

Florida rules: No assisted suicides

No, Charles Hall, you do not have the right to a physician-assisted suicide in the state of Florida.

That's precisely what the majority of members of the Florida Supreme Court told a man dying of AIDS with its landmark ruling rendered Thursday in Tallahassee.

Hall, 35, of the Tampa suburb, Beverly Hills, and two others challenged the state in the courts one year ago. The other two claimants have since died, leaving Hall alone to fight for his right to die. He contracted AIDS through a blood transfusion.

The Court's 5-1 decision against Hall deprives Dr. Cecil Melver a legal right to facilitate Hall's wish to kill himself. Melver said he would

do so last year when it became clear the man's disease was not curable and his pain would only intensify.

Writing for the majority in the ruling, Justice Stephen H. Grimes said that Florida's constitutional right to privacy does not give Hall the right to receive a lethal dose of drugs from his physician.

There is a clear difference, Grimes wrote, in a physician's "passively" allowing a patient to die and "ac-

tively" helping someone take his own life.

Chief Justice Gerald Kogan, the lone dissenter, said the majority opinion ignored advances in medicine that prolong suffering as well as life. He said that it was once illegal to withhold treatment from a dying patient - a practice now readily accepted.

Setting a standard of excellence



Mayor considers leaving board post after verbal sparring with police officers

At a special meeting Thursday, Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said he might resign as chairman of the city's police labor management committee.

Dale called the meeting in response to a verbal altercation he had earlier this week at the committee's regularly scheduled session where he accused a Sanford police officer of being insubordinate and asked him to leave the room.

Committee members and city officials listened to a tape of the meeting where Dale threatened city jobs and told police officer Ned Golden to step out of the room. When Golden refused to step out, Dale called him insubordinate.

Also on the tape and what sparked the dispute was a discussion concerning overtime pay for a police officer in the department's canine unit. Corporal David Ansley submitted overtime in excess of \$8,000 for a one year period. The committee questioned why Ansley let the amount accrue and did not report the expense

earlier. In response to Dale's offer to resign, city commissioners Brady Lessard and Velma Williams urged him not to. Sgt. Darrel Presley added that the police department was willing to work with Dale.

When a member of the public stood up and asked Dale whether he would resign, the mayor said "I don't know. I'll have to speak to Police Chief Joe Dillard and some other people before I make my decision."

Lessard made the motion to table the issue of overtime pay for the canine unit officer until the next commission meeting on July 28.

Do air filters, purifiers really work?

Do the highly advertised air conditioner filters and air purifiers really work? Some are quite expensive.

Some of these types of products work well and are especially good for people that have lung and respiratory problems. There are still other products available that do not work nearly as well as advertised. Some of these products can even cause problems when added to an existing air conditioning unit. These particular types of air conditioner filters, filter out very small particles of dust and debris but can cause the unit to over work and burn up.

There is a growing number of people with hypersensitive airways from asthma, allergies, lung and other respiratory problems. Part of the reason for this increase is the increasing amount of air pollution. Additionally, old and new buildings can have indoor air quality problems depending on a wide variety of reasons.

As a result, the various devices for purifying the air have become popular in the last few years. People are looking for a way to reduce the irritants or

"triggers" such as air pollution, household dust, molds, tobacco smoke, cat fur (dander), etc. But before you pay big bucks, it is wise to shop around and ask a few questions first.

According to Gary Cook who is a Building Construction and Energy Specialist-Energy Extension Service-University of Florida-IFAS, there are several different types of units and filters. Here are some basic pointers.

When adding "special" purifying filters to an existing air conditioner there are several types:

High Efficiency Particle Air Filter (HEPA) -- This type of filter restricts the airflow because they filter out such small

particles. It is not recommended that this type be added to air conditioner systems that are not designed for a HEPA filter because they will over work the unit's motor and result in damage to the air conditioner.

Electronic, two or three wire filters -- These types of filters place a charge on the dust and is very effective in reducing contaminants, trapping even smoke particles down to 0.3 microns. This type of filter must be installed by an air conditioning contractor and may cost between \$300 - \$500.

