Civic Group Favors Slogan Trade At Home

Local Stores Offer Equal Values, Lower Prices, Say Women's Committee

Decorations For Holidays Praised

More Than 50 Store Owners In Contest For Prize Of \$10

"Trade at Home"

Asserting their belief that the stores of Sanford offer values equal to those in metropolitan centers and at prices under those in some of the big city stores where the "overhead" is higher, members of the women's civic committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce today issued a plea to the public to "trade at home."

Comparing advertisements of local merchants in The Herald with those of merchants in newspapers published in larger towns showed in cases where prices are quoted that nothing can be saved by sending away. In a few items where a price a few cents lower was quoted on an item by a store in a metropolitan center the postage or express to get that article to Sanford would make the price higher than if the purchase was made locally.

"And the home town merchant stands behind his merchandise and will 'make good' if there should be anything wrong," it was argued.

Committee members attending the meeting expressed the unanimous opinion that "this is a time when even greater stress should be given to the importance of patronizing our home town merchants."

They also emphasized the value of courteousness on the part of store officials and employees, especially during the holiday season when there are so many visitors in the city.

Praise was given by the group to those merchants who are decorating their stores for the holiday period. More than 50 merchants have entered the contest for the \$10 cash prize offered by the Chamber of Commerce for the most attractive store front and window display to be maintained until after New Year's Day. The contest is to begin today.

Any White Woman Eligible To Take Hygiene Courses

Two Classes A Week Being Conducted By WPA Direction

Any white woman in Seminole County who so desires can enroll in the Home Hygiene classes being conducted twice a week in Sanford under the WPA educational program, according to an announcement made by Miss Frances McDougall, Red Cross nurse. The program is being sponsored by the Seminole County Chapter of the American Red Cross Society, Miss McDougall and Mrs. Alice V. Ward are the teachers.

Persons desiring to take the course are advised to enroll any day excepting Saturday or Sunday at the office of the public health nurse in the City Jail building, between the hours of 10 A. M. and 2 P. M.

Class periods are from one and one-half hours to two hours in length, two classes a week. From 45 to 60 hours are required for certification.

The courses are planned to give practical instruction in subjects relating to the health of the individual, the home and the community. They emphasize positive teaching and are based upon normal living, everyday problems of the home, including cleanliness, sanitation, care of the kitchen, bathroom, bedroom and the making of the bed. This builds up to the presenting of such subjects as the care of babies, children and the aged within the home. Simple home-care of the sick is taught and practical sufficient to enable the student to use it in her own home with both safety and benefit to the ill member of the family.

Chief Orders Enforcing Of Parking Limit

Increase In Traffic Necessitates Rule; Ban May Be Lifted After The Holidays

One hour parking on the downtown business streets of Sanford is to be enforced by the police department from now on, or at least until traffic becomes lighter. The order was issued by Chief Roy Williams this morning.

The one hour parking rule will be enforced on First Street between Oak and Sanford Avenues, on Park Avenue between Commercial and Second streets, and Magnolia Avenue between First and Second streets.

The police department has been lenient with automobile drivers who have heretofore paid no attention to the one hour parking signs, but traffic is becoming so heavy, Chief Williams said, that enforcing of the rule cannot be put off any longer. He intimated that after the holidays the ban might be lifted, but "it all depends on the condition of traffic," he said.

"We do not wish to cause any hardships on anyone," Chief Williams stated, "but you know a word to the wise is sufficient," and I hope The Herald will let motorists know that they must heed the one hour parking rule. The police department asks the cooperation of the motoring public in this regard."

Jap "Aggression" Causes Protest Of Chinese Students

PEIPING, Dec. 16. (AP) Defying police clubs, warning volleys of rifle fire and streams from fire hoses, Chinese student demonstrators stormed through Heilongmen railway today to protest against Japanese "aggression."

In a huge mass meeting at the Chiemen railway station, just outside the legation quarter, 7,000 demonstrators decided to call a national students' strike. They voted to send a circular telegram throughout China, opposing autonomy of North China, denouncing Sino-Japanese negotiations, demanding that China yield nothing to Japan and calling for abolition of the semi-autonomous Hopai-Charar political center.

Kidnaped Millionaire Is Located By Army

HAVANA, Dec. 16. (AP) Nicholas Castano, millionaire, who was kidnaped a week ago and held for \$500,000 ransom was found alive today by the Cuban army. Details of the discovery or whether the huge ransom paid had been used were not immediately available.

Army headquarters announced that Castano and his chauffeur were found in a house near the town of Santiago de Las Vegas on the outskirts of Havana. Men guarding the prisoners were arrested, it was said.

