Bids On Gas, Oil Let By County

The bid to supply gasoline and oil for county vehicles for the next six months was split by the County Commission yesterday between Sinclair Refineries and Pure Oil Co.

Sinclair was low on the bid to supply approximately 50,000 gallons of gasoline with a 2040 cents per gallon figure. About 1,000 pounds of gear oil will be purchased from Sinclair at 13 cents per pound and 700 pounds of chassis grease will be bought from them at close to 12 cents per pound.

The bid for about 20,000 gallons of diesel fuel went to Pure Oil Co. which submitted a low offer of 1150 cents per gallon. Pure also got the diesel engine oil bid with an offer of 71 cents per quart.

Drainage Canal Proposed For Tanglewood Area

The cost and route of a canal to drain the Temple Terrace, Tanglewood and adjacent Winter Park areas will be discussed by Orange and Seminole County and Winter Park officials late this week or early next week.

Tanglewood-Temple Terrace residents discussed their poor drainage problem last night with Seminole County commissioners and County Engineer Robert Davis. The meeting at St. Richards Episcopal Church ended with residents' acceptance of the idea that they would have to pledge money for the county to do drainage work in the Tanglewood-Temple Terrace area and that a small committee of residents working with county officials could best accomplish the project. Eight property owners volunteered to work on such a committee.

Tanglewood-Temple Terrace property owners must realize they will have to "self-impose a tax" upon themselves or they'll be waiting for drainage for the next three years, Winter Park Estates developer Max Jenkins told the group.

The county can float bonds to pay for the drainage improvement, but it must have area residents' pledge to redeem these bonds, Jenkins said. Payment by area property owners will be strung out over about five years, Jenkins said.

The route and cost of the proposed drainage ditch depends on how much water must be drained through it to the Econlockhatchee River, Davis explained. The ditch to be built from the Tanglewood-Temple Terrace area will probably be a little over a mile long and will connect with the Eastbrook to Econlockhatchee conduit now under construction, Davis said. A 25-foot wide conduit will be needed if it is to drain past of Winter Park and Orange County as well as the two Seminole County subdivisions.

Use of a 3,200 foot long, 15 foot wide ditch running along the Seminole-Orange county line was offered last night by Orlando concrete company owner H. C. Buchanan. If the county would clean the conduit, it is not known yet whether this trench will be suitable.

In answer to who pays for a subdivision's drainage, William Byrd, 1823 Linden Rd., Tanglewood, said that the developer of Tanglewood was responsible for putting in the drainage but had done a poor job, so it would have to be done over again.

CHICAGO (UPI)—The Caterpillar Tractor Co. announced Tuesday the steel strike was forcing it to lay off 11,500 of its 40,000 employees Oct. 3. C. A. Wendley, executive vice president of the machinery firm, said that by Oct. 3 the company would be down to a bare minimum of steel supplies.

Macmillan 'Scared'
LONDON (UPI)—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, alarmed by a sudden drop in his party's popularity as reflected by polls, today took his reelection campaign into two towns where "marginal" Conservative seats are at stake.

Strike Illegal
ATLANTA (UPI)—A nine-week Air Carrier Mechanics Assn. strike against Southern Airways, Inc., was ruled illegal Tuesday by U. S. District Judge Boyd Sloan. Sloan ruled that the strike over overtime work was in violation of the Railway Labor Act, and that the strike and subsequent picketing of the airline were illegal.

Italian Leads Off
UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—Italian Foreign Minister Giuseppe Pala leads off the round of the "lesser great powers" in the U. N. General Assembly's policy debate today. Pala arrived from Rome late Tuesday, and spent Tuesday night with the finishing touches to his speech for the assembly, which has already heard the foreign policy spokesmen of the United States, Britain and the Soviet Union.

Health Unit Opposed
MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI)—The grand dragon of the Alabama Ku Klux Klan today the National Mental Health Assn. is "the most dangerous group the South faces today," Dragon Robert M. Shelton of Tuscaloosa, Ala., said he would oppose more funds for mental hospitals in the state "as long as they have those alien psychiatrists, for as long as they are there the program will be directed by the National Mental Health Assn. with headquarters in Chicago."

