'Star Wars' Satellite Makes Successful Flight

Engineers worked through the night to monitor a "Star Wars" hunter satellite pirouetling through space in a dazzling orbital ballet that required it to track down 15 targets mimicking Soviet missiles and warheads.

The 12-hour. \$250 million mission, the most ambitious "Star Wars" space test ever attempted, began Monday with the successful launch of an unmanned Delta rocket at 5:07 p.m. EST - four days behind schedule - from the Cape

Canaveral Air Force Station. Attached to the blue and white rocket's second stage was a 6,000-pound instrument package, the heaviest cargo ever carried by a Delta, including two

ejected in waves to serve as targets for high-tech sensors attached to the Delta's second

"Everything is going very well," a project spokesman said late Monday. "Things are going well; not perfectly, they've had one or two little glitches, but they've adjusted some computers (and) they're going as well as we could expect halfway into the mission.

'The test objects were deployed on time. There are 15 test objects that will be looked at."

At least one of the test objects was thought to involve a second rocket launch early today, but details of that aspect of the mission were not immediately available.

The goal of the flight, called sets of "test objects" that were Delta 181, was to gather data on

how to track and distinguish objects, such as enemy warheads, in the space environment, a crucial element in President Reagan's proposed Strategic Defense Initiative -SDI - space-based missile defense system, commonly known as "Star Wars."

The flight plan called for the second-stage to carry out more than 200 maneuvers to allow the sensors to acquire and track the test objects in what amounted to a futuristic battle-management

exercise. "This is probably one of the most complex SDI missions that has been executed so far, and we're just delighted things are going as well as they are." Army Col. Raymond Ross, in charge of the project's kinetic energy division, said after the launch.

Some 100 ground radars and aircraft around the world were required to monitor the flight. the second in a series of three planned Delta-SDI missions us-

ing NASA's workhorse rocket. The flight marked NASA's first major launch since March 26, 1987, when an Atlas-Centaur rocket carrying a military communications satellite was destroyed by lightning during launch in a thunderstorm.

SDI envisions a layered space-based missile defense system that would be capable of destroying Soviet warheads during the three stages of a ballistic missile flight: launch. orbital coasting and re-entry.

The flight marked the second in a series of "Star Wars" Delta missions with a third flight planned for this summer.

Bork Lashes Out At Kennedy, Cites Lies, Intellectual Vulgarity

GROVE CITY, Pa. (UPI) - In his sharpest attack since the collapse of his Supreme Court candidacy, former Judge Robert Bork lashed out at Sen. Edward Kennedy and others who he said waged a campaign of lies and "Intellectual vulgarity" against him.

"Kennedy painted a nightmare of fascist repression and attributed it to me," Bork said. "Not a line of it was true. Even for a political campaign, it set record lows of mendacity and intellectual vulgarity."

The 60-year-old former federal appeals court judge accused Kennedy and other (iberal senators of jeopardizing the integrity of the judicial nomination process through excessive politicization.

Bork stepped down Friday from the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia where he had served since 1982. His nomination to replace retired Justice Lewis Powell was defeated by the Senate Oct. 23.

Democrats Take Over in Arizona

PHOENIX, Artz (UPI) - Acting Gov. Rose Mofford began putting her imprint on state government after officially taking the reins from the impeached Evan Mecham. sacking Mecham's top aide and saying she would support a Martin Luther King holiday.

It was Mecham's cancellation of a paid King holiday that ignited the furor that culminated in his becoming the first governor to simultaneously face felony indictment, impeachment and a recall election.

The Democratic secretary of state assumed control Monday, three days after the House of Representatives voted 46-14 to impeach the Republican governor and strip him of his powers pending a Senate trial.

One of Mofford's first acts was to place Max Hawkins. director of the Department of Administration, on paid leave. It was Hawkins who urged Mecham to make his fifth try for the governorship in 1986.

Meantime, the House, in its final role in the impeachment process, voted 42-18 Monday to adopt the specific articles of impeachment that will form the basis of the Senate trial, which is expected to start Feb. 22.

U.N. Mediator Talks To Begin On Soviets' Afghan Pullout

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (UPI) - U.N. mediator Diego Cordovez said today formal talks on a Soviet pullout from Afghanistan would be held in Geneva March 2, paving the way for Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev to begin withdrawing 115,000 occupation troops by May.

