



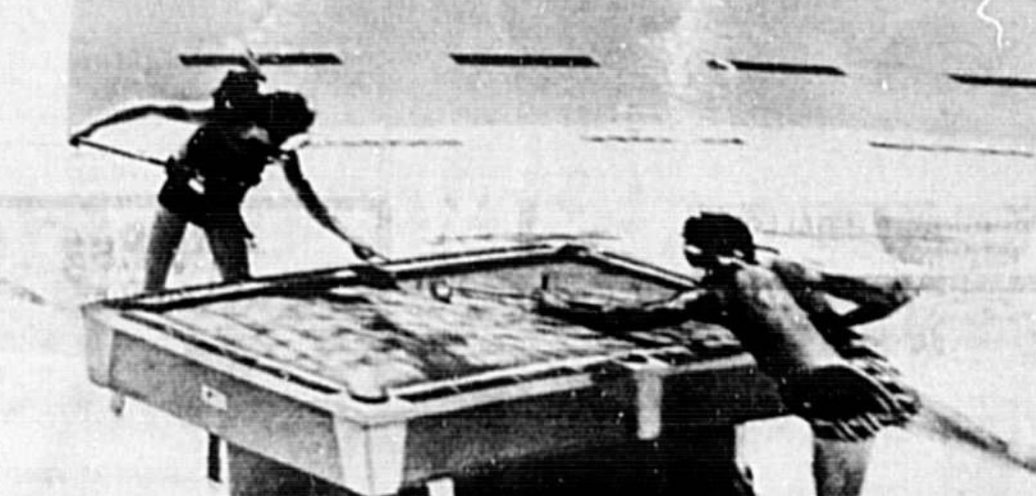
LITTLE SHAVERS HAVE CLOSE SHAVE IN SANFORD PLAYGROUND CONTEST

After Controls Fall Food Prices Continue Soaring Up

By LOUISE COOK Associated Press Writer Up, up and away: That's where food prices are going according to an Associated Press marketbasket survey. The AP surveyed the prices of 15 food and nonfood items in 13 cities on March 1 and has checked at the beginning of each succeeding month. An extra check was made this week in the wake of the lifting of price controls on all food except beef. The total marketbasket bill was up in 12 of the 13 cities checked. Pork chops and eggs led the list of higher-priced items, with increases of 20 and 30 cents a pound on the chops and boosts of up to 17 cents a dozen on eggs. Previous increases averaged no more than a dime an item. One-fourth of the food items checked went up in price from July 1 to July 23. Twenty-two per cent of the total number of items checked—food and non-

From Exporters Wheat Testimony Expected By JIM LUTHER Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate investigators, seeking to determine whether the Agriculture Department knew of the 1972 wheat deal in advance, may call for testimony from the six largest exporters involved. A Senate investigation subcommittee source said the step was being considered after three days of public hearings ended Tuesday without resolving a conflict in testimony on the point. Investigators were also sitting through Agriculture Department telephone records. In testimony on Monday, Agriculture Secretary Earl L. Butz and Asst. Secretary Carroll Bruntz were unable to say when they first learned the size of the massive wheat purchase made by the Soviet Union.

Oil Pinch For Heaters Anticipated

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite indications that the gasoline shortage is easing, an oil industry economist has warned of a possible heating oil pinch in the winter. Dr. James S. Cross of Sun Oil Co. said Tuesday that the gasoline shortage eliminated the reserves the oil industry had built up to deal with the heating oil requirements. "If this winter is any more severe than last, there will be a more serious problem," Cross said. The mild winter last year left the industry with a 16-million-barrel reserve. He said, but the head start was lost when refineries had to concentrate on gasoline production to meet summer needs. Meanwhile, a national survey by the American Automobile Association showed that the gasoline supplies were available for the third consecutive week. Of 4,053 gasoline stations polled, 48 per cent were operating normally — selling gasoline full time and allowing motorists to have their tanks filled. Last week, 47 per cent were operating normally. The AAA said many gasoline station owners have taken advantage of the shortage to reduce their operating hours, eliminating less profitable operating times while selling as much gasoline as normal.

