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### New York And Red Sox Are Happy As Rain Gives Pitchers Respite

**CLEVELAND, Sept. 7.—(AP)—**Al Lopez—cautious, but optimistic—started his Indians on their last road trip today by saying he was convinced rain had brought the pennant closer to Cleveland.

The downpour washed out a doubleheader yesterday at New York between Boston and the Yankees who trail the front running Indians by a single game.

In making up those games, the Yankees will have to play two doubleheaders instead of one against the third spot Boston.

And Lopez declared: "Playing a doubleheader is definitely a handicap and having to play another just increases that handicap."

The Yankees and Sox will play the twin bills on Sept. 28 and 29 and then end the season with a single game Sept. 30.

Mel Harder, who coaches the Cleveland pitchers, added that taking both ends of a twin bill is tough even for a good team.

"Something always goes wrong," he explained.

Harder pointed out Casey Stengel, Yankees manager, had two top notch pitchers—Ed Lopat and Al He Reynolds—ready for yesterday's game. He wondered whether Casey could work his scheduling around to come up with such good ones the next time.

Lopez was a little disappointed in the Tribe's last home stand—11 wins and seven losses.

He had hoped the Tribe could build up a "three to five game" lead this stand, but he still thinks "we're in fine shape and we've got a good chance."

"If it weren't for that hitting slump, we'd have had that lead, and we're over that now. Everything is shaping up good. I have the feeling we'll hit better on the road. Baseball is a game of cycles. We're on the upward cycle now."

"I'm not worried too much about this trip," he continued. "It shouldn't be as tough as the last one and on that one we won 10 and lost four."

The manager noted "we've got only two games in New York and Boston and that'll be a help. And we will have a lot of off days—while the Yankees and Red Sox are still playing."

The Yankees and Sox have eight games to go against each other—and all of them are in the last 10 days.

Harder said he expected Bob Lemon to be the big pitcher this trip. He hoped out loud for "one or two batters to catch on fire." He named staff of Lemon, Bob Feller, Mike Garcia and Early Wynn has been carrying most of the load so far.

Lemon won more games last season, 23, than any other chucker in the circuit. He started slowly this year but has come on with a rush since July and now has a 16-11 record. Harder thinks he will win 20 before this season ends. That last week the Tribe hopes

### Canada And U. S. To Meet In Practice Golf Tournament

**BETHLEHEM, Pa., Sept. 7.—**Canada's best amateur golfers meet America's Walker Cup team today in a strictly informal "for-fun-only" match that could be the forerunner of a new international competition.

Right now about the only thing the match can do will be to sharpen the drives and putts of the linkers for the opening of the 51st Amateur Championship of the United States Golf Association Monday.

The Canadian-U. S. match will be played on the same trap-laden Saucon Valley Country Club course as the USGA meet.

Each side will be represented by nine players. The U. S. team is headed by Sam Uzzetta, of Rochester, N. Y., 1930 USGA amateur champion.

Bill Mawhinney, Vancouver, is the top Canadian linkster. He is so highly regarded, in fact, that his fellow countrymen predict he'll win the USGA crown. If he does he'll be the second Canadian ever to turn the trick. C. Ross Souerville, non-playing captain of the Canadian team, won the title in 1932. He has expressed hope the Canadian-U. S. competition might become permanent.

The Canadians and Americans, playing under the same rules used in the U. S.-British Walker Cup competition, will participate in foursome matches and eight singles—all over 18 holes.

### End To Injuries In Sports Sought By Doctors Meet

**DENVER, Sept. 7.—(AP)—**Action to prevent injuries in all sports was called for today in a discussion before the American Congress of Physical Medicine.

The report urged the training of physicians "to handle—or primarily to prevent—athletic disabilities." The paper was prepared for delivery to the congress by Dr. Norman C. Ochsenschlit, professor of Maxillofacial Surgery and Anatomy at the University of Pittsburgh. He is also chairman of Pitt's athletic committee.

Ochsenschlit said American boys are engaging in athletics who have undetected lesions of pulmonary tuberculosis, bone-line cases of diabetes and slight deformities from undiagnosed mild poliomyelitis.

The report noted: "Unfortunately in too many instances, training without suitable background or education are placed in charge of the health and welfare of college and professional athletes."

"Such trainers frequently share their success on the percentage column—wins or losses—with too little consideration of the injured versus the uninjured."

Ochsenschlit said there are certain portions of the athletic code which are "injury prone" in specific sports. He cited the "sore" shoulder or elbow of the pitcher in baseball.

 from floating around weightless. Koelle said his station could be built for \$518,000,000 and would cost \$40,000,000 to \$50,000,000 a month to maintain.  
 "For perhaps one per cent of the expenditure likely to be involved in a Third World War," the young German said, "we could construct several space stations, build a moon rocket and in time send an expedition to Mars."  
 Koelle said peaceful uses of such a station would include relaying short wave radio and television, making long range weather forecasts and of watching national trouble spots for the United Nations.  
 The Space Congress is an official meeting of 50 scientists from eight nations. Atomic and rocket experts from four other countries sent papers, including Dr. Wernher von Braun, designer of the German V2 rocket of World War II.  
 Von Braun is now a leading researcher of the U. S. guided missile program at White Sands, N. Mex.

 "Recommend no more low level penetrations be made due to severe turbulence," Lt. Bishop radioed to his base at Miami. The aerologist on the flight was L. R. Upton, chief aerologist mate of Union, Nebr.  
 The U. S. M. advisory from the Miami Weather Bureau gave the location of the eye as latitude 24.2 north, longitude 07.0 west. The U. S. produces some 400 feature movies a year.