Electrostatic Type Filter -- This type of filter is not recommended. They are rated by weight of particles removed, and the way the measurement has been calculated makes these filters appear to be highly efficient. However, they generally do a poor job of removing the small particles from the air which is what is actually desired. These filters generally cost between \$20 - \$50 and are designed to replace the standard air conditioner fiberglass filter.

Ozone Generators -- This type is also not recommended.

And, the State of Florida is filing a lawsuit against some manufacturers.

Room air purifier devices -- There are many types of these devices, some are very effective. The small air cleaners that sit on a desk or table are of little use. Look for a unit that has a HEPA type filter. The filter fans are rated by capacity. One with a 250-300 cubic feet per minute (cfm) will do a good job for a medium to large size room. Some are also fitted with a charcoal filter, which can filter out chemicals and chemical odors. This type of air purifier is recommended and can usually be purchased from a variety of discount, home improvement and department stores for \$150 - \$350. After looking at a number of different devices, consider purchasing one that is manufactured by a company that is familiar to you and who has a reputable reputation. enforceable rages in courtrooms throughout the country. Advocates of euthanasia and assisted suicide have been referred to by some as the "Death Culture."

Wealey J. Smith, the author of *Paradise Exit: The Slippery Slope from Assisted Suicide to Legalized Murder*, contends that as a result of the death culture's efforts, the "inalienable" right to life, identified by Thomas Jefferson in the Declaration of Independence, has less resonance among many than a "so-called" right to die.

Smith said the death culture received a "judicial boost" earlier this year when in Palm Beach, Judge Joseph Davis Jr. (a resident of Lake Mary) ruled that Chales Hall was protected in his effort to die by Florida's constitutional right to privacy law.

This, and other court cases, such as the Dr. Jack Kevoorkian acquittals, he said, seemingly legitimized assisted suicide among much of the public as to set the stage for a prolonged political battle in which the

moral health of the country is at stake.

Smith contends that the typical victim (there have been 45) in Kevoorkian's Michigan playground of death, has not been terminally ill - as many believed - but disabled and depressed.

Assisted suicide is banned, either by statute or through court interpretation in four states (Iowa, Louisiana, Rhode Island and Virginia). A recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling neither banned nor condoned assisted suicides, leaving the decision to each state. President Clinton passed a law prohibiting federal funds to be used for assisted suicides.

Renewed efforts are under way, also, to promote proper end-of-life care and compassionate alternatives to killing the sick, such as hospice care and effective pain control.

In what may be the last days or hours of his life, this is all Charles Hall has to comfort him as a result of Thursday's ruling by the Florida Supreme Court. The agony of his approaching death affects not only his but the nation's view of human life.

business center, is complete.

Ken Simback, Pizzuti's regional vice president for the southeast region, outlined the projects currently underway in phase II at Heathrow.

Simback described 701 International Parkway, a four-story building with 125,880 square feet in commercial office space, which is under construction, as "one of the hand-somest buildings around." Leasing is planned for April 1998, he said.

The companion building for 701 is 801 International Parkway, a five-story building with 150,000 square feet of commercial office space. On Business Center Drive will be building 900, with three stories and 110,000 square feet of commercial office space.

Also part of the northern expansion, Heathrow Commons will feature a strip of single story office buildings geared toward smaller businesses. There will be three buildings with 30,306 square feet each and two buildings with 40,140 square feet.

"We are tremendously excited and never expected for this to happen so fast," said Cliff Aiken, executive vice president at Pizzuti.

Aiken said Pizzuti wanted to create a mix of hotels, restaurants and a day care center, which is in the design stage.


"There's more than 2 million square feet to boat out in the northern expansion," he said. Pizzuti's master plan for the business center shows a 300-room hotel in the far north section close to C.R. 46A. Restaurants are zoned in a parcel which includes a nine-acre walking park.

The park, named Heathrow Park, is adjacent to International Parkway. Landscaping for tree lined oval park with meandering sidewalks was completed Thursday according to Mark Evans, director of land development for Pizzuti.

"The park is pedestrian friendly," Evans said.

Evans said there were plans to add an amphitheater or bandshell for concerts or city festivals. Other additions will be benches and water fountains, he said.

