

Yankees Slip Into Champion Throne Easily

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—(AP)—The New York Yankees have very quietly and sedately slipped into the throne room of the American League again and turned over baseball's September spotlight to the Brooklyn Dodgers and St. Louis Cardinals.

There is something amazing in itself in the way which the Yankees have come to regard the pennant as their personal property. To other clubs it is something achieved rarely and to be celebrated riotously.

But to the Yanks the pennant is just a flag that flies from a pole in centerfield in their ball park and is earned, like dividends, by diligent effort through the regular season.

Charley Keller expressed the attitude of his teammates today: "Aw, this doesn't mean anything. It's winning that series month that counts."

This is the twelfth championship in 21 years for the Yanks. They won six during the eight years that Little Miller Huggins was at their helm and now they have won six for Joe McCarthy since he took charge in 1931. In the five years in which McCarthy missed the pennant, his teams finished second four times and last year were third—just two games from the top.

Schroeder And Riggs Ready For Net Semi-Finals

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—The national tennis championships ground through to the semi-final stage Friday with Bobby Riggs of Clinton, S. C., and tall Ted Schroeder of Glendale, Calif., scoring impressive victories to round out the men's field, and Helen Jacobs of Berkeley and Mrs. Sarah Palfrey Cooke of New York winning in the women's wing.

Riggs, seeking to regain the title he won in 1939 and relinquished last year to Don McNeill of Oklahoma City, got past one of the players he feared most when he beat methodical Frankie Parker of New York, the clay court king, 6-4, 6-3, 4-6, 6-2. Bobby was smooth.

Schroeder gained the distinction of defeating Bryan Grant, Jr., in what might have been the Atlanta veteran's final appearance in the championships. After losing the first set in a baseline duel, Schroeder stormed the net to beat down his game little rival by scores of 6-8, 6-1, 6-2, 6-3. Grant was given a standing cheer by the crowd as he left the big stadium for what he swore was the last time.

Miss Jacobs, gunning for her fifth women's title at the ripe tennis age of 33, looked plenty good enough to beat the field as she out-lasted Dorothy Bundy of Santa Monica, Calif., in a furious second set to win, 6-3, 11-9. There was the day's only real thriller, Miss Jacobs coming up from a 1-4 deficit in the deciding set to eliminate her younger and hard-hitting opponent.

Mrs. Cooke qualified to meet Miss Jacobs, her old Wightman cup teammate, in today's semi-final by scoring over Hope Knowles, the Philadelphia youngster, 6-4, 7-5.

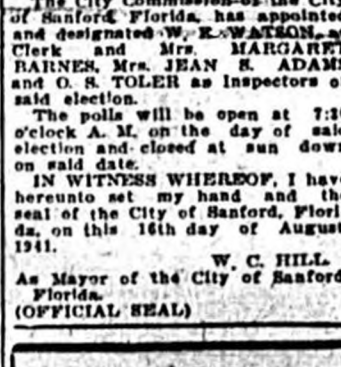

NASHVILLE, Sept. 4.—(AP)—Southeastern Conference Commissioner Mike Connor yesterday had this question placed squarely in his lap: What action if any may be taken when a freshman football player quits one institution after a few days and enrolls at another conference school.

Also involved was the question as to whether he left voluntarily or was snatched away. Vanderbilt University is the complainant and Georgia Tech, where the boy went after leaving the Vanderbilt freshman squad, is the other party involved.

It was the first time the bug-a-boo question of "freshman snatching" had come before the commissioner. Over 100 Jews Are Arrested By Nazi Police

2 Prominent French Lawyers Are Held As Hostages By German Officials

Ex-Minister Is Seized In Paris

Stern Measures Are Result Of Violent French Outbreaks

BERLIN, Sept. 8.—(AP)—A roundup of Jews in France received notice today to evacuate their homes within 24 hours. They are permitted to take only the "most necessary objects and furniture," and were advised that the remainder of their property would be sold and the proceeds turned over to them at a given time.

VICHY, Unoccupied France

Sept. 8.—(AP)—More than 100 Jews and two prominent French lawyers were reported to have been seized as hostages by German occupation authorities in Paris today because of attacks on members of the German army.

