

## PRES. HARDING'S MESSAGE TO CONGRESS NEXT WEEK DEALS WITH TWO SUBJECTS

### Tariff and Merchant Marine Will Fill the Boards

### IMPORTANT TEXTS

#### TARIFF MATTERS WILL BE THE PRINCIPAL SUBJECT—NOTHING ON COMPENSATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—President Harding's message to the new congress next week, it was declared in deal principally with two subjects: the tariff and the merchant marine.

Of the tariff, Mr. Harding is expected by those close to the White House to say that its revision and passage at the earliest possible date is urgently necessary and that it should be stripped of such provisions as would endanger or unduly delay its passage.

Concerning merchant marine questions, Mr. Harding is expected to take a definite stand for the granting of some sort of ship subsidy probably in the nature of preferential rates and routes, as supplementary to the granting of free tolls to coastwise shipping through the Panama Canal. It was expected also in the same quarters that the president would discuss section 24 of the Jones act dealing with the abrogation of trade treaties by the executive. Study of the situation was said to have developed a feeling on the part of administration officials that it would be difficult if not impossible to carry out the provisions of this section.

Tariff matters, senate leaders insisted, will occupy the prominent position in the message. It was asserted that Mr. Harding would ask that rates in the house bill, now in the hands of the senate finance committee, be fixed on the old basis of invoice values rather than on the house provision of American wholesale valuation. His reason for that stand, according to some of his councillors, was that he had been assured it would be better to apply the new system piece meal than by employing the plan on all commodities at one time.

To that end, it was stated also, the president is expected to urge an optional provision in the measure, empowering him to apply the home value basis where, after certain surveys, it is found to be advisable or necessary. Such a course was regarded by congressional tariff builders as obviating the necessity for computing the rates on what opponents of the American valuation plan describe as unknown quantities.

Mr. Harding is expected to urge immediate passage of the allied debt refunding bill. While this was represented as his attitude, a divergence of opinion among senators as to the wisdom of taking up the measure during the sessions of the conference on limitation of armaments, it was said by some, may yet force a change in that stand.

The state finance committee is not in agreement over what should be done, Senator Penrose, the chairman, Senators Smoot of Utah, Watson, of Indiana, and several others arguing that there could be no embarrassment for the arms conference developed by the debate on the funding measure. On the other hand, Senator Curtis, a committee member, and vice chairman of the senate republican conference, as well as Senator Lodge, the conference head, and one of the American delegates to the arms meeting, are strongly opposed to consideration of the debt bill at this time.

Mr. Harding went into details of the legislative program for the next session at a dinner attended by Senators Lodge, of Massachusetts, republican leader; Curtis, of Kansas; Penrose of Pennsylvania and Watson of Indiana. It was understood that the president requested and the senate leaders agreed that the allied debt refunding bill should be taken up immediately and rushed through to passage.

As a result of the agreement, reached at a late hour, Mr. Harding was expected to omit reference to the funding measure in his message.

### LENA CLARKE CASE TO JURY THIS AFTERNOON

#### JUDGE ANDREWS CHARGED THE JURY AT 2:30 AND CASE WENT TO JURY

(By The Associated Press) ORLANDO, Dec. 2.—Judge Andrews was scheduled to charge the jury at 2:30 this afternoon and the case was to go to the twelve men immediately thereafter.

ORLANDO, Dec. 2.—The Clarke-Patterson case is expected to reach the jury early this afternoon when argument of counsel was resumed this morning.

The state and defense in the Lena Clarke case announced yesterday that they would introduce no further testimony and argument before the jury began.

Judge Andrews announced he would allow each side four hours in which to complete their argument, and under this ruling it is estimated the jury would retire shortly afternoon today. Court attaches are of the opinion that the jury will not deliberate long, and the fate of the two defendants is expected to be made known some time today or tonight.

