

HERMAN E. Morris, principal of the Red Cross water safety committee and instructor of classes in First Aid, accepted his present position as chairman of the 1947 Red Cross Fund Campaign for Seminole County. 



MADRID.—After more than 10 years in which Generalissimo Franco's government has punished political opposition as military rebellion,² the underground fight against his rule continues, in conspiratorial atmosphere of false names, hidden microphones and sudden police raids.

The group is divided into sub-groups, which contact the chairman or secretary through their chiefs.

"Maximum vigil is practiced in the use of pseudonyms and such indispensable measures as security as the avoidance of overlarge meetings and extensive acquaintanceship and reported by the activities of the organization. No regular afternoon meetings in cafés, no personal associations, and no sporadic jumping from fixed to fixed. Extraneous groups are completely screened down to the point of being members of the national council, with constant

More Than Hitler

"The Nazis' program for destruction included the destruction of the possibility of human forgiveness for themselves." This is the comment of Stephen Spencer in his new book, European Witness, which is a report of the author's four-month study, mostly in the British zone, of the post-war ideas and attitudes of German intellectuals.

Though sensitive to the catastrophic suffering and destruction in Germany, Spencer puts the blame squarely on the German people because Hitler, in Mein Kampf, and other party leaders had made it clear what Nazism was, and the people were eagerly receptive. Germans accepted the developing cruelty toward Jewish and conquered people as well as the distortion and pollution that Nazism brought to every phase of the nation's scientific, spiritual and intellectual endeavor.

This basic fact of the wholesale and fundamental guilt of all Germany must be borne in mind as the world seeks ways to re-educate the Reich in order that it may emerge worthy and safe for admittance into the family of nations.

Time For Spare Time

The word "pastime" is out. It's a corruption of "pass" plus "time" and once meant amusement, fun. But now it's necessary to develop a new philosophy about recreation. It can't be a pastime any more, a mere doodling away of idle hours. It's got to amount to something. People must "be educated for leisure." Dr. Clifford W. Brownell, Columbia University recreation expert, says so.

Now that Americans have more free time and higher wages, thanks to the labor unions, says Dr. Brownell, they don't know what to do with their time. "Good recreation is as important an element in every culture as food, clothing and shelter," according to him. But people must be trained to make their recreation "good."

So now everybody's going to have to spend some of his "spare" time studying what to do with it and then people won't have any leisure for the things they've learned to do with their leisure and Dr. Brownell will have to consult another expert who can tell him how to get leisure to learn what to do with it. Perhaps it would be just as well to start that detective story picked up at the drug store the other day, but don't tell the professor about it.

Little Me And Big We

No footlight performer can succeed without capable behind-the-scenes management. Few great human accomplishments are achieved by one individual acting alone. Soloing is an anachronism, for this is a world of human beings dependent on the interplay of other human beings before them and with them. Rare indeed is the achievement, the idea that springs unaided into one man's mind.

How many are willing to give credit to those who really made possible their success? The president of a company reads an impressive annual report, gives a stirring speech. He is applauded and rightly, since his is the responsibility. But how often does he go behind the scenes and acknowledge the idea and the man who makes his front possible? Only the very big person dares to let the light of his subordinate justly shine.

Miss Pauline Betz of Los Angeles regained the women's national singles by coming from behind to halt Miss Doris Hart of Miami, 11-9, 6-3. It was Pauline's fourth national crown. Miss Betz also won the Wimbledon title and helped the U. S. Wightman Cup team sweep to a 7-0 victory over the British in London.







As he introduced the measure, Knutson said that Treasury estimates indicate that the federal government stands to pay as much as \$4,000,000,000 if pending portal suits are decided in labor's favor.