Ending a 21-day shuttle mission between Sovietoccupied Afghanistan and Pakistan, which backs the Afghan resistance, Cordovez said the outstanding issues were ready for detailed discussion at the Geneva proximity talks.

Although optimistic, Cordovez stopped short of saying he expected the withdrawal agreements would be signed in March. He said there was "virtual agreement" on a timetable for the Soviet withdrawal.

Gorbachev, in a speech Monday, announced his intentions to begin withdrawing Soviet forces on May 15, assuming the agreements are signed at Geneva no later than March 15. He acceded to U.S. demands and agreed to an early pullout of the bulk of the troops and said Moscow would not attempt to shape a future Afghan government.

Noriega Demands U.S. Troops Out

PANAMA CITY, Panama (UPI) - Military strongman Gen. Manuel Noriega, saying U.S. forces were a "threat" to national security, joined other army officers in calling for the expulsion of American troops in Panama, site of the largest U.S. base in Latin America.

Noriega's comments Monday in a televised broadcast came shortly after mid-level officers under his command formally asked President Eric Delvalle to expel the American soldiers.

The Panamanian general, seen as the power behind Delvalle's government, was indicted Friday by federal grand juries in Miami and Tampa, Fla., on charges of helping Colombian cocaine traffickers in return for payoffs in the millions of dollars.

PETROPOLIS, Brazil (UPI) -Rescuers freed a woman buried nearly 48 hours and pumped oxygen to two others believed still trapped in mud and debris from landslides that killed at least 147 people and left 7,000 homeless in the state of Rio De

Onlookers applauded as Maria Ismenia Aleixo, in her 30s, was pulled from the rubble Sunday in the city of Petropolis, 44 miles north of Rio de Janeiro.

Rescue workers used jackhammers to reach the woman, who was saved from suffocation by a concrete beam that fell on top of her after her home was destroyed in an avalanche of mud Friday that carried her 100 feet down a

"When we pulled her out she told us she was worried because we were getting wet and were risking our lives," rescue worker Jaelio de Souza told a radio station.

The woman was taken to a hospital where she was treated for head and other injuries.


Rescuers also detected the voices of two other survivors in about the same place the woman was found and pumped oxygen into the debris throughout the night, a Petropolis city spokesman said.

More than 1,000 rescue workers dug through tons of mud searching for victims of the slides triggered by torrential rains in the Petropolis and Rio de Janeiro areas.

"I feel powerless facing such a disaster," said Petropolis Mayor Paulo Rattes after declaring a state of emergency. "Petropolis is isolated and people here are thoroughly frightened."

Dozens of bulldozers and trucks operating under occasional light rain in four parts of mountain-ringed Petropolis searched for victims believed to be buried under the rubble of houses crushed by avalanches of

City spokeswoman Ira Barone said 120 people were killed when five days of torrential rains in Petropolis triggered hundreds of landslides. Seventy-three victims already have been buried. At least 548 people were injured and 67 remained hospi-

Bork: I Became A Battleground

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Defeated Supreme Court candidate Robert Bork said Monday his nomination was the most politicized in history and warned senators against extracting "campaign promises" from future nominees.

Speaking out on his first day as a scholar for the conservative American Enterprise Institute. Bork said it was a mistake to have discussed his constitutional views in detail before the Senate Judiciary Committee.

"I had about 15 litmus tests put to me by various senators and I couldn't agree with them all," Bork told a news conference. "If hearings go that way, nominees will in effect be forced to make campaign promises."

Bork, who stepped down Friday from the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia where he has served since 1982, insisted he was "not

confirmation hearings and demonstrated his renown sense of hunmor, admitting "I'm probably in the process right now" of becoming a "has-been."

The 60-year-old former judge, whose nomination to replace retired Justice Lewis Powell was defeated by the Senate Oct. 23, has viewed himself as a victim of a campaign of misinformation waged by liberal groups.

During more than a week of hearings last fall. Bork broke with precedent and answered questions about his positions on specific issues saying it was necessary to do so to respond to misrepresentations of his many years of speaking and writing.