Among those arrested were Justice Minister Pierre Masse and Theodor Valenti, forer deputy, both described as Jews.

New outbreaks of anti-German sentiment were reported Saturday from Paris and authorized notes in Vichy said they were being directed from Moscow, in an attempt to force Germany to withdraw troops from the Rhine area to restore order in occupied France.

Exposures of Russia's hand in the anti-German sentiment in a radio broadcast by Maurice Thorez, fugitive French Communist leader, advising his followers that "never has there been such a favorable opportunity."

The attack on Russia (by Germany) is the signal to arrest. There is believed to have been a precedent from Russia when he fled at the outbreak of the war.

He was general secretary of the Communist Party in France (the position once held by Earl Browder in the United States) a member of the chamber of deputies and a soldier. He was listed as an army deserter, was court-martialed in absentia and sentenced to prison.

Paris dispatches indicated that the terrorists were unafraid of the shooting of three French hostages, presumably Communist, by a German firing squad Saturday morning. The following incidents were reported:

A pistol shot was fired at a German soldier walking with a woman on the Rue de la Faisanerie in the aristocratic Auteuil quarter, where the worst damage was done during the German air raid on Paris June 19, 1940.

Four fires, obviously set by terrorists, broke out simultaneously in a garage regulated by the German navy.

Some of the 10 highest applicants in the examinations will be contacted by the board of parole and pardon.

The board will be the highest authority in the state for parole and pardon.

Army Can Handle Morale Problem, Captain Asserts

Rotary Hears Officer Express His Confidence In Service

U. S. Mourns Death Of Mrs. Roosevelt, President's Mother

RYDE PARK, N. Y., Sept. 8.—(AP)—Mrs. Sara Delano Roosevelt, 88, who lived to see her only son become President of the United States, died Sunday at the ancestral Roosevelt home overlooking the Hudson river.

Death came at 11:15 A. M. (EST) of an acute circulatory collapse resulting principally from her advanced age.

The first indication of her declining health came last Friday when President Roosevelt left Washington for Hyde Park to visit his mother whom he had wished to undergo a physical checkup.

Mrs. Roosevelt died while her son—the 32nd President of the United States—was preparing an address of major importance to the world scheduled to be broadcast from the White House in Washington tonight.

It was announced officially that the address, expected to deal with the new tension in German-American relations, would be postponed until 9:30 P. M. (EST) Thursday. It will be carried from the White House by major American networks and retransmitted to the world by 14 foreign ones.

Dr. Scott L. Smith, the family physician, announced that Mrs. Roosevelt had been unconscious since Saturday morning and had not been speaking since Saturday evening.

Byrd at her advanced age she was extremely active, attending many charitable functions and state meetings, and was the sponsor of her own Orange County, N. Y., hospital, the Byrd Hospital, New York, which opened Aug. 1 to Hyde Park.

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Falmadge Cites Objections To Dean Of School

Photograph Was Taken Of Shinn Eating With Negroes, Governor Declares

ATLANTA, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Governor Eugene Falmadge set off another dispute in the Board of Regents today when he objected to the appointment of a law school dean because he "is one of those boys who had his picture taken eating with negroes."

Falmadge opposed the promotion of Prof. Henry L. Shinn to dean of a university law school. The governor apparently referred to a picture taken at a dinner given by the Athens draft board to negroes called into the Army.

South's Construction Reaches Record High

BALTIMORE, Sept. 8.—(AP)—The Manufacturers Record said Sunday that Southern construction contracts for the first eight months of 1941 reached a figure higher than any annual total on record.

Construction totals for August were placed at \$141,131,000, raising the January-August accumulation to \$1,957,411,000.

"Industrial work," the publication said, "with its big government initiated contracts which in some instances ran to many millions, was the largest contributor to the August figure with a total of \$188,907,000."

