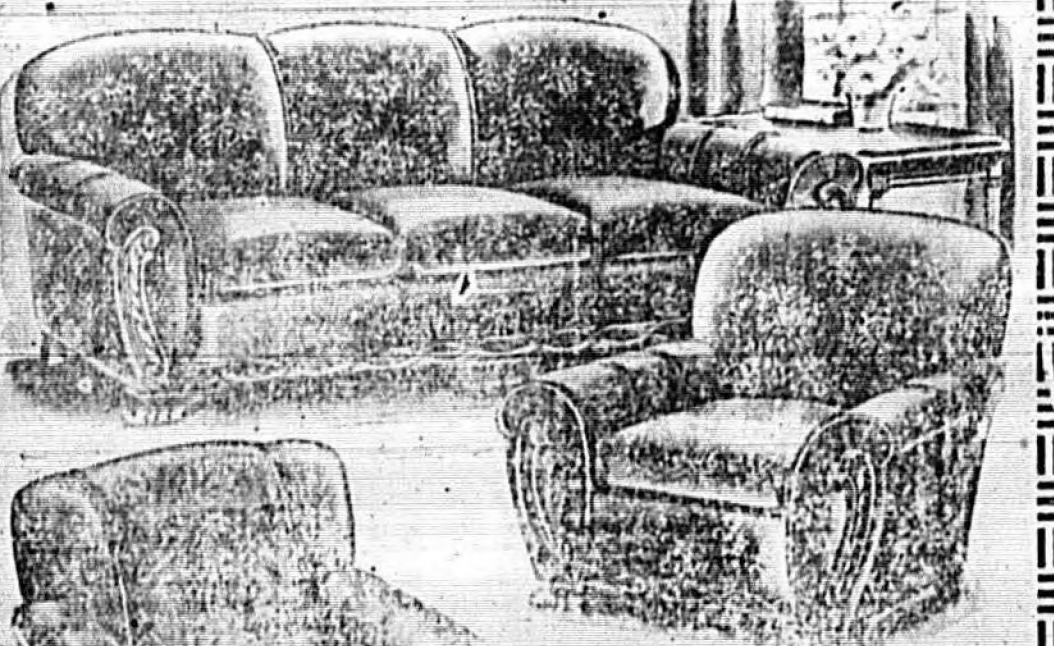

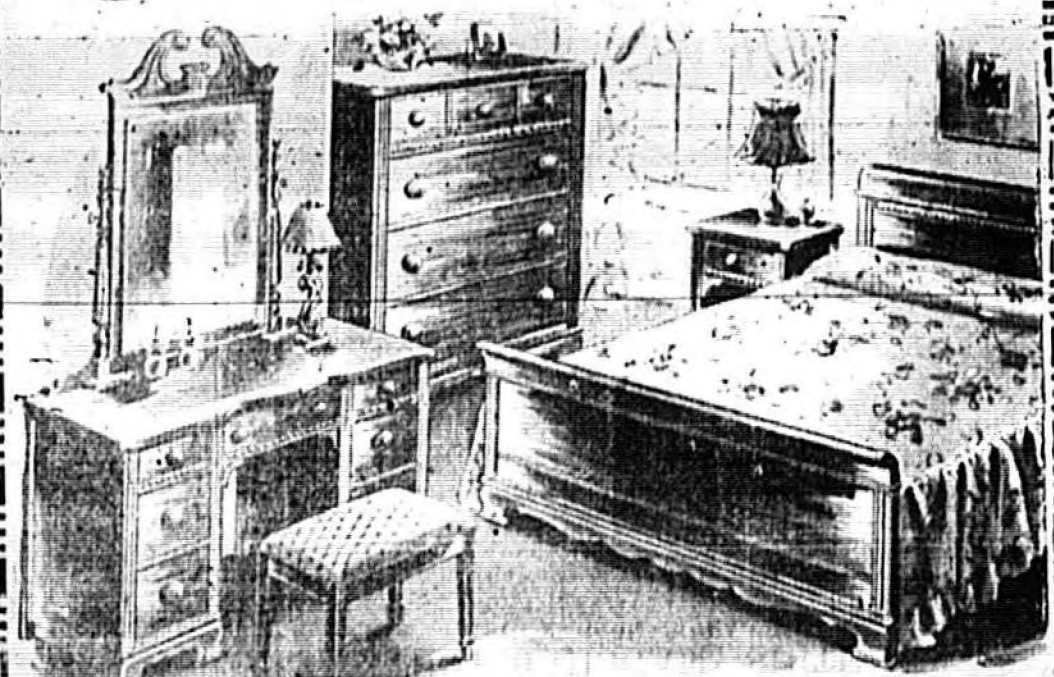

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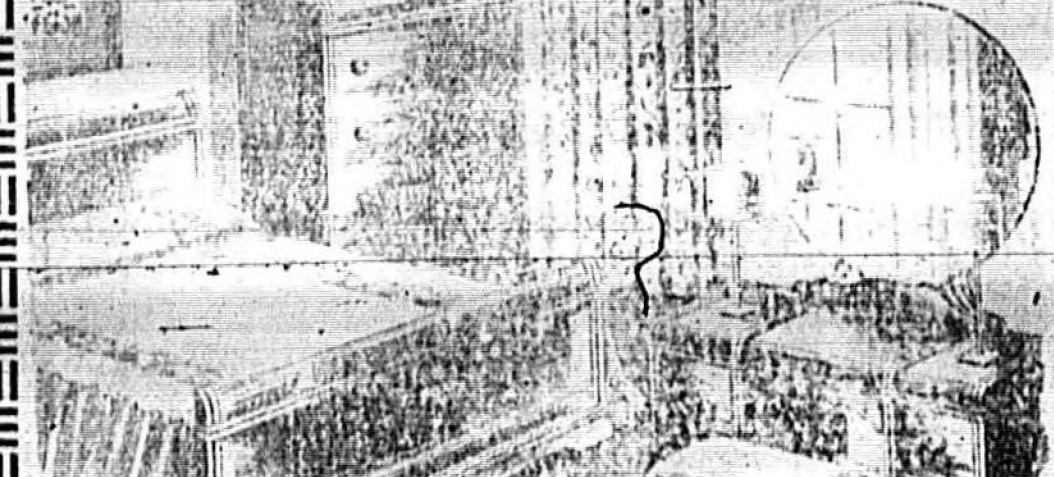

Gators Riding On Crest of Fight Game Win Streak

GAINESVILLE, Jan. 22.—Currently enjoying an eight game victory stretch, including three Southeastern Conference wins at the expense of Georgia and Auburn, the University of Florida Gators, captured yet another victory over Jacksonville N.A.S. and the University of Tampa, in the first game in a single contest Saturday night. The Florida Gators hold a 50-44 win over the Navy five in a previous game this season. Still employing a fast break and a tight defense to good advantage, the Gators annexed two contests from Auburn here this week and to put them in sixth place in the SEC standings with three victories against two losses. The losses were to Mississippi State and Alabama on the road early in the season. These games in the Conference remain for the Gators with return contests scheduled at Gainesville. Meanwhile, with eleven (CORRECT) victories against five losses this season, the Gators have rolled up 666 points in the eleven contests, or an average of 41 points per game. Hans Tandler, range Jacksonville freshman center, remains high point man for the Gators with 190 points for the sixteen contests. Tandler has hit the bucket for 74 field goals of 148 points and won 42 points via the foul good route. Close competitor is Bill Atkinson, Jacksonville sophomore forward, with 80 points for 12 contests. Others in the scoring bracket are Society Henderson, Jacksonville, tied with Julian Miller, Pensacola, with 56 points each; Lamar Bridges, Tampa, 57 points; and Harry Hamilton, Gainesville, 56 points. Basketball Coach Sam McCall later planned light drills early this week, with emphasis on goal shooting and the fast break. The Gators have put to good advantage since they returned to the court after the Christmas holidays. Army Justice In Law Cases Is Challenged

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Senator Glen Taylor of Idaho today challenged the United States Army's competence to deal with crime in its own ranks. Taylor's challenge was leveled before a War Department review board hearing the case of Pvt. Leo Christensen of Iowa, Idaho. Christensen was convicted last June by court martial of murder and manslaughter while serving in Japan with the 24th infantry division. And he was sentenced to hang. Senator Taylor charged that the soldier lacked adequate legal representation. Also he said the record indicates that a confession was obtained from Christensen by methods that were fundamentally unfair. Pointing out that the soldier was only 18 years old when he was tried, the Idaho Democrat asked: "How well is the Army taking care of our 18 year olds and protecting their rights? Apparently not too well if the Christensen case is typical of Army justice."

