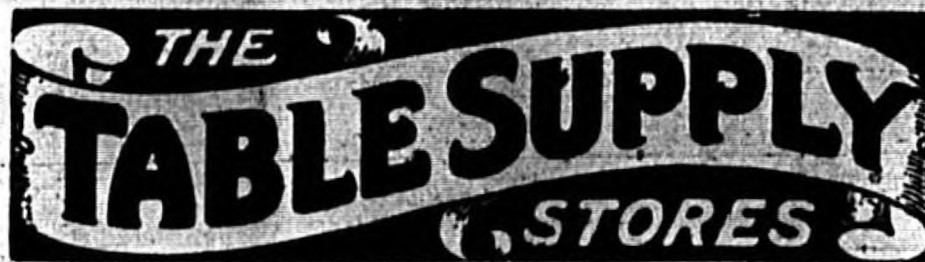

## Action By Laval Eases Allied And French Situation

### Darlan Is Named Heir To Petain And Head Of Country's Land, Sea And Air Forces

VICHY, Apr. 17. (AP)—German authorities announced today that 38 hostages have been shot in occupied France because of reprisal attacks against the German occupying troops.

Meanwhile, U. S. Ambassador Admiral William D. Leahy was instructed to return to Washington for a consultation with the President, as the Vichy government moved aside for the assumption of power by Laval.

Pro-Nazi Pierre Laval today named Admiral Jean Darlan as commander of the French land, sea and air forces, apparently easing Allied concern over the fate of the French fleet, with Darlan also designated as heir to the aged Marshal Petain as chief of state.

The government cleared the way today for the assumption of power by Pierre Laval by submitting its mass resignation to Marshal Petain, and at his request retiring Vice Premier Jean Darlan as commander-in-chief of land, sea and air forces. A communiqué made a point of identifying Admiral Darlan as the old Marshal and spouse of the grandfather of the country's present situation.

Pierre Laval assumed chief command last night in the Vichy shadow government, while French patriots angrily demonstrated under the nose of their Nazi guards in Paris and hundreds of British planes test at the Nazi bases along the channel coast in one of the greatest aerial offensives of the war.

Laval, the leader in France of all those who want to help their Nazi conquerors against France's old allies, formed a new Vichy cabinet in which he became "chief of the government," effectively supplanting Marshal Petain as a political force.

It was clear beyond further doubt that in this phase of the campaign to make France a part of the German military line Hitler had won, and with the probability of a complete break with the United States became high, but the great question remained as to what this victory would really mean to the Germans and how much it would cost in the end.

## Russians Report Over 2,000 Nazis Are Annihilated

### Reds Sink Transport; Waves Of British Planes Cloud Sky

(By Associated Press)  
Russian naval forces sank a 10,000-ton German transport in the Barents Sea, the fourth this week in that arm of the Arctic Ocean north Cape. The Soviet information bureau said over 2,000 Germans were annihilated on the Leningrad front. The "booty captured includes a number of machine-guns, trench mortars, automatic rifles and ammunition."

Waves of British warplanes maintained the round-the-clock RAF raids with new forces against Holland and the occupied French coast.

The new assaults extend the continued attacks to more than 70 hours. A large German air force attacked an English scout plane.

The Russians struck tonight, eight that 40 German soldiers assembled in headquarters at Sinyaya Russa to receive the Russian Red Army when Soviet guerrillas blew up the building.

The radio also broadcast a report today by Red Star that the Germans had lost 28,000 rifles in the first nine months of the German-Russian war.

A big battle on the central front, capped with a Soviet victory menacing a German position of extreme strategic importance, was fought on a field of crumbling snow melted, bridged the bodies of invasion troops slain during the winter.

The Russians struck through the positions of General Tackel, who had ordered three regiments of the 203rd division into a wave of counter-attacks, which failed.

Although Tackel attempted 18 counter-attacks, mistaking thousands of casualties, Red Army reports said.

In an adjoining sector, General Karpov threw in the 280th and 449th regiments and their reserves, including engineers. Twelve counter-attacks failed, and the Germans sent up two more regiments plus eight reserve battalions in a desperate effort to block the Russians from the water barrier guarding their base.

A British military commentator said the weather on the central front should permit heavy operations on the southern front a few days later, and in the Murmansk area about the end of May.