Stock Market Prices Up, Healthy Trend Continues

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock market prices moved higher today, continuing a trend of the previous seven market sessions. The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials was up more than 32 points in the 7 previous trading sessions. It was up over 2 points Tuesday. Analysts said the higher prices might tend to indicate a new market psychology, at least for the near term. Woodworth was the Big Board volume leader, up 1 1/2 at 20 1/2, followed by Thrifty Drugs down 1/4 at 7 1/2; International Harvester up 1/4 at 30 1/2, and Interstate Stores down 1/4 at 2.

Sterilization Case Shows Law Need

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Officials say the case of a 14-year-old black Pensacola girl points out the need for a state law governing sterilization of mentally retarded persons. "I think there ought to be a law which clarifies the boundaries within which we may function," said Dr. William McCaw, director of the agency which performed a hysterectomy on the mentally retarded Pensacola girl last fall. There is no state law governing sterilization of the mentally retarded, he said. McCaw, director of the Pensacola Educational Program's obstetrics and gynecology teaching service, said his staff performed the operation, which involved removal of the girl's uterus, after receiving an order from Pensacola Juvenile Court Judge Theodore Bruno. Bruno said last week he issued the order last November, despite refusal of the girl's mother and grandmother to give their consent, because it was the only way to keep the family together. The judge said otherwise the family would have to be split up to keep the girl and her brother, also mentally retarded, apart. He said there was already evidence that the brother had sexual relations with his sister and mother, Bruno said the whole family, except for the grandmother, was mentally retarded. McCaw said sterilizations of mentally retarded persons were not rare. "If the child is incapable of a decision and is a ward of the court, it is not super rare," he said. "This has happened before in other places I've been (South Carolina and Texas)." No other sterilizations have been performed on mentally retarded persons by his agency since the case in question, McCaw said. Bruno said the decision to order sterilization followed a recommendation from the Division of Family Services and the Escambia County Health Department. Family Services later denied issuing the order.

Tales Of Murders Traced To Sex Killing

MIAMI (AP) — A man who police say dismembered an Ohio youth and then repeatedly raped and tortured the teenager's girl friend bragged to friends of other murders before he killed himself, authorities say. Police said Tuesday they were checking out a story from Carl Erdvig, 29, that Albert Brust had told him that he had "disposed of somebody in the East River in New York" and "concealed somebody." Brust committed suicide last week and shortly afterwards police discovered the body of Neil Matson, 16, of Washington Court House, Ohio, cemented in a shower stall in Brust's home. Erdvig, who said he and Brust had been friends for more than five years, said a mutual friend of the two had seen Brust's torture chamber where police say Matson and his 15-year-old friend were forced into sex acts while Brust took pictures and the girl was tortured and raped after Matson was killed. Erdvig said the friend told him two months ago he had "heard of a few people who had gone in and not come out." "It looks like he had these kind of tendencies before," said Metro Detective Jerry Strickland. "On one hand Brust was sadomasochistic; on the other he had suicidal tendencies. It looks as though he relieved the impulses to suicide by sadomasochism." Brust committed suicide by drinking cyanide mixed with chocolate milk and Strickland said the diaries go into great length about suicide using cyanide. "I came close tonight. I was almost engulfed by the crowd," was one entry in the diary, Strickland said. Police in nearby Fort Lauderdale were first told of Matson's death by his girlfriend last week after Brust released her. But authorities at first discounted his story.