Observers In Poland Report On Elections

WARSAW, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Observers for the American embassy in Warsaw, sent in their impressions of the attitude of the Polish people as one of cynicism, hopelessness, fear and abject submission. Reports handed to Ambassador Arthur Bliss Lane tell of frustration and resignation among the Polish voters. The reports are attributed to intimidation by the Communist-dominated bloc parties. These groups are said to have used armed forces to turn out a mass vote. And they also produced a long list of violations of the Polish constitution and the election laws. Ambassador Lane said he'll send detailed reports on the elections to Washington next Wednesday. His information is based on what embassy personnel and other Americans witnessed when they visited all the important sectors of Poland before and during Sunday's election. Two Thugs Stage \$20,000 Holdup At News Office

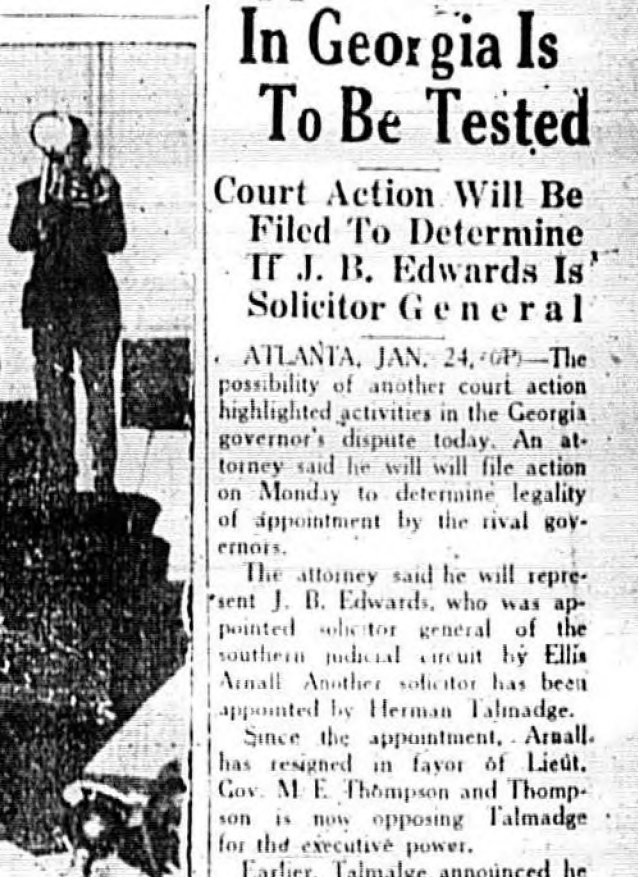
NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Two masked men got away with \$20,000 in a holdup at the news office of the Brooklyn Daily Eagle. The two thugs walked rapidly through the first floor business office past dozens of clerks and stenographers. They went straight to a fenced-in cage where the cashier, a girl, was sitting. The cage was enclosed by wire screening and bars running halfway to the ceiling. One man pulled a gun and pointed it at the girl. The other man scrawled over the cage and seized a canvas bag containing a \$20,000 payroll. With the aid of a monkey, he climbed out of the cage, his companion following. The two men fled to the street and made their getaway in a truck.

Committee Is Told Indians Still Need Aid

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—(AP)—Continued government supervision of Indian tribes was urged today by Secretary of the Interior Julius Krug. He told the Senate Civil Service Committee that this supervision should continue until, as he put it, "The Indian tribes can move into society safely." The Civil Service Committee is attempting to find ways and means of cutting down federal employment. Chairman Langer of North Dakota has suggested that the Interior Department be liquidated. Krug said that he was a firm believer in the Indians, but that the aid must continue "in the time being. The Cabinet officer said "It is not clear to me that it is wise to release assistance tomorrow to the Navajo tribe, for example, when the Indians are still in a black strait on our help."

Big National Goal In March Of Dimes Campaign Announced

MADRID—After more than 10 years in which Generalissimo Franco's government has punished political opposition as "military rebellion," the underground "U" against his rule continues, in a comparatively free atmosphere of false news, hidden mimeograph and subversive police raid.

An outline of how one clandestine underground group operates shown by a copy of a letter from "Union of Free Intellectuals" (Union de Intelectuales Libres-U. I. L.) of the Spanish republican government-in-exile.

This document has by now undoubtedly reached the hands of the Franco authorities.

The U. I. L. claims to be an all-party anti-Franco group, and although its structure closely follows the Comintern line, diplomats who have met some of its representatives say it contains spokesmen of other parties, too.