Hurricane Rated No Threat To State

MIAMI (UPI)—Hurricane Grace, with 100-mile-an-hour winds, churned through the Bahamas only 450 miles from Miami, but the Weather Bureau said its course created no threat to the U. S. mainland today.

The Weather Bureau said the storm, seventh of the season, showed some signs of weakening. But a slight increase in size was indicated. The hurricane remained almost stationary Tuesday night.

U. S. Try Moon Orbit Controls

WASHINGTON (UPI)—U. S. scientists will try early next month to plot a 375-pound space package into orbit around the moon with radio commands from the earth.

Apparently it will be the first use of so-called midcourse and terminal guidance in space history. All other space vehicles, including Russia's Lunik II, have relied solely on "initial guidance" to reach their destination.

According to Radio Moscow, Lunik II was put on course by guidance mechanisms which operated only as long as its rockets were firing. Then, like an intercontinental ballistic missile, it coasted on a long trajectory to its target.

It was fine marksmanship but could not be depended upon for deeper penetrations into space. A spacecraft using initial guidance only would miss Mars or Venus by many thousands of miles.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Lewis J. Hector, who resigned recently from the Civil Aeronautics Board in protest of its policies, has told President Eisenhower that federal agencies are ineffective and need "radical reorganization."

Hungarian Refugee Beaten After Talk

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Francis Isak, president of the Hungarian Freedom Fighters of San Francisco and outspoken critic of Soviet Premier Khrushchev's American visit, was viciously beaten early today in Golden Gate Park.

Police said the attack may have resulted from disension within the refugee group. Isak refused to tell authorities who was responsible.

E. Germans Refuse Soldier's Return

FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI)—U. S. Army officials said today the Communist East Germans have refused to release an American soldier they have held since Monday.

At first, the Army said, the Communists said they would release the soldier but "now have refused" to set him free. The Army identified the soldier as Pvt. Michael Petrovich, 27, of Jersey City, N. J.

Slip Of The Teeth

MELBOURNE, Australia (UPI)—Patrick Joseph O'Rourke, 35, today was reported recovering from a snake bite suffered when he tried to bite the head off the reptile that attacked him Tuesday.

O'Rourke said he "bit the head off hundreds of snakes while serving in Burma during the war but I had my own teeth then."

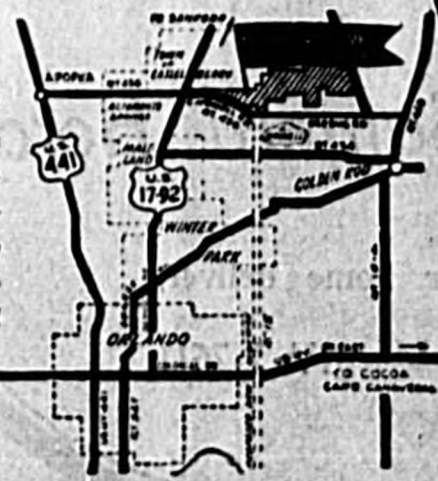

Frankie Carbo, Boxing Figures Arrested By FBI

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Frankie Carbo, notorious underworld boss of boxing, and Truman K. Gibson Jr., the fight game's top promoter are under FBI arrest today, along with three other boxing figures, in an unprecedented federal crackdown on prizefight corruption.

They are charged with trying to "ouster" the earnings and control of welterweight champion Don Jordan with threats of violence in the 10-count indictments against each.

Others arrested in the FBI roundup were Frank (Blink) Palermo, well known Philadelphia boxing manager; Joseph Rice, a Los Angeles sports promoter; and Louis Tom Drana, described as a West Covina, Calif. bookmaker.

In addition, William Daly, fight manager of Englewood, N. J., was named as a co-conspirator but not as a defendant.

If the five indicted are found guilty they face long prison terms or heavy fines, or both.

Announcing the arrests Tuesday night, the Justice Department said the roundup was part of a drive against underworld infiltration in the sport.

