The Business After Hours gathering will be held this afternoon from 5 p.m. until 7 p.m. and is open to all members of the Chamber, as well as prospective members and their guests.

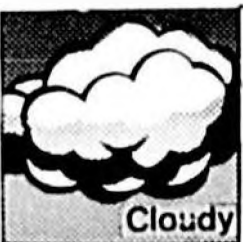

# No new state roads

SANFORD — Don't expect any major new state road projects for Seminole County, a district road department spokesman said Wednesday.

But then, don't expect any previous projects to be dropped either, said Steve Homan, spokesman for the Florida Department of Transportation's Lake Mary district office.

We don't expect any significant changes, said Homan.

Homan said final calculations aren't complete yet, but the district expects to spend about \$75

million in Seminole County during the next five years. Each year, the state approves road and transportation budgets for a five-year period. The final proposal will be presented in a public hearing scheduled for April 10.

The only significant change between the current five-year plan and last year's plan is the deletion of the \$12.2 million interchange of County Road 46 A at Interstate 4. The federally-funded demonstration project was designed to show how fast a road project can be designed and built but has been delayed for three years because land has not been donated for the project.

Homan said though the project will be removed

from the five-year list, it will be returned when land is donated for it. A \$11.2 million federal grant will finance all but about \$4 million of the construction. Area landowners were expected to donate the 37 acres needed for the interchange.

Among the other major projects that are still scheduled are the widening of I-4 between State Road 434 and Lake Mary Boulevard. EDOT has begun the initial steps in preparation of the \$12 million project. Construction is slated to begin in 1995.

Another project still proposed is the repaving of U.S. Highway 17-92 between Shepard Road and State Road 46, scheduled to begin in 1994.

# Book firm re-thinking Lake Mary

LAKE MARY — Scholastic Book Fairs, Inc. has been considering a new facility in Lake Mary. An application for a site plan approval has been submitted.

The company is a distributor for textbooks and other reading books for elementary school book fairs, and seeks to establish an office and storage area at Northpoint.

Scholastic Book Fairs has 55 locations around the nation. Two are already located in Seminole County. The main office is located in Maitland, with a secondary operation at 150 Hope Street in Longwood.

The building planned for the Lake Mary site is projected to be a two-story structure, on the west side of Greenwood Boulevard, between the Boulevard and Interstate 4. It is planned for a total of 40,000 square feet, and would employ approximately 50 persons.

In all, Northpoint encompasses approximately 110 acres of land. The Scholastic Book Fairs site would be slightly over four acres, and would have been the first business to be approved for the development.

As of this morning, the proposal was listed on the agenda for tonight's meeting of the Lake Mary City Commission. The question was whether it would remain on the agenda by tonight.

# City talks about reducing talking

LONGWOOD — The Longwood City Commission spent considerable time this week discussing ways to spend less time in discussions. Earlier workshop meetings will be considered.

Most City Commission meetings in Longwood last approximately two hours but some have gone on for more than three hours.

Following approval of the Consent Agenda during the Commission meeting this past Monday, Commissioner Claret Keith brought up a proposal to consider dealing with the Consent Agenda during a workshop meeting prior to the regular meetings. "By handling discussions on what we would consider housekeeping items before the regular meeting," she said, "we could reduce quite a bit of time."

Keith explained, "This is one of the ideas we discussed with 'Pete' Knowles when he met with the Commissioners on March 9th." At the request of the Longwood City Commission, Knowles, a former Sanford City Manager, had volunteered to work with them to improve communications between the Commission and members of the City Staff.

Monday night's Consent Agenda was approved with a single unanimous vote and no discussion. It

# Sen. Gardner weighs retiring

SANFORD — Though he is currently unopposed, Sen. W.W. "Bud" Gardner is reconsidering his bid for reelection.

I haven't made up my mind yet, the Titusville Democrat said Wednesday. There have been a series of things that have happened this session that have been very disconcerting to me.

Gardner, whose district includes Sanford and much of eastern Seminole County, said recent newspaper articles and editorials, though he disputes their allegations, have been politically damaging to him. Gardner said he will make a final decision whether to run after the Legislature completes budget and transportation sessions during the next several weeks.

Gardner ends four years as a

senator this year. For the past two years, he has served as chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, which reviews all state spending proposals. Previously, he

served Brevard County as a House member for 10 years. He has received more than 100 awards and recognitions during his legislative career.

All it would take would be someone to run an editorial's comments in a direct mail piece and I'd have a tough time fighting it, Gardner said. I'm not sure if I'd want to put my family through that. The die is pretty much cast.