Organization Is Explained

"Our organization adopts, in general terms, the following system. Each section covers a university district (Spain has 12 universities) and is led by a superior council. Under its direction are local councils in those provincial capitals whose distance require them. The level below this is the group, with a chairman and secretary. The group is divided into sub-groups, which contact the chairman or secretary through their chiefs."

"Machismo" is practical in the use of pseudonyms and such indispensable measures of security as the avoidance of overt meetings and extensive acquaintanceships not required by the activities of the organization. No regular afternoon meetings, no cafes, no personal contacts and no sporadic impromptu meetings. Each group is completely organized down to the minutiae of its members' lives and financial problems, with constant

Jack Cramer Rated As Outstanding Netman Of Year

AP News Features Sports Editor NEW YORK—Tennis returned with a bang during the postwar year in sports. Records were set for gate receipts at the nationals in Forest Hills and international competition was back in full swing. Thousands of fans were turned away on the final two days of the nationals which netted approximately \$125,000 and attracted a total of 75,000.

John Kramer, tall 25-year-old ex-coast Guard lieutenant of Los Angeles, was being rated as another Don Budge. He won his first national singles crown, beating Tom Brown, 23-year-old Army veteran from San Francisco, 9-7, 6-3, 6-0.

Kramer also won two singles matches for the U. S. Davis-Cup team in a 5-0 sweep over Sweden, giving this country the right to face Australia in the final. Bill Talbot of Wilmington, Del. and Gardner Mulloy of Miami, Fla., retained their national doubles supremacy, winning both the grass and clay court crowns while Frank Parker of Los Angeles beat Talbot in the clay court singles in Chicago.

Francisco Segura of Ecuador became the first South American ever to win the national indoor singles when he beat Don McNeill of Oklahoma City in four sets in the first indoor since 1941.

Miss Pauline Betz of Los Angeles regained the women's national singles by coming from behind to halt Miss Doris Hart of Miami, 11-9, 6-3. It was Pauline's fourth national crown. Miss Betz also won the Wimbledon title and helped the U. S. Wightman Cup team sweep to a 7-0 victory over the British in London.