Meanwhile, the Navy announced the loss of the 840-ton minesweeper Tenthredin a few days ago in the southern landing of General MacArthur's forces.

"When you purchase a bond you are not making a gift to the government," he added. "But you are making a wise investment that draws high interest, besides aiding your country."

The following information was released by Mr. Speer showing the increasing value of the bonds:

"The Series E Defense Savings Bond is a registered bond not transferable. It comes in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100 and \$1,000. The bond is dated the first of the month in which full payment is received. It matures 10 years from issue date and bears 2.9 percent interest per year compounded annually when the bond is held 10 years.

If you pay \$18.75 you will receive in 10 years, \$25.  
If you pay \$37.50 you will receive in 10 years, \$50.  
If you pay \$75.00 you will receive in 10 years, \$100.  
If you pay \$150.00 you will receive in 10 years, \$200.  
If you pay \$300.00 you will receive in 10 years, \$400.

## 15 Counties Form Industrial Pool

JACKSONVILLE, Apr. 17. (AP)—Organization of industrial pools in 15 counties to bid as units for war production contracts was reported yesterday by Governor Spessard L. Holland.

He said "educational contracts running into millions of dollars have been assured to put these people to working" with additional contracts to come.

The industrial mobilization division of the State Defense Council estimated more than \$200,000,000 of war production contracts had been awarded to Florida firms, including shipbuilding.

## Farms Will Need 600,000 Workers

TALLAHASSEE, Apr. 17. (Special)—If the 1942 production goals set for agriculture are to be reached, it is estimated that more than 600,000 workers will be needed on the farms of the United States.