"We envision the parcel next door as a restaurant or health club," he said. "We see the whole thing working well around the park."

went over each car extensively. In order to even be considered, a vehicle must receive at least 95 out of 100 points. Mine got 96.4 points."

He said the competition was so intense he even lost a few points because of a slight flaw in the corner of a rubber brake pad. "That's how closely they did this examination," he said.

Lash has studied the history of the car right down to the specifics. He said he is the sixth owner. It was originally purchased by a woman who paid \$5,038 plus \$15 for the tag and \$201 in taxes.

While he was hesitant to estimate the worth of the Corvette at the present time, he eventually suggested it may be worth upward of \$30,000.

With the exception of the woman who made the initial buy, he has met all of the other previous owners, and has obtained all of the manuals and paperwork associated with the

vehicle. It still has the original headlights, original paint and tires. While he has replaced the sparkplugs one time, he still has the first set.

One difference in the Corvette is that it is not a convertible. "Most of the 'Vettes' made in that era had cloth tops," he said. "But I have proof that this one was ordered from the factory with a hard top."

When asked what benefit the Benchmark Award will be, Lash responded that it is like a pedigree. "It proves this is the top of the line, that it is in as perfect as possible condition, just as it was coming from the factory."

He said less than 60 vehicles around the nation have ever received the award.

With the added award designation, will he now sell it? "No," he responded, "I can't sell it without my son's approval." He already considers it his car and plans to own it when he gets bigger.

Lash's son is two-years-old.



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

Sanford needs a sports complex

One thing about our Central Florida youngsters (and young-at-heart): they can certainly take the heat. Even in 90 degree temperatures, we can find them out on the ball fields in the area in organized competition as well as just getting together.

For a considerable length of time, we have heard discussions about the need for more ball fields to serve Sanford folks. We have also heard suggestions from the Waterfront Steering Committee that improved development of Fort Mellon Park may include the elimination of one or more fields.

But one aspect which has been discussed, but not given much publicity, is the concept of having a softball complex at what is known as Site-10. The area is out SR-46, east of Sanford. The city owns thousands of acres out there, leasing some of it, and using all of it for water discharge. As such, it is already being used for the benefit of the city.

But if a sports complex could be considered for that location, even though it isn't within easy bicycling distance, it might be an outstanding recreational asset for all concerned.

Lake Mary built a major sports complex several years ago off Rantoul Lane, basically southwest of the Mayfair Country Club golf course in the northern extremities of the city. Just try to book a ball field. Lake Mary Recreation Supervisor Terry Diederich will tell you it is extremely busy, especially during sports season.

Lake Mary's complex not only has ball fields but other areas which can be used for soccer and other sports.

While user fees and other income are not overwhelming, Lake Mary, nonetheless, finds it is able to make ends meet without causing any serious blight on the city's finances. The only expense is staffing. Other than that, landscape upkeep and other operations pay for themselves.

Sanford could consider a similar sports complex at Site-10. With Lake Mary serving the western side of north Seminole County, Sanford could serve the eastern side.

There are those who would like Sanford to be known, across the state and nationwide, as a sports city. With outstanding sports facilities already developed and in use in the southern part of the county, not just Sanford and Lake Mary, but the entire county could become well known as being sports-minded and sports-active. We believe creation of a Sanford sports complex at Site-10 would go a long way toward helping bring this about.

'Echo House' is a so-so D.C. novel

If you're looking for a fun Washington novel to read this summer, stay away from Ward Just's "Echo House" (A Peter Davison Book/Houghton Mifflin, \$25). It's a winter novel -- dense, morose and difficult, but with pearls stashed in it if you look.

Most Washington novels these days are thrillers in which a few good guys battle some implausible conspiracy that threatens to bring on catastrophe. Most Washington novels, in other words, are summer books.

"Echo House" aspires to be much more -- a piece of literature, in the tradition of Henry Adams' "Democracy," that evokes both the life of Washington and human life in general.

Just as a former Vietnam War correspondent for the Washington Post, one of whose previous novels earned Just the line that he deserved "a space on the shelf just below Edith Wharton and Henry James."