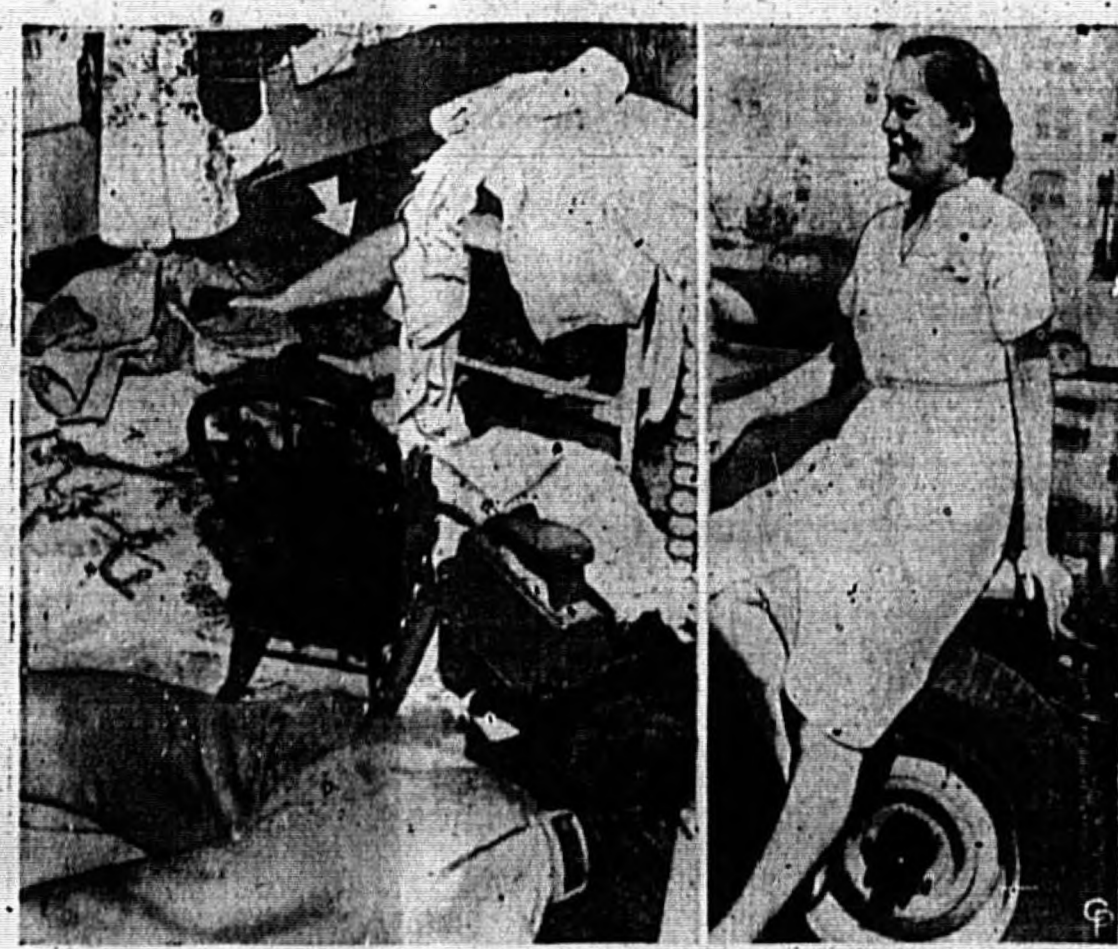

Of course the company doesn't object in the least when Betty, using its clubs and golf balls, goes out and beats some other girl who is using the clubs and balls of a different manufacturer.