The indictments were handed down by a federal grand jury at Los Angeles Tuesday.

Fifty-five-year-old Carbo, whose hoodlum career since the age of 11 has been highlighted by three murder charges and one manslaughter conviction, was arrested in his room at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore. Acquaintances say he is being treated for diabetes. He will be arraigned in his room late today.

The indictments charge that the five defendants threatened physical harm and violence against Donald Paul Neseth of Covina, Calif., manager of welterweight champion Jackie Leonard, a Los Angeles fight promoter, who refused to cooperate in the alleged mauling in-

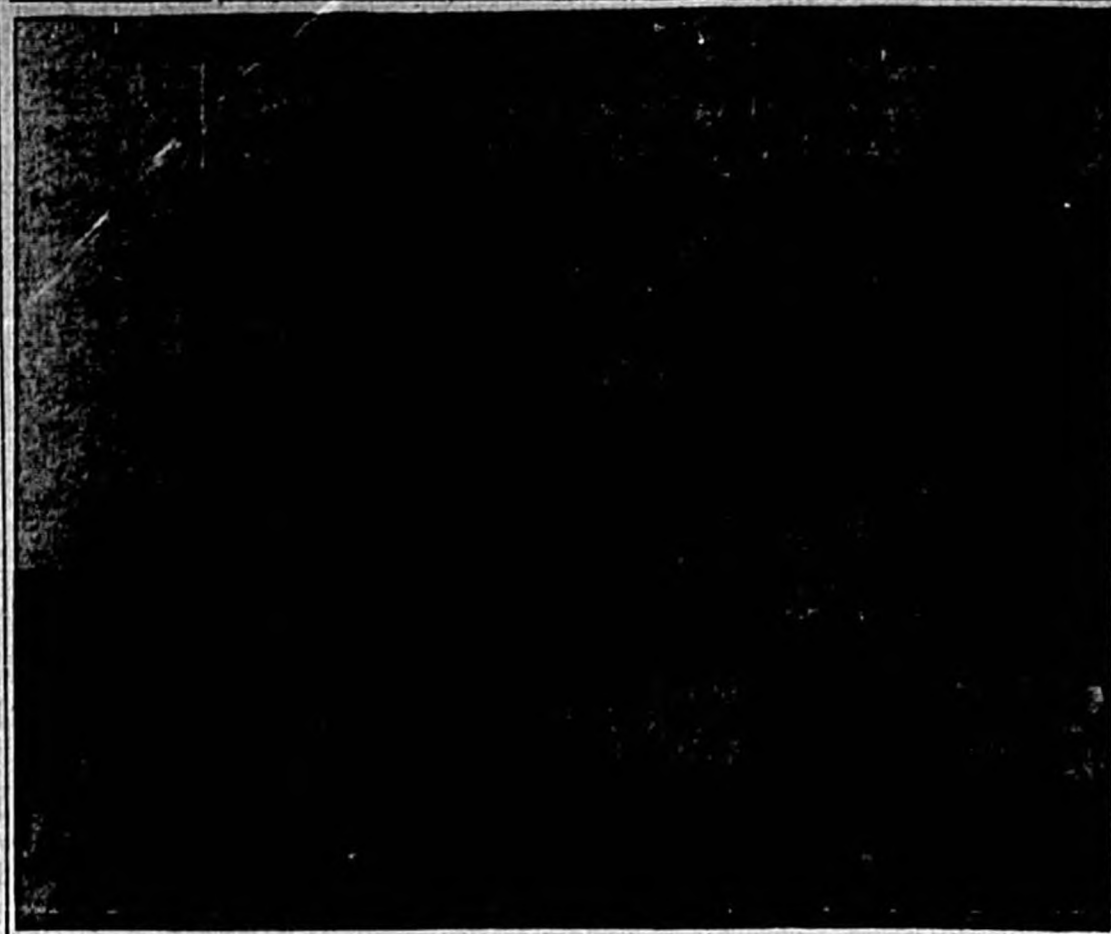
Mrs. Tremper, Osteen Resident, Dies At DeLand

Agents Urge Added County Insurance

Consideration of a "more realistic" figure than \$100,000 fire insurance on the county courthouse was suggested to county commissioners yesterday by Clifford McKibbin Jr., speaking for the County Property Insurance Committee.