Gardner's problems began last year when the Leon County state prosecutor in Tallahassee filed charges against him for not reporting three lobbyist-paid trips. Gardner was the only lawmaker out of 24 who challenged the charges, contending the laws at the time didn't require the paid trips to be paid. The case is still on appeal.

Recently there have been reports Gardner had legislation on behalf of

A friend and sought to provide a \$400,000 loan for Spaceport Florida, a state-created private venture located in his district. Amid criticism, Gardner tried to withdraw both proposals in February but in a strong show of support, fellow senators refused and approved the proposals.

Gardner said since becoming appropriations chairman, he has fought for more openness and suggested the Spaceport appropriation would have been easy to "hide" had he wanted to do so.

"There has been such a downturn in public confidence," Gardner said. "(House Appropriations Chairman) Ron Saunders

and I tried to turn that around. At one time, it would have been easy to hide these appropriations. But I tried to open everything up and let everyone know what's going on."

While Gardner admitted negative media attention is playing a large part in his decision to rethink his re-election, he said election-year sniping in Tallahassee have played a role as well.

"It's just not fun any more," Gardner said. "There has been a lot of name-calling and backstabbing this year, possibly due to the reapportionment. That's got everybody going after everybody else."

# Being an incumbent no longer the same

CHICAGO — Now it's members of Congress who are getting bounced, not their checks.

So far, five Democratic House members have been defeated in primaries, along with a two-term senator who hadn't lost an election in 43 years. And incumbent-hunting season has just started.

All the political perils that incumbents in congressional and state primaries will face were on display in Illinois on Tuesday: redistricting; voter outrage at overdraft checks on the House bank; local headwinds; the grudges that go with a voting record in Congress. And looming over it all was the mood of disenchantment with Washington and its ways.

Redistricting guaranteed two incumbent defeats because Illinois lost House seats and lawmakers were running against each other in two new districts.

The House check kiting affair hit for the first time in the defeat of a veteran Democratic congressman, Illinois Rep. Charles Hayes, who was high on the overdraft roster.

Illinois Sen. Alan Dixon lost in a three-way Democratic primary. His most aggressive opponent ran last, but helped open a victory route for Carol Moseley Braun, the Cook County recorder of deeds. If she wins the general election, Braun would be the first black female senator.

The angry mood of the voters shows in public opinion polls, in crowd responses when candidates take on Washington, in any conversation at a campaign rally. It's behind the movement to limit terms in office, behind the applause when presidential campaigners complain about congressional pay raises.

Members of Congress have been hearing about it, and some have been worrying about it, since the last campaign. It didn't hit them: 96 percent of the House members who sought new terms won. Only one member of Congress was defeated in a 1990 primary, a Republican accused of sexual misconduct. Fifteen House members lost in the general elections.

This time, the symptoms are more severe, particularly since the uproar over the House bank and the penalty-free overdraft system that enabled lawmakers to write checks exceeding their balances.

Hayes was denied renomi-

tion to a sixth term after it was disclosed he'd written 716 overdraft checks on the bank, now shut down. An aide called it a powerful, turnaround issue. Hayes insisted it was a false one: "I'm not a criminal and I don't want to be treated like this," he told reporters on election eve.

His defeat wasn't simple cause and effect: long before the check uproar, Hayes' opponent, Bobby Rush, won the endorsement of the powerful Democratic organization in a crucial Chicago ward. Rush used the bank scandal to press his claim that Hayes had become a captive of congressional perks.

None of that can be politically comforting to the other 295 House members on the overdraft lists.

Rep. Gus Savage, D-Ill., a confrontational black congressman, lost after six terms to Mel Reynolds, a college instructor challenging him for the third time. Reynolds went to his victory rally with a bandage on his forehead, covering the wound he suffered from shattered glass in the drive-by shooting of his campaign car.

Reynolds, also black, won in a Chicago-area district that included more white voters than the old Savage constituency. And Savage, typically, blamed his loss on the white racist press and on Jewish opponents.

So that could hardly be rated a test of incumbency to be applied elsewhere.

The Dixon defeat also had its one-of-a-kind features. Dixon did much of his campaigning against Albert Hofeld, an attorney who put \$4.3 million of his own money into the campaign and ran a barrage of negative television commercials attacking the senator as a Washington insider.

Braun, a former state legislator, entered the race after Dixon cast one of only 11 Democratic votes for the confirmation of Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas.

Ironically, the check-kiting affair may have hurt Dixon, although the Senate doesn't have such a bank and adopted a resolution to remind voters of the difference.

It didn't help Dixon: his poll rating was said to have slumped when the bank story hit.

Braun won with 38 percent of the vote to Dixon's 35; Hofeld got 27 percent.