I'd say that "Echo House" deserves to be at least two shelves below that and one below Allen Drury's 1960 "Advise and Consent," my own all-time favorite Washington novel.

The lead characters of "Echo House" are three generations of Behl men who successively preside over a grand mansion overlooking Rock Creek Park that's been

visited over time by presidents and generals. The novel opens in the 1920s as Sen. Adolph Behl (party and state uncertain) is hosting friends in anticipation of getting a call telling him he's been tapped to run for vice president.

The call comes, someone else is picked, and Behl, lacking grace in his disappointment, ruins his political career. Adolph's son, Axel, witnesses the scene and vows never to be in the position of depending on someone else's phone call.

Still, since politics is the family business,

Axel becomes a "fixer without portfolio" -- a Bill Caseyish figure who, after being badly wounded as a OSS operative in World War II, serves his country and himself as a mysterious banker-spy and, for reasons unclear, ultimately is in line for the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

His son, Alec, is a fixer in the tradition of Clark Clifford. What he does, a gushing journalist says, "isn't exactly law; it isn't exactly lobbying. Is it public relations? I think what you do is get people off the hook." It's hinted, for instance, that he arranged Richard Nixon's pardon.

One key problem with this book as a Washington novel is that it is almost entirely about Langley and K Street people. Congress and the White House are instruments to be manipulated, nothing more.

Sojourner is no mere tool

BOSTON--Next thing you know they'll be making a Beanie Baby named Sojourner.

I mean, the country has had a romance with space before, but this is the first time that they've found a NASA space traveler quite so, well, adorable. Ever since the 2-foot-long, 1-foot-high, 23-pound robot rolled out of its air bags and onto the rusty Martian soil, it's become a national mascot.

The scientists are so excited that one described himself in "hog heaven," though that may be an insult to the real thing. The Pathfinder teammates sound as if they would like to pay their little offspring right on its alpha proton X-ray spectrometer.

As for the country, the trip to the red planet has gotten some 100 million hits on the beyond-this-world wide web. This is more people than are going to line up for the opening week-end of "Contact."

I too am enjoying this virtual vacation on Mars. In an era when long-term planners worry about the next quarter, I'm glad we can still think in Carl Sagan-esque periods of time about billion-year-old floods. When a lot of us have trouble seeing beyond our own national borders, it's great to glance at a world 119 million miles away.

But I confess that I am most intrigued by the way we have welcomed this high-tech traveler into our species. No sooner had it landed than Sojourner was magically anthropomorphized. This was no mere tool, no vehicle. It wasn't even an "it."

The scientists gave Sojourner more than a name. They gave her a personal pronoun. Rover scientist Henry Moore bragged that "she is the robotic equivalent of Neil Armstrong." Then he announced that "she's your field geologist." Moore even said the she wanted to thank the taxpayers for her existence.

Having given Sojourner a gender, I suppose it was only moments before they gave her a romantic interest. When she went picking her way some 15 inches to the rock dubbed Barnacle Bill, deputy project manager Brian Muirhead said, "Sojourner and Barnacle Bill are holding hands." Dr. Matthew Golombek went a bit further to suggest that Sojourner "nestled up and kissed affectionately Barnacle Bill."

What a hussy! Sojourner hasn't even been there a week and she's soul-kissing the natives. I don't want to know what happened when she got her spectrometer snout on that bear-shaped hunk named Yogi. If this goes on, we'll have to screen out the NASA Web page from the children.

But this is not a treatise on sexism in space speech. At least not this time. It's about the instinct to make something as cool

as a remote controlled vehicle into something warm and wiggly. It's about the human penchant to humanize. Even a high-tech robot.

When Neil Armstrong landed on the moon, he sounded like a robot: "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind." But when Sojourner landed on Mars, it--excuse me--she was made into a flirt. The scientists treated this robot as a colleague, even piping in the theme song to "Mad About You" as her wake-up music.

Down here on Earth, we have a different experience with technology. Those with our feet on the ground, not the flood plains of Mars, often feel that the high-tech world has become an alien life experience. It's the unidentified flying object coming our way. And it's not user-friendly.

