

Bait car posters warn would-be auto thieves

SANFORD — The City-County Auto Theft Bureau (CCAT) is putting up large, custom made (by SCSO) posters at local malls, where there is a lot of walk-through traffic to view them.

The posters warn prospective auto thieves and burglars that the next car they try to break into, in Seminole County, could be a bait car.

Bait cars are equipped with hidden cameras, and silent alarms that notify deputies and police, who are on patrol. Investigators even have the ability to lock the doors remotely, trapping the thieves inside. The cars are placed in areas, throughout Seminole County, where auto theft, or vehicle break-ins, has been a problem.

The posters show pictures of suspects that were caught inside of a bait car and who were sent to jail.

The posters are part of an educational campaign that, when combined with aggressive enforcement, is aimed to discourage thieves.

The posters are currently up at the Seminole Towne Center in Sanford. Plans are in the works to put them up at the Oviedo Marketplace and the Altamonte Mall.

City signs Miller to 6-month term

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission voted Monday night to hire interim City Manager V. Eugene Miller in a continuation of the April 11 meeting during which former City Manager Al Grieshaber Jr. resigned.

Each commissioner met separately with Miller last Wednesday after city attorney Bill Colbert recommended him for the interim position.

The commission also voted to pass Miller's drafted contract, which Colbert said was similar in substance to Miller's city of Oviedo contract.

Part of the contract gives Miller a minimum six months as interim city manager with the option of extending that contract. He will receive a salary of

\$10,000 a month, with sick and vacation days. He will also have use of a city vehicle and other city equipment.

Colbert told City Commissioners that if hired, Miller would be available to start Tuesday morning.

District 2 Commissioner Velma Williams asked Miller if it was true he was not interested in a permanent city manager position. Miller said that was correct.


District 4 Commissioner Kevin Hipes moved to pass the motion and said he believed Miller would help the city to not sit dormant and keep things moving along.

Williams seconded the motion. The commissioners discussed the decision before voting.

"I think he'll do a good job," said District 1

City workers puncture gas pipe

SANFORD — Some neighbors woke up to a "swooshing" sound Tuesday morning when city storm water workers punctured a hole through a plastic gas pipeline.

Mike Watson, city storm water foreman, said the mark they received from Florida Power & Light was off by about six feet.

"We went right into their two inch gas line. It had a puncture hole through it," Watson said.

The city was digging near Sixth Street and Laurel to repair a storm water pipe. When they realized what had happened, the Sanford Fire Department, and local police officers, along with the Sheriff's Office and FP&L came to the scene.

About six homes were evacuated for precautionary reasons. Watson said that because it was natural gas, a spark in the area could have made it explode.

The gas itself was blowing out, which caused sand to cover the

area back up, so the fire department had to assist in uncovering the damaged part of the pipe so that it could be repaired.

Sanford Fire Department Battalion Chief Tom Martin said after the fire department exposed the line, they turned it over to the gas company to handle.

"Plastic lines are so difficult to locate," Martin said.

According to Martin, metal lines are easy to detect before roadwork

Lyman remembers classmate

LONGWOOD — Lyman High School teachers remembered Brandon Burkhardt, 17, as a hard working student, who was helpful and energetic.

The Lyman junior died after falling off the hood of a car driven by a 17-year-old girl friend. A male passenger in the car was also 17, according to police reports.

The family did not want to talk with the media, but Lyman Principal Frank Casillo said the school is working with the family to remember Burkhardt.

Calling hours will be held Friday April 22 from 6 to 8 p.m. at the Howell Branch Chapel of Collins Family Funeral Homes and Crematory of Winter Park. Funeral services will be held Saturday, April 23. Call 407-678-4500.

Students held an unofficial memorial at 7:15 a.m. Tuesday morning at Lyman, school officials said. The students left mementos at places that Burkhardt frequented on the campus and around his locker.

Dorene Roloff is a home economics teacher at Lyman. Last week she mentioned to her class that she was low on supplies.

"Brandon went to Home Depot, spoke with a sales associate and came to school the next day

Suspect exposes self to girl

CASSELBERRY — The Seminole County Sheriff's Office is looking for a suspect who allegedly exposed himself to an 11-year-old female on Monday, April 11.

The juvenile told family members and deputies that she was talking on the phone with a friend in her backyard when a white male appeared, pulled down his pants and exposed himself to her. The young girl told deputies that she walked into her house and saw the suspect partially follow her onto the rear patio area, which was open.

