

Infant Mortality

Infant mortality in the United States is among the lowest anywhere in the world, with a rate of 37.5 per 1,000 live births in the white population in 1943, the latest year for which detailed data are available. This, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company remarks, brought us down near the world record of 31 per 1,000 in 1943 held by New Zealand.

"Infant mortality in the United States declined 13 per cent among white babies between .1940 and 1943-from 43.2 per 1,000 to 37.5. Among the colored the decline was slightly higher, 15 per cent. With a total of 118,500 infant deaths in 1943, there were about 19,000 fewer deaths bes.es cause of this improvement," the company says. 