The courthouse now has \$100,000 fire insurance, but a new courthouse similar to the present one couldn't be built for this price, according to the insurance agent. Lack of fire insurance on the county jail should also be considered, McKibbin said.

Auto liability insurance on county vehicles was recommended by the three agents on the committee, McKibbin, Robert Karns and Robert Crumley.

Applying collision insurance to all county vehicles should be studied, the agent said. "At the present time, some are not covered, some have \$50 deductible and others \$100," he explained. A heavy equipment policy to give vandalism and malicious mischief protection also was proposed.

County Home area insurance changes recommended included increasing insurance on the hospital and its contents from \$5,000 to \$8,500, raising insurance on the Negro Home and its contents from \$2,500 to \$4,000, and increasing the stockade policy from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

The commissioners said they need to study the recommendations and asked the committee to provide a revised cost schedule of proposed policy changes that may be compared to the present schedule.

Lane Beats Nuccio In Tampa Election

TAMPA (UPI) — Dairymen Julian Lane, 46, will succeed Nick Nuccio, 64, as mayor of Tampa Oct. 1.

Lane, a political newcomer, defeated Nuccio in Tuesday's runoff election by some 4,000 votes, according to an unofficial tally. Some 70,000 votes were cast in the heaviest balloting in the history of Tampa city elections.

The unofficial count gave Lane 36,806 to Nuccio's 32,321. Lane had pledged to run the "professional politicians out of city hall" and set up a business like government.

Nuccio, a public office holder for 32 years, campaigned on his record and past governmental experience.

Francis Bellamy, who died in 1931, is credited with composing the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Sedatives Knock Out Actress

NEW YORK (UPI) — Actress Vicki Cummings was found unconscious from an overdose of sedatives Tuesday night, police reported.

The blonde stage and TV star was taken to Bellevue Hospital where her condition was described as critical. After receiving emergency treatment, Miss Cummings recovered enough to be removed to a private hospital.

Miss Cummings' husband, William Giberson, told police he received a call at his office from Miss Cummings to say she had taken several pills to kill the pain of a partly-mended broken leg and was beginning to feel sleepy. When he arrived at their apartment, she was unconscious.

New Hearings Set For Jimenez

MIAMI (UPI) — A federal judge has set Nov. 23 to hear more arguments in Venezuela's legally entangled request to extradite for criminal trial, its ex-President, Marcos Perez Jimenez.

Legal technicalities Tuesday delayed setting of a date for a hearing on the request and the judge quashed a warrant for Perez Jimenez' arrest.

Perez Jimenez continues to live in his swanky Miami Beach home and has applied to become a permanent resident of the United States.

Tough Controls Accepted On TV, Radio Acquisition

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Radio Corp. of America and the National Broadcasting Co. have accepted tough federal controls aimed at preventing the use of network power to acquire new radio-TV outlets.

The action was taken in an anti-trust consent decree filed Tuesday in federal court in Philadelphia, ending a Justice Department suit brought against NBC and RCA on Dec. 4, 1947.

The companies agreed to give up ownership of TV station WRCV-TV and radio station WRCV-AM in Philadelphia by Dec. 31, 1952. The government charged they were acquired from Westinghouse Corp. under coercion.

But, on a much broader scale, the court action:

1. Prevents NBC and RCA from using NBC's "network power of affiliation to acquire any broadcast station by coercion in the future."

2. Prevents acquisition of any substantial ownership interest in any TV station in the large market without first getting the go-ahead from the Justice Department.

3. Prevents RCA and NBC from assuming national spot representation for any TV outlet which NBC does not now represent without first giving the department an opportunity to determine that it does not involve coercive use of network affiliation power.