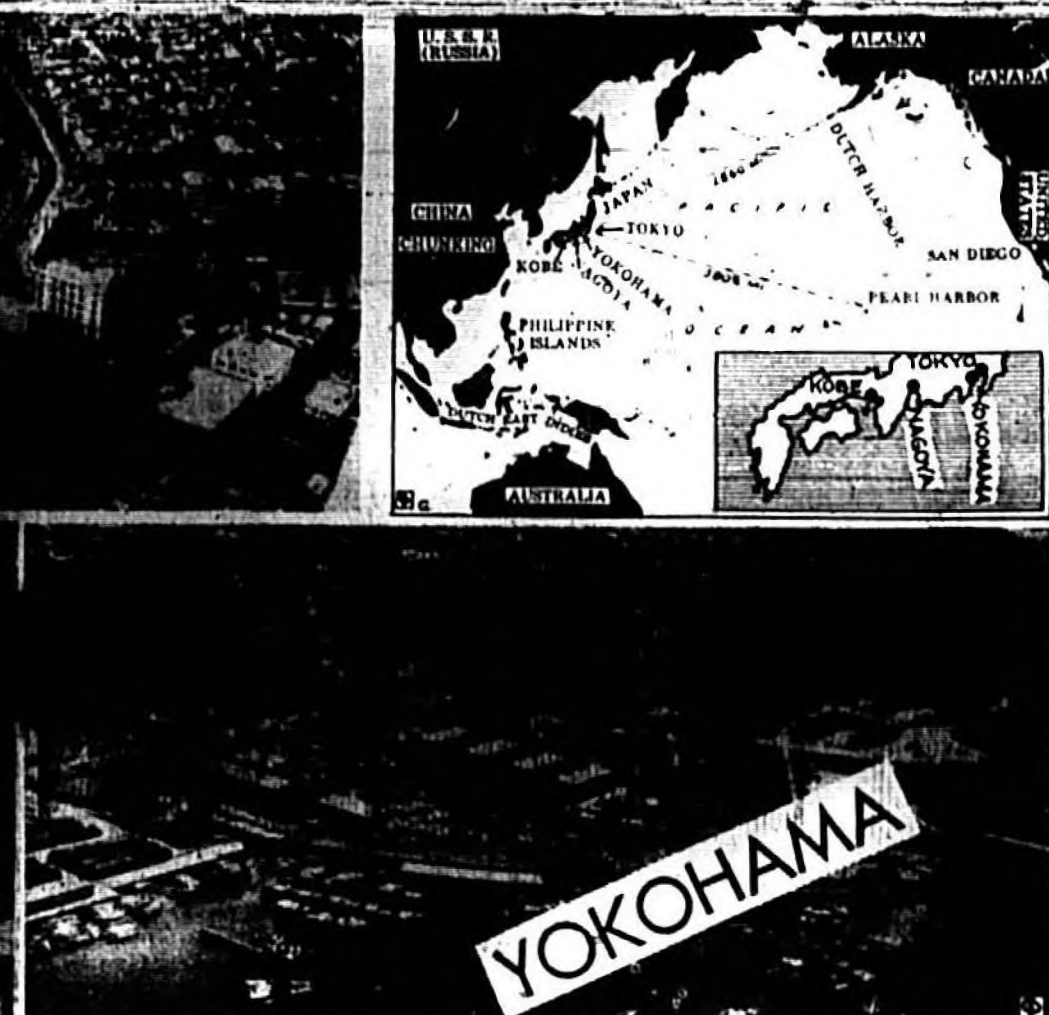
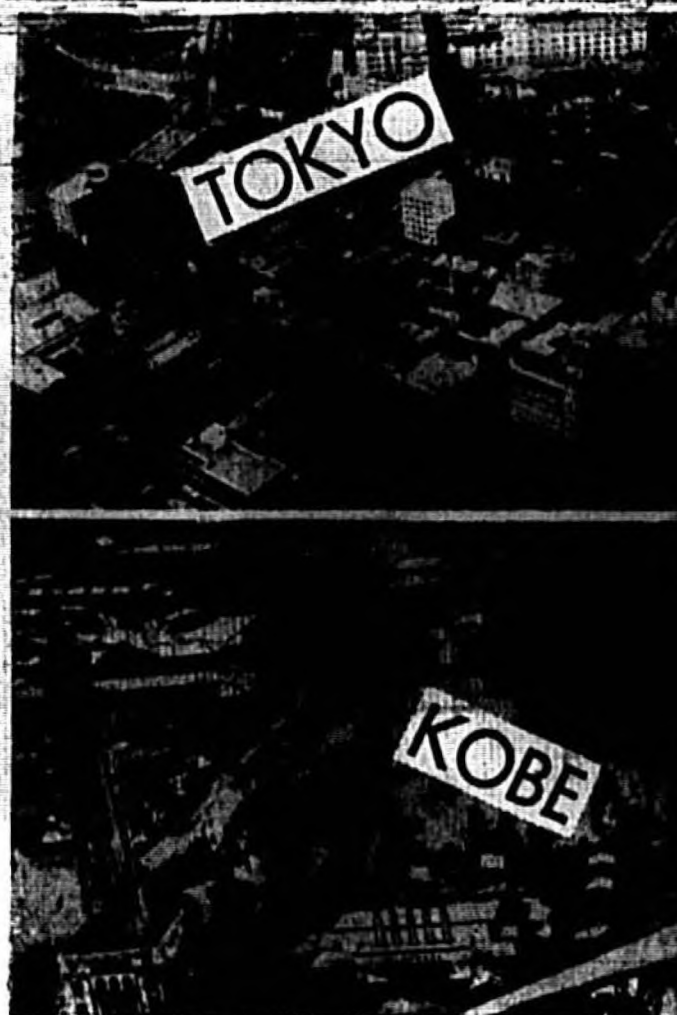

## Reinforced British Hold Burma Lines

### Chinese Recapture Town And Release English Soldiers From Encirclement

(By Associated Press)  
The reinforced British, defending the right wing of the Burma line near Taunggying-wei, maintained their positions under repeated Japanese assaults as heavy fighting continued in all sectors of the front today. Australian leaders met with Gen. Douglas MacArthur and other Allied commanders to map plans for the swift withdrawal of manpower and resources in Australia.

A total of 40 Japanese planes is claimed by the Allied planes in attacks on Hsanku. The Japs are reported to have been destroyed on the ground.

Chungking reported Chinese troops recaptured Yenangyung, the Burma line center today and in two days of better fighting released a British force of several thousand from encirclement. American volunteers and U. S. Army fliers fighting with Lieutenant General Stilwell's Chinese forces on the Rangoon Mandalay road were reported going out on their sector and they were able to establish local air superiority at times although they were hampered by lack of reinforcements.
