SPD makes strides toward accreditation

SANFORD — Wholesale changes to the Sanford Police Department, which began when Brian Tooley became chief two years ago, are becoming a reality. A new 650-page policy and procedures manual and a high-tech employee assessment database are just two upgrades scheduled for the beginning of 2002. Expectations are the changes will improve officer performance and the department's service to the community.

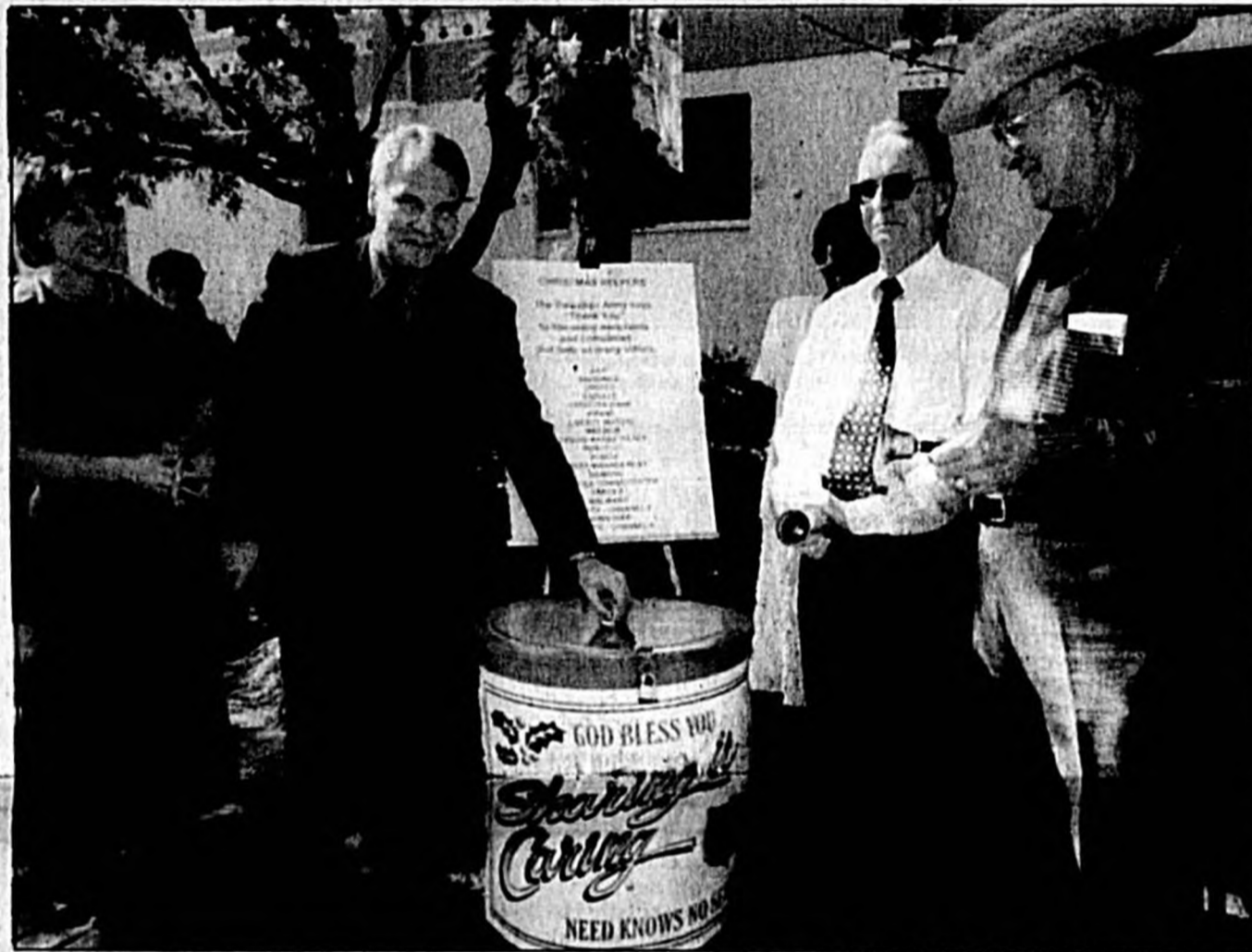
New policies and employee evaluations are designed to meet rigorous standards

Tooley also hopes the changes will lead to the force's first-ever state accreditation. "When I got here there was two or three different policy manuals," Tooley said. Composed from the ground-up and with "very specific written directives," the new manual is set for completion in

the next few months. Drafting the replacement was a "major undertaking" that started shortly after his arrival, he said. Beginning Jan. 1, the entire department's staff will experience another switch when the traditional hand written employee evaluation forms are abandoned for a sleeker computerized ver-

sion. Armed with 3,000 specific employee tasks and a complex point scale the Performance Management Plus program helps the evaluation process become "less subjective and more objective," Tooley said. Although the Sanford Police Department is the first Central Florida agency to implement the evaluation database, hundreds of departments nationwide currently utilize the Tallahassee company's software. Donation adds up for county teachers

Florida Power contributes \$50,000 to finance math and science certifications

Florida Power is helping Seminole County Public Schools place more math and science teachers in classrooms. Sophia Petkov, Florida Power Community Relations manager, presented a \$50,000 check to the Seminole School Board Thursday for the Foundation for Seminole County Public Schools. The funds will go toward the Florida Power Tuition Reimbursement Grant, which helps finance tuition costs for school employees obtaining certification in the areas of math and science.

"Florida Power is committed to education," Petkov said. "We knew a big issue for the school system is the teacher shortage, which will only get worse in the future. We wanted to figure out a way to help put more teachers in the classroom."

The grant is available to eligible district employees, including those who are in the process of obtaining initial certification or working to add certification in the areas of math, science, computer science and industrial arts technology. An applicant must already be a full-time instructional employee in the school system.

According to the Petkov, who is also a Foundation board member, the grant will help school system employees who have considered going back to school to obtain their degree or certi-

Police link 'traveling criminal' to local thefts

SANFORD — A 42-year-old Polish woman described by police as a "traveling criminal" is awaiting trial in the county jail for a 1997 Longwood burglary. Barbara Dolinska was being held in state custody at the Broward Correctional

Institute in Fort Lauderdale, but with her recent state release, law enforcement agencies are lining up to press charges. Thought by police to be committing home burglaries in Central and South Florida for many years, Dolinska's criminal notoriety may be more heralded on the West Coast. According to Lt. John Thorpe of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, Dolinska

has connections to the original LA 20, a Los Angeles based group of about 20 ethnic Hungary, Poland and Germany jewelry burglars responsible for a rash of home invasions in the late 1980s. "It was the first time they grabbed the law enforcement's attention as an untraditional

Sanford chop shop operation closed

The Seminole County Auto Theft Bureau, Sanford police and Seminole County deputies are investigating a suspected chop shop operation located at a Sanford home.

Deputies served a warrant at 1511 Mellonville Ave. Thursday. So far, they've identified a stolen box-type trailer, a stolen travel trailer as well as a stolen pick-up truck.

There are other vehicles on the site where the vehicle identification numbers do not match their parts, police said. There are also other car parts and vehicle motors on scene that are being inventoried. Some marijuana was also discovered at the home, said SCSO Chief Deputy Steve Harriett.

"We're recovering multiple items of stolen property," Harriett said.

Authorities have arrested 37-year-old Richard VanAlstyne in connection with the operation. He is accused of grand theft auto and is suspected by authorities to be

involved in area utility trailer thefts for the past year, maybe two. He was under surveillance at the time of his arrest. VanAlstyne is believed to have links to another stolen vehicle operation that was busted in Lake Mary in March of this year.

In that case 39-year-old Steven Wayne Noe was arrested for grand theft auto. The arrest occurred at 188 Humphrey Road in Lake Mary. Noe is currently out of jail on bond awaiting trial.

Woman who ran from family yearns to return to the fold

DEAR ABBY: A year ago, I made a horrible mistake. I ran away from home. I am not a child — I am a 40-year-old wife and mother.



Dear Abby

I was unhappy with my husband and walked away from my life. I left everything: my kids, my clothes, and the mementos I had collected my entire life.

For a long time before that, I felt unneeded and alone. My husband talked to me mostly in irritated tones — as if everything I said to him was stupid or worthless. My teen-aged sons were disrespectful or ignored me altogether. Their father thought it was funny and said it was my fault. So I ran.

I have had no contact with anyone for a year. Not my kids, my mother or any of my friends. I am lonely and miserable. I suffer from depression. I had a bad case of endometriosis and large fibroids. I am recovering from a full hysterectomy.

The reason I am writing is that I miss my family. I want so much to hug my sons and make sure they are all right. After what I have done, I am not sure I have that right any longer. I don't want to cause more upheaval in their lives. I love them very much, and I know what I did was wrong. I probably don't deserve their forgiveness.

Maybe I should stay out of their lives for good, but my heart aches. I am so confused and scared — but mostly lonely. I really need your advice.

LOST MOTHER IN THE MIDWEST

DEAR LOST: What you did was irrational, and whether it was triggered by your depression or a hormonal imbalance is anybody's guess. Before trying to contact your family, I urge you to schedule some sessions with a counselor to be sure you're strong enough to face what may lie ahead. Once you're on firmer emotional footing, the counselor — or a clergyman — should mediate and facilitate the family reunion. I wish you the best of luck.