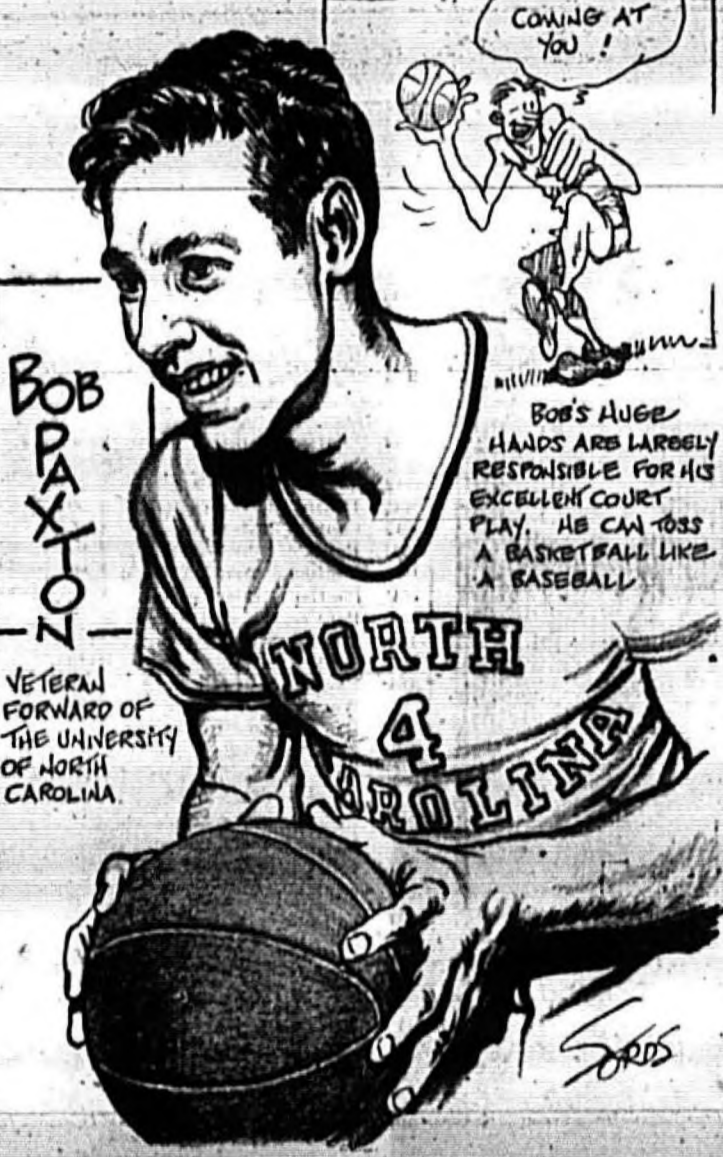

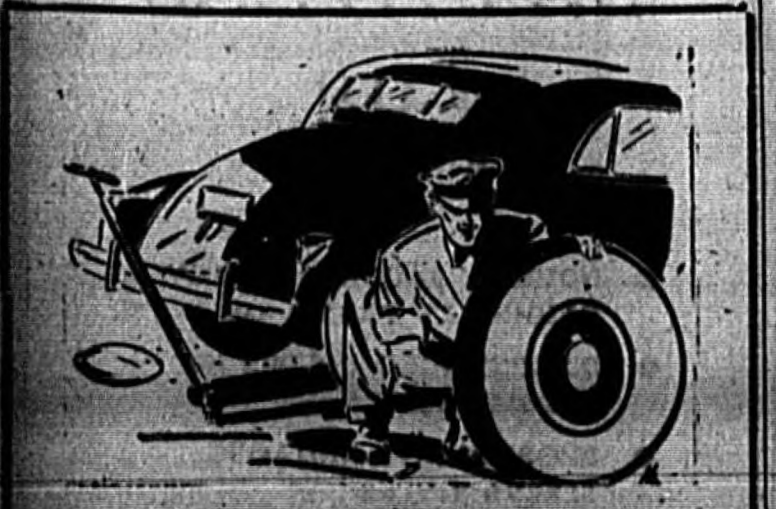

New Measure Would Outlaw Portal Suits

Legislation Is Introduced In Congress To Keep Workers From Regaining Pay

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27. (AP)—Congress today received proposed legislation to outlaw in effect the portal-to-portal pay suits which have been sweeping the country. The measure, written by GOP Rep. Harold Knutson of Minnesota, would prohibit workers from recovering any money under the suits. As he introduced the measure, Knutson said that Treasury estimates indicate that the federal government stands to pay as much as \$4,000,000,000 a year in portal suits are decided in labor favor.

Meanwhile the chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, Senator Alexander Wiley, said a recession threatens America and portal suits are a major drain on the national treasury. In a prepared statement, the Wisconsin Republican said today that the very success of failure of the nation's reconstruction program depends on the answer given to this problem.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27. (AP)—Republican leaders in Congress reached agreement today on the measure they hope to ship off President Truman's \$37,500,000,000 budget. They are counting on a minimum 10 percent slice.

That's the estimate set today by Chairman Styles Bridges of the House Ways and Means committee.

Demolition Of Iron Lung Is Held Downtown Today

Which interest was shown today at the downtown exhibition of an iron lung as a respirator for infantile paralysis which with the special lung contains it, is owned by Mrs. H. May of Sarasota.

Mrs. Mary O'Brien of Charleston, S. C., an actual donor of how a patient lies inside the large horizontal cylinder which has been outside and resting upon a pillow. She explained that a piece of Mr. May, Margaret Marie Watson, had been kept for a long time as a patient in the respirator, which she said, is available here for use at any time it is needed.

At the end of the cylinder is a large hollow affair operated by an electric motor, and should this power fail it can be operated by hand. Variations of air pressure within the cylinder provides artificial respiration. The tank is not so complicated as it appears. It is about 18 inches in diameter and in the case of an infant, this rate can be increased to 20 times a minute.

Access to the patient by doctor, nurse or anyone else is possible by means of a door at the front of the cylinder. This permits observation. The iron lung was first invented and used successfully by Dr. Emerson of Northampton, Mass.

Report States Cooler Weather Benefitted Crops

Carry Over Of Seed Crop Plant Pests Somewhat Reduced

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 27. (Special)—Cooler weather which struck the State the middle of the week did very little damage to growing crops, and may result in some very definite benefits, said William L. Wilson, director of State Markets today. "As I pointed out recently the mild weather this winter has had a tendency to permit the 'carry over' of an excessive large seed crop of plant pests to recreate their kind this in the year and cause growers a lot of trouble. The cold should cut down this carry over."

For the immediate present a direct benefit is reported by Manager R. E. Johnson of our Plant City State Farmers Market, who said at the week-end that strawberries will show a considerable increase in volume this coming week, due to rain and cool weather and the beginning of picking of a new crop. A nice rain swept the Plant City section early in the last week, relieving a drought which had cut into the strawberry volume very substantially.

Crash Is Blamed On Mechanical Failure

There was a strong tendency today to blame mechanical failure, rather than a pilot error, for the plane crash in which Grace Moore, the American singer, and Prince Gustaf Adolf, of Sweden, were killed. The two nobles, along with 20 other persons, lost their lives yesterday in the crash of a Royal Dutch Airlines plane at Copenhagen, Denmark.