New Owner Gives Post No Guarantee

NEW YORK (UPI) - The real estate developer who agreed conditionally to buy Rupert Murdoch's New York Post refused to guarantee that he will keep open the 187-year-old newspaper but dented that he bought it for its prime waterfront

property. Murdoch's sale of the financially alling newspaper to Manhattan developer Peter Kalikow for \$37 million - \$7 million more than he paid 12 years ago - is conditional on major concessions from the racy tabloid's unions

Murdoch previously vowed never to sell the Post to anyone who would not commit to its continued publication. But Kalikow, who has no experience in the newspaper business, refused to guarantee that the paper would remain open for three years as provided for in the orginal document offering the Post for sale, Murdoch spokesman Howard Rubenstein

"Mr. Kalikow and Mr. Murdoch did not come to that agreement because of the grim financial picture of the New York Post. However, Mr. Kalikow absolutely did not buy the paper because of the real estate value," Rubenstein said, responding to union concerns the developer bought the paper to turn its prime riverfront plant into a luxury high-rise.

"We will have serious questions to ask about Mr. Kalikow's committment to the unions and employees before we start discussing any concessions," said Joy Cook, of Local 3 of The Newspaper Guild, the biggest union at the paper.

Kaltkow said he planned to keep top editors and much of the staff of the paper. He was expected to hire Peter Price. chairman of Avenue magazine. as the Post's publisher.

Say 'No Thanks' To More Quotas

For the eighth year, Japan is offering to pun in Itself for selling Americans too many automobiles. The seeming self-denial is government-sponsored restrictive quatas on Japanese auto exports, first urged by the United States and annually renewed. It part, the offer is a tactic to counter Japan bashers in Congress. With Tokyo on guard to reduce the supply and raise the price of Japanese cars. U.S. auto companies need not push for protection. Without auto industry help, other protectionists may find their way blocked.

Whether the tactic works with Congress, it has made a big difference to American auto buyers. One effect of the quotas from 1981 to 1984, according to the International Monetary Fund, was a \$1,200 rise in the average price of a car, domestic and foreign. in this country. Another effect was higher profit for lower effort by Japanese auto manufacturers. With a limit on the number of cars they could ship, companies filled their quotas with high-price, high-mmargin models. No wonder the major Japanese manufacturers came to like the restrictions they at first had protested.

Indeed, the companies like their comfortable quatas so well that they are willing to keep the system even when it's obsolete. Thanks largely to the falling dollar, autos from Japan are so expensive here that more manufacturers, won't sell their full allotments for the current quota year. But they probably can keep the same allotments next year as a sort of future market-share insurance. In a low-sales year, the potential importance of continued high allotments tempts Japanese manufacturers to ship more cars than they can sell. When that occurs, quotas some hoped would reduce the U.S. trade deficit may turn out to increase it.

That's cockeyed. Government-imposed limits on auto imports from Japan make all cars more expensive for U.S. consumers, narrow the variety of models for sale, cushion U.S. companies from healthy competition, stifle Japanese companies' export competition with each other and make both nations poorer. This year, if Japan again offered the supposed trade favor of restrictive auto quotas, the U.S. response should be: "No thanks,"

Secret Budgets

At long last, Congress has gotten up the courage to demand a peck at the Pentagon's so-called black budget. But even this effort likely will prove insufficient.

For years the Pentagon has maintained a special classified budget for top-secret military and intelligence programs. The official rational was that the programs were of such high national security value that Congress was given only the barest details-if any at all. But sensitive national security interests can be protected without abolishing the principle of accountability.

The Reagan administration has grossly abused this funding method. It is estimated that under Mr. Reagan the black budget has increased more then eightfold. If so, that means the Pentagon's black budget alone is larger than the mililitary budget of any other nation, save the Soviet Union.

The White House argument that secrecy is justified on national security grounds is nonsense. Congress is rightfully suspicious that the Pentagon is using the black budget to hide embarrassing cost overruns and design foul-ups.

But the new congressional disclosure requirements have serious loopholes that would exclude at least half the black budget from inspection-including the entire CIA budget. As in the Iran-Contra scandal, the administration is seeking to escape legitimate congressional oversight of secret military programs. Congress has a constitutional duty to see where the money is going; it should demand full disclosure.

Prosecutors Should Investigate Congress

The current legal and political attacks on Attorney General Edwin Meese must be understood as skirmishes in the ongoing war of the liberal media and the Democratic Congress against the Reagan administration.