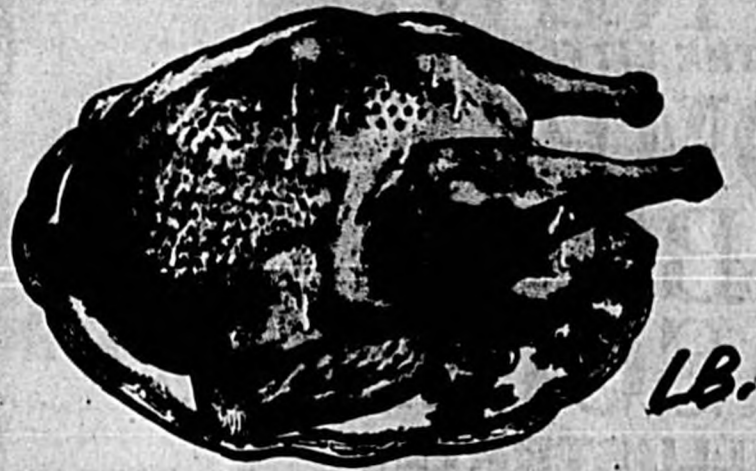

Judge Throws Out Act Restricting Public Hunting

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—A 1969 legislative act restricting public hunting on a state wildlife management area near Inverness has been invalidated by Circuit Judge W. May Walker as "unconstitutional and unenforceable."

Walker said the State Constitution gives exclusive control of public hunting to the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission. He said the legislature can not usurp this authority.

The controversial act, which restricted hunting to 4,000 acres, was pushed through the legislature by Sen. James E. Conner, Brooksville, after some 612 deer were shot during the opening day on the 40,000-acre tract last season.

The commission announced Tuesday the entire area will again be open for hunters this year, except for a small section in northern Hernando County. The rest of the tract is located in Citrus County.

Restrictions on the total kill for the season will be set at a meeting here Friday.

Archery hunting will be permitted Oct. 31-Dec. 6 and there will be three two-day gun hunts beginning Dec. 12 with no more than 400 hunters per day permitted.

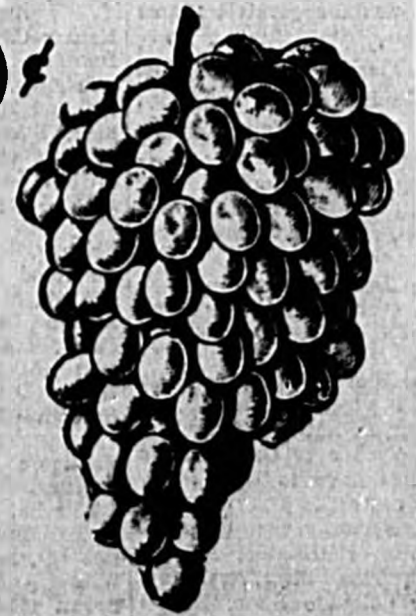

No Threat At Present

MIAMI (UPI)—Hurricane Grace passed only 200 miles off Boca Raton, Fla., today but the Weather Bureau said the storm offered no present threat to the mainland. The Weather Bureau said the big storm had lost some of its punch, but still contained 60 miles of high winds over the coast. It picked up a little strength as it moved to the northwest at about 10 miles an hour. It was expected to follow that path for the next 12 hours. Any change in direction after that likely would be to swing more to the north, the Weather Bureau said.

Hurricane Grace offers no threat to the coastal areas of the United States today. However, all interests of Central Florida northward to the Carolinas should keep on touch with later advisories, the Weather Bureau said. Air Force and Navy hurricane hunter airplanes kept a vigil on Grace with radar and flights into her calm center. An Air Force report said Wednesday the hurricane's "eye" was about 40 miles long. At Washington, the Navy said it plans to launch camera-carrying rockets within the next two days to try to photograph the hurricane. The launchings will depend on weather conditions and the hurricane's position.