It was an American-made DC-3 transport in which Miss Moore and the Swedish Prince were killed. The ship was flying from Amsterdam to Stockholm, and it had stopped at Copenhagen. According to the airline, the weather was good when the plane took off. But as the ship left the runway, it rose steeply upward in a very unusual way but, unavailability. What happens thereafter, they added, might indicate that the plane was in an abnormal condition.

English Judge In Jerusalem Is 2nd Kidnap Victim

Ten Men Take Magistrate From Court; Heir To Baroncy

JERUSALEM, Jan. 27. (AP)—The British placed 39,000 Palestine Jews under house arrest today as a result of two kidnappings of Britons. British military forces have postponed the execution of an alleged Jewish underground terrorist who was to have been hanged tomorrow.

JERUSALEM, Jan. 27. (AP)—The heir to a British barony, Judge Ralph Wincham disappeared today in the second kidnaping in Jerusalem in 36 hours. Earlier, a retired British major named H. A. I. Collins, who was a director of a Jewish-owned bank in Palestine was taken from his home. It is believed both Britons are being held as hostages for a member of a Jewish underground who is scheduled to be executed tomorrow.

In the kidnaping of the judge, ten well-dressed men believed to be Jews drove up to the Tel Aviv court building in three taxis. They were armed. They went into a partly filled courtroom where no case was in progress and ordered Judge Wincham to follow them. Wincham is heir to the Bowyer-Smith barony and is president of the Tel Aviv court.

S. C. Dickson, 93, Dies Yesterday

Samuel Croxall Dickson, 93, died yesterday at 2:45 P. M. in a nursing home in DeLand. Mr. Dickson, who was born Dec. 6, 1853 in Louisville, Ky., had been a citrus grower in Longwood for 64 years. He was a member of the Holy Cross Episcopal Church of Sanford.

He is survived by one daughter, Miss Mildred Dickson, of Asheville, N. C.; one son, Walker Dickson, of Clearwater, Fla.; one grandson, Joseph A. Stewart; two granddaughters, Miss Elizabeth Matthews and Miss Harnett Matthews and one niece, Mrs. Mildred Babcock, all of Sanford.

Funeral services will be held at 3:30 P. M. on Tuesday at the Erickson Funeral Home with Father Mark T. Carpenter officiating. Interment will be in the Lakeview Cemetery.

Reds Support Formation Of German State

Plan Outlines Steps For Presentation Of Peace Treaty; U. S. Idea Ignored

LONDON, Jan. 27. (AP)—Russia today submitted a plan to deal with Germany only when there is what the Soviets described as a "suitable" government to deal with.

A Soviet memorandum to the other members of the four-power deputy foreign ministers conference ignored an American suggestion that the Allies impose an unconventional "peace statute" on the beaten enemy.

What Russia currently wants is for the major powers to draft a formal treaty, sponsor a peace conference to approve it, and then submit it for ratification by "the German State." The peace conference wouldn't be called until "a central government is established which is recognizable to accept such a treaty."

Poland was heard from today at the deputy's committee dealing with reparations. The Poles estimated their material losses in the war at close to \$12,000,000,000.

Big National Goal In March Of Dimes Campaign Announced

An appeal to the community to double contributions to the 1947 March of Dimes, the annual fund-raising drive of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, to the \$24,000,000 national goal will be made today by Randall Chase, chairman of the local March of Dimes campaign, who released a letter from Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation, stressing the crucial importance of the 1947 March of Dimes.

The need to replenish funds drained in fighting last summer's epidemic, which affected more than 25,000 persons and was the worst in the Foundation's history, is more urgent than ever before, Mr. O'Connor declared. To assure continuing care of patients and build up adequate chapter reserves for future epidemics, \$12,000,000 is needed, he said.

The other half of the \$24,000,000 is required on the national level as follows:
Epidemic aid reserve fund, \$5,000,000;
Research and education, \$5,000,000;
General Working Fund, \$2,000,000.

During the 1946 epidemic, the \$4,000,000 epidemic reserve fund of the National Foundation, previously considered adequate, was wiped out completely by November in aiding chapters. By the end of the year approximately an additional \$1,500,000 earmarked for research had to be diverted for emergency aid to fulfill the pledge that "no one stricken by polio need go without care for lack of funds."

"This community as every other in the nation must be adequately prepared for any emergency the future may bring," Mr. Chase said.

"Let us double our contributions now so we can be prepared. We cannot gamble with the safety of our children. By giving generously now we will avoid future self-reproach that we gave too late and too late when next summer's epidemics strike."