Once inside, the victim told family members what happened. Eric Blair of Casselberry told deputies that he did not witness the incident, but he confronted the suspect, who was still in the walk path at the house. The offense report said the suspect appeared nervous and continued to walk around as the family members talked to him. When the suspect walked out from the walkway onto their Casselberry street, he saw the deputy's patrol car and began to run in between houses.

The reporting deputy said they are not sure why the suspect stayed in the immediate area after exposing himself.

Witnesses described the subject as a white

SHS student among finalists in competition

SANFORD — Seminole High School Junior Nimish P. Ramanlal, who recently won the grand prize in the Orlando Science Center Science Challenge is one of the finalists for the prestigious Dr. Nelson Ying Student Science Competition - also held at the Orlando Science Center.

He will be competing against four other finalists selected from more than 30 entries from high schools and homeschool equivalents in seven surrounding counties. Each year, the Ying Competition awards one outstanding high schooler \$5,000 and a trophy for the best science research project with the ultimate goal of benefiting humanity.

In March, Nimish's innovative mathematics project was chosen from more than 100 of the best science fair projects from middle and high schools throughout Central Florida during the OSC Science Challenge. Now he has submitted another research project to the Ying Competition and will face off against four other science scholars, including 2004 Ying Winner Shiv Gaglani from Brevard County's West Shore Jr./Sr. High School.

Nelson Ying, a local philanthropist, scientist and entrepreneur, sponsors this competition every year at the Orlando Science Center as a way to encourage and inspire the science leaders of tomorrow. Finalists were selected following a thorough review process by a distinguished panel of judges, which include Ying as well as engineers, scientists and educators from Lockheed Martin, Kennedy Space Center and the University of Central Florida.

Nimish and the other Ying finalists will deliver oral presentations to the judges' panel on Saturday, April 23, from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. at the Orlando Science Center. The awards ceremony will also be held at the science center with the winner announced at 2 p.m. on Sunday, April 24.

In addition to the \$5,000 cash scholarship and trophy, the Ying winner also receives a \$1,000 prize for their teacher/mentor and their school. Sunday's awards ceremony is open to the public and included in their paid admission to the Orlando Science Center.

Students win grants from music program

SANFORD — Two Seminole County students will receive \$1,000 grants from Winter Park Musicale, a professional organization of women musicians, according to a news release from Seminole County Public Schools.

The annual scholarship program is intended for high school students planning on pursuing a music degree in college. Four grants of \$1,000 have been awarded to students who auditioned in piano, voice, strings, winds, and percussion.

Scholarship auditions were held April 2 at the Winter Park Presbyterian Church. The scholarship winners will play in a recital sponsored by the Musicale and open to the public on Tuesday, April 19 at 7:00 p.m., at the Steinway Galleries at 303 East Altamonte Drive in Altamonte Springs. Admission to the recital is free, but donations to the scholarship fund will be accepted.

This year's winners from Seminole County Public Schools are Megan Szymanski of Oviedo High School, and Yoon Kyung Chung of Lake Brantley High School in Altamonte Springs.

Szymanski is a senior at Oviedo High School, and is taking dual enrollment flute lessons at the University of Central Florida with Nora Garcia. Szymanski is principle flute/piccolo of Oviedo High School Wind Ensemble and the Florida Young Artists Orchestra (Symphonic). Honors she has earned include the 2005 Florida Young Artists Orchestra Concerto Winner and the 2004 Florida State University Tri-State Festival where she ranked number one.

This fall Szymanski will continue her musical studies at UCF as a performance major with the goal of entering a conservatory for graduate school.

Chung is a senior at Lake Brantley and currently studies with Lev Gurevich. She is this year's concertmaster of the Florida Symphony Youth Orchestra (Symphonic). Awards she has earned include first place at the Florida Federation Music Club, the Pre-College Chamber Ensemble Competition, and FSMITA at the district and senior levels.

In 2001, Chung received second place in the MTNA State Competition. After graduating from college, her goal is to become a professor at a music university.

Area residents who evacuated were allowed back into their homes around 9:30 a.m.


Martin said the whole procedure went completely by the textbook for broken gas lines.



Hospital breaks ground

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Ground was broken April 13, by officials from Florida Hospital, Altamonte Springs and Seminole County, for a major expansion project at Florida Hospital Altamonte.

