When he runs in that state, he will be running against President Truman, or some other Democratic nominee. Stassen is a former governor of Minnesota where he made an outstanding record. He served in the Navy during the war where he was on the staff of Admiral Nimitz and rose to the rank of captain. He was also delegate to the San Francisco conference which drafted the United Nations Charter. Without a doubt he is one of the best qualified men in the United States for the presidency.
