The bowl-bound SIS Seminoles put together one of the best team efforts of the current grid season Wednesday night to post a 27 to 14 homecoming victory over a stubborn bunch of Bulldogs of DeLand High before a crowd at Sanford's Memorial Stadium estimated at nearly 4,000.

No one SIS athlete dominated either the Tribe's offensive or defensive play, but it took just such an effort to finally stop a hot passing game by the 'Dogs that highlighted the first half.

In fact, DeLand put on an aerial circus — the likes of which haven't been seen around these parts in high school football for years. But it all came mainly in the first half and the Seminoles were able to defend against the attack successfully in the second half.

The ability to do it was primarily responsible for the win.

The Tribe took the opening kickoff and Sonny Messer returned to his own 46. Halfback Buddy Burton, fullback Lee Sparkman and quarterback Ron Hinson moved to a first down on DeLand's 43 before Burton and halfback Danny Tillis got eight and 10, respectively and another FD on the Bulldog 23. At that point the Bulldogs were penalized half the distance and Burton carried from the 12 1/2 to the nine before Sparkman went in for the TD.

Billy Kuykendall protected the lead with a successful PAT boot.

After an exchange of punts, Kenny Gill, Tommy Lawton and Gary Breckenridge picked up a first down on DeLand's 35. Breckenridge opened up his passing game with a 14-yard shot to Ken Drury and from the 49 he fired an 11-yarder to Bill Barlett.

Moments later Breckenridge fired twice more to Barlett and the 'Dogs had a first and to situation on Seminole's 33.

After officials chased a dog off the field, a Breckenridge pass to Bob Apgar was ruled complete on interference on Sanford's six. After being held to only a pair of yards on three plays, Breckenridge shot one to Apgar on a criss-cross pattern for the TD and Eddie O'Quinn tied it up with his boot.

The Tribe wasted no time taking the lead again when Burton, Sparkman and Hinson alternated on running plays to carry Sanford to DeLand's 32. At that point, Hinson uncorked a 20-yard aerial to Mike Gray for the second SIS score. Kuykendall again split the uprights.

Apparently this made the Bulldogs mad because they growled right back and Breckenridge highlighted a DeLand drive with a 32-yard pass play to Apgar who was downed on Sanford's six.

On a fourth and three, Breckenridge rolled out on the option, kept the ball, and waltzed over the marker. It was O'Quinn again who placed it through the uprights to knot the count at 14-all. And that was it until late in the third stanza.

After Seminoles and DeLand had exchanged third period punts following short drives, the Tribe moved from their own 37 to the Bulldogs' 20. The movement was highlighted by a 17-yard jaunt by Sparkman and a 12-yard dash by Rick Walstrom.

However, SIS lost the ball on downs when Hinson was tossed for a loss on a fourth down play on DeLand's 23. The Bulldogs took over and Breckenridge immediately hit the air lanes. But his initial toss was intercepted on the 30 by SIS end Larry Watson who zig-zagged his way to paydirt to put the Tribe into a lead it never relinquished. Kuykendall booted his third PAT.

Late in the final period, after several exchanges, Burton intercepted another Breckenridge pass on the Bulldog 30 and carried to the eight. From there, Tillis scooted eight yards for the score with only 1:19 left. Kuykendall's kick was wide and the scoring was complete.

But Breckenridge's passing won't be forgotten for a long time by SIS fans. He tossed 26 times, completed 10 and suffered three interceptions.

The Garden Gate

Dir. Gardeners Circle TREES

The hurricane sisters, Cleo and Dora, have paid their unwelcome visit and have gone on their ruthless way, leaving a path of destruction.

They destroyed shrubbery and many trees that had been friends for years; but remember that God gave and God took away, and he will give again to the worthy; so bestir yourselves and plant anew. Begin with trees, because they take longer to grow.

In this locality, since the temperature often drops below freezing, it behooves one to plant hardy trees. In the evergreen class, the oak (Quercus) is the first choice. The Live Oak, my favorite,

is handsome and wide-spreading but slow in growth. The Water Oak, of which there are many varieties, are fast growers and beautiful in shape. A tree five to seven feet tall when planted will make a nice shade tree in five to six years.