The project will add a six-story patient tower, inpatient beds and an expanded emergency department. The project is expected to cost about \$70 million.

Planned for completion in the summer of 2007, the new additions will add 83 inpatient beds, a 37-bed Emergency Department,

expansion of radiology services, improved cardiology services, and much more.

Over the past three years, Florida Hospital has seen a 35 percent increase in inpatient volumes. In addition, every month, an estimated 4,000 people move to Central Florida, with almost 400,000 now living in Seminole County.

Florida Hospital Altamonte already sees more than 42,000 emergency department visits, more than 106,000 outpatient visits, and almost 17,000 inpatient visits

each year.

The expansion planned for Florida Hospital Altamonte is one of several major expansion projects in the works for the Florida Hospital system. Florida Hospital Orlando, Florida Hospital East Orlando, and Florida Hospital Winter Park are also adding new patient towers, while Florida Hospital Kissimmee, Florida Hospital Celebration Health, and Florida Hospital Apopka are making significant facility improvements and additions.

with a huge bag of samples for the class," Roloff said. "He had a huge heart."

When Burkhart was a freshman at Lyman, he was elected as class senator. Geography teacher Summer Copeland said he was one of only a few to be consistent and diligent in participating with the freshman class student government.

"Brandon always followed through with his commitments and as a student took great pride in his work and his reputation at Lyman," Copeland recalled.

Burkhart was active with the Junior ROTC program at Lyman. Casillo said his stepfather wanted to have ROTC be a part of any memorial. Several teachers noted the young man's leadership skills.

"He was also a leader in class setting a good example for the other students," said Mary Gillilan, a math instructor. "He often would help other students in their work. He was one of the bright spots in my sixth period geometry class. He will be greatly missed by all of us in his math class."

Teacher Bill Yucius said Burkhart was active in the SECME Club for engineering students. In regional competition, Burkhart and five or six others earned a first place award for a banner they created. He also earned a second place overall for a water bottle rocket he worked on with classmate Ryan Mathis.

Casselberry Police were still investigating the traffic homicide that happened Sunday night on Hill Street near Seminola Boulevard. Seminole County does not have a medical examiner, so the autopsy will be performed by the Volusia County examiner.

Once the investigation is complete, Casselberry police will consult with the state attorney to determine if any charges will be filed, according to spokesman Lt. Dennis Stewart. He estimated the investigation will take at least two weeks.

Stewart said traffic fatalities are automatically termed a homicide while an investigation takes place.

Police said rescue units responding to the scene at 9 p.m. April 17 found Burkhart trapped and entangled beneath a car driven by the young woman. Burkhart was pronounced dead at the scene.

The two friends in the car locked Burkhart out as a joke, according to a preliminary police investigation. Burkhart climbed on the hood of the car and the female driver drove down Hill Street toward Seminola. The male passenger saw Burkhart slipping off the car and the drive began to stop.

Burkhart fell beneath the car and "was accidentally run over by the vehicle," police reports said.

The name of the juvenile driver and passenger are not being released until the investigation is completed. The female student was apparently home schooled, Stewart said, but he did not know what school the male passenger attended. Casillo said only Burkhart attended Lyman.

"Police officials want to emphasize the importance of young drivers and passengers using proper vehicular use safety and taking vehicular use seriously at all times," read a statement from the Casselberry Police Department.

Casillo said seven counselors were brought into the school Monday morning to help students and staff cope with the loss.

The counselors talked with anyone who wanted to, and stayed about an hour. Casillo said about 25 students met with counselors and with their own guidance staff.

Some of the students were good friends, and some didn't even know Burkhart, Casillo said. He authorized two students to go home. Students had trouble coping with the sadness of the situation.

By chance, that morning was the senior breakfast. It gave Casillo the opportunity to remind students to make good choices. He said the seniors will have about a month or so of making many choices as they finish high school.

"The school's role is two fold," Casillo said. "We are here to support the families and students in this time of crisis. We also must educate our students on making good decisions."

Standing on a car hood is a serious situation, he said. "You need to think about things before



back to the scene for a follow-up call when the one witness said the subject had left prints on her sliding glass door. Three latent print cards were lifted from the door and sub-

Commissioner Art Woodruff. He also said that the city was not looking for a caretaker, but someone who will get the city rolling in the right direction, and he thought Miller was that person.