So, again, it was not a simple, direct test of incumbent vs. outsider.

## Chiles: Cuts to Medicaid death warrant

TALLAHASSEE — Anyone who supports cutting Medicaid services to pregnant women, the elderly, disabled and working poor is fiscally imprudent as well as coldhearted, Gov. Lawton Chiles said.

Cutting prevention programs triples the cost of the cure as problems worsen and become more expensive, Chiles said.

Health care cuts passed by the Legislature would also have meant losing federal dollars, since the state only contributes 45 cents of every dollar spent in Florida on Medicaid, a joint federal-state program.

## Lawmakers to reconvene on redistricting

TALLAHASSEE — Lawmakers gone just a week after a 60-day legislative session will try again to agree on new congressional districts in a special session starting Monday, Senate President Gwen Margolis and House Speaker T.K. Wetherell said.

The legislative leaders signed a proclamation Wednesday calling a session Monday through April 3 to return to redistricting and other unfinished business such as revisiting bingo laws opposed by charities and doing away with re-

election campaigns for judges. Gov. Lawton Chiles will add other items before the end of the week, spokeswoman Julie Ambender said.

It's the first of three sessions expected to last at least until June to deal with the congressional districts, new districts for state legislators, and a budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

A 23-district congressional map to match population changes in the 1990 census comes first.

Republican lawmakers have filed a lawsuit saying the Legislature can't agree and asking a federal court to take over. A three-judge panel has scheduled a hearing March 27.

"That's why we want a very limited call," Wetherell said. "If you junk up the call with a bunch of other stuff you junk up your chances" of agreeing.

## No drugs, but cops find moonshine

WILDWOOD — It was a change of pace. Instead of cocaine flowing north from South Florida, police said they found illegal liquor — moonshine — in a car headed south.

Members of the Sumter County Highway Interdiction Team were surprised Tuesday night when they stopped a car traveling from Alabama to South Florida. Police said they confiscated 14 gallons of moonshine whiskey and arrested two people after a traffic stop on Florida's Turnpike extension near Wildwood.

Arrested were Fletcher May Jr., 60, of Highlands, Ala., and Voncie Harris, 45, of Laverne, Ala. They are charged with moving alcoholic beverages with intent to defraud tax and possession of moonshine whiskey.

Wildwood Police Officer Noel Griffin III, head of a multiagency drug task force, said the moonshine, worth about \$30 per gallon on the street, is 86 proof.

# Growing stronger

## Twelve-ounce baby survives first month, weighs one pound

MIAMI — A baby who weighed only 12 ounces at birth reached another important milestone in her odds-defying struggle for survival as she turned 1 month old.

Zascha Beatriz Villamar, born Feb. 18 — 18 weeks prematurely — now weighs a full pound. Doctors have upgraded her chances from 10 percent to "better than 50-50," said Miami Children's Hospital spokesman Omar Montejo.

"She's little, but she's very strong," said mother Rosa Villamar, 21. "I know she's going to make it."

The hospital invited journalists to mark the occasion Wednesday with Zascha's parents. The smallest premature baby to survive was a British infant who weighed 10 ounces at birth, according to the Guinness Book of World Records, and Montejo said Zascha ties the U.S. record.

"The doctors are optimistic now that she has made it through the first four weeks," Montejo said.

The infant is in an incubator, heavily insulated to keep her from exposure to disease or infection. Her body is warmed by heat pumped in from a hose, a heating pad and an overhead

spotlight that follows her every motion.

Her lungs are still so underdeveloped that the infant needs a respirator to breathe, and she is fed intravenously.

Ms. Villamar spends up to eight hours a day sitting in the isolation booth where the incubator is located, talking to Zascha or just praying quietly. Her husband, Manuel, 25, a dental technician, visits every day after work.

"My baby comes first," said Ms. Villamar, who begins each day with a phone call to the hospital to see how Zascha is. "It's her life."

"I talk to her all the time," she

added. "I tell her I'm waiting for her to come home."

Complications necessitated the baby's delivery by Caesarian section at Hialeah Hospital. Zascha then was taken immediately to Children's Hospital, where doctors decided technology, combined with the infant's apparent tenacity, gave her a fighting chance.

Most babies so premature are feeble and inactive, but she was born kicking and flailing, doctors recalled.

"It's as if she was asking for help to survive," said Dr. Ian Jeffries, head of neonatology at Children's Hospital.