If anything, technology has been dehumanizing everyday life. Real life is turning into its virtual version. Too many voices have been replaced by voice mail. Some days, we interact more with a keyboard than with each other. Even the information operator has been replaced by a series of annoying electronic requests: What City? What Number? What Nonsense?

In what we call cyberspace, more of us enter chat rooms than know how to chat in a living room. And it seems we are all being forced to make our mental hardware fit new software.

This Romance with the Rover reminds us that there's another side to this story. The human side, the unique and reassuring desire to absorb, adopt, and adapt. It's behind the bumper sticker on the car, the sweet talk to the recalcitrant computer, the naming of rocks and high-tech explorers.

Right now, even the scientists among us are heaven-bent on humanizing something so foreign you'd think it was a Martian. As for the surrogate Sojourner, "Go get 'em, Sweetheart." But stay away from the little Martian rock star they've named the Couch.

Air Force comes clean on Roswell

WASHINGTON--The horde of UFO believers who gathered along a abnormally lonely stretch of desert in Roswell, N.M., earlier this month is the latest evidence of the foolishness that government cover-up can cause.

The visitors gathered for the 50th anniversary of a believed UFO crash, an event the U.S. government probably could have debunked decades ago.

Instead, the Air Force waited until a week before the anniversary to produce a 231-page report, "The Roswell Report: Case Closed," which, indeed, offers reasonable explanations for a series of strange eyewitness accounts of events that occurred decades ago.

The "Roswell Incident" has become a central myth of UFO lore. It began in July 1947 when a rancher northwest of Roswell found debris from a crashed object he thought was a flying saucer. Aluminum-foil-like bits and pieces were reported to be impervious to burning or ripping, and after crumpling went back to their original shape without creases.

When the Army Air Force investigated, the first official press release issued about Roswell declared the military had the remnants of a flying saucer. Within hours, however, higher-ups declared the first press release a mistake and explained that the debris was merely a downed weather balloon.

The story laid dormant for decades until it was resurrected by a supermarket tabloid in 1978. Since then, at least four books have been published on the Roswell incident, and it is a central theme in the popular sci-fi TV series, "The X-Files."

The story evolved from the rancher finding the foil-like bits and pieces to purported accounts of one live and several dead aliens being recovered by the Army Air Force around the same time.

A grounds well of interest in the matter finally prompted Rep. Steven H. Schiff, R-N.M.--a UFO skeptic--to ask the Pentagon in March 1993 to declassify everything relating to the Roswell military operation. He offered them a face-saving chance to come out with the truth once and for all. What the Pentagon did, instead, was effectively insult the congressman. The Air Force referred him to the National Archives--which said it had no information.

Schiff didn't take kindly to the brush-off. In late 1993, he called the General Accounting Office, the investigative arm of Congress, and asked them to look for documents relating to the incident. The GAO investigation for a Republican congressman--then in the minority in the House--was not a high priority.

But the Air Force was spooked enough to try to pre-empt the GAO inquiry. They issued a short report in late 1994 that was intended to be their final word on the matter. The debris was part of Project Mogul, they declared, a top-secret experiment aimed at detecting future Soviet nuclear blasts by monitoring sound waves in the upper atmosphere using high-altitude balloons, sensors and radar reflectors.

The next year, as the GAO was conducting its inquiry, knowledgeable sources told our associate Dale Van Atta that the normally staid, unflustered GAO auditors were convinced the Air Force was still covering up and had not told them everything it knew.

Church celebrates 107th anniversary

SANFORD — Christ United Methodist Church, 406 Tucker Dr., will be celebrating its 107th anniversary this Sunday in a special service and program beginning at 11 a.m. The church has a long history in the community and will be honored in accepting new stained glass windows to commemorate the event.


According to a flyer sent by member Lee Stenstrom, the original church was built shortly after the Civil War on land owned by John M. and Jane Lord. The original name of Christ United Methodist Church was Ebenezer Chapel and was also founded by the Lords, whose grandson is J. Lee Stenstrom.

When John Lord, who was wounded in the battle of Gettysburg, returned to his home, on crutches, in central Georgia, about 20 miles north of Macon, he found his family and friends were loading their wagons and on carts to move south, as the result of General Sherman's march through Georgia from Atlanta to Savannah.