DEAR ABBY: I must respond to the letter from "Stamp Out Stereotyping," who asked why patrons of the parents' "ethnic" restaurant assume that he/she has no command of the English language.

Carrying a Concealed Firearm

All in the family Legacy slots at universities are discriminatory, too

The University of Georgia's modest affirmative action program should not have been so controversial. It was a factor in only 10 percent to 20 percent of applications, and at its best the program never managed to boost UGA's black student body to more than 6 percent.

Last fall, UGA had 24,010 undergraduates, but just 1,368 African-Americans — and relatively few of those admitted through affirmative action. Was that worth fighting over?

Apparently so. Like other colleges and universities that attempt to increase the diversity of their student bodies, UGA has been hit by a series of lawsuits attacking its affirmative action efforts. So has the University of Michigan. So has the University of Texas. And on and on.

Earlier this month, Georgia's Board of Regents announced that UGA would drop its affirmative-action program rather than continue to face court challenges. The University of Michigan, however, has decided to defend its effort — a slightly different program than UGA's — before the U.S. Supreme Court.

Critics of affirmative action in college admissions have argued that such efforts are patently unfair because they grant "racial preferences," admitting unqualified black or Latino students over well-qualified white students. That has never been true. The University of Michigan and UGA may have admitted black students with slightly lower scores on the SAT, but they have never admitted students who are unqualified.

But for the sake of argument, let's pretend the critics are right. Isn't exactly the same thing true of legacy? Isn't saving spaces in the freshman class for the less-qualified sons and daughters of graduates also patently unfair? Why doesn't that upset proponents of merit (narrowly defined as scores on standardized admissions tests)? Why hasn't legacy been challenged in court?

Most selective institutions, public and private, set aside slots for family members of graduates. Legacy is practiced in the Ivy League, at UGA, Duke, the University of Texas, the University of Virginia and most other prestigious colleges.

Given centuries of legally sanctioned racism, the practice automatically discriminates against blacks. Since its first alumni finished in 1804, for example, UGA has graduated hundreds of thousands of whites. But it has graduated only about 5,300 blacks since it started admitting them in 1961. The pool of blacks eligible for legacy, therefore, is minuscule by comparison.

Legacy is affirmative action for those families with a long tradition of college attendance, the vast majority of whom are white. It is baffling that conservatives who argue that college admissions should be based on a rigid standard of scholarship have never been troubled by admissions of less-qualified family members of alumni.

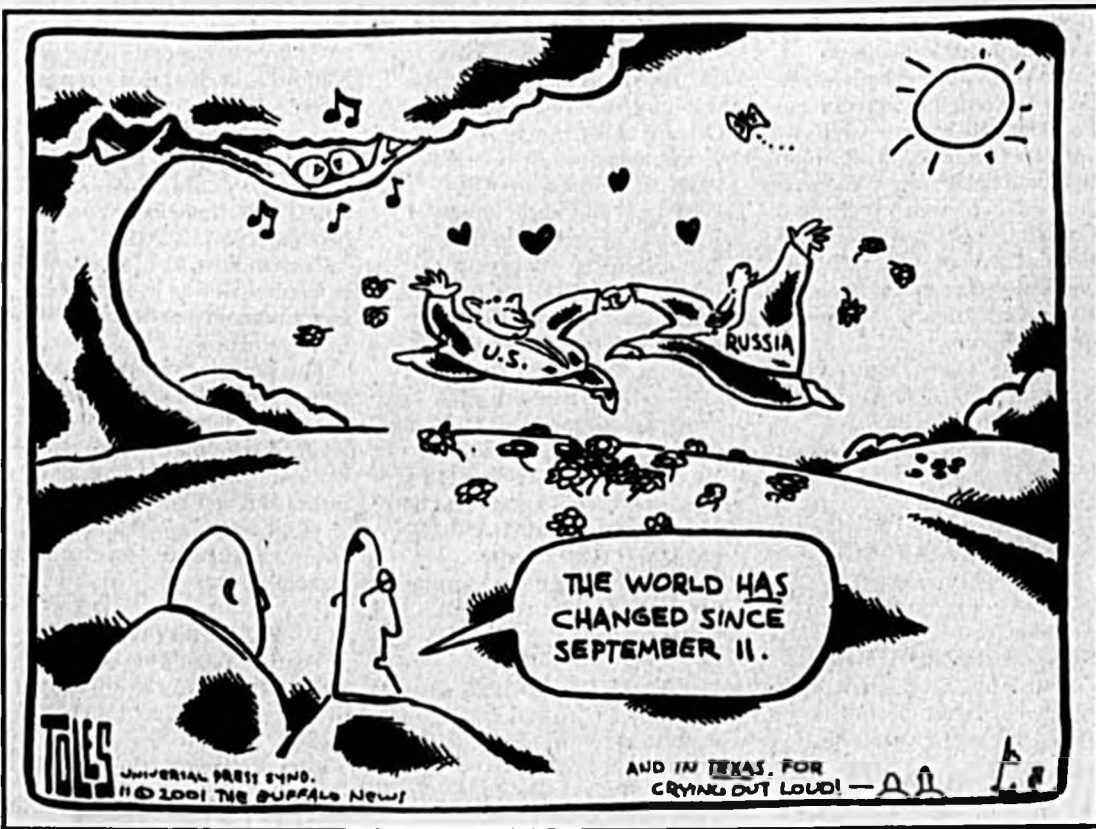
Why is that? Surely those critics are not placated because legacy benefits mostly the white and affluent. Surely their opposition to affirmative action is a matter of principle — and color-blind.

Defenders of legacy note that students admitted because of it perform about as well as students admitted on the basis of test scores only. However, the same is true of black students admitted through college affirmative-action programs. According to a landmark study by William Bowen, former president of Princeton University, and Derek Bok, former president of Harvard University, black graduates of 28 elite institutions — many, such as Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas, admitted through affirmative action — earned advanced degrees in such fields as medicine and law at slightly higher rates than their white counterparts.

If critics of affirmative action are interested only in fairness, they should demand an end to legacy and insist on that change in court. Oddly, they have yet to rise to the challenge.

The City of Sanford has a long and well documented history of soliciting business endeavors that utilize a minimum wage workforce, unlike the prospering city of Lake Mary. The practice dates back to the days of our Founding Father, Henry Sanford, and continues today with the vast expansion of retailers, hotels and restaurants in the city limits. An

individual in today's society who makes \$6 an hour cannot possibly afford adequate health care coverage. To prevent the relocation and expansion of a needed medical facility is morally irresponsible, in light of our City leadership's aggressive pursuit of businesses who employ minimum wage workers. How ironic that the Mayor and City Commission is "thumbing their nose at the needs of their citizens."

The U.S. Surgeon General's extensive report on mental health published in 2000, states, "mental health and mental illness are part of the mainstream of health, and they are a concern for all people." This published report shows that mental illness ranks number two in the burden of disease on econ-

omy in the United States, second only to cardiovascular conditions and exceeding all malignant diseases.

The citizens of Sanford should be outraged at the comparison of their medical needs to the needs of dogs and cats in an animal shelter. The analogy clearly demonstrates the need for more Diversity Training for the Management and Staff of the Seminole Herald.

In war, truth and history usually die first

With a stroke of the pen on Nov. 1, President Bush stabbed history in the back and blocked Americans' right to know how presidents actually make decisions. A five-page executive order released by the White House the next day ended more than 30 years of movement toward openness in government and re-established the old standard of "need to know."

From now on, scholars, journalists and any other citizens will have to show "a demonstrated, specific need to know" even to ask to see documents and records from the Reagan, Clinton and two Bush presidencies — and all others to come. And if an individual or institution asks to see records never made public during a presidency but later deposited in the National Archives by former presidents, the requester seeking documents will now have to receive the permission of both the former president and the incumbent.

The wording of the Bush order puts it this way: "The Archivist shall not permit access to these records by a requester unless and until the incumbent President

advises the Archivist that the former President and the incumbent President agree to authorize access to the records or until so ordered by a final and nonappealable court."

My response to that was to send President Bush a couple of books on recent presidencies along with a note saying they might become valuable artifacts, because no writer will be able to do books like them anymore without approval from two presidents. I also attached a letter from his father, the first President Bush, praising the work of documenting presidential decision-making.

There are rules upon rules upon rules about which presidential papers become available and when — and some of them defy all reason. For more than 25 years, an inscription by the Irish writer Brendan Behan to President Kennedy was withheld from researchers, apparently because it was written on a copy of Evergreen magazine, a literary journal considered racy stuff in those days. And the rules change, though they have been changing in the direction of more and easier access, beginning with the

Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) in 1966 and post-Watergate laws, regulations and decisions defining presidential papers — with the exception of obviously personal items and true matters of national security — as public property, not a private archive.

Until last week, a citizen had the right to seek to review presidential papers five years after the end of a presidency under the FOIA, or to simply ask for all but the most sensitive records after 12 years. No more. "If you disagree, you can still go to court," a White House spokesperson told me. Right. If you have years and tens of thousands of dollars to spare to get to an unappealable decision.

The White House is emphasizing two reasons for Bush's order. One, certainly valid, is that premature disclosure of decision memos and such could stifle candid dialogue inside any White House. Second, they say, this is just a way to streamline the process, make it more orderly.

