



## Hoover Again Sees Freedom Threatened

### Ex-President Cautious In Reference To Present Methods Of Government

STANFORD, UNIVERSITY, Calif., June 17.—(AP)—Another warning against any sacrifice of freedom in the search for economic security was sounded yesterday by former President Herbert Hoover.

Cautious references to "bathroom methods" of restoring "social growth" to the "economy of security" and to bureaucracy were made by Mr. Hoover in addressing the 1933 graduating class of Stanford, his alma mater.

In a reference to the prevalence of individualism at the time of his own graduation in 1888 Mr. Hoover said he spoke "at the risk of seeming counter-revolutionary or as a defender of

Government by specific laws, not by the uncertainties of administrative fiat," was one tenet put forth by the former president.

The concentration of economic power and the concentration of political power are equally destructive," he remarked.

"There never has been nor never will be freedom when powers of government are lodged in a man or in a group of men," he added. "Moreover, all history teaches us that even majorities cannot be trusted with the ark of freedom without checks. Constitutional government, the division of powers, are the only successful protections the human race has devised. To transgress or override them will weaken and finally destroy freedom itself."

Only a few days prior to the recent Supreme Court decision that brought death to the Blue Eagle, Mr. Hoover in an interview advocated abolition of the NRA.

The former President foresees the possibility of further great advancement if the right direction were followed.

"If our thought is clear, and if our methods are rightly directed,

he said, "we should see another era of advancement as great as the hundred years which followed the Napoleonic wars. If our course is wrongly directed, victory may be won but at a heavy price."

Several producing districts did not send representatives to the joint wage conference Saturday, which ratified the contract extension. Mr. Roosevelt proposed to avert the nation-wide strike originally set for midnight last night.

Absence of these representatives who distract his experiments, and believe his policies depart from sound American principles, can be induced to vote together for one opposing candidate.

Whether that estimate is correct or not, it is the actuating factor behind the present maneuverings in the opposition camp.

The thought of the leaders is that a preponderance of public sentiment hardly can be mustered to the left of Mr. Roosevelt, and that to oppose him with a middle-ground candidate, looking to the left and to the right, would be suicidal. They see their hope on the right.