Pathos was injected into the proceedings twice yesterday. Once when LeRoy B. Giles, in a defense argument, referred to "the sorrow which had weighed so heavily" on the Rev. and Mrs. Clarke, parents of the defendant, whom he spoke of as being in the "twilight" of life, and again when Mrs. George W. McCormack, daughter of Fred A. Millmore, with whose murder Miss Clarke and Patterson are charged, burst into tears as Attorney Chillingworth, of West Palm Beach, speaking for the defense referred to the "cold blooded manner in which Millmore robbed the Palm Beach postoffice in 1918." Mrs. McCormack's sobbings echoed to the far corners of the court room and the trial was momentarily delayed while a deputy sheriff led her into the hallway outside.

At the morning session yesterday two witnesses were examined. Postal Inspector H. N. Graham was presented by the state in an effort to establish the fact that Miss Clarke had always appeared sane in the transaction of business affairs while she was postmistress. Graham said that prior to the time when irregularities began to appear in the postoffice accounts, Miss Clarke had always appeared to be above the average in intelligence and was clever and resourceful in the transaction of business. He said she made a model postmistress until she began juggling the accounts in an effort to cover the shortages. The witness testified that at one time the amount involved in the discrepancies

No deaths are reported but police said many persons injured by mobs in their orgy of plunder and destruction. The police stood idly by while mobs worked their will, some even expressing sympathy with rioters.

### INVESTIGATING TAR AND FEATHER JOB AT MIAMI

#### BRITISH VICE CONSUL AT WORK ON FLOGGING OF MINISTER

(By The Associated Press) MIAMI, Dec. 2.—Acting on telegraphic instructions from the British embassy in Washington, A. H. Hubbard, British vice consul here, today began an investigation into the flogging, tarring and feathering here last August of Rev. Philip S. Irwin, archdeacon of the Protestant Episcopal church, who engaged in work among the negroes of Miami. Hubbard said the inquiry would include investigation of similar treatment accorded George Doty, negro blacksmith. Irwin and Doty are British subjects. Both left the county after their experience with the masked men.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—China's request for withdrawal of foreign troops from China referred to committee headed by Elihu Root for further study at today's meeting of committee on Far Eastern and Pacific affairs to Washington conference.

#### PROHIBITION PARTY TO REMAIN "ALIVE"

CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—The prohibition party will continue to work as a political party along the same lines as in the past, its national committee decided here to-day.

Sentiment was against changing the party's name and enlarging its major issues or for winding up its affairs in the belief that its work was done. At the close of the two-day meeting even the suggestion that the party might quit if the republican or democratic party took up its work was rejected.

### In the Naval Controversy That Seems to Split on the Ratio

### SUBMIT QUESTIONS

#### TO HOME GOVERNMENT AND EXACT NATURE OF LATEST MOVE IS UNKNOWN

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Negotiations over the naval program according to feeling in American conference quarters are proceeding unsatisfactorily. Four American delegates meeting today went over the situation as it now stands. More definite statutes said to be improbable before next week.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Great Britain, as the ally of Japan, is using her influence to bring the Japanese views in the naval ratio dispute into harmony with those of the United States.

With this development, the Japanese plenipotentiaries again have submitted the whole question to their home government.

The exact nature of the latest move for a solution of the ratio problem is not disclosed, but it is indicated that Great Britain has found a double interest in the success of the negotiations because she had accepted in principle the American "5-5-3" proposal and because, on the other hand, she is in alliance with Japan, who asks for a ratio of "10-10-7."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—Complete abolition of the submarine as an instrument of warfare still is regarded by the British delegation as the most preferable decision to be reached by the armament conference when the question of submarine is brought up.

While the British delegates realize, it was said today, that their view as to the unsuitability of the submarine for warfare might not prevail in the conference, they felt certain it would receive much sympathy in the world at large.

In anticipation of a lively discussion of this subject before the conference, one of the highest British authorities last night set out the British attitude as follows:

The submarine hardly can be used without being abused. In the past it certainly was a gross abuse of every rule of war; it destroyed the innocent and the non-belligerent as well as the crews of warships; there might be a legitimate use for the submarine if it could be confined to operations against merchant ships without violation of the rules of war.

Moreover, the British spokesman said he doubted seriously whether the submarine really was the weapon of the weaker power against the stronger.

