King Troubled By Communist Accusations

Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. currently is having a rash of difficulties defending his nonviolent integration movement against accusations that it is being infiltrated by workers for world communism.

King calls this a smokescreen by "segregationists and race baiters" to obscure and deflect the national move by Negroes for civil rights.

The latest incident on this score involves a rather mysterious figure known variously by four names but most often as Jack O'Dell. Two congressional committees have labeled him as part of the Communist setup in the United States. He has worked twice for King's Southern Christian Leadership Conference, most-

ly as a money raiser. Following published reports last week that O'Dell still ran the New York office of SCLC, King summoned reporters to insist that O'Dell had left the employment of his organization "by mutual consent" in June.

This came despite a conflicting scknowledgement the same day from King's New York office that O'Dell still worked there as administrator. King said the discrepancy obviously was from confusion and not fact.

A spokesman for King later explained that O'Dell had dropped by the SCLC office on the day of inquiry but was not working there.

King credits the flurry of Communist charges to two Southern governors - Ross of Mississippi and George Wallace of Alabama - who testified before the Senate Commerce Committee againat the proposed new civi rights bill.

Both held aloft a large newspaper photograph which they identified as a picture of King attending a meeting at the Highlander Folk School in Tennessee. They said this was a place frequented by Communist sympathizers. King also defended the school, now defunct because



Outsiders' Game Raid Seen As Army 'SOP'

"SOP" is a time-worn phrase in the U.S. Army. It means, "standard order of procedure." In other words, once a procedure is established,

never change it. The Herald has dug deep in its endeavors to learn why the federal government ignored the Seminole County sheriff's department in that bolita raid last Saturday. The Herald has talked with the Governor's press officer, the Seminole County legislative delegation, the County Commission chairman, Sheriff J. L. Hobby, Police Chief Roy Williams, and tried to contact the state attorney, Arthur L. Steed.

However, all the statements forthcoming from those mentioned above did not bear the fruit of the question as did statements from two Army reserve officers well versed in the operations of federal law enforcement agencies. And, succinctly, this is the gist of their joint opinions:

"Federal law enforcement officers do not and will not request small county agencies to co-operate, in fear of a 'leak' to those they seek to arrest. It is perfectly in character with the way federal agents operate."

In other words, this is "standard order of procedure" with federal agents throughout the United States. And is no reflection on the Seminole County sheriff's department.

Yet, The Herald still questions: This bolita operation supposedly commenced in Orlando and Orange County and spread to Seminole County, So, why did the federal agent, Don Derry, trust the Orlando police and Orange county sheriff's department.

Sheriff Hobby today, at first saying he had no statement, read a letter dated Jan. 19, 1962, addressed to the Florida Sheriff's Bureau in which he outlined the base of these bolita operations at Lake Apopka. And the letter further requested the co-operation of the Florida Sheriff Bureau since he does not have the money and manpower for extensive investigative opera-

Sen, Mack N. Cleveland Jr. today said "I understand Sheriff Hobby did extend jurisdiction and cooperation to the federal agency and Or-

ange County." Rep. S. J. Davis Jr. expressed himself as "concerned as a citizen and state representative with illegal gambling activities and alarmed at the extent of gambling operations and known figures now apparently moving into this county with their base of operations. Illegal gambling breeds crime and corruption." However. Davis had no comment as to why, he believed, the federal agency ignored Seminole County.

llen, Jan Fortune, like Davis, had a lengthy statement against illegal gambling but no comment as to why Seminole County was ignored. He did say Monday's Herald front-page editorial raised a good question and he added that it "is logical and legal in the interest of good law enforcement to retain areas of jurisdiction and communication." He said he did believe that the Seminole County sheriff's department was fully coordinated and properly advised of the pending raid.

Sheriff Hobby has twice said he knew of the pending raid "but not when."

The Herald now is of the belief that Sheriff Hobby and his department were fully cognizant of the investigation, were fully co-operating, were supplying information to the federal investigators-but were kept in ignorance of the timing of the raid. In effect, The Herald feels that these federal agents "pulled a boo-boo" in not briefing Sheriff Hobby . . . much to his embarrassment.

The Herald now asks the federal agent, Don Derry, why Sheriff Hobby was subjected to embarrassment and why he was not requested to furnish men to co-operate in the raid? This editorial will be sent today to Mr. Derry for his written reply, for Wednesday's edition.



Admittedly there is a wide difforence between being trained for specific jobs in particular new factories and being given skille in a broad field that may or may not of-

fer quick job opportunities.

Nevertheless, it was something of a jolt to read that a \$8 million federal-local program of job training for 20,000 jobless New York youths is looked on skeptically by many of the affected youngsters themselves.

Their chief complaint, disclosed in random interviews: They don't care to study or train. They want jobs today. Not just any jobs, but work like operating a crane or bulldozer, which draws high pay.

These lads talk, in other words,

as if somehow they could miraculously acquire instant skills. They want none of the drudgery of learning, of hattling up the ladder. Open the golden door now!

They should talk to some of the men who once had good jobs in West Virginia but lost them. They now drive hours to and from training classes, getting a paltry subsistence wage as they prepare for "new joba" that may or may not materialize in auto repair, woodworking, machine shops and the like.