Peace Plan Critics To Be Answered As Major Battle Looms

Pope Avoids Discussion Of Ethiopian Peace Proposals

Words Would Be Misconstrued, Pontiff Tells Consistory

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 16. (AP) - Pope Pius purposely avoided discussion of the pending Italian-Ethiopian peace proposals today in a secret Consistory where he created 20 new cardinals. The pontiff said any observation he might make "would not be well understood or would be deliberately misconstrued" in many places. His Holiness did "pray God fervently for peace with justice, with truth and with charity."

The Consistory, during which the 20 new princes of the church were elected, was saddened by the sudden death of Cardinal Lega, 75, bishop of Frascati, an hour and a half before the conclave.

The Pope filled the only vacant bishopric in the United States, that at Helena, Mont., by appointing Joseph P. Gilmore, chancellor of that diocese, to succeed Ralph L. Haynes who was recently named rector of the American College in Rome.

Grand Jury Told To Probe Tampa Crime Condition

TAMPA, Dec. 16. (AP) - The grand jury is to investigate crime conditions in general and the flouting murder of Joseph Shoemaker in particular was given to the Hillsborough county grand jury today by Circuit Judges L. L. Parks and Harry N. Sandler.

Claims of gambling, crooked elections and graft in official circles "culminating in the murder of Joseph Shoemaker" were recounted to the jury in a written charge of the judges.

State Attorney J. Rex Farrar said he had not called any witnesses before jury yet and does not know when he will call them. The abduction of Shoemaker "from the very doors of our city hall," the judges said, "exhibits a spirit of lawlessness which law-abiding and law-respecting citizens cannot tolerate. The incident further exhibits an utter lack of fear of detection and punishment."

Local Government - A Fallers By ARTHUR DUNN

After a month in Louisiana and over a year spent investigating in 19 other states, I am forced to the conclusion that people in most communities have lost faith in the integrity of their local and state governments.

Integrity is a much stronger word than honesty. The latter has a negative connotation of policy you practice to keep out of jail.

It is because of bad government that dignitaries are possible. When politicians lose faith in their representatives, they threaten to resign.

So, too, in this country. When Governor Talmadge used the militia to quell the Highway Commission in Georgia, its citizens applauded, and many show no disapproval at his intention to run the state after January first by martial law.

When I left Florida last September a number of Miami city and county officials, including a mayor and ex-mayor, were being indicated, and petitioners recalling the entire City Commission were being circulated.

They could never have become the unquestioned dictator of Louisiana had there not been popular dissatisfaction with state and local governments.

Local government is a failure in the United States. We might as well admit it. It has fallen down completely on the job of suppressing crime and preventing motor murders.

Public expense leave no room for doubt that in most cities of any size gambling, semi-immoral, crooked voting and racketeering enjoy protection.

The New Year will bring to employers of labor an additional tax burden, for upon Jan. 1 the Federal Social Security Act will become effective in part.

The old age insurance levy, twin of unemployment insurance, will not be started until Jan. 1, 1937. This impost begins at 1 percent and remains stationary through 1939.

Summed up, employers of eight or more persons will separate themselves from a pay-roll tax of 6 percent, after both laws bear down to their fullest possible extent.

The purpose of these two pay-roll taxes is laudable, as it is intended to provide funds for the care of the unemployed during periods of stress and for the social security of employes who have reached the age where they are no longer active.

Born in Crescent City, Fla., in 1877, Gautier attended Stetson University and came to Miami in 1903. He has been city attorney, county judge, county solicitor, city commissioner and mayor. In 1933 he served as state legislative chairman of the Florida League of Municipalities.

In seeking the Democratic nomination, Gautier proposes the state throw open its lands to homesteaders, take over the making of small loans, and encourage agriculture and small industries.

"Reasonable economy on the one hand and equitable distribution of the tax burden on the other," Gautier's statement said, "will provide equitable distribution of the tax burden and provide ample funds for just administration of government and schools without new tax sources."

Lack Of Labor Delays Market Improvements

Work Halted Because
Men Engaged On
Streets, Armory,
Committee Is Told

Schedule May Be Changed By Board

Conference Is To Be
Held During Week
On Local Projects

Lack of labor is delaying improvements at the Farmers State Wholesale Market in Sanford, the supervisory committee learned last night. Surveys of the market site where new roads are to be built and a loading platform is to be erected have been made, building material requirements have been figured out, and are ready for delivery to the lowest bidder, more than \$42,000 of government funds have been allocated for the project, and construction was expected to begin this week.

But because there are not enough unemployed men residents in the community to undertake the market improvement and at the same time keep other projects going the market project has been shifted to one side.