"Oh absolutely. I couldn't agree with you more," Mayor Linda Kuhn told Woodruff and the other commissioners.

Williams said, "I, too, enjoyed the interview we had."

Kuhn said she had conversations with some of the Oviedo city officials and they told her they "tried and tried" to get Miller on a permanent basis.

The commission then voted unanimously to hire Miller as the city's interim manager.

Lonnie Groot, from the city attorney's office, who was chosen to step in on the day-to-day operations for the city, said he assembled a list of projects that the city is currently involved with so that Miller could start looking over them.

"Miller has a good group of people to work with and we look forward to working with him," Groot said.

Commissioners wondered if now would be an appropri-

ate time to begin discussing how they would search for their next city manager. Colbert advised them to wait for Miller to get onboard and get a couple work sessions in.

"We can take some extended work session time," Woodruff said.

The commission agreed to start looking at their calendars to find a Saturday in the next month or so to have an extended work session to discuss what they want in their next city manager.

Miller had an opportunity to go up in front of the board and he thanked the city for the opportunity.

"I want to assure you and the community, you won't feel the bump in the road from the transition," Miller said. "I'm confident that I will facilitate trust. I look forward to serving you."

As Kuhn brought the meeting to a close, she told the commission that she wanted to remind the commissioners of something: "Save your forks." She later said she would always try to keep the commission guessing.

The next city commission meeting is April 25 at 7 p.m. on the first floor of City Hall.

Iraq, the soldier returned to Sanford to help with local recruiting and to visit before returning to his current base in Texas.

"It's an excellent way to go into the military, serve your country, and get some experience," Worthington said. "They train you on the job, and you grow up a little bit."

The young soldier figured when he wants to apply for a local job somewhere, the military experience "is a pretty good thing to have under your belt."

Worthington's experience has trained him as an MP, or military policeman. Someday he would like to work as a law enforcement officer, he said.

In Iraq, he worked with the Iraqi police and helped protect a general in charge of communications. He was on duty when the Iraqi people voted in a real election for the first time in decades. He even sat in a huge throne in one of ousted dictator Saddam Hussein's palaces.

After he graduated from military police school, Worthington was stationed at Fort Hood, Texas, where he joined the First Cavalry unit. Shortly after Sept. 11, he traveled to Kuwait as part of Enduring Freedom.

Later he returned to Fort Hood and performed regular law enforcement duties. Desert training followed at Fort Irwin in California. The war started and he was sent to Iraq in March 2004 and returned just last month.

Worthington recalled the anxious feeling prior to arriving in Iraq. Like most Americans, he watched the news and saw the car bombings and attacks on U.S. soldiers.

"When you get there, though, you have had all this training," Worthington explained. "When you get there, you calm down in a sense."

He said the real situation is not chaotic the way the media portrays it. Incidents happen and people die, he said, but the same conflicts are shown over and over again so that it eventually seems like there's more than one situation.

"Sometimes when the news media covers things, they speculate too much," he said. "It's like you see a peephole of what's going on over there."

Staff Sgt. Wallace Layne III, a local recruiter who also spent time in Iraq, said the good news is not reported, and that upsets soldiers.

"We received a lot of accolades from the Iraqi people," Worthington said. Working with the Iraqi police, he met many of the local people. He said there were mixed feelings about the U.S. presence there.



On patrol, Kyle Worthington did run into some anti-American feelings. Here in Arabic it calls for the death of Americans. Still, he said many Iraqis welcomed the soldiers and the freedom of their new lives.

"Some look at Americans as invaders, and others as liberators of the country," he said in an interview Wednesday. Layne said all they see is the Al Jazeera television network, and people make opinions from the information they receive.

"With the Iraqi police we ran joint patrols and training with them," Worthington said.

Among the U.S. soldiers, he said, there is a lot of camaraderie. Many see their experience as a unique opportunity to play a part in the rebuilding of a nation.

"I think everybody's on the same page," he said. "Everyone's there to serve the country. They are missing their families."

Support from home is what sustains most of the soldiers, he said.

"The thing that gets you through all this combat is your family," he explained. Also, coming home on leave after six months, he was pleasantly surprised when strangers approached him to shake his hand and say thanks.

"People that you didn't even know would walk up and say, 'Excellent job over there,'" he said.

Even though he didn't see any combat, Worthington nonchalantly said: "You're always getting shot at from somewhere." Sometimes they were drive through an

intersection that moments later is blown up when another convoy is moving through.