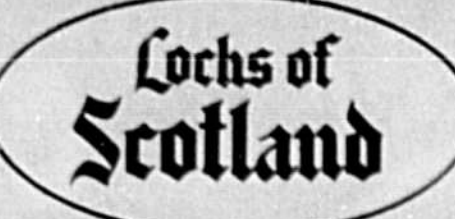

Ranks Among Top 5

CHICAGO — What an eye-opener I have had visiting the wineries of Mogen David. Although a long-established name, Mogen David, until recently, has been most often thought of as a kosher-type wine. Phenomenally, today Mogen David ranks among the top five leaders in the total wine-sales market of the United States. This rise-to-the-top has come about because of several important factors: In 1970, Coca-Cola Bottling Co. of New York bought the wine firm, thereby amply applying any needed expansion monies; Mogen David took on a new president, J. Myron Bay, a savvy, self-willed dynamo who waited almost 15 years as an executive with the wine company to head the cast and demonstrate that he knew what the public wanted in taste-worthy, low-cost wines. In three years he has proved his point: sales have risen from \$13 million to \$30 million. Bay's paramount idea was to reach the entire wine-drinking public and not just a select group. He also believes in keeping quality and that, my friends, is the main secret of his success. Anyone can produce a wine that is inexpensive, but to make a wine everyone can afford and is worthwhile drinking takes good winemaking plus a top executive who understands the often elusive winemaking-consumer acceptance combination. Mike Bay went BIG into the beverage wine market and hit the jackpot. His Cold Bear, Black Bear and now the JUG wines are a marketer's dream. Cold Bear is an inexpensive type of Cold Duck while Black Bear is a blackberry wine with a light taste everyone who doesn't expect their alcohol to "come on strong," will approve. Those JUG wines are in a class by themselves. The strawberry flavored is the most popular but I preferred the apple wine in the jug-you-like-to-collect. Mogen David has lots of winemaking savvy and astute executive planning going for them too.

Use Apple In A Tasty Recipe

Apples are another fresh fruit coming into season. This is a versatile fruit which even the most finicky of eaters enjoy. An Apple-Carrot Bake also includes prunes and the combination is rich with vitamins and minerals everyone needs in a balanced diet. APPLE-CARROT BAKE: 1/2 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup prunes, plummed & Washington state apples, pared, cored and cut in quarters, 1/2 cup orange juice, 1 teaspoon grated orange peel, 2 tablespoons butter. Pare and cut carrots into 1-inch chunks. Place in saucepan with water and salt. Bring to boil, cook until just tender, about 20 minutes. Drain, reserving liquid. Combine with corn syrup, orange juice and orange peel. Pour over orange sauce. Bake with butter. Bake at 350 degrees 45 minutes or until apples are tender. Baste fruit occasionally. Makes 9 servings. Serve with poultry or pork. Preferred varieties: Golden Delicious or Winesap.

To stretch a package of frozen green beans add chopped celery sauteed in butter after the beans have been cooked and drained. If you like, you may season this vegetable combination with rosemary. When there's a real leftover, from a real roast, you can use the leftover in a curry sauce. Ever add flaked coconut to paccade batter? Good served with maple syrup or orange sauce.

## Judge Orders Conference Probers To Fight Nixon In Courts

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congress and the President of the United States joined unprecedented constitutional battle today over access to tape recordings and documents sought by the Senate Watergate committee.

President Nixon replied to committee subpoenas by refusing the tapes and offering selected documents only if the panel specifies which ones it wants. The chairman, Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., D-N.C., said that was an impossible condition; how could he specify documents when it doesn't know what documents exist?

And so, before a national television audience, the Watergate committee voted unanimously to ask the court to order Nixon to produce the material. In his simplest terms, the seven senators of the Watergate committee voted to sue the President.

## State In Black \$21 Million

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—State revenue collections for the fiscal year ending July 1 showed Florida with a \$21 million surplus and potential for even more leftover funds in preparing next year's budget.

Administration Department figures released today revealed that state income exceeded even last minute revenue estimates by \$21 million over the 1972-73 fiscal year.

If the surplus holds during the year, it would mark the second straight year the state has had excess funds. The 1972 Legislature had a \$267 million surplus to spend.

An Administration Department spokesman said the carry over from the just-ended fiscal year could be greater or less than \$21 million. Precise calculations will be ready within several weeks, he said.

L. L. Qualls, economist for the Senate Ways and Means Committee, said unchanged economic conditions for the rest of the year could cause income to run \$40 million to \$50 million ahead of estimates. This figure, coupled with a \$21 million carryover, would give the 1974 Legislature a surplus in the neighborhood of \$70 million, Qualls said.