Ever since the passage of the special prosecutor law (recently declared unconstitutional and soon to be tested in the Supreme Court). Congress and the media have had a field day using or threatening to use it against Reagan's closest associates. Several of these-National Security Council directors Richard Allen and William Clark and chief of staff Don Reganwere hounded out of office without the need to resort to it. Others-deputy chief of staff Michael Deaver and presidential aide Lyn Nofziger-got the full treatment, leading to indictments (though in both cases for acts allegedly committed after they had left the White House). Still others-including NSC director John Poindexter and Lt. Col. Oliver North-are awaiting similar fates.

But Edwin Meese-first as counselor to the

president and then as attorney general-has thus far repeatedly eluded the liberals' wideswinging scythe, and their exasperation with him has grown proportionately. Nearly five years ago, they demanded and got a special prosecutor to probe Meese's alleged misdeeds as White House counselor, only to have the wretch conclude that Meese had committed no indictable offense. Since then, they have kept up a steady drumbeat of unsubstantlated charges. wild speculations and empty innuendos against Meese, forcing him to appear before one grand jury after another to explain his actions in this or that connection.

Recently, for lack of any better weapon, they have taken to adding up the hours Meese has had to spend on this sort of thing, and have cynically suggested that an attorney general so heavily beset really ought to resign even if he has never been proved guilty of any wrongdo-

It's high time that the ranking Democratic crooks on Capitol Hill, and the media liberals who have repeatedly conspired with them to break vital federal laws, were forced to explain their actions to a grand jury on pain of indictment, prosecution, conviction and jail.

What is urgently needed is a permanent blue-ribbon panel of cold-eyed special prosecutors, appointed by the president, fully staffed, adequately financed and carefully insulated from all political pressures, whose sole and solemn duty it shall be to inquire into the conduct (or misconduct) of members of Con-

It may be argued that it is too late in the Reagan administration to embark on such an ambitious and controversial initiative, but on the contrary this is the perfect time. Such a panel, once created and hard at work, would be almost impossible for even a Democratic president to disband without a massive public uproar, and its existence would spare any Republican who succeeded Reagan in the Oval Office the onus of having to appoint it himself.

Congress Has Good Intentions

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Much like the remorseful soul who overindulged the night before, Congress awoke to a new year full of good intentions and resolved not to repeat the bad behavior of last year.

Over the past few weeks, leaders of both parties in both the House and Senate have pledged to conduct their business in a much more responsible fashion, particularly when it comes to passing the appropriations bills that are necessary to keep the federal government operating.

The goad for this reformation has been the generous dose of criticism Congress received for the way it ended last year's session-two months late and only after dumping all individual money bills into a massive \$606 billion catch-all measure that rightfully deserved President Reagan'd derisive comments during his State of the Union address.

Despite all the promises and good intentions, however, many observers familiar with the pressures and proclivities that entangle Congress doubt any serious improvement is forthcoming.

Congress is expected to pass 13 individual appropriations bills each during the first half of this decade year, but that has not happened in recent years. The House, which originates the bills, manages to get most over to the Senate, but usually late and then they get bogged down in the Senate. And by the time the two chambers seriously begin negotiating their differnces the end of the year is fast approaching.

House Speaker Jim Wright says this year will see all 13 bills reported by the House Appropriatios Committee by mid-May and all will be passed by the House by the August recess.

Senate Demogratic leader Robert Byrd also said he hopes Congress will manage to pass all the money bills individually and get them to Reagan's desk.

The fact that this is an election year and the lawmakers want time to campaign should encourage early action on the appropriations bills as well as other legislation. But nothing will change the fact that members of Congress will continue to disagree among themselves and with the president on where and how much money should be spent. That is the main obstacle to speedy work by Congress.

Farms Edging Back

FORT DODGE, Iowa (NEA) -"Hogs have been good this year," says Delores Mertz, surveying her family's 640-acre farm in northcentral lowa. "Things are starting to turn around." The "things" are the conditions

affecting U.S. agricultural-and they ranged between appalling and Land values collapsed, crop prices

gyrated, exports plummeted, interest rates escalated and bankruptey filings soared.

