





There is every indication that this situation wil 5 crest in the weeks ahead. Before everyone is drawn into this phenomena there are a few basic facts that fairly cry for emphasis and attention. First and foremost is that everyone who would

engage in such enlivening conversations be sure that he is registered. Next in basic priorities must be the determina-

tion to VOTE. Registering is not enough. It may serve as a pacifier to one's civic conscience, but it is just

Voting is that end of the old challenge to "put your money where your mouth is" when applied to the political contest. Our emphasis on this is provoked by the pressure of the calendar-Oct. 4th is the day on which all Florida voter registrations will end.

challenging fact that new families are moving in increasing numbers and at an increasing rate into our booming Central Florida area every day.

To those who were registered voters in their old homes, we would point out that they can register here and vote in the national election. If they have lived in Florida for one year and in Seminole County for six months, then they can vote in state and county

This brings up the whole question of voting, its responsibilities and its privileges. With the almost complete coverage of political events-witness our news columns and this page-a supply of facts and informed opinion is available.