### GERMAN MINISTER WANTS BIG LOAN FROM ENGLAND

#### WOULD BORROW FIFTY MILLION POUNDS FROM BANK OF ENGLAND

(By The Associated Press) LONDON, Dec. 2.—Former German minister of reconstruction Rathenau, negotiating with Sir Robert Horne, Chancellor of Exchequer, and with officials of the Bank of England for a loan of fifty million pounds sterling to Germany, learned here on high authority today. It was understood that Rathenau would be given a definite answer today, which high officials said probably would be in the negative.

JOHN LANDMAN DIES IN ROCHESTER

John Landman, a former resident of Altamonte and well known here, died at Rochester, Minn., where he was receiving attention at the sanitarium of Mayo Brothers. Fred Walema received the announcement of Mr. Landman's death today by wire and the statement that the funeral would occur at the late home of the deceased at Grand Rapids today under the auspices of Grand Rapids lodge of Elks.

Mr. Landman lived for many years in Grand Rapids, Mich., and had a large circle of friends in that city. On account of failing health he came to Florida several years ago settling near Altamonte and planting an orange grove. Failing health made it necessary for him to give up active work and he removed to St. Petersburg where he owned two Federal bakeries. He was taken to Rochester several months ago and all that medical skill could do was done for him with no avail. His friends here will learn with regret of the death of Jack Landman, who was well liked by those who knew him.

DEATH OF GEO. H. ROBERTS

George H. Roberts died at the home of his son South of the city on Wednesday afternoon after a lingering illness. The funeral was held from the home today at 3 o'clock, Rev. Clarke officiating. Interment was made in Lakeview cemetery.

Decensed was born in Oswego, New York, in 1840, and with his parents moved to Toledo, Ohio, when he was a young boy. He made his home in Toledo for many years coming to Florida with his son two years ago. He was a veteran of the Civil war, being a member of a company volunteering at Toledo.

FOUR INJURED IN FIRE DESTROYING BIG PAPER PLANT

AUGUSTA, Ga., Dec. 1.—Four firemen were injured and property and stock loss of \$75,000 suffered when fire gutted the Georgia-Carolina Paper Company and the Bothwell Grocery Company here tonight. The fire occurred in a chain of eight warehouses owned by J. T. Bothwell.

A half hour after the fire started all the warehouses were in danger, as was the Augusta factory, one of Augusta's largest cotton mills nearby. The condition of the injured firemen is not regarded as serious. They were caught under a falling brick wall.

LENA CLARKE CASE GOES TO JURY TODAY OR TOMORROW A. M.

(Continued from Page One) have paranoid tendencies. He said that a wide latitude must be given in fixing whether a constitutional psychopath with paranoid tendencies is insane.

When the defense sought to pin him down in asking if it were not true that the only difference on which he based his opinion as to the sanity of Lena Clarke and the alienists for the defense was in fact that he ascribed her transitory flights to delusions and they to delusions, and that if there might not be a reasonable doubt as to the infallibility of his opinion as opposed to theirs should the case rest on it, he replied:

"I don't know whether or not the case hinges on it or not, but if so it wouldn't alter my opinion that Lena Clarke was sane when she committed the crime with which she is charged."

Dr. W. H. Spiers, alienist for the defense, took the stand early in the morning session of court. The former member of the state medical board at Chattahoochee, in his testimony to the jury, corroborated the opinion of Dr. Ralph N. Green, the well known alienist from Jacksonville, in declaring Lena Clarke was a constitutional psychopath with paranoid delusions; that she was insane and did not know the difference between right and wrong at the time of the committal of the act with which she is charged, and that she would remain in an asylum for the rest of her life if she were sent there.

A hasty conference of the defense was noted when Judge C. O. Andrews using his prerogative, from the bench questioned the witness, Dr. Spiers, with regard to the injury to the skull suffered by the defendant when she was three years old. The court sought to establish whether it had been determined if the blow from the well handle had pierced both walls of the skull. The witness said that the only way to determine if the inner wall guarding the brain had been pierced was by an X-ray.