Red Lunar Data Rated Important By U. S. Scientists

WASHINGTON (UPI)—An astronomer said today that reported findings by Russia's lunar rocket appear to be of "tremendous importance" to understanding of the earth's structure as well as the moon's. He and other scientists said the Soviet data also appear to prove that the moon does possess an atmosphere, albeit a thin one. The astronomer, Dr. Gerhardt S. Schilling of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, said he has not yet seen any scientific reports on the data disclosed by Lunik II before it crashed into the moon Sept. 12. But on the basis of news dispatches from Moscow, Lunik's findings apparently confirm the idea that the moon has a very thin atmosphere. The Soviet scientists, he said, believe to have a solid rocket core, has no magnetic field appreciable enough to register on instruments like those aboard Lunik II. If Lunik had found a fairly strong magnetic field around the moon, it would have upset a whole body of theory about the structure and formation of the earth and other planets.

Minister's Claim Of Support Denied

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—A spokesman for the White Citizens Councils says his organization is not backing the Rev. George E. Downs for governor. Downs, a Baptist minister from Winter Park, announced as a candidate earlier this week. He said he had the council's support. But Homer Barrs, of Tallahassee, the group's executive administrator, said he did not know Downs was planning to run until he read it in the newspaper. "We're going to support somebody for governor," Barrs said. "But we don't know who, yet, and it probably won't be Downs." Downs is an executive secretary of the association.

'Tigress' Eats Raw Meat, Wows Fans

LONDON (UPI)—Maria (The Tigress) Callas dined Wednesday night on raw meat and then gave a concert in the Royal Festival Hall that brought the audience to its feet with a tremendous roar of approval. She laid aside for a moment the worries over her broken marriage with Italian industrialist Giovanni Meneghini and her reported romance with multi-millionaire Aristotle Onassis and became Callas the Magnificent. Midway during the performance she ripped off the shoulder straps from her green evening gown, give herself more leeway in slaying the mad scene from the opera "Hamlet," the audience went wild. When she had ended, 3,000 usually sedate Londoners applauded without letup for 15 minutes while fans showered her with flowers and kisses and screamed