Lots of those who are upgrading their skills in the South are in fact marked for definite jobs in indus-

tries moving in. But the nearly universal testimony of industrialists and economic experts who have observed the South's economic growth is that these workers generally put out effort as if their lives depended on it. They spend no time grousing about not being crane operators.



Rocket System Evolution Is **Told Rotarians**

The development of a comprehensive weapons system such as that which surrounds the Martin-Marietta Bullpup rocket was outlined for Rotarians by Charles S. DeNeen, requirements manager of the air-to-surface missiles department, Monday.

DeNeen, entitling his talk, "The Evolution of a Weapons System," used a western-type movie for an example saying that the missile was compared to the bullet from the cow-

"But the gun, itself, as the force which launches the bullet, the cowboy's hand that holds the gun, the man, himself, his brain that tells the hand to pull the gun and shoot it, and the hackground reasons for his action are all part of what we call a weapons sys-

tem," DeNeen explained. He said that the Martin Company produces the whole system from the missile, itself, through the trait ng of the men who handle it, the men who shoot it, the transportation, assembly and tar-

get practice. "This comprehensive system was not always used," DeNeen said. He pointed out that in World War II, and before, a haphazard system was used, with different groups, companies and services all having a part in the building, assemhly, use, training and servicing of a weapon, resulting in inefficient and ineffective ar-

rangements. "Now we design the entire weapons system from start to finish at one time, so that it can be expedited and used in

a highly effective manner." DeNeen traced the evolution of the present attack missile from the ones used by the Germans in World War II, through the speedup in design, construction and use in the Korean War, to the present phase in the national de-

fense system. The Bullpup missile which Martin-Marietta builds is now in readiness with every attack aircraft and ground vehicle throughout the world, has been proved very reliable and

is relatively inexpensive. "Mass-production has reduced cost by 700 percent in the past five years," he noted.

DeNeen was accompanied by Jack Horner, safety officer at Martin, and Randall Chase was in charge of the program. A short film, showing the firing of the Bullpup at targeta at a international weapons meet, was shown at the conclusion of the program.

Cherries May Be Lonesome In **Frozen Pies**

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Officials of the food and drug administration are inclined to agree with Sen. Philip Hart, R. Mich., about the lack of cherries in frozen cherry

But they don't know what to do about it.

Hart contended recently that pictures on the packages of the frozen pastry showing lucious wedges of pie crammed with cherries were a snare and delusion.

The Senator said the pies more often than not contained fur less cherries than the pictures would lead the purchaser to believe and even those floated in watery juice.

Hart, whose home state produces more cherries than can be sold, was indignant. He asked the FDA to investigate. The first word today from Malcolm R. Stephens, chief of the FDA enforcement bureau, supported Hart's complaint.

"We think some of the pictures are not truly representative," Stephens said. His inspectors reported the

pies generally contain 40.60 cherries, although pictures on the packages indicate many more. The pie with the most, he said, contained 100 cherries, but had no vignette on its wrapping.

Thomas Bellis of FDA's food standards division suggested weight of the fruit might be the best standard for assuring the proper proportion of cherries.



So far the wave contains no State's Attorney Has Nothing New To Say

It is confessed The Herald still does not have the answers to why the Internal Revenue Service enlisted the aid of Orange County and Orlando law enforcement officers but ignored the Seminole County sheriff's department in that bolita raid last Saturday.

The Herald requested by telegraph statements from Gov. Farris Bryant, Troy Register. chief Internal Revenue investigator for Florida at Jacksonville, and James Robinson, assistant state attorney, since Arthur L. Steed, the state attorney, is on vacation. None responded.

But we did receive a letter from A. J. Hosemann Jr., assistant state attorney, from Merritt Island.

"It is apparent from your comment that you were not familiar with what you were writing about," writes Hosemann. That is truethat is why we are asking questions but getting no answers. ". . . . and although your article indicated you pursued all phases in an effort to obtain the facts, you failed to contact the proper sources for the information you commented about." We can only say, we tried.

Hosemann writes further Police Chief Roy Williams was unaware of the raid because it was without his jurisdiction. We reported that, "Sheriff Hobby," he continues, "was aware of what was going on and it was at his request that the other law enforcement agencies participated." We reported that, too, Our question was and is: Why was Sheriff Hobby not informed of the raid and asked to participate? Hosemann proposes other thoughts already advanced in The

And then Hosemann comes up with this remark: "Unfortunately, this case in not completed and therefore I can not reveal anything regarding it, but I do think and feel that you should correctly and truthfully inform the citizens of Seminole County when this case is completed and the facts can be revealed." We heartily agree and endorse that remark: If only to neone will tell us what is going on!

"If you will compare the crime rate of Seminole County with that of other counties of similar population you will find that the crime rate is much lower. This can be attributed to the excellent work of Sheriff Hobby and his men and to Chief Williams and his force," Hosemann writes. We'll buy that . . . we have no quarrel

Hosemann concludes. "Your premature editorial faled to mention that the State of Florida has an interest in these cases, and is working with the law enforcement agencies involved for violations of state law, and it is the intent of this office to do something about it."

Is that true, Mr. Hosemann? If so, why does Governor Bryant refuse to comment? Why was it necessary for the federal government to move in and stage this raid. Why was Sheriff Hobby not informed? Your lengthy letter fails to answer any of these questions. We will gladly publish any comment you may have further in answer to our questions. Until you or some other official gives us all the correct answers The Herald will continue to ask: WHY??
