Bengasi Drive Indicated By Axis Moves

Reds Claim Advance Toward Southwest And Recapture Of 90 Towns, Villages

LONDON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—The Axis counter attack in Libya is swinging to the west and northwest the British said today, indicating a possible drive for Bengasi. The Russians claimed a 90-mile advance on the southwest front and the recapture of 90 towns and villages. Russian troops were reported pushing with such strength toward the west yesterday that the Germans were beginning the construction of defense lines which reach all the way back to Berlin. Russians were aiming at driving the Germans back behind Smolensk, and were reported exerting pressure upon two strong points north and south of that center. One was Rashev, 150 miles northwest of Moscow, which was reported practically encircled. The other was Orel, 200 miles south of Moscow and a strategic railway center on the Moscow-Khar'kov railway. Meanwhile, yesterday General Edwin Rommel's columns held a 50-mile line on the western side of the Cretan peninsula and from a point just northeast of Mena, which the Germans have occupied westward to Soluch. All along the line the British mobile columns were engaged in the enemy, and British paratroopers had penetrated it well to the south. Soluch is about 30 miles below the British-held port of Bengasi. Rommel has been held in practically the same area for two days.

LONDON, Jan. 29.—(AP)—The House of Commons, with only one dissenting vote, today expressed confidence in the conduct of the war by Prime Minister Winston Churchill after he had told them the United States is determined to close with the Germans for as soon as possible. The vote was 464 to 1. The presence of an A.E.F. in the soil of the United Kingdom reinforces the desire of the United States that her ready troops should establish battle contact with the foe as soon as feasible, Mr. Churchill asserted.

At the present time training fields in these two branches are filled again. The cadet was graduated from South High School and attended Eastern University in Deland. He is 22 years old.

Harry Papworth

In the death of Harry Papworth Sanford loses another of those vigorous old pioneers who knew Sanford when it was little more than a trading post on the banks of the St. Johns and who have contributed so much of their time and energy to the development of the present city.

Covering a span of over half a century, Mr. Papworth's life here began after a tour of duty with his British regiment in South Africa where he took part in the fierce campaign against the Zulus. He was one of the first to become interested in citrus growing in this section and maintained that interest throughout his long life though for many years his primary business was in New York.

Mr. Papworth's residence here falls naturally into two parts, the early days before going to New York, and the period after his return some twenty-five years later. But in both cases we find him very much the same, full of energy and pep, fun-loving and plain-spoken, generous with his time and money, and always eager to do something for the community welfare.

When he first came to Sanford he organized the first volunteer fire department and became its chief in the days when streets were made of sand and fire equipment had to be dragged through them by men on foot. He also organized the old "Sanford Rifles," one of the first militia units established in Florida following the Civil War.

Mr. Papworth came back to Sanford in 1927 after a successful business career in New York City. He immediately launched himself into every civic movement which he considered for the best interests of the town. He became president of the Sanford Chamber of Commerce at a time when despair and discouragement were written on the faces of nearly all its directors, reorganized it and then became president of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Only those closely associated with Mr. Papworth during the years that followed realize fully how valiantly he fought for this county's welfare. He attended countless meetings of the State Road Department in various parts of the state, at his own expense, in the interest of Seminole County roads. He attended Chamber of Commerce meetings and St. Johns River Improvement Association meetings in early morning and late at night for the sake of Sanford.

His efforts in behalf of Mediterranean Fruit Fly reimbursements have been monumental. For 12 long years he has labored, with growers and congressmen alike, to secure just payment for the damage done local farms and groves during that campaign. Long after almost everyone else had given up in despair, Mr. Papworth kept hammering away, and though the payments have not actually been made yet, it now appears likely that they soon will be, and no small part of the credit will belong to Harry Papworth.

Sanford will miss this fine old gentleman. His place will long remain unfilled.

Sugar Rationing

It comes as a particular shock to the people of Florida to learn that sugar is going to be rationed and that they will have to cut down on the amount they put in their coffee when they know so well that for years the government has actually prohibited a long sought increase in sugar production in Florida and has been paying at least one large corporation nearly half a million dollars a year for NOT raising sugar cane.

But whether we like it or not, we will have to make the best of it. That someone has blundered goes without saying, blundered much more crudely, it seems to us, than the brass hats who are getting the blame for Pearl Harbor, but that is neither here nor there now. Most people are human and likely to make mistakes. If doing without sugar, now that the cane has been burned, will help to avert other mistakes in the future, it will be worth it.

"This newspaper, together with nearly every other one in the state," says the Tampa Tribune, "has consistently bemoaned the lack of foresight of government officials in hamstringing Florida's sugar production efforts. Ever since war broke out in Europe we have pointed to the danger and possible shortage that might result if we continued to depend on offshore producing areas for a large part of our supply."

"Although some of us may still have that attitude, it is not the right one to take. We might as well admit that those government officials blundered by not permitting Florida growers to produce more sugar several years ago. Admitting that, we should forget the error and plunge into the task of seeing that problems arising from the shortage are held to the minimum."

"Most Americans abhor the idea of ration cards, but it appears that they will be necessary to prevent hoarding by individuals and unfair storing up of supplies by warehouses. Sugar is an important item in the diet of every family. It is an essential article, too, in making explosives. Under such conditions, officials are acting wisely in taking every necessary step to conserve sugar supplies."

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State-Line Barriers Asked To Be Moved

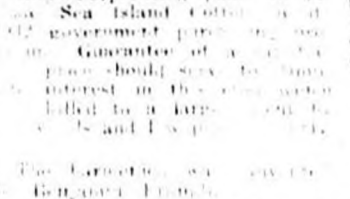

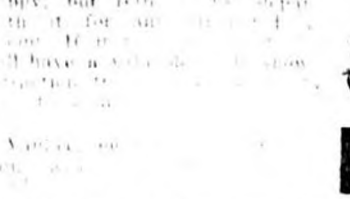
