Tuffy, a docile, four-year-old brown bear, succumbed recently to whatever appeal a Spring-like day has for Ursus arctos, and went for a mile-long strut through the streets of Rosemont.

The bear's adventure was tame to the point of boredom so far as he was concerned, but his unexpected appearance in the quiet city street provided excitement to hundreds of Queens residents.

It was a problem for a score of police,

and a mile for his owner, who got a summons.

Tuffy lives with his parents, Bill and Rosie, in a cage at the rear of the home of Stanley George, son of a Romany chief, at 116-32 231st Street, Rosedale.

At the time of yesterday's disturbance, the George children opened the cage door to feed the three bears.

The elders accepted the food with becoming gratitude, but the carrots and apples had no appeal for Tuffy. He ungraciously brushed the children aside and walked off in the cage.

For all of his 300 pounds, Tuffy is an accomplished, if not graceful roller skater. There was no skates handy, however, so Tuffy adopted a steady, plantigrade gait, and set off down the street, while the George children howled with alarm.

When he reached the park, however, he was overtaken by an automobile driven by a neighbor of the George family whose aid had been enlisted in the absence of Stanley and his father, Gus. The neighbor sought to check Tuffy's progress by edging in front of the bear, and forcing him into the curb.

These tactics availed nothing, since Tuffy simply outflanked the car and continued on his way. The park was full of people enjoying the sunshine and the Sabbath quiet when Tuffy, tired, lay down in the shade of a tree.

Following the signing of the Declaration of Independence, the Continental Congress issued Continental currency. The pose is humorous and symbolizes a form of contempt.

The use of bogus currency as an implement of war is an old Japanese custom. In the Russo-Japanese War the treacherous Japanese established in Kobe, Japan, what was probably the most elaborate counterfeiting plant in history, costing approximately \$100,000.

There has been much talk of secret weapons. It is unreasonable to assume that one of these much-heralded aids to Axis victory may be a veritable mountain of counterfeit money. It is not only unlikely, it is probable that one or more of the Axis powers holds such a weapon and is awaiting the psychological moment to loose it in an avalanche.

Japanese Invasion Speeded Chino Unity

Even "Bandit" Groups Fight for Nation

Mme Chiang Kai-shek's visit in Washington developed the surprising bit of information that China is under a queer kind of obligation to Japan. Who would have thought it! The Japs did not intend to do their neighbors a kindness, of course, when they attacked China. Far from it. Their scheme was to rob and enslave them, killing as many as necessary to accomplish their object.

Up to the date of Nippon's attack the Chinese had been a pretty badly disorganized people. There are several different local breeds of them and they generally were anti-Occidental for a long, long time.

No wonder, either. The Occidentals had exploited them for generations. They were such easy suckers that maybe the Westerners were excusable for the advantages they took. And possibly they were educational in the long run. Anyway the "Chinos" got tired of it finally.

In saying that the Chinese and Americans always had been on uninterrupted harmonious relations, Mme Chiang was slightly forgetful of her country's "Boxer rebellion" in the early 1900's. Later when congress voted the Oriental exclusion act designed to stop Asiatic immigration from across the Pacific, the Chinese certainly did not like that and still don't. Just now, by the way, there's a congressional move to modify it, to let Chinese in as copiously as anybody and maybe even more so than Germans.

All events the Chinese were considerably disturbed at that stage of the game. They needed some influence to solidify them, and, comparatively recently, the Jap attack did the business. The amalgamation movement doubtless had been working mean time, but the Japanese invasion unquestionably compacted it.

Apparently, from frontier to frontier, it is now unanimous.

There are Qualings in other countries. China seems to be remarkably free of them. Even so-called bandits are anti-Axis today. Maybe Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek has played the principal part in lining up his countrymen against the enemy. Nevertheless, he needed Allied help. He was rather slow in coming and Mme Chiang has attended to that part of the job. Partly it's personality, partly it's logic. Women are a discount. Japan They weigh in China.

Mme Chiang didn't come to Washington on an official mission, but it means that. It was social also. And it's international. International politics and polite society mix peculiarly, but they do mix.

In short, Chiang is now an American "society." Mme Chiang did it. She is a public character also. It would be interesting to see if her husband, the generalissimo, likewise could be an American society pet. He has not had a chance to be tried out here for the present.

In short, Mme Chiang is China's spokeswoman—now. Father Chiang is outvoted at present by Mama.

Mama knows more about this country than Papa does. He has visited here but she was educated in our midst. He knows us. She's a Chino-American. She "belongs." She verges more on being an American than she does Chinese.

**Point Rationing
Of 200 Foods Is
Effective Today**

Chart Can Be Used
In Buying Pro-
cessed Products

Point rationing of more than 200 processed foods began today, which appears in this page, was run in The Herald by independent grocers for the convenience of their customers. Housewives should study the chart carefully and clip it out for further reference. The chart can be used in making out grocery lists, to tellers and salesmen in grocery stores.

The following items are not included on the chart and are not rationed: Canned fruits, chili con carne, fruit cakes, fruit puddings, jams and jellies, olives, pickles, potato salad, preserves and relishes.

So stringent are individual restrictions under the point value plan that the average person will be able to buy only four or five cans a month of common fruits, vegetables and juices.

For the next six months, he will get less than half the processed products he bought in 1941-42.

The civilian received only a gentle hint of what was in store when sugar and coffee were rationed. He will now gain sharp realization of what it means to ration not only the home-grown United States armed forces, but also the armies of the Nation's Allies and the peoples of Allied and liberated territories. In about a month his normal pattern of living will be disrupted, not by rationing of fresh meat, canned meats (excluding poultry), canned fish and shellfish.

The Office of Price Administration, striving to protect consumers from booming prices in fresh vegetables, now firmly in demand as a result of rationing program, last week slapped price ceilings on seven staple items: tomatoes, snap beans, carrots, cabbage, peas, lettuce and spinach. It promised to impose similar price control on other still unprotected foodstuffs as the need arises.

Thus some 96 percent of all foods now are under OPA price control and it is likely that most of the remaining 4 percent soon will be. A large share of the items coming up to the average citizen's table likewise are already rationed or soon to be, and restriction may be spread to such other staples as butter, milk and cheese—and ultimately to fresh fish.

Not only the home but the public dining place will be affected as the tight grip of point rationing is imposed tomorrow on restaurants, hotels, large boarding houses and similar establishments. These will be cut slightly less than 50 percent in their estimated 1943 consumption of processed foods. Many restaurants may be forced to close early, turn patrons away or serve meager portions to meet the restrictions.

guns and dozens of machine guns.

The Germans lost 200 men and two tanks in a counter-attack, it was said.