This was the explanation given to the supervisory committee by R. L. Glenn, chairman of the planning board. If the market improvements are to be made now then it will be necessary to halt building of the Armory for the Florida National Guard and to spend work on the city streets. There are not enough carpenters, Mr. Glenn said, to build the loading platform at the market and to build the Armory at the same time, and there is not enough negro labor to pave the roads around the market buildings and repair Park Avenue and First Street down town at the same time.

Since the Armory and street work had begun before funds for the market were allocated it was decided best to continue with the projects, rather than suspend that work and undertake the market improvement.

Mr. Glenn said he is to meet with head officials of the Works Progress Administration in Jacksonville on Thursday of this week and if he finds he is unable to convince them of the necessity of putting through the market improvements he will wire Chairman H. M. Hayworth of the committee and that official will go to Jacksonville and lend his support.

"I'll tell them that the market project is the most important," Mr. Hayworth declared. "The National Guard boys have a place to meet and I fail to see why the immediate construction of the Armory is necessary. It could wait for a few weeks. The same way with the streets. Work on them is to be suspended during the holidays, and I see no reason why the suspension could not be continued a few weeks longer."

Market officials stated that the roads around the market area will be paved before the rainy season, and unless the loading platform is erected before the busy market season it will be impossible to assemble broken lot shipments of fruits and vegetables.

Roosevelt made a \$2,500,000,000 "error," Hoover said in estimating the New Deal's public debt commitments, and took credit for \$2,500,000,000 of irretrievable assets and out by the Hoover regime. He predicted the public debt would rise to \$42 or \$43 billion by next July.

Confidence Vote Given Laval For His Peace Plans

Chamber Is Dared By
Premier To Over-
throw Government

PARIS, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The Chamber of Deputies by a vote of 706 to 212 today assured Premier Laval of its confidence in his program to settle the Italian-Ethiopian war. The vote of confidence came after the premier dared the Chamber during the Chamber's 100th anniversary to overthrow his government, declaring he refused to go to Geneva under humiliating conditions. The deputies voted on the Premier's demand that interpellations of the government on its plan in handling the Italian-Ethiopian situation be postponed until Dec. 27.



Crowded into the background is the important question of whether Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy would accept in respect the progress of the Italian-Ethiopian peace which Premier Laval and British Foreign Secretary Samuel Hoare launched by a week-end conference eight days ago. Laval's reply is expected Thursday, following Wednesday's meeting of the Fascist grand council.

The Italian government announced that the Italian troops had returned before the attack of about 2,000 Ethiopians in the northern front. The announcement, the first of a war in which Italy has admitted retreat, was made in official communiqués. There was considerable concern among the Italian officers, including four Italian officers, killed and three wounded, and several Italian soldiers killed and wounded. Ethiopian losses were described as "insubstantial."

The Ethiopians attacked the advance observation posts on the Takka River, the announcement said, and after "bitter resistance" the Italians withdrew. At the same time another Ethiopian group crossed the river valley, making a flanking movement.

Enemy maneuvers resulted in the battle that now is in progress and in which some of the air forces and detachments of tanks are taking an active part," the communique stated.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—(AP)—William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, said today he would renew his demand for punishment of those who flogged and killed three men in Tampa two weeks ago. Joseph Shoemaker, one of the three, died of his injuries. Green's statement came after a conference with Norman Thomas, Socialist leader, and David Lasser, president of the Workers' Alliance of which the three Tampa men were members.

Thomas told reporters that Green had a chance to "do one of the finest jobs in America. With his backing he can do something that rarely has ever been done before in cases like this."

Warriors' Onslaught Forces Retirement Of Invaders Along North Battle Front

Ethiopian Losses
Said To Be Heavy

Four Legion Officers Killed As Selassie Troops Storm Posts

ROME, Dec. 17.—(AP)—The long-awaited general toward which the Italian and battle in northern Ethiopia, Ethiopian armies have been maneuvering for weeks, appeared to be under way today with the first engagement of the Italian and Ethiopian forces.

The Italian government announced that the Italian troops had returned before the attack of about 2,000 Ethiopians in the northern front. The announcement, the first of a war in which Italy has admitted retreat, was made in official communiqués.

Hauptmann Has No Further Recourse To Courts Of Law

BERLIN, N. J., Dec. 17.—(AP)—Paul Richard Hauptmann may all his cards on the plea which he makes to the Court of Appeals today.

Law courts of interpretation of legal technicalities is correct, it is finally closed to the man convicted of the Lindbergh baby killing. He has now, it is said, exhausted all legal resources.

The proposed "detainer" test develops anything significant, Hauptmann must produce "the evidence" before New Jersey's court of mercy. Five votes, including the governor's, are necessary to commute the sentence.

Legal officials observed that criminal law provides "newly discovered evidence" is not ground for new trial unless designated in the statute. New Jersey statute, they said, contains no such provision.