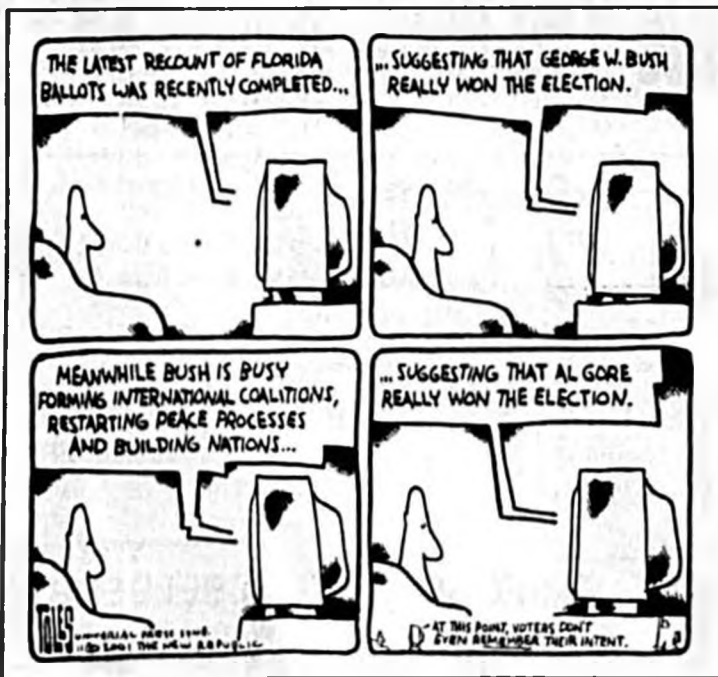
The first has always been true, and the republic has managed to survive when some truth slips out 20 years or so after the crisis of the day. The second is so unnecessary it is ludicrous. To make its case, the White House released the fact that there are

68,000 FOIA applications for records in President Reagan's library north of Los Angeles. Well, I know, because I am on the list there and have been told it will take at least a year and a half to process new requests. But it is hard to figure out how double presidential oversight will speed things up, unless the idea is to just say no.

And I think that is the idea. There are surely Reagan-era records that might be a touch embarrassing to some men and women back in power with the second President Bush. More important, though, the most controversial record searches of my lifetime have involved foreign assassinations and assassination attempts, particularly regarding the deaths of President Ngo Dinh Diem of South Vietnam, President Salvador Allende and Gen. Rene Schneider in Chile, and Fidel Castro in Cuba. I suspect these Bushmen, aware that they are headed into a nasty war, simply do not want to have to spend their later lives defending the decisions they are making now.

Secrecy is their way. If truth is the first casualty in all war, in this one, complete and candid history will be the second.

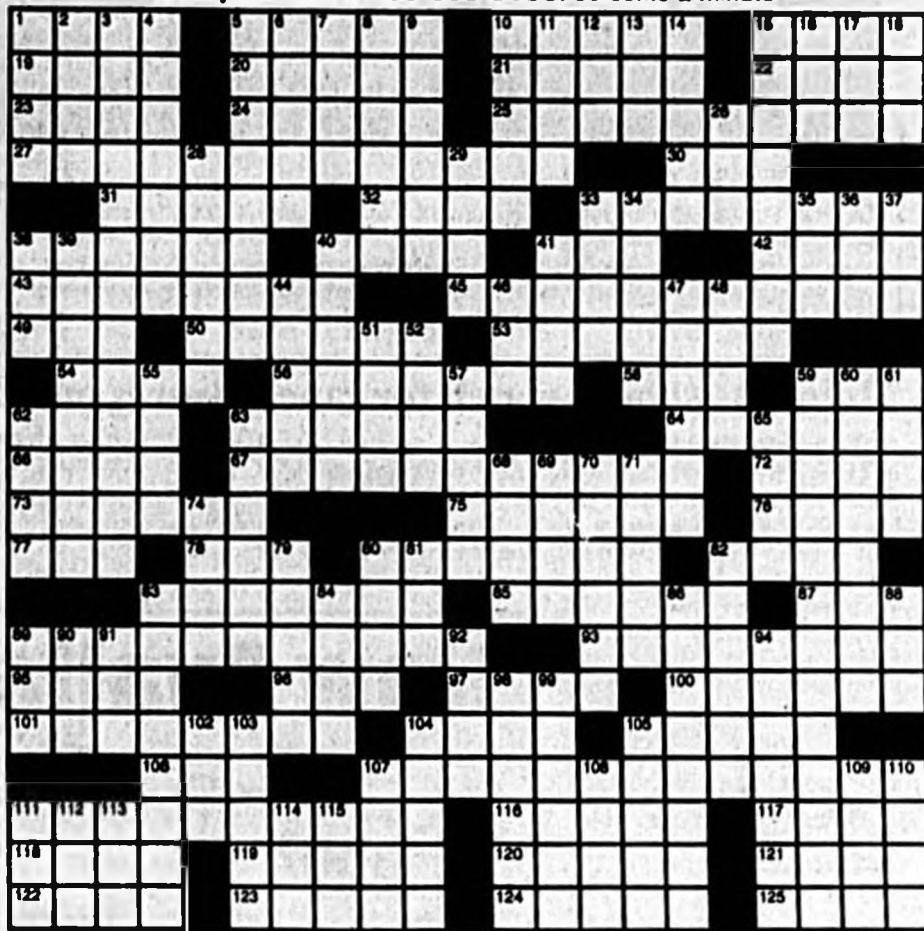

form of organized crime," Thorpe said.

The "traveling criminal" is part of a roving band of thieves that target residential areas during the day, said Thorpe. They typically steal jewelry which pays their "business expenses" of renting high priced cars and traveling by airplane to new locations. Some money is even thought to be funneled back to their home countries. What separates traveling criminals from a traditional criminal is the ability to produce false identification and then slip through the cracks of the judicial system.

Dolinska is known by police to have four aliases — Barbar Dolinska, Anna Waleska, Barbara Kozlowska, Basia Kozlowska — but officers are betting there are many others. "If you arrest them they have fake ID," Thorpe said. "They've

bonded out and gone before you can really find out who they are. They know how to work the system. If you do get them in court they'll try to plea down by offering to make full restitution to the victim and pay full court costs."

Dolinska is thought to have as many as five close associates — many of them from her own family. Family and ethnic ties make the groups hard to work from the inside, Thorpe said.

Jan Jalonski, and Dolinska's sister, Tamara, are also wanted on charges in the Longwood case. All three reportedly stole approximately \$15,000 worth of jewelry and precious metals

while the homeowner was away at church.

"Tamara Dolinska is wanted just as bad," Thorpe said. Neighbors at the time did notice something strange and asked the "traveling criminals" what they wanted, but according to the police report the thieves used the "lost dog ploy" to avoid confrontation.

Seminole County Judge Alan Dickey will hear the Longwood case Dec. 11. Since 1995, she has faced burglary charges from four different Florida counties; Pinellas, Palm Beach, Indian River and Manatee. In addition, Indian River County; St. Louis, Mo.; Clayton, Mo.; and immigration officials in Miami also have detainers on Dolinska.

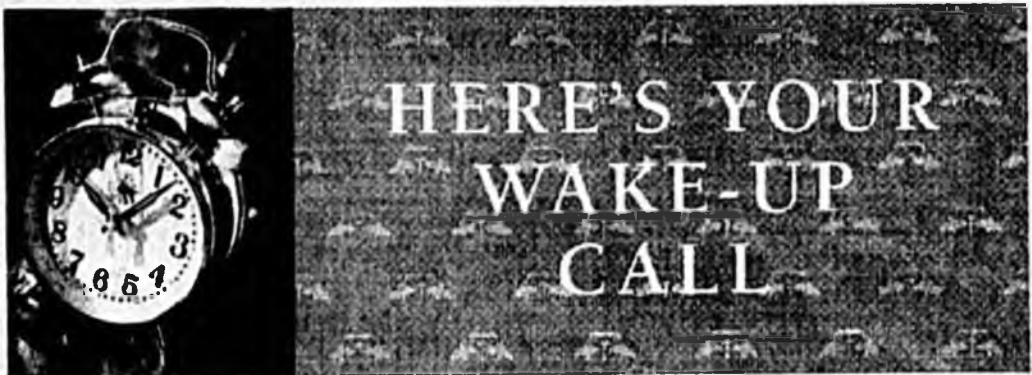
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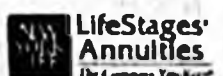
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SCC nursing instructor honored

SANFORD — Seminole Community College nursing instructor Maureen Tremel was recently honored with the Florida Association of Community Colleges' (FACC) Excellence in Curriculum Exemplary Practice Award at the 52nd Annual FACC Convention.

Each year the FACC's Curriculum Commission recognizes programs demonstrating exceptional achievement in curriculum or instruction.

Nominated last April by SCC's Dean's Council, Tremel's entry — which included a description and accompanying program materials — was sent to FACC's Curriculum Commission for review. Of six semi-finalists, three were cho-

sen as finalists and asked to present abbreviated versions of their innovative programs at the convention.

Competing with two professors from St. Petersburg College, Tremel presented "Responding to Community Needs with an On-line Paramedic to RN Transition Course."

The Paramedic to RN Transition tract in the Associate in Science degree program allows paramedics to pursue their education while working full-time and was designed to avoid skills repetition.