Because of uncertain economic conditions the last Legislature delayed consideration of two proposed tax reductions. One would have expanded the property tax homestead exemption for the elderly while the other would have increased the intangibles tax exemption.

Administration Secretary L.K. Ireland Jr. said the \$21 million was about one per cent above the estimated income. Collections for the general revenue fund totaled \$1.8 billion, he said.

Sales tax collections accounted for \$1.4 billion of the increase. Some \$1.04 billion in sales tax was taken in during the last fiscal year, about 1.4 per cent more than estimated.

## County Residents Plan To Protest City Zoning

A mass protest against a proposed to raze 600-year-old Mayfair Golf and Country Club is expected tonight.

Greenbriar and Loch Arbor home owners have given notice to the Sanford planning and zoning commission they will protest the project killed.

The city recently annexed 20 acres of orange groves, allowing developers to apply for multi-family zoning, and drawing the ire of county residents, who have been assured the plans will be heard tonight.

Fireworks flashed last month between the county residents led by Sanford dentist G. W. Edwards and representatives of GMC Builders Inc., Orlando, when the 240-unit project was first proposed.

The opposition to the project "that would be in our back yards and increase traffic congestion on Country Club Road" has continued.

Wednesday night residents of the Greenbriar Loch Arbor area were targets of a telephone campaign to turn out protesters at tonight's public hearing.

Last week, after a month's study, the commission recommended to city commissioners density in the area be held to an average of eight or less units per acre.

July 5, Gary Martin of GMC Builders said the 600-unit project could be reduced to 200 units, but further reductions would make the project economically unfeasible.

The grove property is accessible only from County Club Road and straddles the paved roadway.

The property is owned by H. E. Tooke Jr., Daytona Beach, and Sanford attorney Mack N. Cleveland Jr. County Commissioner Mike Hattaway, a licensed real estate salesman, represents the sellers of the tract.

Martin said the proposed project will be two-and-a-half bedroom condominiums to sell in the \$45,000 per unit price range and overlooking the golf course.

## Land O' Lakes Sale Prompts Second Suit

A second real estate firm has filed suit in circuit court at Sanford seeking a commission on the recent sale of the 14-acre Land O' Lakes Country Club at Casselberry.

Laurel Realty Co. Inc. asked the court Wednesday to order SMD Partnership to order former owners of the property, Land O' Lakes Country Club at Casselberry Inc. and National Grocery Brokers Inc., to pay Laurel a \$63,000 commission.

The lawsuit, filed by Attorney Herbert A. Bargeon Jr., alleges a broker with Laurel, Eltie Curry, entered a non-exclusive oral agreement in January or February 1972 with Douglas A. Grimes, president of the defendant corporations, to find a buyer.

Laurel says the broker found Dan Neuhoff and he negotiated for the land in March 1972. Then Laurel says in May 1972 he joined with Stanley I. Meadows and David M. Meadows doing business as SMD Partnership.

The suit alleges the three men entered a written contract and bought the property June 12, and the defendants refused to pay Laurel.

A similar lawsuit, filed by Orlando real estate broker H. R. Gettle, is pending in circuit court.

## County Residents Plan To Protest City Zoning

Nixon's response to the Watergate committee came in a letter delivered by White House messenger to Dash at 8:30 a.m. Nixon refused to give up five specific tapes of conversations with former White House Counsel John W. Dean III but added: "It is quite possible that there are other records in my custody that would be within the ambit of that subpoena and that I could, consistent with the public interest and my constitutional responsibilities provide to the select committee. All specific requests from the select committee will be carefully considered and my staff and I will cooperate with the select committee by making available any information and documents which do and which do not fit that appropriate... within the sweeping but vague terms of the subpoena."

"You will understand, however, I am sure, that it would simply not be feasible for my staff and me to review thousands of documents to decide which do and which do not fit that appropriate... within the sweeping but vague terms of the subpoena."

Ervin said Nixon's demand that the committee be specific about what documents it wanted was an impossible demand to live with.

"We are not clairvoyant," Ervin said. "You can't identify a document you've never seen. The Constitution wouldn't fall if Nixon complies with the subpoena, he added."