Following the conclusion of the cross-examination by the state of Dr. Ralph N. Green, alienist for the defense, four witnesses were called to the stand by the defense. All testified that Rena Norman, the state witness who testified that Lena Clarke had told her from her cell next to hers in the Orange county jail that "she was in jail for killing a man," was a woman of bad character. The witnesses were A. C. Griffin, J. H. Dickson, J. W. Pounds and Earl Murray, all of Ocoee, where Rena Norman had testified she lived for several months last year.

In rebuttal the state brought four lay witnesses from West Palm Beach to the stand to testify that they had known Lena Clarke for a number of years and had always regarded her as sane. On cross-examination the defense failed to find that they had observed any peculiarities during the time they had known her.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Progress toward normal conditions throughout the country has been continuous during November despite a relative slowing down" as compared with the previous two months, the Federal Reserve Board said last night in its monthly business and financial review. "On the whole," the board said, "the best opinion now looks to a steady, even if locally interrupted, progress back to normal conditions, altho no immediate or sudden expansion or boom is in sight."

WASHINGTON, December 1.—The record of the republican party in the extra session of congress is described as a "disgraceful failure" by Representative Garrett, of Tennessee, acting democratic leader of the house, in a statement to appear in the congressional record tomorrow. Although the congress is not in session, it will issue an "extra" of the record to accommodate the many members who desire to "revise and extend" their remarks of the last few days of the session.

Here in Dade county, for instance, if three thousand dollars' worth of the seals are sold, a visiting nurse will be furnished for one year. She will be provided with an automobile so that she can get about without loss of time and energy; and wherever there are cases of tuberculosis, she will be able in some measure to alleviate them and to prevent their carrying infection to other people.

And cannot Dade county easily buy three thousand seals? Cannot it buy five thousand or ten thousand seals?

It is entirely proper to begin using Christmas seals now. MR. FORD WILL NOT GEP MUSCLE SHOALS

From the start it has been evident the big interests were opposed to the sale of Muscle Shoals to Henry Ford, and Associated Press dispatches of Monday indicate that the manufacturer is not going to succeed in his effort to gain control of the nitrate plant. The Associated Press dispatches states "belief that congress would reject the offer was said to be justified on the ground of economy and its repeated refusal to appropriate more money for the completion of the Muscle Shoals project."

Congress, as has been proved repeatedly, engages in a lot of false economy but an essentially important things fails to show a sense of true economy. It will appropriate millions for some wild-eyed scheme, yet when a call is made for an appropriation which has as its purpose economic progress it hesitates, displaying the economy of a frugal housewife.

Henry Ford has made every assurance that if Muscle Shoals is sold to him he will use it in advancing the agricultural and other interests of the

section in which it is located. Government engineers say it will cost from \$42,000,000 to \$50,000,000 to complete the Wilson dam. Mr. Ford says it can be done for \$28,000,000. But Mr. Ford isn't given the opportunity to prove his estimate.

The government has millions tied up in Muscle Shoals. Even if the government lost money by selling the plant it would profit in the long run, because the plant is now a dead weight and Mr. Ford offers every assurance that he will complete it and put it in operation as soon as possible. If the government keeps the plant, in the long run it will cost more than the difference between the estimate of its engineers and the estimate of Mr. Ford's engineers. At the same time doing no good for the South, nor for any other section of the country. The big interests are opposed to the sale. They do not like Mr. Ford and plan to gain control of the nitrate plant themselves. Therein lies the story.—Florida Metropolis.

FOR SAFETY IN AIR TRAVEL

Elaborate Devices That Are Under Consideration by British Experts in Aviation.

Three new fog devices to overcome the drawbacks of mist and fogs to air-men are stated to be under discussion by British authorities. The first consists of the "laying along the route" traversed by the airplane of a powerfully charged electrical cable. This automatically sends up into the air a constant series of signals. By keeping his machine in such a position that the strength of the signals is kept constant the airman is assured that he is flying along the cable line. The second makes for safety in landing when the ground is not visible, and consists of a wire, with a weight attached, which is lowered from beneath the machine; when the weight touches the earth the airman learns that it is time to "flatten out" his machine. The third is called the "artificial horizon." It is a gyroscope instrument which shows an artificial horizon line always in front of the pilot and enables him to detect instantly when his machine is heading over too much sideways in its relation to the real horizon, which is temporarily invisible. A tiny model airplane poised above the artificial horizon line indicates precisely the movements of his own machine. —Scientific American.