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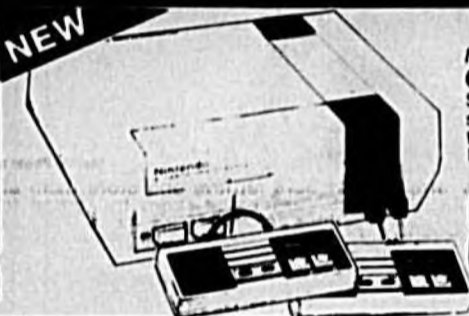
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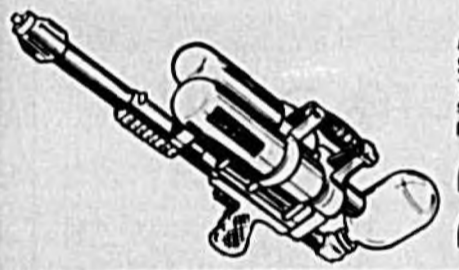

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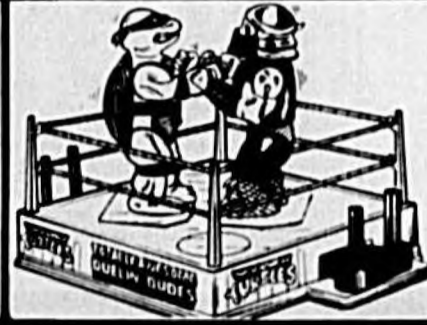

## Reform

In Western terms, the reforms just decreed by King Fahd of Saudi Arabia are minimal, yet in the Saudi context they are progressive. For the first time, a kingdom whose political philosophy is rooted in medieval practices derived from the Koran is to have something like a written constitution, including a bill of rights to shield citizens from the excesses of the country's notorious religious police.

The king, who retains full powers, nonetheless will seek regular advice from a 60-member consultative council on matters of public policy; provincial governors and local councils will have more authority on budget and development matters, and the process of royal succession will be broadened to allow the selection of a younger, more progressive prince of the house of Saud.

Even if all that comes to pass, it hardly means that Saudi Arabia is about to become a constitutional monarchy, much less a fully functioning democracy. Moreover, the changes seem motivated more by a fear of growing discontent, at home and in the Arab world generally, with the royal house's feudal ruling style than by any sudden conversion to pluralism.

Even so, the changes are significant, in part because Saudi Arabia is to the Muslim world as the Vatican is to Roman Catholicism — the defender of the faith and keeper of the holy places — and in part owing to the country's enormous oil wealth, which gives it a worldly influence beyond its otherwise modest assets.

That influence has its limits. Iraq's seizure of Kuwait in August 1990, and the threat that posed to the Saudi monarchy, was greeted in much of the Muslim world not by outrage but by cheers. Whatever notion remained that checkbook diplomacy could forever insulate the Saudis from upheavals elsewhere in the Middle East was shattered.

Now, the dynasty is trying to buffer itself by meeting at least some popular demands — though not yet, apparently for popular elections, equality for women or the liberalizing of a criminal code that allows the death penalty for adultery and the severing of a hand for theft.

Whether these reforms will pacify Western-oriented liberals or, if they do, whether that will further inflame Muslim fundamentalists who think liberalization has gone too far already, is impossible to predict. Nor is it clear to what extent, if any, the quest for peace and stability in the world's most volatile region will be affected.

Nonetheless, a country with one foot in the late 20th century and another in the Middle Ages now seems ready to narrow that gap. That's no small thing.

# Only voters can bounce bouncers

Don't be fooled by Speaker Foley's impassive air and his reputation for personal integrity: The House of Representatives, and more broadly Congress as a whole, has taken a terrible beating as a result of the series of scandals that has broken over it in recent years. According to the polls, the American people's opinion of Congress as an institution is lower than a turtle's toenails, and absolutely nobody pretends to wonder why.

First it was the rawly partisan reign of Jim Wright as Speaker — a reign that ended abruptly when Wright resigned, both as Speaker and from the House itself, shortly before the savings and loan scandal, which he was in up to his ears, broke over an amazed nation.

Next came the resignation of the Democratic Whip, Congressman Tony Coelho, amid still-unanswered questions about \$100,000 worth of junk bonds he (or his campaign committee) purchased from Michael Milken's old firm, Drexel Burnham Lambert Inc., with money borrowed from a person or persons still unknown, and sold for a nifty profit of \$13,000.

Last year there was the scandal over congressmen's unpaid bills for meals eaten by them and their cronies in the House restaurant. Perhaps it was to lessen such financial pressures on themselves that members of Congress not long ago hiked their salaries to nearly \$130,000

a year. Shortly thereafter it transpired that employees of the House Post Office were running a profitable side business selling cocaine right out of the office.

