The last chapter in the Frank case is ended. A mob broke into the penitentiary last night MANY SHOTS. and at one o'clock this morning the body of Frank was suspended from the limb of a tree at Marietta, about thirty miles from the prison at Milledgeville and filled with bullets. The particulars of the storming of the well fortified penitentiary by the mob of about seventy five men and the taking of Leo Frank from the place will be told when the full particulars can be learned. 