"You're always hearing gunshots, and sometimes you know where they are coming from, and sometimes you don't," he explained.

Worthington brought along many photos of Saddam's palaces that show just how infatuated the man was with himself. Worthington visited the Al Faw Palace, which now houses the multinational force Iraq command.

The soldier explains how giant heads depicting the dictator were taken down from the corners of the palace. One might think a giant head might be a bust of Saddam, but the pictures show a tiny Worthington standing in front of 40-foot fiberglass portrayals of Saddam in military gear.

Another photo shows the young man sitting in one of Saddam's thrones at Al Faw. Worthington looks like a munchkin sitting in a red and gold throne of the Wizard of Oz. In this case, the wizard of Iraq was all too real.

Worthington also visited the Baghdad zoo that houses Hussein's son's animals, such as a cheetah. Another picture captures the soldier petting the tame cat.

He doesn't keep in touch with any of the people he met in Iraq, but Worthington remembers trying to communicate with them as he spoke English and they spoke Arabic.

"They're pretty good guys," he said, referring to the Iraqi police. "They're not as bad as people make them out to be."

He has hope that the Iraqi people will straighten their country out, especially when he recalls the enthusiasm of election day there on Jan. 30.

"There was a lot of energy," Worthington said. "Many of them walked miles to get to polls." Iraqis also valued the ink on their fingers that identified them as having voted, he said, recalling how some would hold their fingers in the air as a symbol.

His parents, Chris and Cindy Walters, still live in Sanford on 19 th Street. Worthington said he loves his family, but joining the military helped him mature into a man.

"I was able to move out on my own and kind of spread my own wings," he said.

"The military training makes you grow up, and makes you think about things."

LIFEGUARD JOB FAIR

Orange County Parks and Recreation will host a second lifeguard job fair at the Fort Gatlin Recreation Complex today (Wednesday, April 20).

Freshman Mike McClendon improved to 10-0 as the Raiders pounded Santa Fe Community College 8-6 totaling 19 hits Monday afternoon at Sam Maupin Wall Field in Gainesville.

The Raiders (36-16, 14-7) were eager to rid themselves of memories of their last trip to Gainesville, which resulted in a blown 7-0 lead, jumped out of the gates early with all nine starters getting a hit by the fifth inning.

The Raiders scored the first run of the game when Aren Griffin singled to left and went first to third on a single by Travis Battle. Jon Lozada drove Griffin home with a groundout to give the Raiders an early 1-0 lead.

Reinaldo Alicano hit his first career triple to drive in a run in the fourth; the triple was the seventh the Raiders hit this season.

Lozada continued to his torrid month of April adding another three-hit performance to his resume raising his seasons average to a team high .361 (60-166).

In the eighth inning, Griffin led off with his second double of the afternoon, and then proceeded to swipe his 18th base on the season leaving him primed to score on Steven Kellum's RBI single. Kellum joined Battle and Kyle Patrick as the only players to have four hits in a single game.

Battle continued his hot-hitting with a 2 for 5 day driving in a run. Sanford's Justin Frost added a two-hit performance adding a double.

Oviedo's Tyler Ackley has stepped up his performance at the dish adding two more hits and an RBI.

McClendon (10-0, 1.81) was his usual dominant self allowing just three runs, two earned over 8.0 innings, giving up just seven hits, punching out five batters, walking only one.

McClendon's 10th regular season victory is the most since 2003 when current University of South Carolina standout Zac McCamie went 10-2 in the regular season, leading the Raiders to the Junior College World Series.

The Raiders have gone 9-1 over their past 10 games and will wrap up the road portion of their schedule today (Wednesday) in Ocala against Central Florida Community College in a game that will have huge ramifications on the Mid-Florida Conference playoff seeding. The Raiders remain in the conference lead and have a leg-up to the automatic

State Tournament bid, but will need tremendous effort coming down the stretch to clinch their third playoff trip in the past four seasons. In the Mid-Florida conference only the top two teams make the playoffs with any and all tie-breakers done with one-game playoffs at a neutral site. John Duocy (6-2, 2.06) will make the start for the Raiders in Ocala. First pitch at Goodlett Field is scheduled for 3 p.m.

The team will host Daytona Beach Community College at Raider Field on Friday at 3 p.m. and would host Santa Fe on Saturday at noon if necessary. If SCC wins today and Friday, Saturday's game would not be played.

