State," one of the dealers commented.

To replace the local Sanford State Farmers' Market with the same type of building or even lesser in appearance and fire resistance would not help the local market situation, a dealer said. The Seminole County Chamber of Commerce expressed interest in the local market and the replacing of the market with a modern, fire resistant building capable of handling vast volumes of produce and merchandize with available labor.

"We are forced to use mechanical aids in loading produce into trucks which would be impossible to do with wood flooring," one of the dealers burned out in the Apr. 4 disastrous fire said.

"One of the representatives or maybe all of the representatives and our Senator will be invited to attend, and we would like to see the State Market Director and other officials attend the meeting so that we might be advised of what plans are being made for the reconstruction of the market," it was said at the meeting.

It is also expected that Nathan Mayo, Agriculture Commissioner for Florida will also be invited to attend the meeting.

The meeting will be held in the City Commissioners Room at the Sanford City Hall.

Congressman Herlong, "not tomorrow."

"They will have to re-program the present plans but there will not be new legislation for the immediate construction," said Herlong.

Congressman Herlong said "I am thrilled to death and elated over the fact that the Navy has decided to do this because it is utilizing the present facilities and expanding where a base now exists."

Mayor David Gatchel, speaking to Congressman Herlong after the Navy's release had been read said "We think you've done a wonderful job, Syd."

Congressman Herlong's reply was "The people have done a wonderful job, too."

Chamber of Commerce President Clifford McKibbin commented, as he spoke to the Congressman, "You and the boys up there did a wonderful job for us."

George Andrew Speer, President of the Seminole County Junior Chamber of Commerce said "We want to thank you for all that you and Senators Smathers and Holland have done for us."

John Krider told the Congressman "There's no way to express our appreciation for what you have done."

Krider, talking with Captain Robert Jackson following the release of the Navy's Chief of Planning said "It's the biggest news we've had in a hundred years. We're very, very thrilled," he said.

Karlie Housholder, a member of the Chamber of Commerce Armed Forces Committee said this afternoon "I am completely happy—it shows that the people of Sanford, cooperating together can accomplish what they want."

City Commissioner A. L. Wilson commented today "It is certainly gratifying news and I think it is one of our finest efforts because of the way our citizens get together with city officials, the city's leaders, and our Washington delegation to put over this job."

Captain Robert W. Jackson, by telephone, said this afternoon shortly after the release was made "I am very, very pleased with the decision and most happy that the Navy has seen fit to remain in Sanford where the Navy is loved so much."

Immediately following the release, plans were made for a gigantic rally and parade this afternoon which is scheduled to take place at 4 o'clock. The parade, which will include the City Police Department, the Sheriff's car, the Highway Patrol cars, Fire Department apparatus, and hundreds of automobiles joining in, will form at the Chamber of Commerce building to tour downtown Sanford in a loud and jubilant expression of their appreciation for the Navy's release.

Present plans for the program at the Sanford Naval Air Station are to expand the facilities within the present limits of the Air Station. Runways will be lengthened and buildings constructed to take care of the immediate need. This will include barracks, hangars and other types of building that have been in demand for sometime at the local Naval Air Station.

Telephones have been ringing constantly at the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce office with citizens asking for additional information on the expansion program of the Navy.

Roy Green of Radio Station WTRR was on hand for the release of the news from the Navy Department and from Congressman Herlong. Within minutes of the release the radio station was broadcasting the news.

One of the officials attending the release of the news at the Chamber of Commerce office today shortly after one o'clock commented "Everyone is so happy that they're nervous and don't know what to say."

It was an unexpected release of the Navy's Planning Department since it had been earlier announced that it would possibly be June

around the globe with service aboard aircraft carriers and in the Pacific and Mediterranean areas, more outstanding.

"It's hard to tell how many types of planes I've worked on," the retired Chief said in an interview. "But the first plane on which I worked was a N3N-1 Navy Trainer—and that's a long time ago."

Travassos was a flight engineer aboard the famous Mars which transported tons upon tons of cargo into the Pacific and other areas during World War II. "I had a job in the air," he said. "The loads we carried and the things we did would be a story in itself."

And without even taking time to remember, the Chief can call off islands in the Pacific like Oahu, Saipan, the Philippine, Marshall, and Johnson Island, as points longed in his book which he reaches for during conversation about his career.

"I like it here in Sanford," said Chief Travassos, "and I'd like to come back to live."

"If Pratt and Whitney were to send me back to Sanford then I'd be a happy man," he said.