Students are able to complete the theory component of the first year of study solely on-line. Tests, interactive activities and streaming videos are offered via the Internet.

The program premiered in

Aug. 2000 with 11 experienced paramedics.

"Since that time, the nursing program has tried to get the word out about the program," Tremel said. "Ultimately, we'd like to expand, creating partnerships with colleges who may have one or two students interested in such a program, but who don't have the resources or overall student interest to develop a program like this."

"I'm hoping my presentations may increase awareness about the program and that we're willing to work with other institutions," she added.

In addition to winning the \$1,000 award, Tremel's abstract will be published in *Visions*, FACC's Journal of Applied Research.

Murder suspect may have ties to Central Florida

SANFORD — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office along with other area agencies are on the look out for a California triple-murder suspect that may have connections to the community.

Santa Cruz, Calif., police Sgt. Rudy Escalante's 10-year pursuit of Angel Manuel Rivera, 56, has his newest leads pointing to the Deltona and South Florida areas — locations he has visited in the past.

A California grand jury indicted Rivera on three counts of murder in 1991 for a drive-way shooting spree, Escalante said. Police believe Rivera

struck again in 1999 when an East Chicago woman was murdered.

"He was living there with a woman," Escalante said. "Her 11-year-old son awoke one morning and found her strangled in the living room. He was gone."

At the time of the Chicago murder, Rivera was using the alias Sylvester Vasquez, but other aliases include Jose Robles, Miguel Rivera and Manuel Rivera, said Escalante. Other locations Rivera is thought to have ties in is Pompano Beach and Milwaukee, Wis., as well as his homeland, Puerto Rico.

"We're running off some leads when we were in East

Chicago that some contacts said he's been to Florida in the past," Rivera said.

According to the SCSO alert, Rivera is a devout Catholic and frequents churches to do volunteer work and to find a place to stay.

Rivera is 5 feet 9 inches tall, weighs 175 pounds and has brown eyes, black hair and a medium complexion. The FBI also has a warrant issued for unlawful flight to avoid prosecution.

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County showcases GIS services

SANFORD — Wednesday marked the third annual Global Geographic Information Systems (GIS) technology day, but for Seminole County's GIS department it was its sixth.

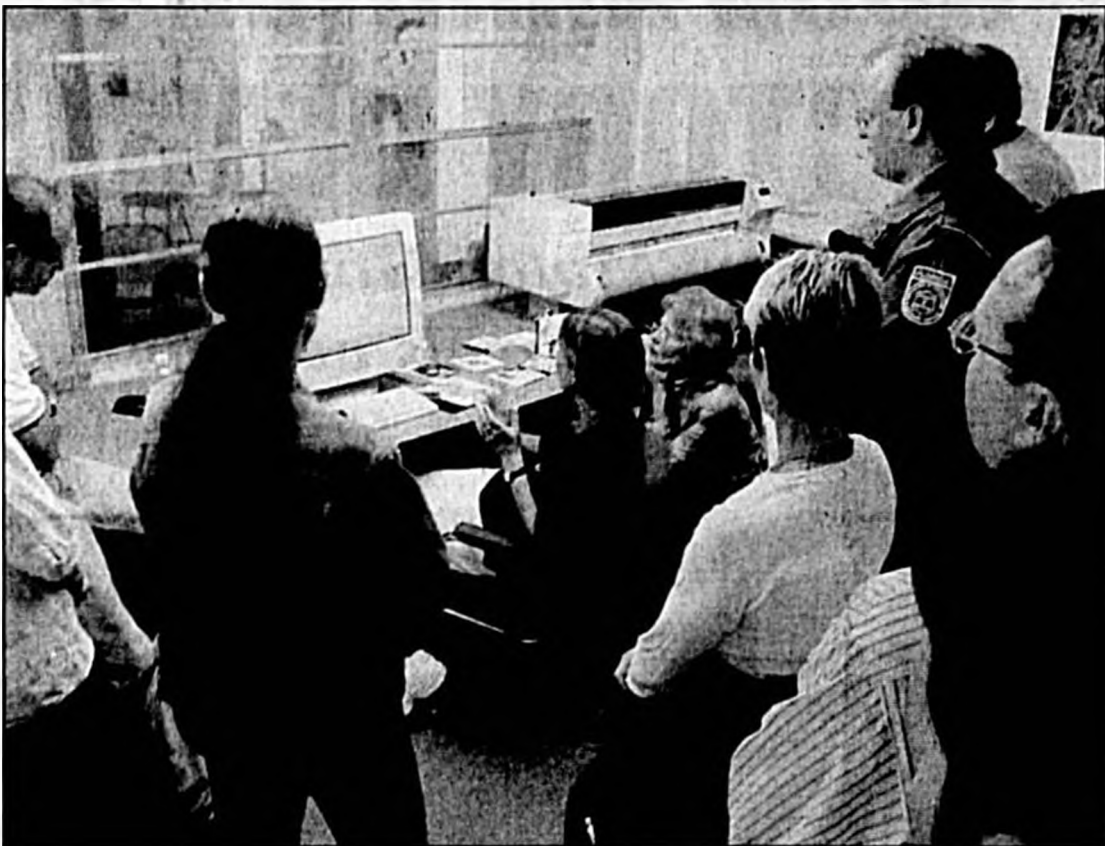
GIS technology is a collection of geographic data designed to efficiently capture, store, update, manipulate, analyze, and display all forms of geographically referenced information. The county's GIS technology may not be the premier global GIS program, but as many county residents learned during GIS Day 2001 they're definitely no slouch.

GIS Day 2001 helped educate millions of children and adults in more than 81 countries on the benefits of geography and the role GIS plays in its support of geography.

"This is a good opportunity to show people what GIS is and what it can do," said city of Sanford GIS technician Mike Jones, who visited the exhibit looking to share data. "It's always nice to see what the county is doing because they're at the forefront."

Geographical layers of information developed by the county GIS department help many county operations including planning, stormwater and the property appraiser's office. They also play a big part in county commission public hearings providing valuable reference points for sometimes heated discussions. What many county residents don't realize is the power of the county maps is also available to the public.

When New York City's emergency operations center was lost in the World Trade Center terrorist attack, GIS publications warned departments across the nation to make sure their data is stored on CD-

ROMs. Seminole County had been storing that vital information on CD-ROMs for two years, said Al Hill, county GIS program manager.

"We originally developed this CD in response to a hurricane that was bearing down on us," Hill said. "We could operate out of the back of our car if we needed to."

Much of that same information is available to the public with CD-ROMs that can be checked out from every county public library and through the web site at www.co.seminole.fl.us/gis/. The county map has more than 120 different layers of informa-

tion such as addresses, municipal boundaries and flood plains.

Also on the disc are some countywide aerial photos. Since 1995, Seminole County GIS has regularly completed new county aerial shots every few years. Not only do the series of aerial photos document the land use change and urban growth, but they also play an important role in the reconstruction and assessment after a disaster.

"The data is invaluable for emergency management folk," Hill said.

Some groups learning more about GIS technology included several cable companies, school

board employees, home owners associations and county staff.

Ken Covert and Linda Reynolds of the Seminole County/Lake Mary Chamber of Commerce also visited the GIS technology department. They said the information provided by the county's maps could help in relocation of employees for newly attracted businesses to the area.

"Our county is leading the way in doing this," Reynolds said. "We surely appreciate them having an open house."

cation in math or science, which are considered high need areas. The grant is an incentive for them to go back to school now in order to have them certified in these areas as soon as possible.

"There are already some people in the school system now who want to go back and get their degrees," Petkov said. "We wanted to focus on them. Our main goal is to put new teachers in the classroom. In this way, we hope to be a small piece in solving the problem for Seminole County."

Grant recipients must take a minimum of six semester hours per year toward the high need areas and receive a grade of "C" or better in each course, with an overall GPA of 2.5. Applicants must sign a contract indicating that upon completion of certification, he or she will teach for three years in Seminole County Public Schools. The grant will reimburse tuition costs at Seminole Community College or the University of Central Florida.

"This is a testament Florida Power truly understands that children are our future," said Tina Calderone, executive director of the Foundation. "This will help us tremendously in putting more math and science teachers in the classrooms."

The current grant structure helps meet the Foundation's short-range goal of helping current instructional employees receive certification, Calderone said. However, its long-range goal is to help individuals attain the education needed to teach in the classroom.

"Right now, we are soliciting current teachers who need certification in the math and science areas," she said. "For example, this will help an English teacher who wants to get certified in science."

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Seminole Expressway incentive program to benefit commuters

Beginning Monday, Nov. 19, SunPass and E-Pass users traveling between State Road 434 and Red Bug Lake Road on the Seminole Expressway (Central Florida GreeneWay/Toll Road 417) will receive a 44 cents credit on their normal 75 cents trip, as part of the one year Tolls Rebate Incentive Program.

To receive the discount, motorists equipped with either SunPass or E-Pass systems must enter the Seminole Expressway at State Road 434 or Red Bug Lake Road, and exit at either Red Bug Lake Road or State Road 434.

Upon completion of the route, the electronic toll collection software compiles the information and issues a 44 cents credit. SunPass and E-Pass customers receive the credit on their account balance the next business day; SunPass frequent users continue to receive their regular 10 percent discount.

Cash customers are not eligible for the rebate because their trip origin and destination can only be confirmed through electronic toll collection.