The early 1980s were financially devastating for many producers," notes Juliana Krug, an information specialist with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The agricultural depression during the early 1980s was, in great measure, the logical result of an extraordinary economic boom that lasted through much of the 1970s but could not have gone on indeli-

Farmers, says USDA economist Greg Hanson, "entered the 1980s with an inflated cost structure, a burdensome debt load pushing rapidly toward \$200 billion, huge production capacity and a critical dependence upon sustained growth in export demand."

The average price per acre of U.S. farmland peaked at \$823 in the spring of 1982. Five years later, it had tumbled to \$548. In Iowa, the state most severely affected, the value of all farmland fell from \$67.4 billion in early 1981 to \$25.1 billion in early 1987-a loss of almost 63 percent.

At the same time, farmers were squeezed from other directions. Their share of the average dollar spent for food by retail purchasers had been just under 40 cents in the 1960s and 1970s but dropped to 30 cents in the early 1980s.

(Of the remaining 70 cents, processing accounts for 31 cents, retailcharges consume 23 cents. wholesaling takes 10 cents and transportation accounts for 6 cents.)

Production expenses, which consumed about 75 cents of every dollar earned by the typical farmer in the 1960s and 1970s, increased to 85 cents in the first half of this decade. (They now have returned to the 75-cent level.)

For many working the land, those pressures became intolerable. The number of farms throughout the country declined from 2.43 million in 1980 to 2.17 million last year.

(Some of that decline is attributable to long-term structural change. The number of farms has dropped every year since 1935, with the exception of very small increases in 1980 and 1981.)

Now, however, net farm income is up, gross farm debt is down and conditions appear to be slowly improving. "No one expects a dramatic turnaround," notes the USDA's King, but there is evidence. that a fragile recovery is underway.

Alternative AIDS Studies Blocked

The White House has canceled a conference that would have forced the country's premier AIDS researcher to confront claims that the virus he has identified as the cause. of the lethal disease might not be the cause at all.

Dr. Robert Gallo, the star scientist at the National Institutes of Health. is the man who pinpointed the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) as the cause of AIDS. Since Gallo's discovery, the NIH, which controls the largest share of the money for AIDS research, has denied funds to scientists with other ideas, even though they have published their theories in respected

Foremost among the researchers with a fresh point of view is Dr. Peter Duesberg of the University of California at Berkeley. A member of the National Academy of Sciences, Duesberg has 24 years of experience with the family of retroviruses to which HIV belongs. He studied the virus in Gallo's own laboratory

under a prestigious fellowship and concluded that it did not meet the standard criteria for a diseasecausing agent.

Duesberg questioned the HIV theory in an article in the medical journal Cancer Research last March. As yet, there has been no official response from Gallo. The editor of Cancer Research, Dr. Peter MacGee, is surprised at the silence from Gallo. "Dr. Duesberg is an excellent scientist. He has a very good reputation. We had expected that there would be more official response to it," MacGee told our reporter Sallie Dinkel.

Instead, Gallo apparently dismissed Duesberg's theory without explanation. "Peter doesn't understand the biology of what he's talking about. Period. Simple as that," Gallo told a reporter for Spin-

magazine. Gallo did not return at least a dozen calls for comment.

Among those seeking an answer to Duesberg's challenge was Jim-Warner, a senior analyst for domestic policy at the White House. Warner called Dr. Harvey Bialy, the research editor at the medical

Journal Bio/Technology who had planned a workshop called "How Does HIV Cause AIDS?" to discuss Duesberg's claims, among other 0 p

According to Bialy, Warner offered to co-host the workshop under the auspices of the White House because he was frustrated about the inadequate responses he had gotten to Duesberg's theory. The White House label would guarantee the attendance of Gallo and other experts. "Warner is quite skeptical himself about the veracity of the virus-HIV hypothesis," said Bialy. Warner would not respond to our


In spite of initial enthusiasm, the White House conference, scheduled for Jan. 19, was finally taken off the calendar shortly before that. Warner tried to get it rescheduled, but he couldn't, and it was permanently canceled, according to Blaly. Doug-McCormick, chief editor of Bio/Technology said: "The impression was that the pressure came from the NIH." When we asked Warner about the conference, he said, "I can't talk about that."