The Champor-tree is excellent for shade because it grows wide as well as tall and is a fairly rapid grower. Also it is not easily uprooted by wind storms.

The Magnolia, a stately tree with large white flowers and heavy green leaves, brings beauty to its surroundings. Related to the Magnolia in looks is the Loblolly-hay (Gordonia lasianthus). As trees of this variety are rather slender in form, they are more attractive

placed in a curved line in groups of three about twelve feet apart.

The Chinese Elm, available in both deciduous and evergreen, is useful in mild climates. The evergreen grows rapidly and is attractive in shape.

Odonatissimum viburnum can be trimmed into a pleasing shape, as also can Ligustrum. Satisfactory varieties of the latter are lucidum with glossy leaves, aureo-marginatum with golden-tinted leaves, and nobilis. Small but dense, they are useful for hedges and screening purposes as well as for shade.

Each of the Ilex or Hollies makes outstanding trees with their bright red berries and waxy green leaves.

Among the deciduous trees, the Maple and the Sweet Gum rank high. Both are fast growers and well shaped. In this group is found the Koelreuteria paniculata (golden-rain-tree), which has amazingly beautiful clusters of colored seed pods. These clusters can be cut while in their bright color and kept in the house for several months without losing their beauty.

Many beautiful trees will survive some degree of cold. Among them are the Jacaranda, the Schinus terebinthifolius (Brazilian Pepper-tree), and the Gravellea robusta (Silk-oak).

There are many more trees that will grow in this climate, but get started; plant something! It is wise to consider the eventual size of the adult tree. Do not plant trees too close together, because mature trees are difficult to transplant.

After the trees have been placed, start on the shrubbery in the same careful and studied way, and you will reap much joy, because

