

Pointing out that the people of Florida are paying more for State government on a per capita basis than the national average, Rep. Brailey Odham told the Jaycees the other day that the people of the United States as a whole spend three times as much for government as for food for themselves and their families.

Just why it costs so much to run the government is indicated in the account Mr. Odham gave of the manner in which the so-called deficit of \$60,000,000 for the next two years, or the figure of \$240,000,000 for the biennial appropriation bill, was arrived at. "The House of Representatives had just three hours to study this bill and after less than one hour's discussion voted in favor of it" he revealed.

How did they know that \$240,000,000 was the amount that would be needed? Why not \$242,000,000? Or \$280,000,-000? The answer is they didn't know. They don't know now. They simply asked the various state agencies how much did they think they could spend during the next two years, put it all down on paper, added a few more millions for good luck, told the Legislature that was what they wanted, and the Legislators without giving any thought to the matter whatever, voted "Ave".

It may be that the State Welfare Board will need more money during the next two years, although it received four million dollars more during the past two years than it could give away. It may be, too, that the public schools will need more money, or that more money is needed for State highways. But wouldn't it be a good idea to find out? Wouldn't it be a good idea for the Legislators to look into this matter of State expenditures and see for themselves just how much money is really needed?

Do we simply have to take the professional politicians word for it? Just because they ask us for \$60,000,000 more. do we have to dig down in our pockets for the stipulated sum without question? Mr. Odham says that "Those who feed from the public trough will always cry for more money". Maybe he's right. May be if we give them \$60,000,000 now.

MIAMI, Fla.-Grady Norton can prove to you by scriptual authority that Methuselah, who died at 969 years of age, actually lost his life in a hurricane.

Since that ancient day, people have learned to heed hurricane warnings and the death toll from these tropical storms has been reduced by 98 per cent. That re-duction has come only in the last 20 years, said Norton. "We feel it is entirely possibl

"But there is one factor that worries us.