And now, Rubergate. It is already clear that the great majority of congressional check-bouncers — far more than can be explained by their higher number in the House — were Democrats, particularly the worst abusers. This is not because Democrats are inherently more sinful than Republicans, but because the voters, in their wisdom, have left the Democrats in control of the House uninterrupted for nearly 40 years. In that period of time, longtime members with the clout afforded by seniority in the majority

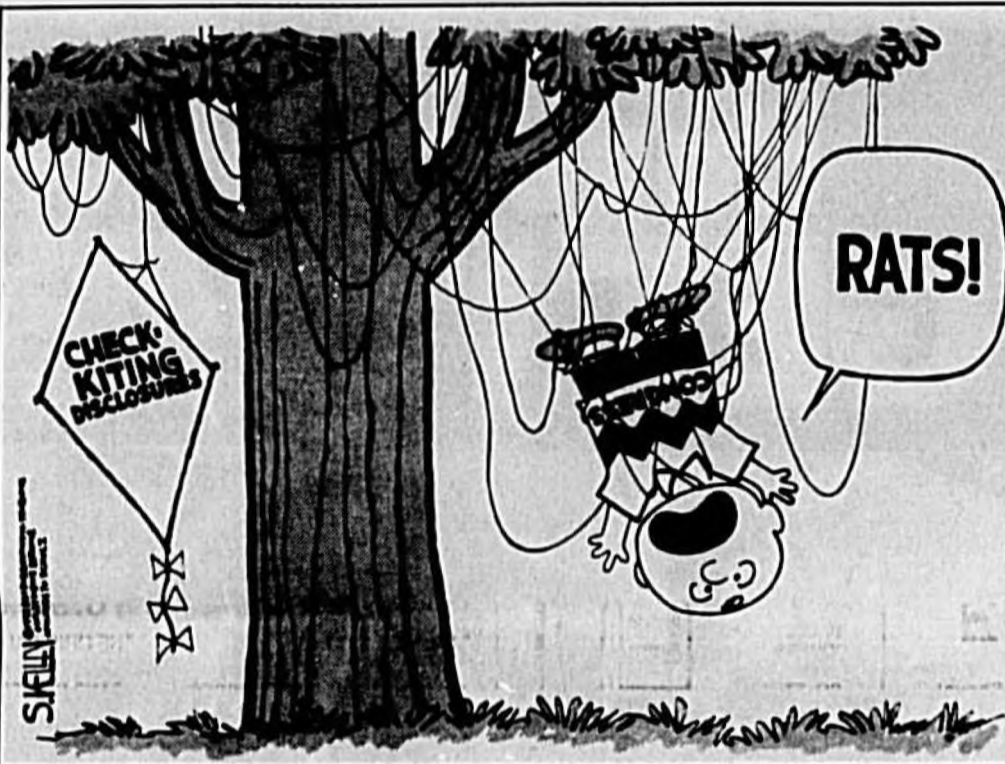
party became accustomed to getting away with murder.

Among the excuses being flung in our faces, like the tinfol confetti that planes used to use to evade radar, two stand out as in particular need of being swept away.

One is the righteous assertion that "No crimes have been committed." That is — as it was in the previous cases of Wright and Coelho — far from clear. If a member of Congress used the House Bank to obtain tens or (for all we know) hundreds of thousands of dollars in interest-free loans, what did he or she do with the money? Plow it into the next campaign and cover the overdraft after being re-elected? Or was the money simply invested — and, if so, was an appropriate tax paid on the profit?

Another is the emollient reassurance that, whatever misdeeds a particular congressman may have committed, we can safely leave his punishment to the voters of his district, for after all they can turn him out any time they want to.

It is an interesting idea, that a prison sentence, or even a vote of censure, should not be inflicted on a congressman because political defeat is a more appropriate (and somehow more democratic) punishment for such grandees. Why not inflict both?

# Whistle-blowers fare poorly

WASHINGTON — Four years ago, candidate George Bush promised that federal whistle-blowers — government employees who come forward with tales of waste and abuse — would have nothing to fear during his administration. In fact, he vowed they would be treated as "heroes."

Over the past four years, however, whistle-blowers have fared no better — and possibly worse — than in previous administrations. The usual "reward" for coming forward has been demotion or termination, and in a few cases threat of prosecution for revealing classified information.

Two current cases are typical: Aldric Saucier is a \$75,500-a-year physical scientist with the Strategic Defense Command, the U.S. Army's component of the Strategic Defense Initiative. He was the author of a very detailed study arguing that an updated version of the current Patriot missile system is all that is needed to effectively track and shoot down the existing generation of ballistic and tactical missiles.

