



a hill without firing a shot after the Allies blasted them with tank and field artillery. The recaptured knot is inorthwest of Yonchon, which is seven miles north of the 38th Parallel.

Usefulness Of Cheating

The long period of reverberations from the ousting of some ninety cadets from the Military Academy at West Point was to be expected. Americans hate summary justice, and spring swiftly to the defense of anyone who appears to have been condemned without a hearing. In the uproar over questions of possible injustice and the worth of the honor system, it was hard to keep sight of the reasoning behind a strict. perhaps even harsh, policy toward cheating ing as they worked.

Some observers took occasion to point out the serious nature of the work for which military cadets are preparing. They will become the leaders, the executors of policy and the makers of decisions in the armed forces. On their skill, knowledge and judgment the defense of the nation and the lives of our servicemen will depend. Perhaps a man can get through one of the academies by stealing the answers to questions. But after he receives his commission and is sent into the field to command a platoon of men, from whom can he steal the answers when the lives of his men hang in the balance of a question which faces him?

The mere possession of a college degree, or similar symbol of learning or achievement, may help a young person to get a start in the working world, but he won't last long unless he has the knowledge which should go with the symbol. A person may steal credit for something he didn't do, but he can't steal the ability to do it.

DENVER, Sept. 7-(A)-Action DENVER, Sept. 7—(P)—Action to prevent injuries in all sports was called for today in a discussion before the American Congress of Physical Medicine. The report urged the training of physicians "to handle—or primarily to prevent—athletic disabilities." The paper was presented for delivery to the congress by Dr. Norman B. Ochsenhirt, professor of Maxillofacial Surgery and Anatomy at the University of Pittsburgh. He is also chairman of Pitt's athletic committee. mittee.

Ochsenhirt said American boys are engaging in athletics who have undetected lesions of pulmonary tuberculosis, borderline cases of disbetes and slight de-formities from unadiagnosed mild Homyelities.

The report noted:
"Unfortunately in too many instances, trainers without suitable background or education are placed in charge of the health and welfare of college and pro-fessional athletics. "Such trainers frequently base

their success on the percentage column-wins or losses-with too little consideration of the injured versus the uninjured."

Ochsenhirt said there are certain portions of the athletic body which are "injury prone" in specific sports. He cited the "sore" shoulder or elbow of the pitcher in baseball.