As they traveled south they decided to spend their first winter and several more months at Fort White, Florida, which is near the Georgia-Florida state line, south of Jessup, Georgia. Some of their groups elected to remain in that area, but John Lord and the rest decided to move further south and settled in this area near an old abandoned Indian Fort known as Fort Reed on the south end of Lake Monroe near Mellonville Drive. This was prior to the settling and existence of the city of Sanford.

Soon after the Civil War the Indians in the area were told to leave. Some of them migrated west to Kansas, Oklahoma and the Midwest. Others went south into the Everglades.

Also about this time John Long and his friends were busy building their homes. Lord, who it is assumed was raised by Christian parents, soon recognized the need for a church, so he elected to give one acre of this newly acquired property for that purpose. He and his friends purchased the

lumber and John H. Wynn, who was an excellent carpenter, proceeded to build a church.

John Lord was knowledgeable of the fact that the Indians were being displaced and that the chapel at Fort Reed, which had been built by them, and some early missionaries, was no longer being used. He secured permission from the government to remove the pews, altar and lectern and put them in the new church. No one knows when Fort Reed Chapel and furnishings were built, so the altar, lectern and a portion of the pews could be over 120 years old. He then contacted the Bishop and other officials of the Florida Methodist Conference and initiated the necessary documents to make it a member, and to be served by one of their circuit

riding ministers. The charter members, at Lord's recommendation, decided to name their church, Ebenezer Epworth Methodist Church as referenced in the 12th verse of First Samuel, which says, "Thus far has the Lord helped us." John Lord was designated Superintendent of the Sunday School and served in that capacity for 25 years. Their service was in August 1890.

Lord, whose home was a short distance away raised a family of eight children, six girls and two boys. All of their children grew up worshipping Jesus, in Ebenezer. One of this children became an ordained Methodist minister, as well as two of his grandchildren.

The special service will feature

speakers, the Rev. Dean Witten, superintendent of the Orlando district, the Rev. J.C. Powell, superintendent of the Tallahassee district and Judy Shears, producer of the stained glass windows being donated.

Grandchildren and great grandchildren include: Evelyn L. Stanifer, Eunice L. Outlaw, Horace L. Smith, Theresa Tyler, J. Lee Stenstrom, the Rev. J. Richard Lord, Ina Powell. Their families and other descendants will join the current members of Christ United Methodist Church, for an old time "pot luck" dinner at the church following the morning worship service. After lunch, a family reunion will be held in the sanctuary.

Marriage: A great mystery!

We act on what we know and "knowing" is not one of this modern generation's greatest assets! Although medical knowledge doubles every five years... computer science is literally reaching the skies... and many other high achievements exist... marriage, however, remains a mystery as to how to make it work. Not only do over half of marriages disintegrate, but a high percentage of those staying together are failing in carrying out their Divine purpose!

How many marriages:
- are so good that "you cannot stand it"?
- produce great happiness, joy and peace?
- bring fulfillment and complete satisfaction?

The answer is - as many as function like the great story of redemption and are becoming "one". Instead of "running away from marriage," partners are "running to marriage" with a union that is a great mystery. The Scriptures describe this mystery.

"For this cause shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall be joined unto his wife, and they two shall be one flesh. This is a great mystery; but I speak concerning Christ and the church." (Ephesians 5:31-32).

In the context of the Ephesian letter (chapter 5:3-12), the beautiful description of marriage comes after a dark and sordid, sinful behavior which depicts the perversion of marriage. Marriage, therefore, is two people being "melted down into one." Heat up two pads of butter, melt

Marriage in purpose is: man joined to

his wife - literally, "being glued to one another." "Becoming one" is the cause and purpose, and this calls for plans to be drawn up that lead to "oneness". These plans include reflecting God's image:

"So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them." (Genesis 1:27).

Being made in God's image means reflecting God's character. We reflect this image when we love, forgive, show mercy, etc.

"And the Lord God said, It is not good that man should be alone..." Man was not made to be alone, so the woman completes the man. 


