### COULDN'T KILL MULE

"OLD TOBE" NONE THE WORSE FOR LONG IMMERSION.

Incident of the Civil War Shows How Hard It Is to Separate Government Pack Animal From Uncle Sam's Rations.

Z. P. Hotchkiss, adjutant of Phil Sheridan post G. A. R. of Oak Park, Ill., tells the following experience with a government mule. As an army telegrapher Mr. Hotchkiss was attached to the staff of General Canby in the final Mobile campaign.

"The entire outfit for the construction of the army telegraph lines," says Mr. Hotchkiss, "was carried on the backs of forty pack mules. A coil of half a mile of wire hung upon each side of the saddle.

"There were six young operators, one from each corps, mounted on horses. To these boys had been entrusted the government cipher and knowledge of the advance movement of the troops. These secrets were safe, as none of the young fellows ever betrayed a trust.

"For the Mobile campaign the mules were drilled in the streets of New Orleans to follow the lead of the mule-train or the horse of the chief operator.

One day, while following in the rear of the army up the peninsula from Dauphin island, the entire train was trailing along in the rear of the chief operator, who knew nothing about ocean tides. The reel mule, Old Tobe, from whose back was uncoiled the wire, was in advance and followed his leader into an arm of the sea of Mexico. The operator's horse was soon beyond his depth and was swimming for shore water when it was seen that Old Tobe had sunk beneath his heavy load. The mule's swim, his head above water, and his legs sticking out, and he floating twice as long as he should.

"Some of the boys walking toward the mule, said, 'He'll get him this time.' He dove again and he floated until he had cut the head of his heavy load, mule and reel, the animal of his load. Old Tobe floated to the surface, shook the water from his ears, was towed ashore, pumped out, and a few hours later was again making the march for Fish river. Save for dragging a little, he showed little sign of his experience, but he had been under water long enough to have killed anything but a resurrection mule."

Some 200 mule operators who though many of their number were killed or taken prisoners of war, are ineligible to a government pension, are the recipients of private pensions in their old age from their comrade, Andrew Carnegie.

### VARIETIES OF STOVES

NATIONS HAVE DIFFERENT METHODS OF KEEPING WARM.

Russian Sleeps Over Brick Contrivance in Which Slow Fire Burns—Holland's Heating Arrangement Perhaps Most Economical.

The stove is, comparatively speaking, a new invention. So late as the time of Queen Elizabeth people did not have chimneys; they built their fires in a round hearth in the middle of the room and when chimneys were introduced, the old-fashioned folk all grumbled, because, they said, smoky air was good for colds. But to the eastward stoves of brick and porcelain were commonly used.

A stove made of brick is used in Russia, and in it a slow fire burns all night long. On top of it, when night comes, the peasant and his whole family, in their sheepskins, lie down and go to sleep. It is nice and warm, rather like a window seat that is over a radiator, and sometimes there is a second shelf overhead for any stranger who may be staying overnight.

The brick stove of the Russian peasant, in all probability, came overland from China too long ago to talk about, for the Chinese have stoves of brick and clay shaped something like it.

In Japan there is not much need of keeping warm, but whatever stoves there are in a Japanese home are low, for the life here is all carried on sitting or kneeling on the floor. There is a rough clay stove, made especially for the great rice kettle, that costs only a few cents, and when broken the poorest can buy another. There is a dainty little charcoal stove on which the cooking is done, and beside it stands a pretty basket filled with the softest and finest charcoal. There is also a small stove or furnace to heat

the water for the bath. And still more odd is the little earthen bed-stove, used as we use a hot-water bottle, shaped like a curled-up cat, and it is called "neko" (the kitten).

The German stove of porcelain, with its curious decorations, has figured in many a story of German life. A porcelain stove will hold the heat a long time and keep a room warm with but little attention.

In Holland, where the working people are often at home for a little while at noon, they have the most thrifty arrangement of all—what might be called a portable stove, a stove in an iron bucket. When the children come home from school and the older people from work at noon, instead of lighting the kitchen fire, one of the children takes the fire bucket and trots around the corner to the fire-woman's. The bucket is just large enough to hold a piece of burning peat or some live coals, and a teakettle sits on top. The old woman who sells fire and hot water fills the bucket and ket the for a tiny sum, and the child goes home with just enough fire and water for the family dinner.

Charcoal is commonly used for cooking in France, Italy and Spain because it makes a small, hot fire. The Polak keeps a small pot of what we would call a "hot hand warmer" with coals in it, and he keeps it only within the last few years has it been possible to find rooms that were heated on the American plan anywhere in Europe. The people keep warmer in this country than in any other spot on the surface of the globe in the temperate or frigid zone.

Washington, April 14.—Lack of logical method in the development of the American navy was deplored by Rear Admiral Bradley A. Fiske, U. S. N., in a paper on "Naval Strategy" presented at today's session of the annual convention of the Navy League of the United States. The admiral did not appear in person, his paper being read by a delegate.