Sanford Girl With Lease-Lend Agency

Miss Marjorie Tills, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Tills of Sanford, has been serving since June 7, 1941, as a professional assistant in the lease-lend division of the British Purchasing Commission and is not with the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

During the school year 1939-40 Miss Tills was secretary to H. W. Chandler, registrar at the University of Florida, and in 1940-41 she was a student in the Graduate School of Columbia University.

Collins Issues 14th Draft Call

ST. AUGUSTINE, Sept. 8.—(Special)—Brig. Gen. William Collins, director of selective service, State of Florida, today announced that the 14th call for white selectees and the 15th for colored selectees had been sent to the various local boards in the State of Florida.

The call for white selectees will total 1,608 men who will be delivered to the Induction Station, Camp Blanding, on Oct. 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16.

The 15th call for colored selectees totals 563 men who will be delivered to the Induction Station at Camp Blanding, on Oct. 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24.

Canadian Premier Returns On Bomber

MONTREAL, Sept. 8.—(AP)—Prime Minister William L. Mackenzie King returned to Canada aboard a Liberator bomber Sunday morning from London where he conferred with empire officials concerning Canada's part in the war.

He was expected to proceed immediately to Ottawa for an early cabinet session based on his discussions with the war cabinet and Prime Minister Churchill.

Florida Livestock Producers Begin Successful Season, Mayo Declares

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 8.—(Special)—Florida livestock producers are now in the beginning of the most successful season in many years, Nathan Mayo, commissioner of agriculture, said today commencing on a report made by William L. Wilson, director of State Farmer's Markets.

Livestock sales held at the Arcadia and Palatka State Livestock Markets since May 8 are already well above the total for the entire fiscal year ending June 30. Commissioner Mayo said, and recent reports show that the rate of increase is steadily going up. He predicted that unless some terrible and unforeseen calamity occurs this will be a record smashing season for the livestock industry.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, the Arcadia State Livestock Market showed total sales of \$169,981. The nice bi-weekly sales of \$111,222, an increase of \$2,241 over the total for all of last year. The average sale at Arcadia during this period has been \$15,242.

Last year the Palatka State Livestock Market reported total sales of \$48,319. For 17 weeks sales since May 8, the report shows a total of \$128,229, an increase of \$117,169 over the total for all of last year. The average sale at Palatka during this period has been \$19,725.

Since both of these markets since May 8, such a grand total of \$119,241 compared with \$48,319 for last year. Palatka's increase is \$70,910 over last year's total of \$48,319.

Florida cattlemen are producing a better grade of stock than ever before, according to the State Livestock Market.

Auto Official Urges Lifting Of Gas Ration

General Manager Of A. A. A. Says That Small Amount Of Gas Being Saved

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—(AP)—General Manager Russell E. Singer of the American Automobile Association urged today that the eastern seaboard's 7:00 P. M. gasoline curfew be lifted, asserting that it is an "unnecessary inconvenience" which had had scant or no effect in conserving the east's motor fuel supply.

A bitter dispute over proposed construction of the world's largest oil-carrying pipeline was developing Sunday between high-ranking defense and Administration officials.

Critical opposition to the project intended to meet what the office of defense petroleum coordinator says is a gasoline and oil shortage on the east coast, came from Admiral Ernest S. Land, chairman of the maritime commission Ralph W. Budd, defense transportation commissioner, and spokesmen for the railroad and ship industries.

Supporting the project were Secretary of Interior Ickes, Ralph K. Davies, acting petroleum coordinator, and many of the large oil companies.