Motorists may still enter the on-ramps at-speed, but the SunPass or E-Pass transponder must be properly mounted on the windshield to ensure that the electronic readers located on the ramps collect the information at both points along the route.

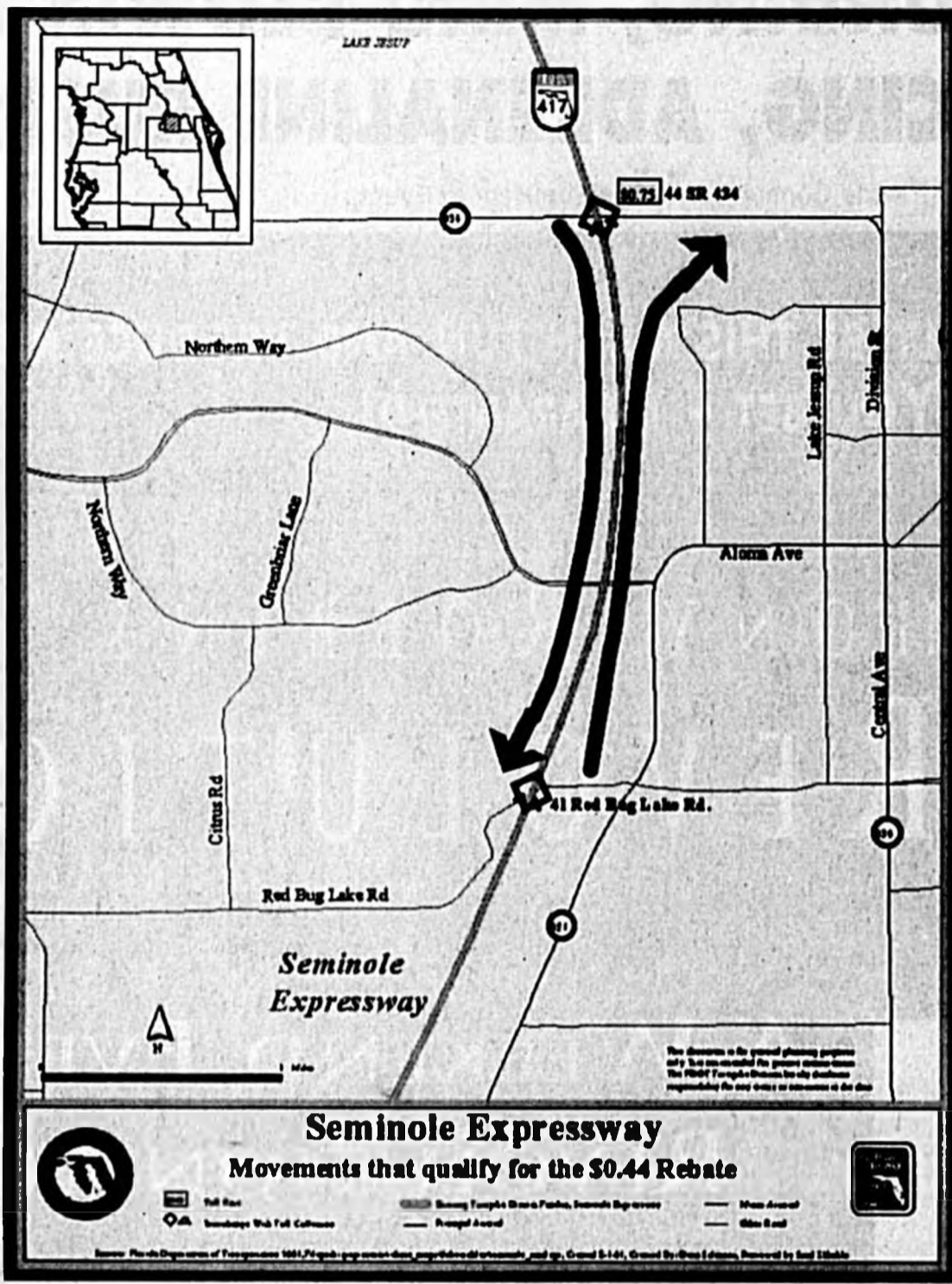
The Tolls Rebate Incentive Program (TRIP) was initiated at the request of the Oviedo City Council. The City Council hoped that the Seminole Expressway would be able to provide some relief on heavily congested State Road 434. Florida's Turnpike began development of the program, which encourages ridership on the Seminole expressway as well as subscriptions in the SunPass electronic toll collection program.

As additional incentives for drivers, the TRIP discount brings the toll rate for this short movement to 12 and one-half cents per mile, in line with other movements along the Seminole, and may save motorists time by using the Expressway instead of State Road 434 for local trips.

Q — What is the Tolls Rebate Incentive Program?
A — A one-year pilot program for SunPass and E-Pass



customers that travel the short, two and one-half mile trip between Red Bug Lake Road and State Road 434 that will encourage enrollment in the electronic toll collection programs, and provide commuters with a rebate.

Q — What benefit do SunPass, E-Pass users receive?

A — Customers with transponders who enter or exit the Seminole Expressway at Red Bug Lake Road and enter or exit at State Road 434 will receive a rebate of 44 cents on the 75 cents toll normally charged. (See diagram)

Q — Who is eligible to participate in this program?

A — All SunPass and E-Pass users who travel the Seminole Expressway between Red Bug

Lake Road and State Road 434 automatically receive the rebate during the trial. No registration is necessary to participate. The transponder, however, must be properly mounted on the windshield, so it can be read at both ramps.

Q — Why did Florida's Turnpike initiate this program?

A — Florida's Turnpike was approached by the Oviedo City Council, which hoped that the Seminole Expressway might provide additional relief for commuters on such congested local roadways as Aloma Avenue (State Road 426), Red Bug Lake Road and State Road 434. Since the Turnpike was looking for ways to encourage ridership on the Seminole Expressway and increase

SunPass usage, this cooperative program was developed as a way to meet both goals.

Q — Why not just lower the tolls on the Seminole Expressway?

A — Except for this one short movement, tolls average 12.5 cents per mile when traveling on the Seminole Expressway. These toll rates were established at a hearing before the road opened in 1994 and were set at a rate that allows the Turnpike to meet its bond debt on the Seminole.

Q — How soon do I get the rebate?

A — Motorists using either SunPass or E-Pass transponders will see the rebate on their account balance the next business day.

Hardin said she received the idea for the wreath after the national PTA organization announced next Wednesday was declared National Wreath of Remembrance Day. Local PTAs were asked to elaborate on the idea, encouraging schools to come up with various ways to observe the day.

"When we told the students about it, they were really happy about doing it," Hardin said. "Each day, they would walk by the wreath as it got bigger and

bigger because more hands were being added to it, and they would just get so excited."

Every student in the school, starting with the pre-kindergarten class, wrote or drew a message to the survivors of Sept. 11. Many of the hands offer words of prayer and hope. One third-grader wrote, "my daddy's fighting for you," while another construction paper hand states, "I'm sorry for the people who died on Sept. 11. My prayers and thoughts are with you."

Hardin also added a sprig of Rosemary to the bow of the

wreath as an added symbol of remembrance.

"Rosemary is the herb of remembrance," she said.

Once the wreath was completed, Hardin sent a letter and a photograph to New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani explaining why the memorial was constructed.

"I wanted to send the wreath to New York City, but it just got too big," she said.

Instead, the wreath will highlight a short ceremony on Tuesday sponsored by the school's PTA. It will be placed on

the school's marquee, where it will remain throughout the upcoming holiday.

The school's PTA is also encouraging parents to display their own wreaths on Nov. 22, in observance of National Wreath Remembrance Day. The day gives communities across the country a chance to remember the victims of the Sept. 11 tragedies and show the solidarity and strength of the nation.

Florida agencies are using or in the process of implementing the program, said David Pantel, president of On Target Performance Systems.