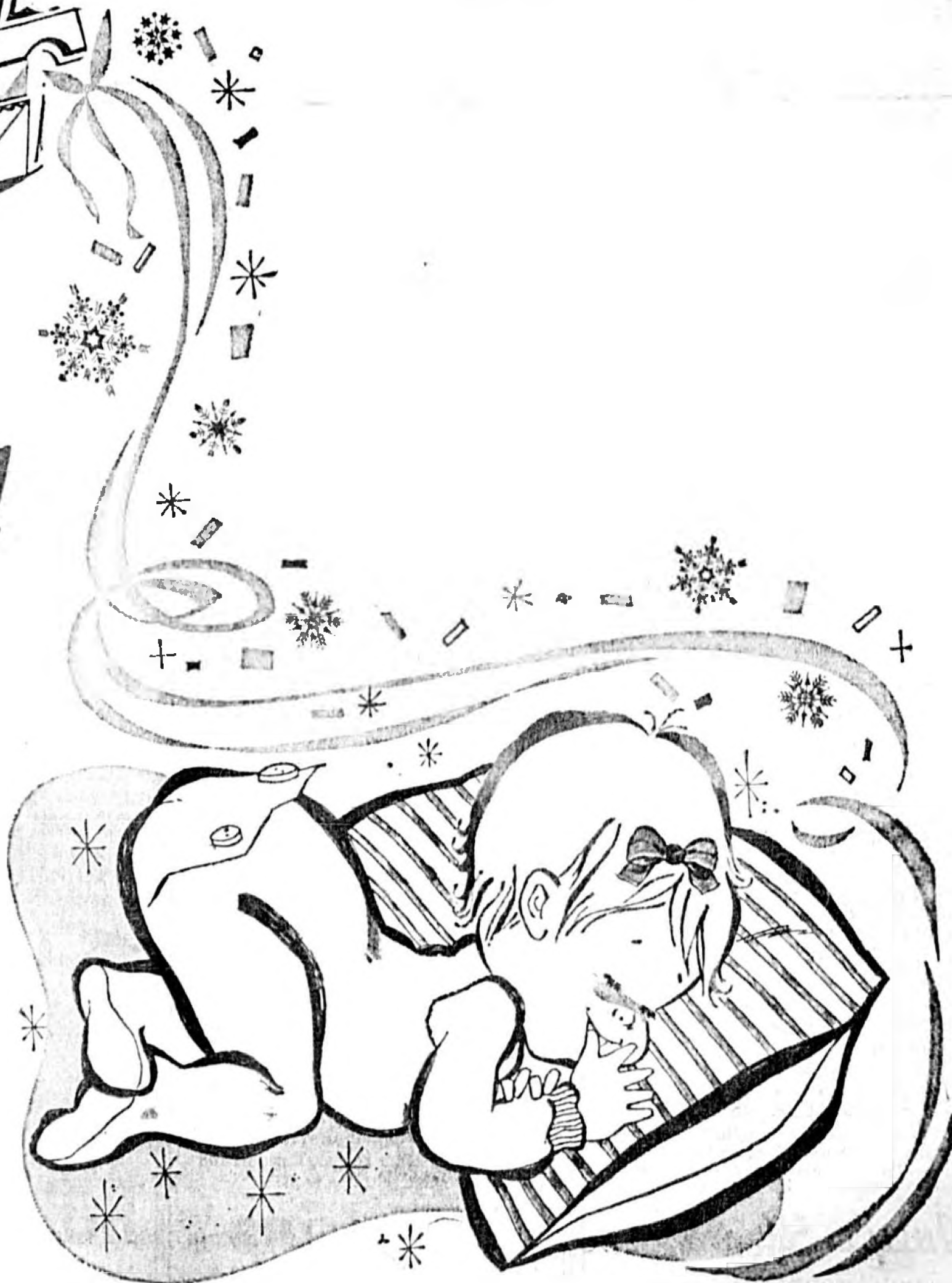

Time Will Pass More Quickly If Kiddies Busy

For his cap, cut a triangle of white paper seven inches long and five inches high. For ear muffs, glue cotton balls to the sides of the can and make the red muffler from a strip of paper, color it red, cut fringes on the ends, and tie. It is held in place with a little glue.

Make the lid with the V-shaped openings at the base of the toy. Cut a rectangle of white craft paper five inches by sides of the can. Draw buttons, nine inches and glue it to the a mouth, pipe and eyes, and color them with black crayon. Make the nose red.

Mail Early And Avoid The Rush, Advises Postmaster

Mountain Of Mail Expected This Year

A little planning during the Thanksgiving holiday can help avoid the "Christmas Rush," Postmaster Cecil Heard said today.

The Sanford postmaster has some tips which will not only get ZIP into Christmas mailing, but help local postal employees move the record-breaking mountain of mail expected this Christmas season.

1. Find last year's Christmas mailing list. If you don't find it, or didn't have one, make one up.

2. Check to see that all addresses are correct.

3. Wherever possible, add the ZIP code to the address on the list, because ZIP code speeds your mail, always include the code for your area in return addresses. The ZIP code for all of Sanford is 32771.

4. Determine your list of gift purchases which must be mailed. Such planning allows you to shop early when selections are so great and you can shop up to mailing materials in advance. Be sure to purchase enough material so that parcels will be packed securely.

The postmaster emphasized that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage. He also suggested that the address be written on only one side of the exterior wrapping and that a duplicate address be included inside the carton, in case the outer covering is not secure and comes off.

Miss Heard said that the Post Office Department in Washington is predicting that a record seven billion pieces of mail will move through the postal system during the peak rush just before Christmas. The cooperation of all mailers is vital for us to deliver each holiday card, letter and package before Christmas Day. A little planning will make the Christmas rush less hectic for everyone, she said.

For a really old-fashioned Christmas treat, try your hand at flower-pot bread. It's the easiest way to reproduce the old-fashioned brick-oven bread of days past. Its authentic, crusty flavor rivals anything that Grandmother ever made.

FLOWER POT BREAD
2 cups scalded milk
2 tablespoons sugar
2 tablespoons shortening
2 teaspoons salt
1 cup lukewarm water
2 envelopes yeast
6 cups sifted all purpose flour
malted shortening
2 teaspoons sugar

DIRECTIONS: Buy three 5" wide and 8" deep red clay flowerpots. Wash and grease well. Bake the empty pots for 3 to 10 minutes at 375 degrees. Repeat process again. This keeps bread from sticking.

Melt milk in a saucepan. Add 3 tablespoons sugar, shortening and salt, and stir until shortening is melted. Cool to lukewarm.