MISTRESS OF HIGH FINANCE

One Feels That Indianapolis Woman's Abilities Are Almost Wasted in 'the Home.'

Some wives are real business women and their husbands are the only ones who do not know it. But Indianapolis holds one who recently proved her business ability to her husband. Now, she had, ever since their marriage, charged things and he had paid the bills, but when he learned that her charges were growing weekly he decided to try a new plan. He went to her. "Now, Elmer," he said, "I'm going to try a new plan. Half of my salary is yours and half mine. We'll each spend just what is necessary and see which can have the most money in the bank at the end of the year." Delightfully the wife agreed. At the end of the first month she announced her bank balance and her husband was delighted at its size. The next month it was still larger and he was more delighted. But when the third month brought the statement that she had saved more than her half of the money his pleasure knew no bounds. Half fearfully he went after his own statement. What would he do if her bank account now was higher than his—the man who prided himself on his economy?

Then he found that he had no balance. First horror, then amazement and then something indescribable followed his discovery for that condition of affairs existing. His wife had diligently drawn out his savings (they had a double checking account) and applied them to the next month's expenses and saved her own share. —Indianapolis News.

SONG SLOW TO WIN FAVOR

But "Tipperary" Will Be Dear to British Hearts for Many Generations to Come.

"It's a Long Way to Tipperary" was written in 1911 by Jack Judge, a singer in the English music halls and of pure Irish blood. A friend, Harry Williams, assisted him in the work; but virtually words and music are Mr. Judge's own. He carried the manuscript from publisher to publisher without success, until in 1912 he tried the London house of B. Feldman & Co. Bert Feldman liked the piece and was willing to publish it if Mr. Judge would agree to certain minor changes. One was the repetition of the word "long" and another was the lengthening of the third syllable of the word "Tipperary"—both toward the end of the chorus. Mr. Judge consented and the song was published, as it also had been written with not a thought that it would become, two years later, a marching song of soldiers in a great war, and so known wherever English is "said" or "sung." At first the song had only a slight sale. But Mr. Feldman kept his confidence, and, as the story goes, one day when the composer was deploring the cool reception of the piece at Edinburgh, the publisher said to him: "Take my word for it, that not only Edinburgh but all the world will one day ring with your song."

And it did. "Tipperary" will never be forgotten by the English. It has an inner meaning dear to them.

The Divine Sarah Bernhardt.

Among the many distinctions of the Divine Sarah is that of having impersonated death more frequently than any other artist on record. Some years ago a devotee calculated the number of death scenes in which Madame Bernhardt had played, and computed that her deaths by self-administered poison numbered over 10,000, her leaps into a scenic Seine over 7,000, and her suicides by revolver shots over 5,000. The realism of her acting in such scenes utterly overwhelmed the Sultan, Abdul Hamid. Once, and once only did she play before him in the private theater at Constantinople, when he left his seat and declared he never again wished to see a woman who imitated death so realistically.

Forgot the Rules.

A Greek who had been in this country four years and heard many stories about hunting rabbits, decided he wished to go hunting. He found an American who would take him. The Greek thought it great sport. He played dog and "scared" out the rabbits and the American boy shot them.

After a while the Greek wished to try his luck at shooting, so the American showed him how to handle the shotgun.

They scared up a rabbit; the Greek put the gun to his shoulder, but did not shoot.

The American exclaimed: "Why don't you shoot?"

The Greek replied: "I forgot which eye you have to squeeze."

Rope and Telephone Wires.

Rope from ships that have sailed the seven seas—that has been tied to every part in the world—ends its career by guarding the nation's telephone conversation.