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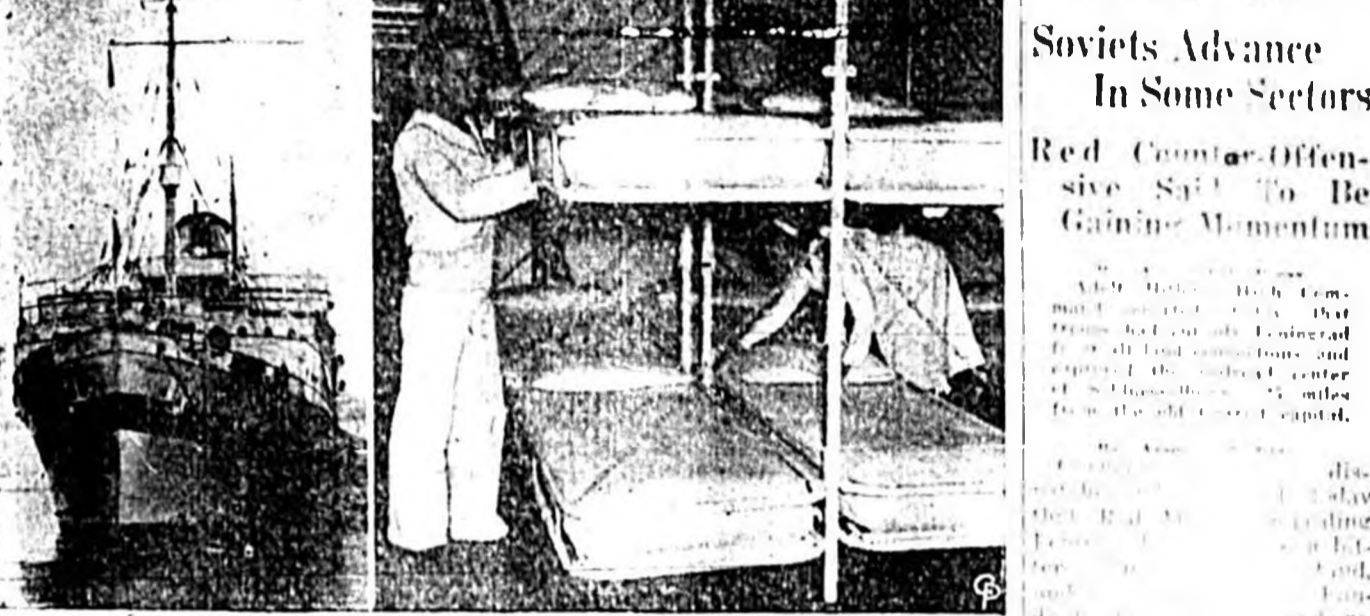

still claimed the Nazis troops were moving closer upon the city.

Moscow dispatches, however, declared soldiers and sailors, who have joined forces with the people of Russia's second city in a vast defense lineup, had taken the initiative on the broad front and driven the Germans from vital highway leading to the city.

The government newspaper, Izvestia, said in Moscow that the counter-attacks first blocked a German thrust across a river (perhaps the Neva, which flows from the south-western corner of Lake Ladoga, through Leningrad to the Gulf of Finland). Then the Russians took the offensive and exacted a toll of 1500 dead and wounded from the Germans in one fight, the account said.

The Finns, again, were active north of Leningrad, reporting a 65-mile advance in a three-day offensive. The Finns did not say whether this was their own or whether it was the reports indicated they were drawing their section of the German front back some lighter upon the city.