Several researchers we talked to sald AIDS has become a maker and breaker of scientific reputations. Dr. Stephen Catazza, a New York clinical researcher who is also skeptical of Gallo's hypothesis, put it this way: "The bottom line to everything, as I have through rather unpleasant experience found out, is money and ego, reputation, Nobel prizes, all the things that we doctors took oaths to ignore. The patients don't count any more. I think that's the ultimate tragedy that's come out of AIDS."

Gallo plays a big role in directing the flow of money to AIDS research. according to many scientists who work in the field. "Robert Gallo doesn't support any alternative views," said Duesberg, "As long as this (the HIV theory) goes unchallenged, it will have an inhibiting effect on research."

Hundreds of millions of research dollars are spent each year on the assumption that HIV causes AIDS. Medical experts we questioned believe that federal health authorities would be embarrassed if that assumption were wrong.

NASCAR Reinstates Richmond's License

DAYTONA BEACH (UPI) -NASCAR reinstated the heense of driver Tim Richmond Monday, two days after the stock-carsanctioning body revoked his license after a urinalysis revealed chemicals banned under

a new substance abuse program. Richmond, 32, Ashland, Ohto, asked for a second test and submitted a sample Saturday night. The flamboyant driver again is eligible to drive in Sunday's Daytona 500, if he can get medical clearance from his personal physician and a track doctor at Daytona International Speedway. The first urine sam-

ple was given Thursday. The medical clearance is necessary to prove he has recovered from a bout with pneumonia. Richmond claimed in a television interview Sunday there was a mistake made in the first drug test, but NASCAR spokesman Chip Williams said Richmond

"There was no mistake made whatsoever," Williams said. 'There was prohibited substances in the first one, no question. The second test was negative, no question."

Richmond was the first driver tested under the substance abuse orogram, announced Jan. 25. He missed all but eight races last year while rumors of drug problems circulated around him.

When the new policy was announced. NASCAR officials admitted Richmond's case was a prime factor in their decision. Among the banned substances are: cocaine, marijuana, heroin, PCP, any other drug derivatives. and alcohol.

Williams said NASCAR would announce later this week what Richmond tested positive for inthe first test. He said there was no possibility the positive read-

of medicine Richmond was taking to recover from his illness.

Richmond was not available for comment, and as of late Monday, NASCAR officials had not spoken to him to inform him his license had been reinstated. Asked how Richmond could test negative so quickly after a positive reading, Williams said, "It (banned substances) cleaned out-

of his system." NASCAR's substance abuse policy does not have strict guidelines on how soon a driver can request another test if he is found to be in violation of the policy. However, Williams said that a driver that has a small amount of a banned substance in his system is more likely to be given a quick refest than one with heavy amounts of drugs.

"If we ran into a situation where a guy has a bunch in his system and he wanted to retest. we'd say, 'Hey, wait a few

wants another test, that's OK."

Williams said marijuana remains detectable for up to 45 days, while the other substances disappear in less than a week. Because he tested positive once, Richmond will be subject to future drug tests whenever NASCAR deems necessary.

Under the substance abuse policy, there are no penalties for a driver testing positive, other than being banned from driving until he tests negative.

Although he is eligible to drive, Richmond is not guaranteed a spot in Sunday's Daytona 500. Richmond does not have a ride for this year, and Ken Ragan, who was going to let Richmond drive his Ford in last Sunday's Busch Clash, said he was planning to try and qualify the car himself for the 500.

Richmond cannot drive in the

Houseboat Sailor Should Be Competent

Many of us who boat frequently on the St. John's River and Lake Monroe have noticed a tremendous proliferation of rental boats. The operators of most of these boats are either novice boaters who lack full knowledge of boating skills or who are new to our waters. The lack of courtesy of maintaining an idle speed in the no-wake areas both at the 1-1 bridge to the railroad bridge area and the Blue Springs area is apparent many times. The question asked by some "what are those red and green things out there in the water in the lake" provokes a smile and yet some concern from the Coast Guard Auxiliary operators patrolling these areas.

Some of the skippers do show themselves to be excellent boat handlers and it is a delight to see a competent sailer handling a large houseboat in a strong or gusty wind with little or no apparent trouble.

One of my friends related some of his experiences with rental houseboats; his "sea story" seemed to be worth repeat-

"The first rental houseboat trip that I took was in the Florida Keys. Three



couples, all Scuba divers, spent one week cruising in the Keys. The rental boat was a twin screw (engine) and turned out to be quite manueuverable".