Chief Travassos has a daughter, Nancy attending the University of Florida and a son in school here. "No, my wife and family are not leaving Sanford," he said, "so I'll be coming back soon."

New Radio Series On Blindness Told

Radio Station WTRR, in cooperation with the Florida Council for the Blind and the American Foundation for the Blind in New York, is presenting a new series of radio shows, "20/200" (the legal definition and sight-limits which mean blindness). The series was produced and directed by the American Foundation for the Blind and features Dave Garro-way and Leon Pearson of NBC, as well as other personalities. The first program was broadcast on Apr. 17, at 9:15 a. m.

The American Foundation for the Blind sent its director of Public Education, Dr. Gregor Ziemer, and Leon Pearson all over the country to record these broadcasts. They set up their tape recorders in the homes, schools, factories, offices, research laboratories, vending stands, organizations for the blind—everywhere and anywhere that blind people might be found leading their normal, useful everyday lives. More than 150 recordings were made, out of which were selected the interviews which make up this series. Leon Pearson and Gregor Ziemer lead the discussions with blind people and workers for the blind, with Dave Garro-way doing

the narrating. Among the subjects discussed are: blind children, talking books, aids and devices, employment, recreation, and successful lives of blind people. "20/200" is intended to give listeners a new dimension of blindness.

WASHINGTON — More reductions in postal service went into effect today, but congressional leaders expected normal service would be restored by next Saturday.

STOCKHOLM — A Swedish court indicted an atomic energy official and a naval blueprint expert today for "grave espionage"—believed to include an attempt to betray submarine secrets to Russia. Three others were indicted on charges of withholding knowledge of the activities of the chief suspects.

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower plans to make a real fight to rescue his \$4,400,000,000 foreign aid program from the congressional economy axe, his chief economic adviser reveals. Gabriel Hauge, administrative assistant to the President for economic matters, said Eisenhower has "spoken out several times already" on the subject of his aid program for foreign nations. "I think the President is going to make a very forthright attempt to lay the facts before the people on this very important subject," Hauge said. He did not indicate what method will be used.

WASHINGTON — Chairman John L. McClellan (D-Ark.) says that his Senate Rackets Committee may introduce several legislative recommendations before the end of the present session of Congress. The committee prepared to resume its investigations Tuesday into misconduct in labor and management. It will begin scrutinizing certain union activities in the Scranton, Pa., area.

The Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, dealers and brokers on the Sanford State Farmers' Market, members of the Board of Sanford City Commission and the Board of Seminole County Commissioners, as well as interested citizens, will get down to "brass tacks" in discussing the proposed replacement for the facilities which were destroyed by fire on the morning of Apr. 4.

A meeting has been called by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce for Wednesday afternoon, April 17, in the commissioners' room of the Sanford City Hall, at 2 p. m.

John Krider, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, in making the announcement of the meeting said that Lee Thompson, Administrative Assistant to Nathan Mayo, Commissioner of Agriculture, in Tallahassee, will be present at this meeting.

Representative Mack N. Cleveland Jr., contacted in Tallahassee, said "Since we had to undergo the tragedy we should make use of it and explore fully the view of those who will use the market. We'll do everything we can to give the people what they want. There's no need, because of the urgency to go into a rebuilding program haphazardly."

Plans have been explored for the replacing of the former frame market building and platform with a modern steel and concrete structure similar to the installations in Raleigh, N. C. and Pompano.

Senator Douglas Stenstrom told The Sanford Herald by telephone that "The Chamber of Commerce, market officials, and all of those who are interested in the progress of Sanford should present a united front to the Department of Agriculture to come up with a better possible type of market."

Said the Senator "I am pushing for a concrete and steel structure rather than a frame building with consideration given to a central administration type of market similar to the one in Raleigh, N. C."

"We need a modern market to provide storage facilities that would create a year 'round market and a 15-month payroll," he said. (Continued on Page Seven)

New Government Formed In Jordan

Hussein Khalidi, a pro-Western Palestinian, succeeded today in forming a new Jordan government, an Amman dispatch reported. The Cabinet included ousted leftist former Premier Sulaiman Nabulsi.

Khalidi's reported success in setting up a new cabinet came in the midst of these other swift-moving developments which had threatened to turn the Jordanian domestic crisis into a new Middle East war:

King Hussein ordered the withdrawal of Syrian troops from Jordan.

A Damascus radio report said Jordan warned Israel that "any act of provocation or aggression" would be met by force.

The Jerusalem radio reported that the Iraqi government had warned Syria it would take

"strict military measures" if Syria intervened in Jordan.