SDI, however, is spending billions annually on developing new missile interception systems. Saucier claimed that much of this money is being wasted, especially since no potential enemy is currently trying to develop a new generation of missiles. The former Soviet missile development program has largely been abandoned with the breakup of the Soviet Union.

To say that Saucier's report angered his bosses would be an understatement. The report was rejected, and the scientist given a job rating of "unsatisfactory," then fired on the basis of that job rating.

High-ranking members of the House and Senate, including a number of Republicans, have now come to Saucier's aid, demanding that his firing be rescinded. As a result, Defense Secretary Richard Cheney has ordered Army Secretary Michael Stone "to defer final action" until his office has an opportunity to investigate the situation.

Army Col. James Roberts, SDC chief of staff, notified Saucier that his status would be changed to "administrative leave with pay." But he also said that he had not changed his mind about wanting to fire Saucier.

Three years ago, Congress, over the objections of the Bush administration, passed the Whistle-Blower Protection Act. It empowers the Office of Special Counsel to investigate allegations of retaliation towards whistle-blowers. Saucier has filed a grievance under the law and may become its first major test case.

Several members of the House are trying to save the job of a Census Bureau professional whose crime was being objective on a subject

about which the Bush administration wants little objectivity — the number of Iraqis, especially civilians, killed in the Gulf War.

Last year, in preparation for the publication of "World Population 1992" — an annual estimate of world population — the Census Bureau's Center for International Research assigned 29-year-old demographer Beth Osborne the task of updating population figures for Iraq.

Osborne realized that, for a remotely accurate figure, she had to try to estimate how many Iraqis died in the war. So, after an extensive search of accounts of the war, plus interviews with experts around the world, Osborne came up with the estimate that 158,000 Iraqis died as a result of both the war and subsequent fighting between Iraqis, Kurds and Shiites. She further broke the deaths down into 86,194 men, 39,612 women and 32,195 children.

Both the White House and the Defense Department have worked tirelessly trying to keep the spotlight off the numbers killed in the Gulf War. The Pentagon's stock answer is that they simply cannot make an estimate.

But when an Associated Press reporter called Osborne, she gave him her estimates because, in the past, all work of her Center has been considered public information and available to anyone who calls and asks.

Predictably, the Center was thrown into a major panic when the figures became public. Osborne's work was termed "highly inaccurate." Her superiors quickly rewrote her report cutting her estimates by more than two-thirds.

Equally predictably, she has now been notified that she is to be terminated.

The non-profit Government Accountability Project is dedicated to exposing government waste and to protecting whistle-blowers. According to its legal director Thomas Devine: "This administration has not been any more sympathetic towards whistle-blowers than the previous administration was. It remains very intolerant of all government critics, especially those who work for the government."

# Make bouncers pay the price

Before personal computers were invented, before political correctness was invoked, we knew all about "PCs." These were "privileged characters" — self-righteous smuggers — and we wouldn't give them our votes for dogcatcher.

Comes now a new breed, PCCs — Privileged Characters of Congress — inveigling our votes.

We sent them to be our representatives in the House, and they say that's precisely what they were. Some 355 of them hope we'll understand that they merely handled their banking practices in a manner representative of the way we handle (and mishandle) ours.

So they bounced some checks. Some were representative of the best of us; others, the worst; and most of them were like most of us: We write 50 billion checks annually — and bounce 37,500,000 of them, the American Bankers Association reports.

But there is this minor distinction: When we bounce a check on our bank, we pay a penalty. When they bounced a check on their House Bank, nobody paid.

Privilege doth have rank. But we can purify it by insisting that our PCCs vote to revoke their privilege. Let them assess themselves a fee of \$15 per check they bounced, plus an 18-percent interest penalty on each overdrawn check.

One representative has taken an impressive step toward atonement. Rep. Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., who made himself a leader of Congress in shaping of foreign policy and authorizing the Persian Gulf War, turns out to have also made himself a leader in congressional check bouncing. Solarz and his family wrote 600 to 700 overdrafts on his House Bank account in three years and three months ending June 30, 1991.

Solarz' response includes the standard explanation that he didn't pay attention to his House Bank balance — but last October, he voluntarily assessed himself a penalty. Solarz asked his accountant to determine what interest was assessed on overdrafts by commercial banks during those 39 months, and when the accountant said the highest rate was 18 percent, a spokesman says Solarz rounded it to 20 percent and wrote a \$2,400 check to the Disbursing Office of the House Sergeant-at-Arms. With that, Solarz made himself a leader of Congress in yet another category: redemption.