"The next rental boat was a single prop houseboat out of DeLand. Same crew, but with new and unexpected complications awaiting us. The first was the growing awareness that houseboats made on pontoons with only one propeller have to stable themselves to a multitude of wind conditions. Headwinds, followingwinds and winds at right angles to the vessel.

"Headwinds are generally good for all weather conditions. The others can be

downright nasty under adverse conditions. On this trip we had dinner reservations at the Holiday Inn in Sanford at the Marina but decided to do some blackwater diving on the northside. of Lake Monroe for artifacts around the old Enterprise Steamship "T" docks. Ctrca 1860-1890.

The weather conditions suddenly changed in the late afternoon. The strong wind was now out of the NW. After lengthy discussions with the crew about the dinner options, in the face of white waves between us and Sanford, the group decided that I as the Captain. should make for the port.

I soon realized that the bigger port opening of the east side was not a feasible opening to the protected waters of the marina. The single prop with a followingwind ruled out that option, dueto lack of rudder control, and the possibility of broaching.

The west opening was unappealing. due to the remembered narrowness of the opening and the remembered pilings

Edecided to about Sanford and head for the I-I bridge and the more quiet waters of the St. John's River.

A few minutes at right angles to the wind convinced us all of that folly. The one prop with the huge wind surface of the houseboat configuration was a rolling nightmare.

So, back to the west side of the marina option. With a following sea and one prop motor, we were depending solely on that motor's reliability to keep working under very, very wet conditions. As the marina came closer and closer, the west opening appeared narrower and narrower. The amount of left/right manueverability I had was extremely limited. I would have one and only one opportunity to slip into the west sheltered side without crushing the boat and ourselves against the barrier walls of the west side. I sweated in weather that was cold (low fourties) and windy (with its chill factor effect) but finally made it

into the dock, thoroughtly exhausted." BOATERS TIP: Don't wait for the weather to deteriorate. Check the weather reports. Check the wind, and if it starts to get beyond your capabilities.



Streetman said despite the grand jury's statement that the purchase "unfortunately gave the appearance of a lack of proper planning and organization," that the board would not handle it any differently now if given the chance.

"I think if someone never came to a Board of Commussioners meeting, or only came to a few, they would think that it appeared to act with lack of planning and organization. Anyone who is familiar with how the board works knows that is not the case.

One of the criticisms of the approval of the purchase contract was that it occurred at 2 a.m. "We don't like 2 a.m. votes. either, we're all tired out by that time, but they do happen," Streetman said. He said the county has made

DEAR READER - Get a stool analysis for worms. Tapeworms from cats can be spread to humans by finger-to-mouth contact when the parasite's eggs are present in soil and are inadvertently ingested. I doubt that your symptoms are due to tapeworm, because we are usually not aware of tapeworm infestation until anemia develops. You have to look for other factors to explain your distension, loss of energy, low blood pressure and wriggling sensations. Nonetheless, stool analysis is in order

DEAR DR. GOTT - If a person is allergic to sulfa drugs, would taking medicine with sulfate added to it cause any kind of reaction?

DEAR READER - Ordinarily, it wouldn't. Sulfa and sulfates 58 Doctrine are usually so unlike each other that cross-reactions do not occur. However, there are exceptions. 

WIN AT BRIDGE


A large percentage of current partnerships use an opening one-no-trump range of 12-14 high-eard points. Since today's South was of that school, he had to open the bidding with one club. When South persisted with two no-trump after two clubs, North was justified in carrying on to game with eight high-card points and a five-card club sun-The values for game were present in the combined North-Southcards, but success would depend upon the defender's choice of opening lead.

Despite the normal stricture against leading an opponent's suit at no-trump, there are obvious exceptions to this rule. Here we see a good example.

The unbid suit, diamonds is certainly unattractive. Nor does the bidding suggest that East would have enough strength in hearts to cripple declarer's chances if West selected that lead. The spade suit is different: If East has a key card or two, leading right into South's known four-card suit can be a winner.

And that's the way it went. West led the four of spades to dummy's queen and East's king, and the spade return went to West's ace. West now forced out the last spade stopper while he still had the club king for an entry, and the contract was easily set. With any other lead, declarer will quickly run for cover with nine tricks.