King Hussein, strongly pro-Western himself, noted out Nabulsi last Wednesday because of his pro-Soviet and pro-Egyptian views. Hussein solidified his power Sunday by ousting remaining pro-Egyptian elements from the government and the army.

Apparent Compromise
But his acceptance of Nabulsi in the Khalidi cabinet appeared to be a compromise by both sides in the interests of Jordanian national unity.

The Damascus broadcast said that a representative of King Hussein of Jordan visited all foreign embassies and legations in Amman this morning and asked them to inform their governments that "any act of provocation or aggression by Israel against Jordan will be met by the Jordanian army by force."

68,000th Landing On FDR Made

Sanford's Savage Sons of Heavy Attack Squadron Five this week celebrated successful completion of carrier qualification exercises by carrying a cake awarded the squadron by the crew of the USS F.D.R. marking that ship's 68,000th landing.

The monumental landing occurred as VAH-5 skipper, Comdr. Joseph M. Tully Jr., completed his re-qualification in the AJ aircraft.

The cake was presented to the squadron by Capt. T. W. Hopkins, commanding officer of the F.D.R. and returned to Sanford where it was enjoyed by all hands.

A milestone in Savage Son history was reached as the AJ's came

aboard and recorded the first carrier landings in this type aircraft for Comdr. Ira M. Rowell Jr., Lt. Cdr. Bob Osterholm, Lt. Bob Kennedy, and Lt. (jg) Gerry Ryman and Dean in the AJ. VAH-5 is now undergoing a period of evolution, phasing out the propeller driven AJ and training its pilots to fly the Navy's new, heavy jet bomber, the AJ1 Skywarrior.

Osterholm and Ryman are the Squadron's junior pilots and were recently selected to be the youngest AJ1 plane commanders in the Navy's Heavy Attack Program. Prior to this operation, both yearling aviators had not had the opportunity to drive an aircraft aboard ship since flight training days at Pensacola. Both had been attached to VAH-5 as bombardier navigators since 1954.

Lt. Cdr. Osterholm, although not a tactical crewmember of the squadron, had to undergo complete training and qualification in the squadron aircraft before he was considered eligible to fulfill his duties as squadron landing signal officer.

A new aircraft recently seen over Sanford is the Grumman F4U Corsair which was the Navy's first line fighter during the Korean War. The single engine jet is being employed by VAH-5 as a training aircraft to familiarize the pilots with jet performance prior to receiving the Skywarrior.

to be losing it little-by-little, thanks to a few narrow minded souls who can't stand improvements and progress.