The American Bankers' Association reports that commercial banks also charge an average fee of \$15 per overdraft. Many banks offer overdraft protection, in which they will not bounce checks but will cover them and assess an overdraft fee plus a 16 to 21-percent interest charge on each. Solarz' spokesman says his boss didn't assess himself overdraft fees because the House Bank paid no interest on his checking account. But a bankers' association official noted that interest rates are earned only when checking accounts keep a minimum balance — which would seem to disqualify an account that bounced more than 600 checks over 39 months.

There's no crime, and certainly no shame, in bouncing a check now and then. But if it can be shown to be a sweeping pattern indicating a member of Congress was, in effect, floating himself interest-free loans, the Internal Revenue Service or Justice Department may make a federal case of it.

However, the vast majority of abuses are not about crime, just privilege. So, tell your representative in the House that all but the most flagrant abusers can find electoral redemption by enacting a resolution to assess each member a fixed \$15 fee, plus 18-percent interest, for each overdraft.

Scholastic Book Fairs presently has two offices in the area, the main office at 901 N. Lake Destiny Road in Maitland, and a secondary operation at 150 Hope Street in Longwood.

Christine Kirkham at the Maitland office explained, "As I understand it, the proposal to move to Lake Mary has been placed on hold for the time being, and we're probably going to withdraw our application." Kirkham would not immediately reveal why the withdrawal will be made.

Jon Walls, who represents Shell Oil, owners of the property, said this morning, "As it stands right now, the proposal will be brought up tonight at the Commission meeting, but what will happen before tonight I cannot say."

Walls had appeared before the

Lake Mary Planning and Zoning Commission when the initial applications were discussed. P&Z unanimously recommended the Commission accept both proposals.

The only problem would be in the warehouse space required by Scholastic Book Fairs. The original development order, D.O., does not include warehouses, and the matter would require an amendment to the D.O. by the City.

Even if the matter remains on tonight's agenda, City Planner Matt West plans to stop tonight's action. "Since the City Staff has not received an actual request to amend the development order," he said, "we are recommending the matter be tabled." He suggested the tabling should "not include any specific date since it is not known when the request to amend the D.O. will be scheduled."

In suggesting approval of the Shell Oil requests, P&Z also included two previously agreed upon stipulations prior to issuance of the site permit.

The first two would require the payment of \$34,238 to the Lake Mary Police Department and \$15,000 to the Fire Department. The other requirement would be either the donation of two acres of Northpoint land for use as a park or payment of \$184,000 in cash.

"These payments were part of the original development conditions we agreed to when the development of Northpoint was first approved five years ago," said Walls.

The proposals are listed on the agenda for tonight's City Commission meeting. The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. in the commission chambers of the Lake Mary City Hall.

After Jordan walked to reload the bases, Twigg hit a ground ball to shortstop and beat the relay throw to first base, allowing Mark Bellhorn to score.

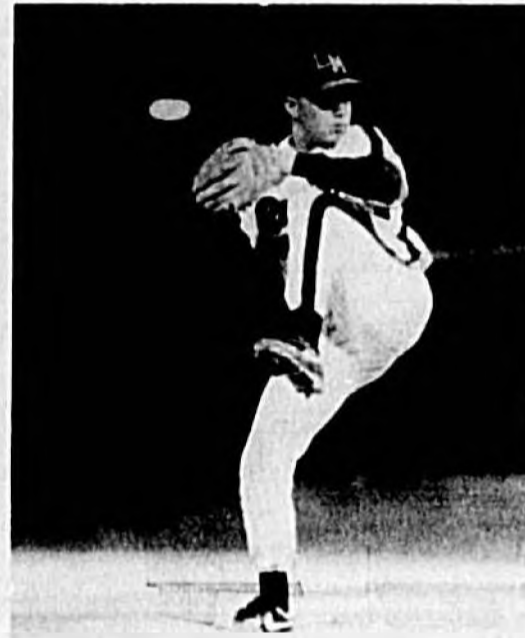

Additionally, traffic crashes caused by people under the influence of alcohol and other drugs is the number-one cause of violent death in America, and Fetal Alcohol Syndrome is the largest preventable cause of mental retardation among American children.

These consequences are a fact, whether the drug of choice is a legal or illegal substance.

You are correct. Prohibition failed. However, during the period of Prohibition (1920-33), alcohol consumption did drop considerably and the incidence of alcohol-related illnesses declined dramatically. While Prohibition was not the answer, the nation's alcohol-related illnesses declined dramatically.

The nation's alcohol problems are much worse today than ever before. There are now approximately 10 million problem drinkers in the U.S. History has proven that legalization of a substance increases its use in the population and contributes to creating a larger population of

chronic users.