In a large, warm bowl, dissolve the two teaspoons of sugar in water. Add yeast, let stand 10 minutes, then stir well.

Add lukewarm milk. Stir in 4 cups of flour, beat very well. Add remaining flour. This is a sticky dough. Transfer to a greased bowl.

Brush top of loaves with melted shortening. Cover with waxed paper and a clean towel and allow to rise (about 30 to 45 minutes) in a warm place until double in bulk.

Turn out on a lightly floured board. Knead lightly, then divide in 3 equal parts. Put in well-greased flower pots. Cover and let rise in a warm place in a 375 degree oven for 35 to 40 minutes, with a double thickness of roll on oven rack under pots to break direct heat.

Although this bread recipe is for three 5 inch clay flower pots, it can be used in any size pot. Clay flower pots come in a variety of sizes from 1 to 12 inches high.

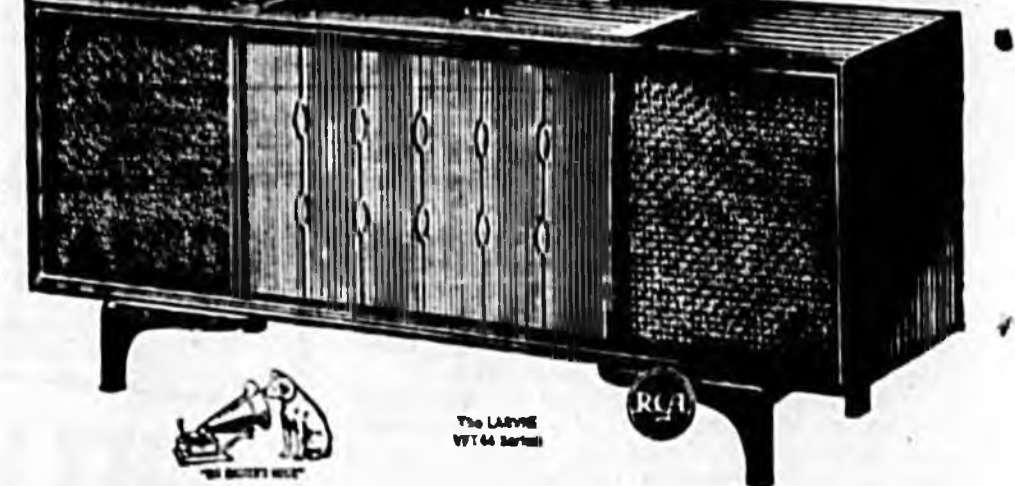

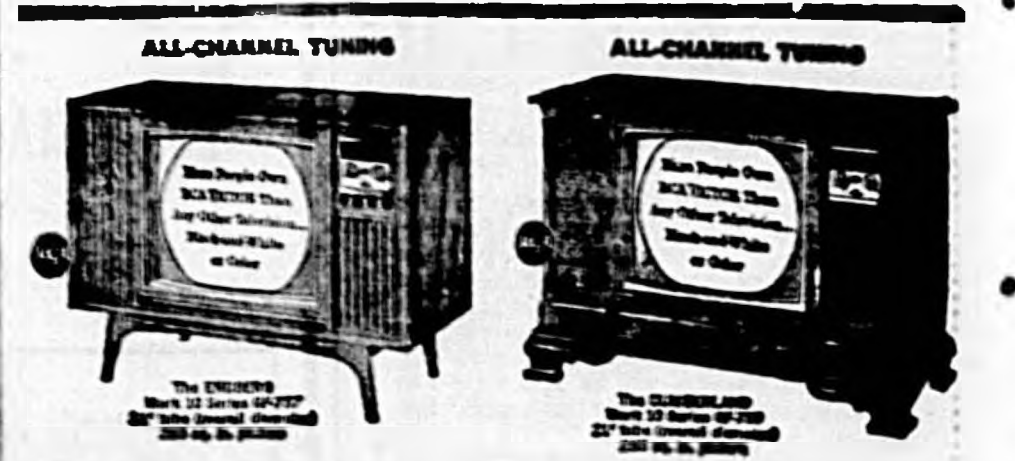

Frozen strawberries may be used in place of the raspberries. Add one-fourth cup lemon juice to the berries with the water when making strawberry jam.