From junk rope is made the high grade of paper which insulates every wire in a piece of telephone cable. Over 13,000,000 pounds of old rope worn fed to the giant vats which tore, cooked, washed and bent into a pulp the makings of 7,000,000 pounds of cable paper used by the Bell Telephone system last year.

Queen Keeps Diary 50 Years.

Queen Alexandra, it is said, has kept a diary for nearly half a century. Her little books are each nine inches long by four wide, and bound in satin, which is painted with flowers.

FORREST LAKE STATES HIS POSITION.

To the Voters of Sanford:

It has come to my attention that efforts are still being made to have the people believe that if elected City Commissioner I would disrupt our present form of government.

Now nothing could be further from the truth than such propaganda, for the following reasons:

First: I will be only one of three commissioners and could not do any act without being joined by one or more of the others.

Second: The City Commissioners cannot under the law abolish the present charter, even though they all combine.

The city charter can only be changed by an act of the legislature, or by a vote of the people themselves.

Furthermore, I have no desire to upset the present form of government, as it is the substance that counts in anything, and not the form. However, there can doubtless be some improvements made in the present charter as has already been demonstrated, for example, the present method of nominating candidates; but such improvements are matters for the legislature, or for the people themselves, and cannot be effected by the commissioners.

I believe that the administrative affairs of the city can be run on a more economical basis than is being done at present, and at the same time, with greater efficiency, and if elected I shall work to that end.

I believe that the law requiring a budget for each fiscal year's revenues and expenses should be rigidly followed, and that the administrative affairs of the city should be conducted on that basis.

I have made no statement or promise of what I shall do if elected, and shall not do so, except such public statements as may be published over my signature, as is this one.

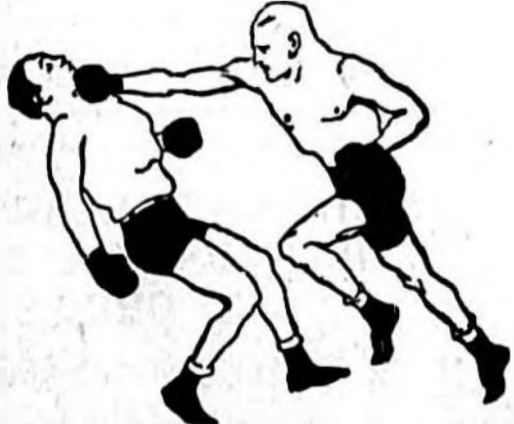

### Lena Clarke Case to Jury This Afternoon

(Continued from Page One)

ing to let the case go to the jury merely on the testimony of these two witnesses for the state, adding that there must certainly have been a reasonable doubt as to Lena Clarke's sanity in the minds of the jurors following their taking the stand.

The court recessed for a few moments when Attorney Chillingworth finished and when Judge Andrews returned to the bench at 4:10, the state had another turn through John C. Jones, brother of the state attorney, who has been assisting in the prosecution. Attorney Jones confined his remarks to a review of the evidence, although he too attacked the plea of insanity.

Miss Clarke continued her perusal of the works of Sir Walter Scott throughout the ninth day of her trial and appeared to take no interest in the proceedings, even when the attorneys reached the highest notes of their oratory. Baxter Paterson read a magazine, although he frequently looked up and smiled as counsel for the state reviewed the evidence. He remarked yesterday afternoon that he was "sore because they're not paying enough attention to me," when asked if he was not pleased with the small mention he was receiving at the hands of the attorneys.

The Rev. and Mrs. Clarke sat directly behind their daughter inside the railing of the court room and appeared not to miss a word of the proceedings. The Rev. Clarke frequently turned his eyes toward his daughter and in every instance would then glance toward the floor. On one occasion he clasped the hand of the little white-haired mother who sat at his side, but at no time did the aged couple show any indication of the sorrow that has come into their lives. The court room was crowded to capacity as it has been each day of the trial, and not one of the spectators failed to notice every detail which developed during the day. Several of the women spectators brought lunch baskets to the court house in order that they might keep their seats for both morning and afternoon sessions. The final argument for the defense will be made by Edward W. Davis, while States Attorney Jones will close for the prosecution. Attorney Davis is expected to begin immediately when court opens this morning at 9 o'clock and Attorney Jones will follow him. The usual legal ceremonies will occupy some little time, as will the reading of Judge Andrews' instructions, so it will likely be afternoon when the jury finally retires.