We have gone to enormous public expense to pass and implement laws to protect our citizens against hazardous chemicals and known poisons. Heroin, cocaine, hallucinogens and other toxic chemicals would have little debate over their right to legal accessibility were it not for the fact that they can deliver pleasurable sensations prior to destroying the human mind and body.

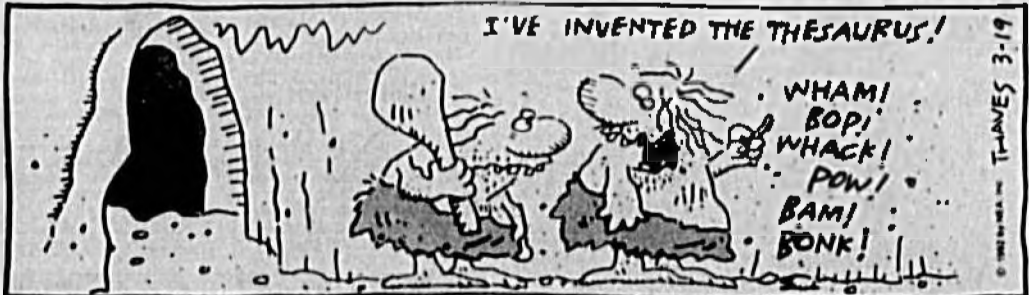

**How to curb the pain caused by scar tissue**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** After a battery of diagnostic tests including MRI, CT scan of the abdomen and lower bowel series, I was referred to a pain management clinic in a major hospital. I was told I had an entrapped ilioinguinal nerve from scar tissue from previous abdominal surgeries. Nerve blocks only last a few months. Can you suggest any other type of treatment that would be more permanent?

**DEAR READER:** One of the commonest consequences of surgery is the formation of scar tissue. Ordinarily, this tissue causes no symptoms. However, if the scar lies near a nerve, patients may occasionally experience pain if the scar contracts and exerts traction on the nerve. If you have understood your doctors correctly, your pain is the result of such traction on a nerve in your lower abdomen. You will very likely be helped by the pain clinic, where specialists use medicine, such as anti-inflammatories, and techniques, such as acupuncture, for pain relief. Although this unusual situation is not a health hazard, it is uncomfortable and can be treated.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My daughter was recently operated on for a ruptured appendix. Her doctor indicated she had a carcinoid. Could you please explain what this is? Her bed-wetting problems cleared up just prior to surgery, and I can't help but wonder if there is any connection between the two.

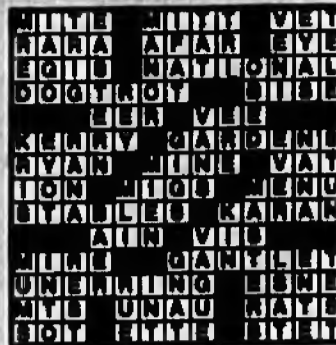
**DEAR READER:** Carcinoid syndrome, an uncommon affliction caused by nests of tumors in the abdomen, usually leads to flushing of the skin, abdominal cramps, diarrhea and heart disorders.

Since carcinoid tumors are usually benign and often arise in the appendix, they are discov-

ered by accident during routine appendectomies. Other forms of carcinoid tumor, especially those in the lungs and liver, may be malignant, requiring chemotherapy for treatment (in addition to surgery for diagnosis). Fortunately, your daughter

**WIN AT BRIDGE**

 Today's hand is our third from the 1991 Gold Flake Bridge Federation of Asia and Middle East Open Bridge Championship. It is from the match between the teams that finished first and second: Pakistan and Egypt.

An aggressive contract of three no-trump was reached. South couldn't be criticized for passing three clubs, but his fitting club honor and spade ace suggested that, if they had a heart stopper, he could run nine tricks. Dummy's aceless clubs must have been a disappointment.

At first glance, though, it looks as if declarer can maneuver nine tricks: one spade, one heart, one diamond and six clubs. However, the Egyptian defenders, Adel Kordy, West, and Samir Salib, found the way to defeat three no-trump. Kordy led the heart

king. Declarer won with dummy's ace, played a club to the queen and led a club to the queen and ace. Now Salib did well, switching to the spade 10. Declarer ducked and West won with the king. And Kordy found the right continuation. He cashed the heart queen and exited with a low spade.

Declarer was left somewhere between Satan and the Indian Ocean. If he had won the trick with dummy's spade queen, he could have cashed the club suit. But then he would have had to lead away from the diamond king at trick 12, losing the last two tricks and finishing one down. So South overtook dummy's spade queen with his ace and led a diamond toward dummy's king, hoping West was out of spades. However, West won with the diamond ace and cashed two spade tricks for two down.