Learning the System

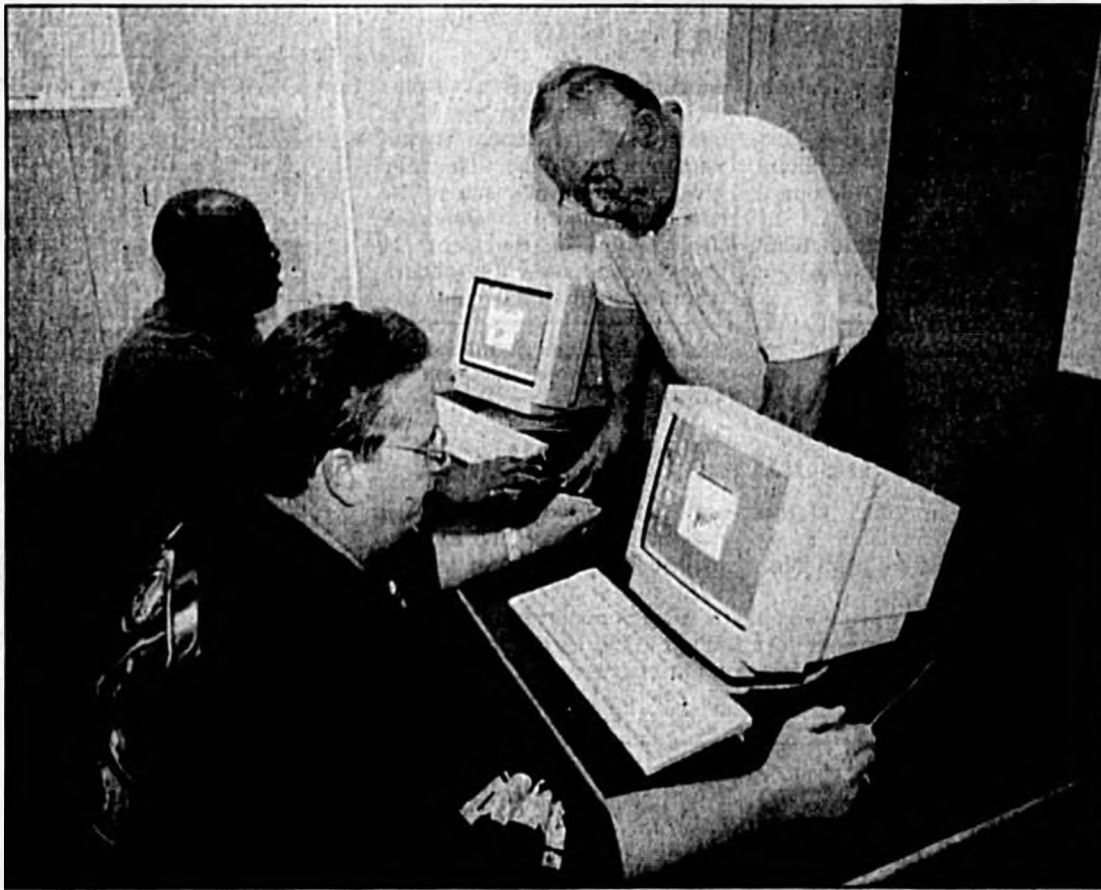
While the new program will initially help Sanford police make the evaluation process more efficient, the benefits could be numerous to the professional development of the force, Pantel said.

That same potential has the U.S. Navy Intelligence considering the program for its purchasing process, and a scheduled meeting with FAA officials with the thoughts it could be used for airport screeners. Implementing the program into a department is a lengthy process that begins with a daily job analysis for each member.

Every employee's evaluation log is customized according to their daily job tasks they provide in an initial survey. Individual logs are also developed around policies officers have to adhere to and proficiencies.

"It will help establish expectations at the front end of the evaluation period so there is no surprises at the end of the evaluation period," Tooley said about the process.

On a monthly basis, supervisors grade an officer's performance, using specific examples, in the employee's designated categories based on a simple three ratings system. Each category is weighted by subject, importance, and frequency on a scale of 1 to 4. In an effort to

make the system as honest, objective and fair as possible, the weight given to each item are not disclosed to the evaluating supervisors, Pantel said.

"It's very difficult for supervisors to manipulate," he said. "It also provides excellent documentation for the courts. It's very hard to argue with specific dates, specific performance

issues. It's so concise, but it's detailed."

Helping Everyone

The program will also develop

improvement plans for each employee. Plans are given to employees with expected completed dates and could range from on-the-job training to coun-

selling. Skill deficiencies which appear department-wide can also quickly be identified through various in-depth management reports. That feature will be integral in helping tailor future training needs, Tooley said.

Pantel noted the program also helps protect employees too. Unlike the traditional hand written evaluations where personal preference may taint the outcome, the program's objective point scale prevents that. It also tracks unnoticed, but important areas such as extra curricular activities and exceptional performances, he said.

The program was originated as a law enforcement tool, but today the database is being applied to citywide applications, health services and fire departments, Pantel said. Leon County Sheriff's Office was the first law enforcement agency to implement the program. The sheriff's office chief of detectives Capt. John Schmidt refers to it as an "awesome system that quite frankly meets all the standards. It's really the best thing going in job evaluation."

His opinion is important to the Sanford Police Department not just because of its ringing endorsement for the new evaluation program, but he is also the president of the Florida Police Accreditation Coalition.

The Quest Begins

Accreditation will not come easy as the process for applying takes two years, but Tooley said the department is "moving diligently toward it."

A number of issues have to be addressed and more than 270 standards have to be met before accreditation is granted, said Schmidt. Sanford is addressing some key issues Schmidt identified, like creating new policy and program documentation.

"The community benefits from accreditation because they see the agency is raising the bar," Schmidt said. "There's a lot of benefits within the department as it provides employees with clear cut guidelines of how to do business."

The process doesn't end with accreditation, as departments are assessed every three years to make sure they're doing what they said they would. Accreditation also sets forth high professional standards, as operations are required to be documented more, he said.

"It's a lot of work," Schmidt said.

If Tooley's first two years of hard work are any reflection of the next two, the Sanford Police Department will take the accreditation process in stride.

Hunting
safely from
treestands

MONTGOMERY, AL. — "If you're a hunter, chances are you know or know of someone who has been injured in a treestand accident," says Jackie Bushman, the founder and CEO of Buckmasters, the world's largest whitetail deer hunters association.

"In our hunting club a few years ago, one of the guys didn't check his stand from the previous year before using it. When he went to climb onto it on opening day of deer season, the limb he used to step into his stand from had rotted. When he stepped on to it, it broke. He fell to the ground, broke his hip, and lay there for four hours before crawling to the road for help.

"Most treestand accidents are the result of careless and costly errors," says Bushman. "But treestand hunting is safe and rewarding if we pay attention to a few basics. People don't like to bother with things like safety belts and other safety measures, but paying attention to safety measures, like wearing a safety belt, is smart," he says.

"Being safe in a treestand isn't difficult. It boils down to a little time and advance work — which provides some of us with a really good excuse to spend extra time in the woods before hunting season," Bushman adds.

"If you plan to hunt from treestands this year, here are some things Bushman recommends keeping in mind.

"No accident was ever planned, that's why they're called accidents," Bushman reminds us. "Accidents often occur when you're tired, or when you're still sleepy from getting up early. One fall, just one, can leave you dead or paralyzed.

"Any time your feet aren't on the ground and you're not wearing a safety belt, you're in what I call 'death territory'," he says. "If you hunting from anything that's hooked to a tree, you need a safety belt. If, for some unknown reason your stand breaks, or you fall asleep, or you lose your balance, the safety belt can save your life.

"If you like to stand up and shoot when you're bow hunting, use a safety belt that keeps you snug to the tree when you stand up. If you have to lean a little bit, you want to feel the safety belt grab.

Always check your treestand before the first day of the season. "If you use a homemade treestand, don't forget: trees grow wider as well as taller from Fall to Fall and the nails might be deeper in the tree than they were," Bushman says, "leaving the steps or stand less stable. Check to make sure that wooden parts are not rotten. If you plan to make your own stand this year, consider using treated lumber, which will last a lot longer.

"If you plan to use any of the limbs on a tree as steps to get into your treestand, or for balance after you get in, make sure that they're alive and sturdy.

"Remember the 'death territory' — when you're putting a treestand in place or when you're putting in screw-in tree steps, wear a safety belt.

"There are many safety belts and harnesses on the market," Bushman says. "It's See Outdoors, Page 3B