### DISASTER COMES WITH RAIN

Algerian Native Houses Are Built to Afford Shelter Only From the Sun's Rays.

In Algeria one of the perplexing little puzzles of my childhood was set at rest, writes Temple Manning in the Chicago Journal. Until I went there I had never been able to figure out exactly what was meant by the passage in the Bible that reads: "How can we make bricks, for we have no more straw?"

But when I saw the Algerians make bricks by incising short straws in the mud of the fields, patting the bricks into shape, and drying them in the sun, the mystery was explained. And then one day when it rained I wondered why they ever did it.

Fortunately it seldom rains in Algeria, but that day it rained as I never saw it rain before or since. The very heavens seemed to open and the celestial reservoir to empty itself within a few hours. A veritable river gathered in the streets and ran from house to house throughout the little village, and every once in a while I heard through the darkness of noonday a dull splash.

The next morning I waded through the village to see what had happened, and I found whole families camping out on the highest ground, for their houses had melted away. It rains so seldom that the natives do not include it in their scheme of life; they build their houses for the sunny days. And when the rain comes their mud-brick houses, unless strongly white-washed, and they seldom are, fall down and melt into mud heaps.

Then the whole family goes camping until the house is rebuilt. "Tu cha Allah!" smiles the serene owner—"It is the will of God."

### ARTICLE NOW SELDOM SEEN

But Many Decades Ago the "Antimacassar" Was a Part of Every Well-Regulated Home.

Did you ever come across the word "antimacassar"? If you are from New England you surely have met it, for New England is its home. The word means "an ornamental covering thrown over chairs, sofas, etc., to prevent their being soiled by the hair." Its derivation dates back to the romance of the days when American clipper ships ranged all over the seven seas and their bywaters.

The hardy skipper of those days used to bring home a substance produced on the island of Celebes, in the eastern archipelago, named macassar oil, from the place where it was obtained. There was a belief in those days that this oil tended to retard or prevent baldness. So it was used in plentiful quantities by beaus and near-beaux.

But the oil worked havoc with the parts of chairs and sofas whereon the aforesaid beaus reposed their shaggy heads. So the New England housewives, as a preventive, devised the antimacassar (see the Latin "anti" against). Thrifty ladies, weren't they—and neat beyond cavil.—Chicago Journal.

### Drink Plenty of Water.

Are you taking at least eight glasses of water a day? It is food and medicine! It is more necessary to drink at least this amount than to comb your hair or wash your face. If our bodies did not have an enormous capacity for taking punishment the terrible perils we daily subject ourselves to if we do not drink enough water would be understood by every man, woman and child.

It can be figured out, mathematically almost, that the lungs give off what amounts to more than two glasses of water a day. The skin gives off that much, or a good deal more, while the kidneys are subject to all sorts of irritations, followed by disease, when the fluids of the body are too heavy with the wastes and breakdown from every one of the billions of body cells. Copious water drinking dilutes these wastes.—Chicago Tribune.

### They Had One, Too.

Five-year-old Mary Ellen likes the hospital in their square because when she goes over to visit the nurses they always take her around to see the new babies there. But recently her folks have been fewer than usual as her next-door neighbor has a small incubator which has been hatching luffy chickens. Interestingly Mary Ellen has been watching him take them from the incubator.

### Tracing Movement of Birds.

The desire to learn what become of birds that flew south with the approach of cold weather led Audubon, the great American naturalist, to place silver threads about the legs of a brood of plovers. The following spring he was rewarded by having two of the birds return to nest near the haunts where they learned to fly.

This occurred early in the Nineteenth century and was the first known case in America of bird banding. Since that time this means of securing information on the movements and life history of migratory birds has been used by many societies, and every fall thousands of birds fly south bearing a narrow ring, stamped with a number, about one of its legs.