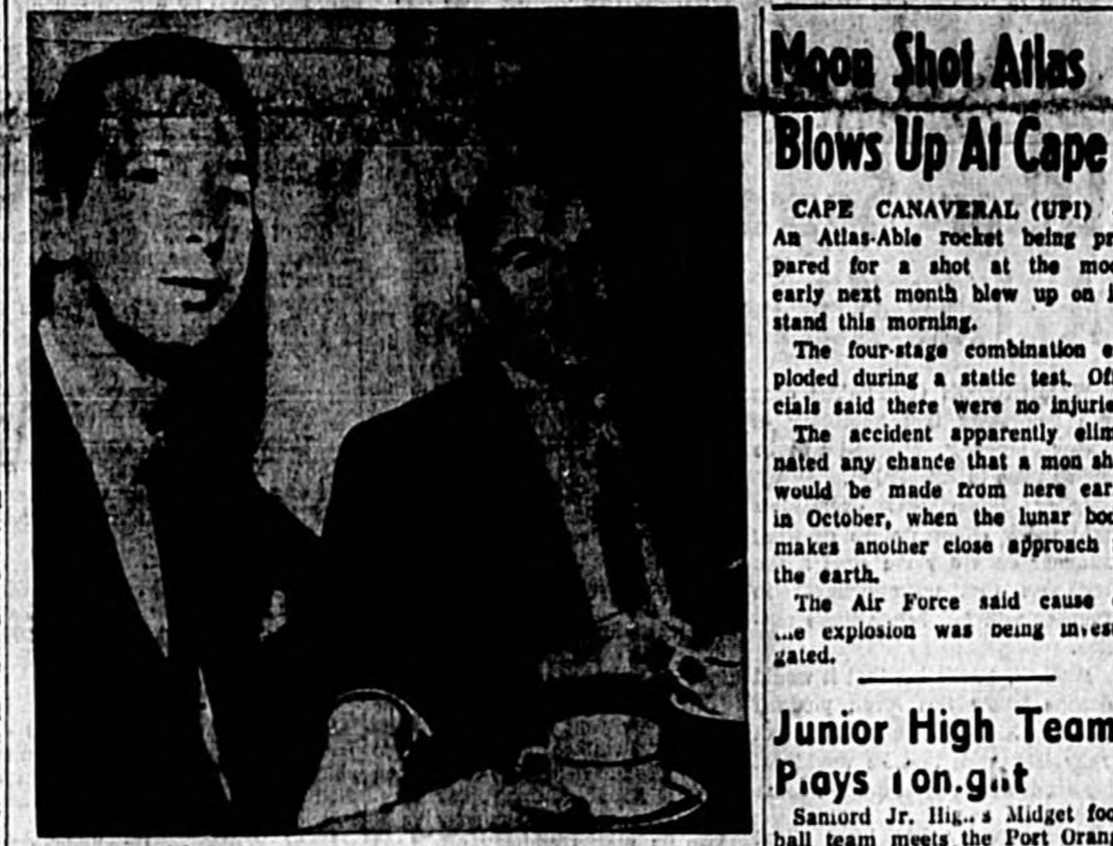

Highest FHA Mortgage Rate Effective Today

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The highest interest rates in the nation's history on FHA-insured home mortgages today went into effect. The interest ceiling for one to four family homes was boosted from 5 1/2 to 5 3/4 per cent Wednesday shortly after President Eisenhower signed a new billion-dollar housing bill passed by Congress. The FHA also hiked interest rates on other housing programs. Rates on large-scale rental projects were increased from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 per cent, on cooperative sales housing from 3 to 3 1/2 per cent, and on co-op rental of management-type housing from 4 1/2 to 5 1/4 per cent. The legislation signed by the president authorized \$650 million in grants for urban renewal over two years, \$250 million in low-interest loans for construction of college dormitories, \$50 million in loans for housing for the elderly, and \$50 million for various other programs. The bill was actually a third try for Congress. Eisenhower vetoed two earlier versions. He signed the latest measure although it still contained several features he opposed. FHA Commissioner Julian A. Zimmerman authorized the higher interest rates to make FHA-insured mortgages more nearly competitive with conventional loans. Lenders have been shying away from making FHA loans at 5 1/2 per cent or less because they can get a better return on other loans. The 5 1/2 per cent rate on individual home mortgages means that home buyers actually will pay 6 1/4 per cent. This is so because they must pay an additional one-half of one per cent insurance premium. In addition, the bill permitted a \$2,500 increase to \$22,500 in the maximum mortgage for a single family dwelling which the FHA can insure. It also permitted reductions in down payments for FHA-insured mortgages on homes valued at more than \$15,500.

Governor Holds Closed Talk On Seminole Tax

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Gov. LeRoy Collins met with Seminole County officials today to try to break a deadlock over a proposed reassessment to increase values in the county for tax purposes. The conference began at 11:40 a.m. with newsmen barred. Collins promised a statement following the meeting.

President, Nikita To Get Down To Brass Tack Talks

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Nikita Khrushchev, his tour of America drawing to a close, returns here today for climactic cold war talks with President Eisenhower. The Soviet premier and his party were to arrive at Andrews Air Force Base at 4:35 p. m. after a one-hour flight from Pittsburgh. His schedule called for him to reach the president's nearby Camp David, Md., mountain retreat early Friday for two days of brass-tack talks. Khrushchev flies back to Moscow late Sunday. The Russian leader will attend a reception tonight at the Russian Embassy to be followed by dinner in his honor given by Senator Robert W. Byrd, publisher of the Journal of Commerce, at the Sheraton Carlton Hotel. Twenty-two top American businessmen and industrialists will dine with and question Khrushchev.

Cape Shot Atlas Blows Up At Cape

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI)—An Atlas-Able rocket being prepared for a shot at the moon early next month blew up on its stand this morning. The four-stage combination exploded during a static test. Officials said there were no injuries. The accident apparently eliminated any chance that a moon shot would be made from here early in October, when the lunar body makes another close approach to the earth. The Air Force said cause of the explosion was being investigated.