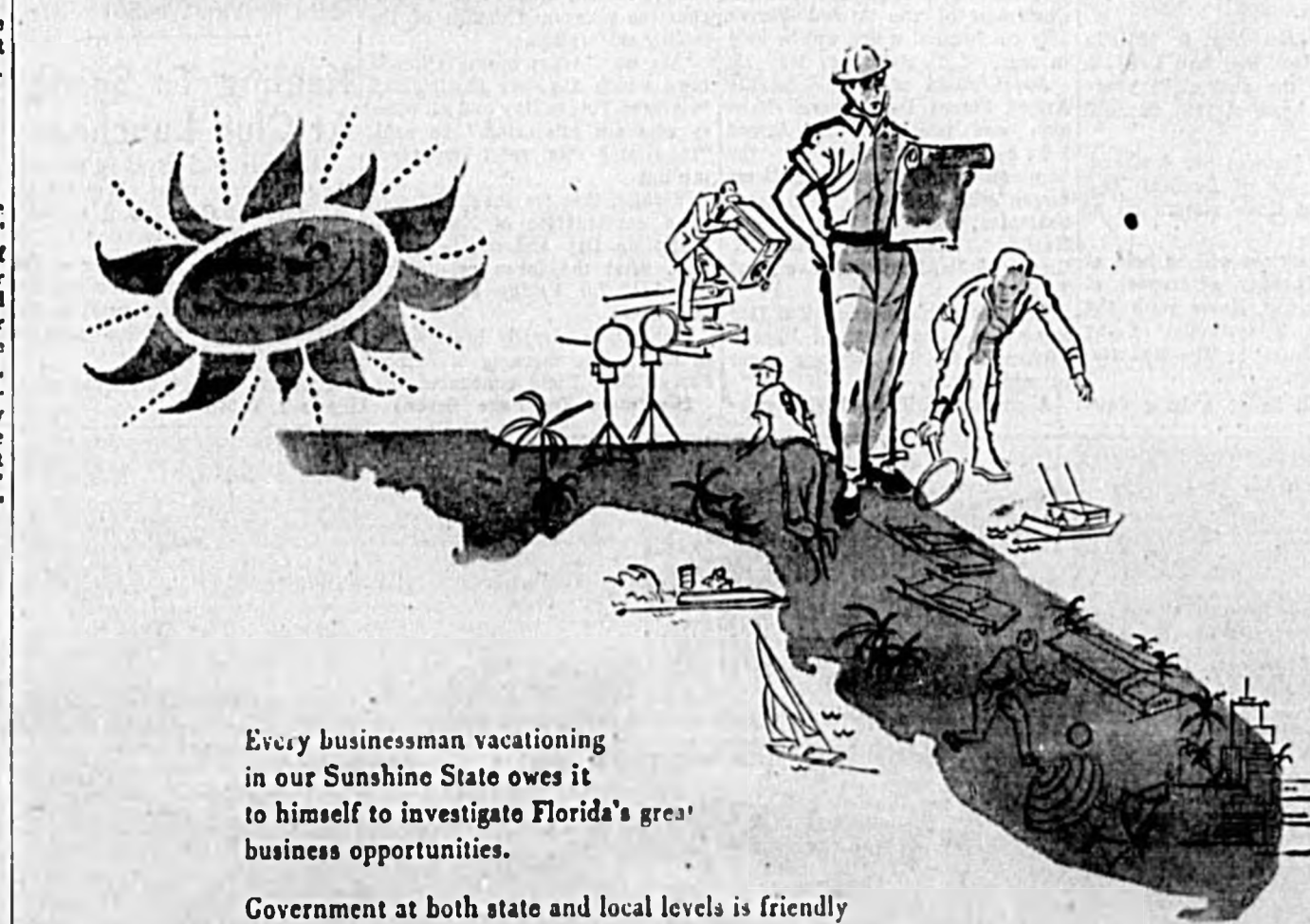

WASHINGTON — Senate Democratic Whip Mike Mansfield has charged the Eisenhower Doctrine has smashed the Western alliance in the Middle East. He said the doctrine means the United States now must go it alone in the trouble-ridden area.

WASHINGTON — The Senate Rackets Committee began new hearings today on what it called "a classic example of the use of force and violence... and terror tactics" by union leaders.

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower's embattled U.S. Information Agency was in double trouble today in both House and Senate. The House took up the USIA's committee-reduced 106 million dollar budget with Republicans leery of trying to restore cuts for fear of opening the door to even deeper slashes. Simultaneously Senate Democratic Whip Mike Mansfield D-Mont. said he not only "thoroughly approved" of the House Appropriations Committee cut, but would be satisfied to see the propaganda agency's fund whittled to a low 55 million dollars. Eisenhower asked for 111 million dollars.

Funds To Restore Service

WASHINGTON — The Senate Appropriations Committee approved unanimously today an emergency \$1 million dollar appropriation aimed at restoring full postal service.

The action required only 10 minutes and cleared the way for possible Senate passage by night-fall.

Chairman Carl Hayden (D-Ariz) of the appropriations group said he would ask for unanimous consent of the Senate to suspend its rules and take up the emergency appropriation today.

The extra postal funds were included in a 49 million dollar supplemental money bill for several government agencies. Even if it wins Senate approval today, the measure would have to return to the House for an okay of minor amendments written in by the Senate committee.

But there was no assurance the Senate would actually go to work on the bill today. Unanimous consent is required for the Senate to waive its rule that appropriations must "lie over" for three days before the Senate acts on them.

Sumnerfield stands pat. A single senator could block action. This would delay the bill until Friday and might prevent restoration of full postal service this Saturday. Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield has said he will not restore service until the money bill is passed and signed by President Eisenhower.

CofC Armed Forces Committee Makes Report To Board

Andrew Carraway, chairman of the committee, told the commissioners "We layed aside our personal and political differences and worked together" in the "effort to keep the Sanford Naval Air Station in Seminole County."

"Our job will not be complete until the Navy acquires additional land," said Carraway as he told of the progress of the committee. "We do not feel that the Navy is firmly imbedded here in Sanford until more land is acquired and we're going to keep pounding at the Navy until they secure the land for a 12 to 14 thousand foot runway," he said.

Carraway explained that the largest item in the report "is for the employment of a widely known engineer who has come to Sanford to make a feasibility report."

The Board of Commissioners also took under advisement the use of an air cooling system in the auditorium of the Sanford Civic Center. However, the City Engineer told by the architect, John Benton IV, that the air conditioning of the banquet room would not be affected by the change. The proposed system would result in a saving of approximately \$12,000 for the city.