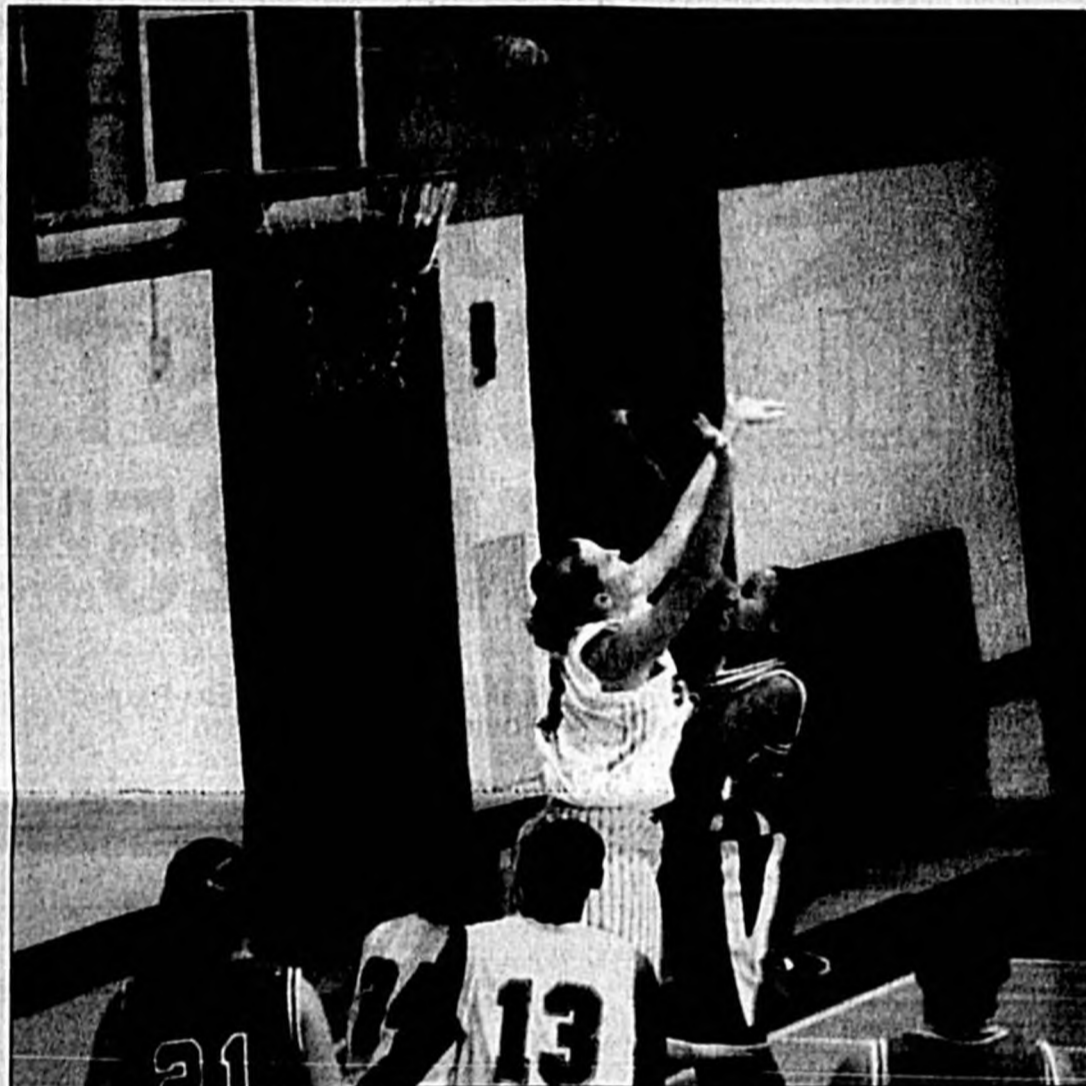

75-65, with five minutes to play, and seven points, 80-73, with 2:15 remaining.

But the local squad would get no closer as it fell to 2-2 on the season.

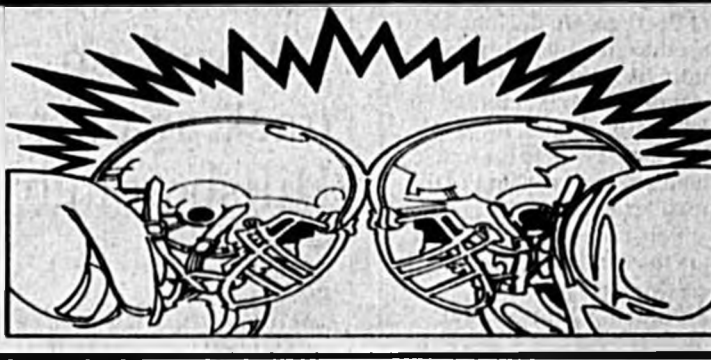

important to buy one that gives you a feeling of comfort as well as security. I like one with a push-button on the ropes so I can tighten it to get closer to the tree or loosen it so I can lean out against the tree. It gives me a little more versatility when I'm

putting up a treestand or when I'm hunting.

"Be sure the belt is big enough to go around a tree," he says. "If you're hunting from big trees, you might have to get an extension rope. We learned that lesson the hard way while taping the Buckmasters TV series. "Pull your gun or bow up

after you're in the stand. Before going up into the stand, make very sure your gun is unloaded and the bolt is open. Then tie a rope or line to the gun so the barrel points toward the ground. Before going down, reverse the procedure: unload the gun, open the bolt, tie it so the barrel points downward.

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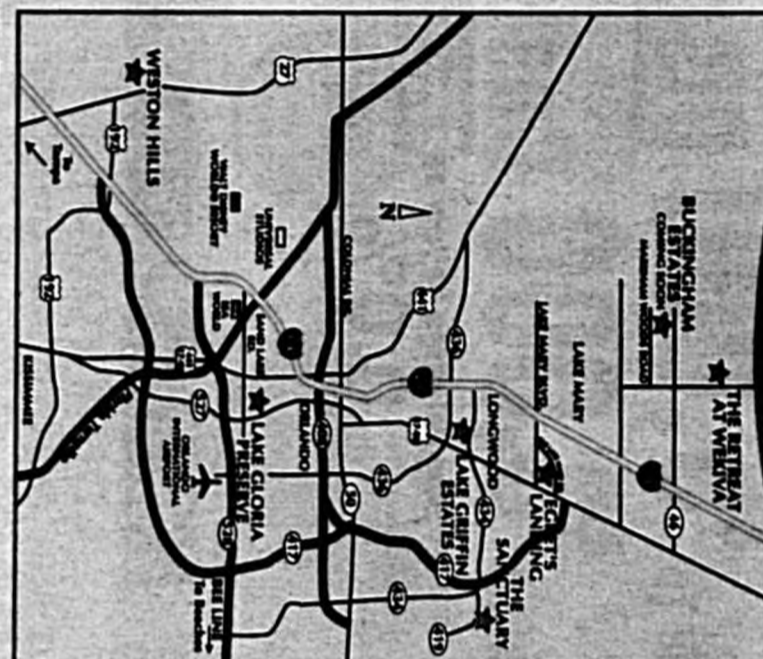

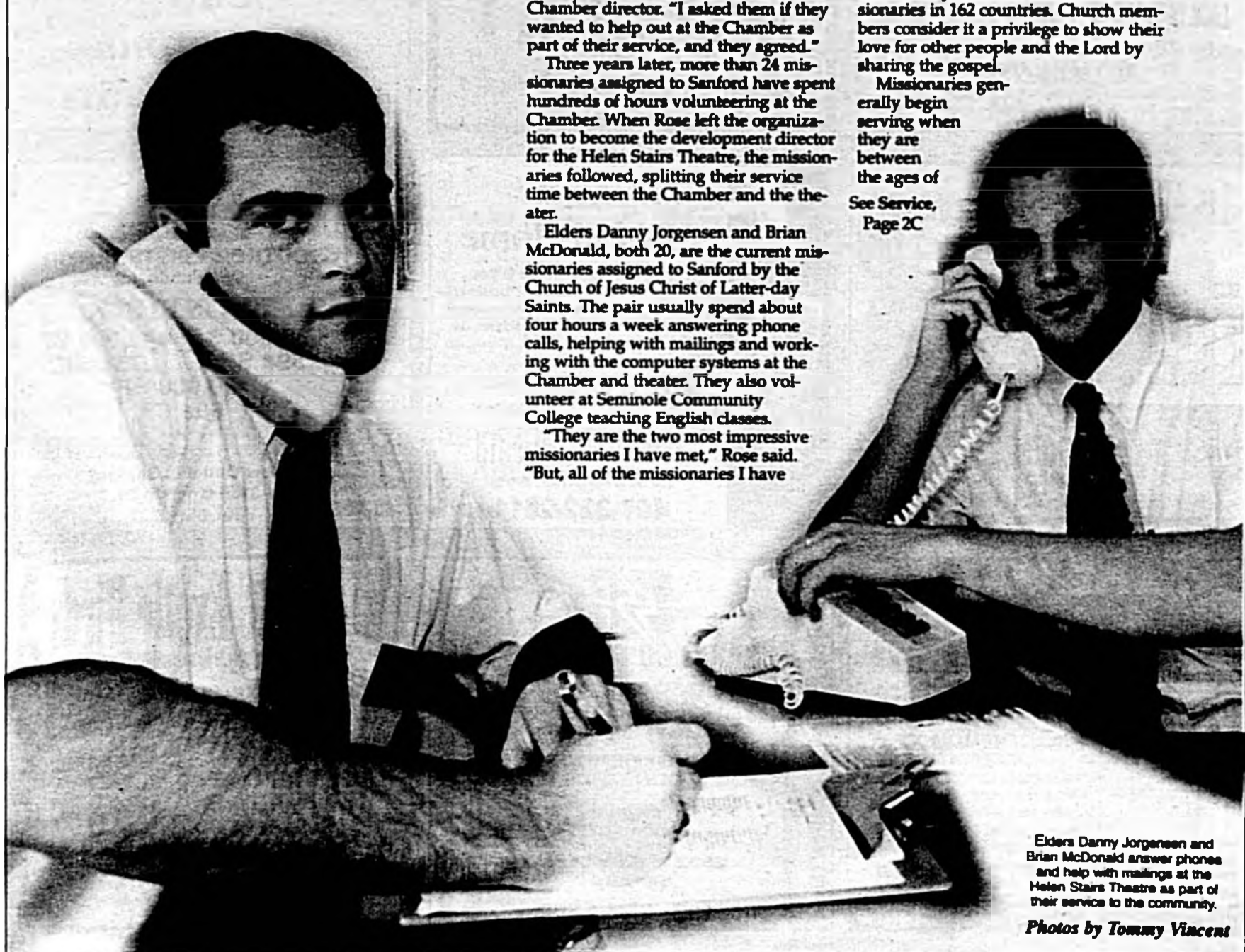
"They are the two most impressive missionaries I have met," Rose said. "But, all of the missionaries I have