The SCC softball team will also wrap up the regular season this week and are looking to close on a strong note heading into the state tournament.

The Raiders, ranked No. 6 in the state poll, ran their record to 38-16 with a sweep of Lake-Sumter Community College, 10-2 and 6-2, on Sunday.

The team was to have hosted St. Johns River Community College in their final conference doubleheader on Tuesday and then close out the regular season with a doubleheader against Polk in Winter Haven (5 p.m. and 7 p.m.) on Thursday and then return home to host national power Palm Beach Community College in a doubleheader on Saturday at 1 p.m. and 3 p.m. Admission to all home games is free of charge.

Calathes, Merthie make 1st Team All-State

A banner boys basketball season did not go unnoticed when the Florida Sports Writers Association got together to vote on the 2005 FHSAA All-State Basketball Teams.

Tribe boys, Rams girls claim SAC track titles

The track postseason got off to a good start for several county teams and athletes as they began the search for state championships.

Led by senior Stevie Warren, the Seminole High School boys held off a strong charge from host Lyman to win the Seminole Athletic Conference Championship, 175-to-166.5, at the Carlton D. Henley Sports Complex last Thursday evening.

Warren won the 100, 200 and 400-meter dashes as well as the long jump and triple jump to put the Tribe on top.

Overall, the Fighting Seminoles won eight of the 17 events and almost completely dominated the sprints and relays.

In fact, the Tribe claimed the first four finishing spots in the 100-meters, seniors Robert Peterson, Travis Knight and Freddie Howard Jr. following Warren across the tape, while also running 1-2-3 in the 200-meters and first and second in the 400-meters.

Seminole also won the 4 x 100-meter and 4 x 400-meter relay's and senior football and weightlifting star Kevin Harris won the shot put.

The Greyhounds were led by senior Von Dixon, who won the 110-meter and 300-meter hurdle events and was second in the triple jump and third in the long jump. Lyman also won the 4 x 800-meter relay race, while junior Dan Hamilton won the pole vault and J. Eiserman won the high jump.

Also getting a pair of wins

was Winter Springs senior Kyle Jones, who won both the 1,600-meter and 3,200-meter races.

The other individual winner was Lake Mary sophomore Matthew Wright in the discus.

On the girls' side, Lake Mary only had four individual champions, freshman basketball star Jordan Coleman in the 400-meters, junior Katie Evans in the high jump, senior Shereena Hollis in the shot put and junior Ashley Kirkpatrick in the discus, but it was enough to hold off host Lyman and senior star Quawandis Grubbs, 138.5-to-117.

Grubbs won three times, winning both the 100- and 300-meter hurdles and the long jump, in a tie with Winter Springs' Yvonne George. Junior Anissa Cleveland also won the 100-meter dash for the Greyhounds.

Oviedo finished a distant fifth, but still had three individual champions.

Senior All-American Jennifer Barringer won the 800-meters and 1,600-meters and senior Brittany McDermott won the pole vault.

Winter Springs finished third with George adding the triple jump to her co-title in the long jump.

Fourth-place Lake Brantley got wins from junior Amanda Hintze in the 3,200-meters and

the 4 x 800-meter relay team. And sixth-place Seminole had junior Brittany Martin win the 200-meter dash as well as having its relay teams win the 4 x 100-meters and 4 x 200-meters.

Seminole and Lake Mary will be headed to the Class 4A-District 2 Meet at Flagler Palm Coast High School in Bunnell today (Wednesday) with Lake Brantley, Lyman, Oviedo and Winter Springs in the Class 4A-District 3 Meet at Showalter Field in Winter Park and Lake Howell in the Class 3A-District 6 Meet at the City Complex of New Smyrna Beach on Thursday.

The Class 1A-District 7 Meet was held last Thursday at Trinity Prep and the Saints proved to be rude hosts, easily winning both the boys and girls titles.

Led by eighth-grader Amanda Powell, Trinity Prep won eight of the 17 individual events, including all three relay races, and had 16 qualify for the regionals.

Powell won four events, the 100-meter and 200-meter dashes as well as the long jump and triple jump.

Crooms Academy finished seventh with Yolanda Grant making her way to the regionals in two events, winning the 100-meter hurdles and placing third in the 300-meter hurdles, while Jackie Hunt also qualified for regionals by finishing third in the shot put.