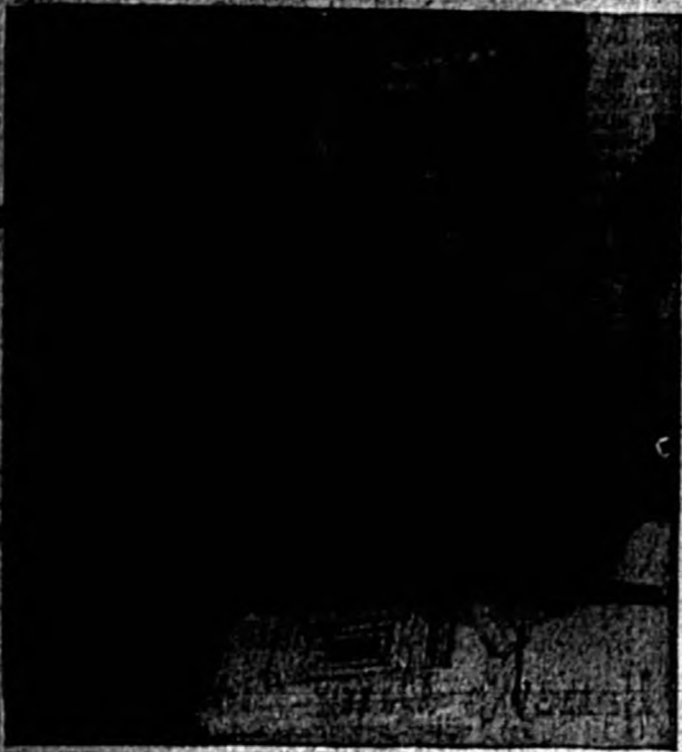

Stewart Says

Washington Is Fed Up With Petain, Vichy

IF GENERAL DE GAULLE, the Free French anti-Vichy leader, would set up some sort of a more or less legitimate government in exile, it's strongly hinted in Washington that it would give the French government recognition.

The general does have a loose organization operating in London, but it's hardly deemed enough to have any kind of de facto status. It is pretty clear that the Washington administration is in a position to do what it pleases.

At first there was a certain amount of American sympathy for Marshal Petain, as a 70-year-old man who had served his country for 40 years. But now the conviction is crystallized that he genuinely is as much of a totalitarian as Adolf Hitler.

In fact, he's rated as a rather meaner specimen than Benito. It does start as a detour on his own account. He had a very high amount of respect for it, Italy was in frightful economic shape.

He took the situation in hand and really improved it, perhaps more or less unconsciously sliding into his dictatorial role in the process. Then he tied up with Der Fuehrer and today he does as the latter tells him. Or else—He undoubtedly didn't intend that, either. He couldn't help himself.

Marshal Petain thought he saw a chance to become dictator of France by accepting a subordinate position under Adolf. He did it liberally.

At his advanced age, probably he found active and decisive help much for him. Accordingly, the other day, he took Admiral Darlan into partnership with him. He didn't retire, though. He was supposed to be the government, Admiral Darlan and myself. But, of course, they're both subs under Adolf.

The marshal's latest stunt is to join the French Legion of Volunteers and Volunteers of the National Revolution.

The name's too long. It needs to be compacted into something like the Nazis in Germany, the Fascists in Italy or the Falangists in Spain, for those are exactly the kind of names that are needed.

Apparently, though, the French aren't falling for the new order as generally as Italians fell for Fascism or Germans for Nazism.

General de Gaulle's Free Frenchmen are on the anti-totalitarian rampage abroad and at home. And there appears to be plenty of anti-totalitarian sentiment in the home country. The shooting of pro-Nazi Pierre Laval and General de Gaulle's suspension of the French navy, however, has not been enough. Marshal Petain himself long ago mentioned "in his mind that has been rising in some regions in France." It originally is an "ill wind" from the totalitarian standpoint.

On top of all this comes publication of the story that Vichy is working under direction of General Henri-Haye, Vichy's Washington ambassador, have been making the Vichy game in the United States, trying to plant propaganda and covering up available information for totalitarian enlightenment.

The year includes the insertion that General de Gaulle, backed by British naval strength, would have gained possession of the Vichy base for the Free French. It's a story that was spread in advance, from Ambassador Henri-Haye's Washington headquarters, to be on the lookout for him, as a result of which Vichy's Dakar base, supposedly bought him off, as it's widely reported, they could have done if he'd been any more.

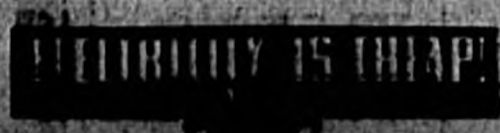

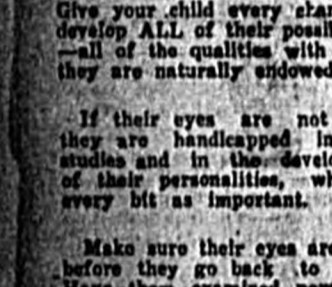

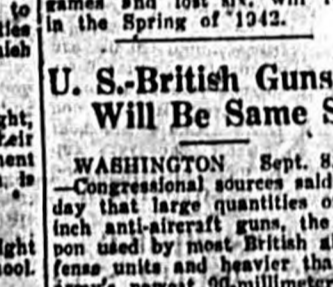