"In the elementary parts of the navy profession," said the paper, "we do very well. But of the higher branches, particularly of strategy, we have little clear conception. We compare the strategical methods employed by, say Germany and us, and we are forced to admit that the German methods are better adapted to produce economically a navy of the first order."

"The American navy," said the paper, "is a hodge-podge of different types of ships, and the result is a fleet that is not adapted to any one particular service. His brother Elks took the position that politics has nothing to do with the Elks, the best man for the job should be elected for a political position.

Well Known Writer Dies. Mount Kisco, N. Y., April 1. Richard Harding Davis, author and war correspondent died at his home here last night from heart trouble. His body was found early this morning and he had apparently been stricken while at his telephone. He had gone into his library to dictate a telegram to a friend in New York City. His wife assumed, when he did not return, that he was reading and she did not visit the library until after midnight.

Richard Harding Davis, one of the most popular of American writers, a playwright also and a veteran correspondent of five wars, was born in Philadelphia in 1864 and was the son of L. Clarke Davis and Rebecca Harding Davis, also a writer. After being educated at Lehigh and Johns Hopkins Universities Mr. Davis entered journalism, starting with the Philadelphia Press, and later serving on the New York Sun. He was correspondent during the Turco Greek, Spanish American, South African and Russo Japanese wars for the London Times and the New York Herald, and during the present war wrote despatches for a syndicate.

# R. AND H. BILL PASSED HOUSE GOES SENATE

## ST. JOHNS RIVER ITEMS ARE SAVED INTACT

Washington, April 13.—The annual river and harbor appropriation bill carrying \$40,000,000 passed the house today by a vote of 210 and 133 with every item as agreed on in committee unchanged. Scores of amendments to cut down items urged by representatives who charged that the bill was a "perk barrel" measure were rejected during the two weeks' debate. Just before the final vote an effort was led by Republican Leader Mann to reduce the total to \$20,000,000 failed 200 to 149.

The entire appropriation for a \$700,000 item to deepen the approaches to the Brooklyn navy yard is continuing work on improvement projects already authorized and under way. The single item proposed by Senator President Woodruff to reduce the amount of the preparedness program, the full amount goes to the senate.

The bill provides for the appropriation of \$3,000,000 appropriated to the St. Johns river between \$2,000,000 and \$3,000,000, including \$500,000 for the St. Johns river, New York; \$1,000,000 for the Hudson river, New York; \$1,000,000 for the Delaware river, Delaware; \$1,000,000 for the Potomac river, Maryland; \$1,000,000 for the Ohio river, Ohio; \$1,000,000 for the Missouri river, Missouri; \$1,000,000 for the Mississippi river, Mississippi; \$1,000,000 for the St. Johns river, Florida; \$1,000,000 for the St. Johns river, Florida.

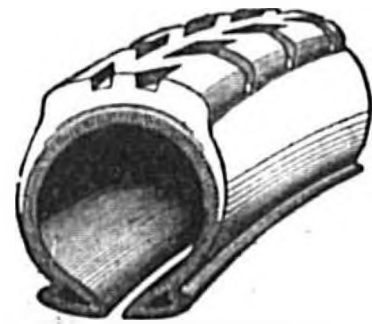

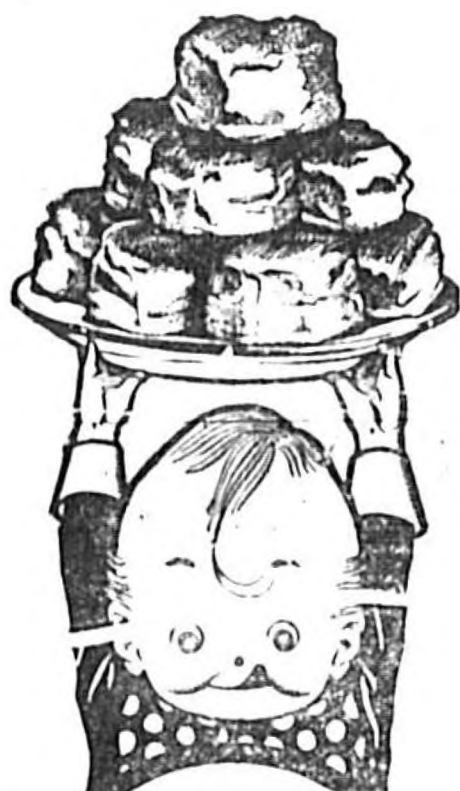

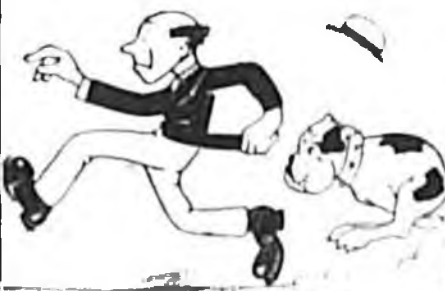