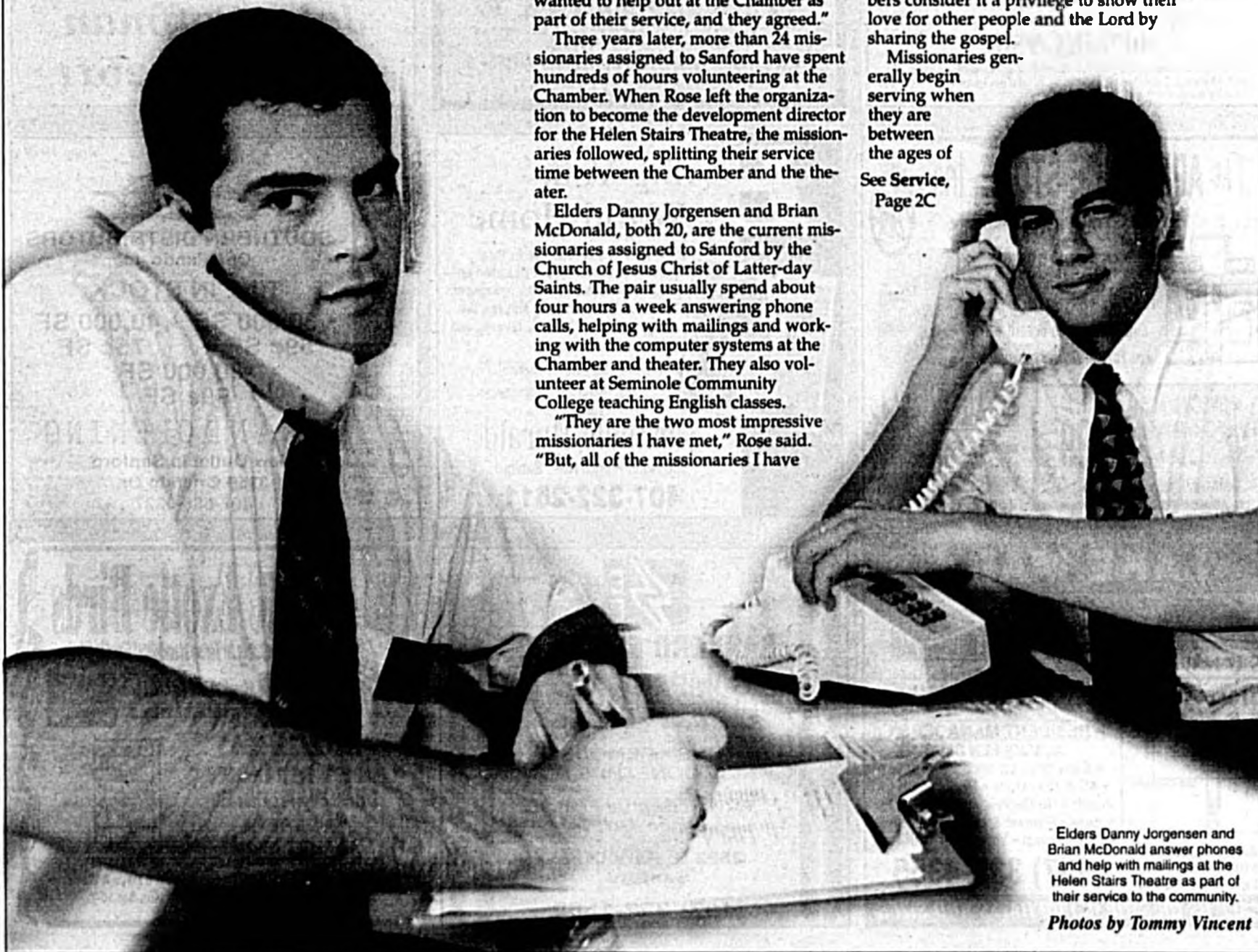
worked with have been extremely dependable and willing to be of service to the community.

"What I really like about them is that they are able to separate their community service and their missionary service," he said. "If you have a question, they will answer it, but they don't push their missionary cause."

Based on revelations that Joseph Smith said were brought to him in the 1820s by heavenly messengers, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints today has more than 60,000 missionaries in 162 countries. Church members consider it a privilege to show their love for other people and the Lord by sharing the gospel.

Missionaries generally begin serving when they are between the ages of

19 and 21, but many retired seniors, men, women and married couples also serve missions.

Missionaries serve from 18 months to two years. Missions are voluntary, and missionaries are not paid for their service. While serving full-time, missionaries are official representatives of the Church.

"Our main role is to teach the Gospel of Jesus Christ and invite people to listen," Jorgensen said. "But, charity and service are important, so we get out and do that, too."

Before serving a mission, a person completes an application process. Each missionary call is issued from the Church's headquarters in Salt Lake City, Utah. The missionary then enters one

of 15 missionary training centers around the world for three weeks of training before traveling to his or her assigned area.

Jorgensen, who is from Gunnison, Utah, has spent six months in Sanford and plans to serve missions for two years throughout Florida. McDonald is from Nampa, Idaho, and has been in Central Florida for 11

months.

"I like Sanford, and I will miss the area when I leave," McDonald said. "People here are good, nice and humble people."

When it is time for Jorgensen and McDonald to leave, the tradition will continue when other missionaries arrive in Sanford.

"You never know how long they will stay — they

move around the district," Rose said. "But, all of them have enriched my life. They really believe in helping the community they are in."

"It's a terrific program, and they are terrific people."

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Give Tom Turkey the night off this holiday

Traditionally, Thanksgiving and turkey go hand-in-hand, however that doesn't mean that the holiday would flop should you choose to serve another main course in the turkey's place. (The turkey probably wouldn't mind either!)

Chicken, that incredibly versatile, healthful cousin of the turkey won't disappoint when you serve it up autumn-style for your Thanksgiving Day meal. Low in fat and smothered in a tangy dijon-cider sauce, this meal is sure to be a hit this holiday season. Enjoy this recipe courtesy of "More Healthy Homestyle Cooking" (Rodale), by Evelyn Tribole, M.S., R.D.

Marian's Autumn Chicken With Dijon Cider Sauce Serves 6

Sauce:
 2 cups apple cider
 1 1/2 cups 1-percent milk
 2 tablespoons cornstarch
 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
 1/8 teaspoon ground red pepper

Apples:
 2 tablespoons butter
 2 large apples, with peel, cored and cut into 1/4-inch rings

Chicken:
 1/3 cup unbleached or all-purpose flour
 3/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
 6 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves
 1 tablespoon dry sherry or apple juice

To make the sauce: In a medium saucepan, bring the cider to a boil over medium-high heat and cook for 15 minutes, or until reduced to 1/2 cup. Transfer to a cup and let cool. In the same saucepan, add all but 2 tablespoons of the milk. In a cup, dissolve the cornstarch in the remaining 2 tablespoons milk and add to the pan. Stir in the mustard, salt, black pepper and red pepper. Cook and stir over medium heat for 3 to 5 minutes, or until the mixture begins to thicken. Stir in the

cooled reduced cider. Cook and stir until bubbly. Remove from the heat and set aside.

To make the apples: Preheat the oven to 200 F. Melt the butter in a large skillet. Add the apples and cook over medium heat for 3 minutes per side, or just until tender. Transfer to an oven-safe platter and place in the oven to keep warm. Leave the butter in the skillet for cooking the chicken.

To make the chicken: In a shallow dish combine the flour, salt and pepper. Place the chicken breasts between two pieces of plastic wrap and, using a mallet, pound each to 1/2-inch thickness. Dredge the chicken in the flour mixture and shake off any excess. Place the chicken in the skillet that contains the butter. Cook over medium-high heat for 5 minutes per side, or until a thermometer inserted in the thickest portion registers 160 F and the juices run clear. Transfer to the apple platter and keep warm in the oven. Add the sherry or apple juice to the skillet. Cook and stir over medium heat for one minute, scraping up the browned bits from the bottom of the pan. Add the cider sauce and cook for 4 minutes, or until heated through. Arrange the chicken and apple slices on 6 dinner plates. Top with sauce.

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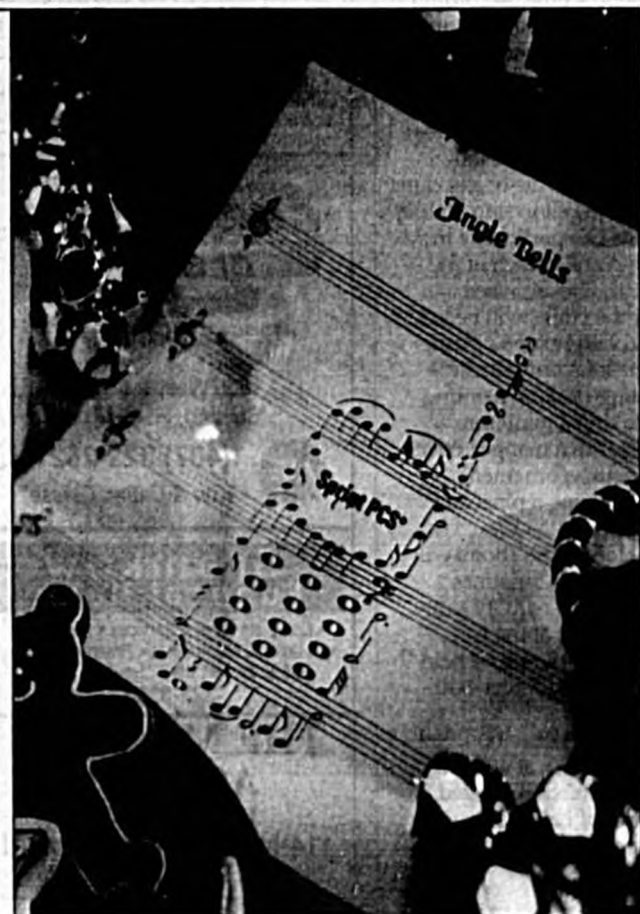
